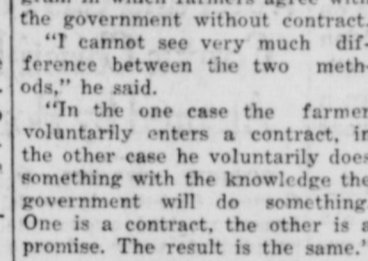
Postal Receipts For Ranger Show Increase Over Those Of The Same Period During 1936

Mankind's 'Other Side' in Startling Contrast

There are on display in Europe right now two exhibits which seem to sum up the tragic contradictions in the soul of modern man as nothing else could.

One of them is to be seen in Spain, where bombs crash into crowded city streets, tanks lumber across broken fields spitting flames and destruction, and men shoot their brother men by the hundreds because they cannot agree on the way society is to be run.

The other is on view at the great Paris Exposition, where there is a magnificent display of man's scientific achievements—his reading of the riddle of the stars, his conquests over disease, his brilliant reconstruction of his race's history, his harnessing of nature to do his will.

Vera Micheles Dean, editor of the weekly Bulletin of the Foreign Policy Association, makes this comment on these two exhibits:

"Undismayed by knowledge of his own mortality and the possible finiteness of the universe, the scientist, on a battlefield which spans the world, strives not only to preserve life but enrich it. Yet outside his laboratory, humanity, with growing indifference, accepts the deliberate increase in the chances of death inflicted by modern warfare."

It is a dismaying and an incomprehensible thing, this two-sidedness of man, this blending of magnificence and horror. The genius that conquers a world-old plague is the same genius that sends up airplanes to drop bombs on school rooms; the restless drive for accomplishment which can weigh, analyze and chart the movements of a star millions of light years away is the same force that divides a nation into warring camps and puts brother at the throat of brother.

The fact that human nature contains these contradictions—that man, who is made "a little lower than the angels" and can rise to dazzling heights of self-abnegation and mastery, also contains black spirits of cruelty and hatred and can be blind and destructive in his folly—this is not news. The race has always had a dual personality, a mingling of good and evil. But it is only in this modern world that the contrast between humanity's best efforts and its worst efforts has become so startling.

For our recent advances in the physical sciences have enormously increased our powers—for evil as well as for good. If a good man can do more to help the world now than ever before, because infinitely more efficient tools are in his hands, a bad man can do more to hurt it. Attila himself, with his horde of savage marauders, could not inflict destruction and misery on a given territory as quickly and completely as can an aviation corps major with a couple of flights of bombing planes.

In this fact lies the greatest of our problems. The echoes of our actions carry farther than they used to. More than ever before, we are required to master ourselves, to control the brute that is in us, and to give permanent ascendance to those forces in human nature which seek to lead us toward the stars.

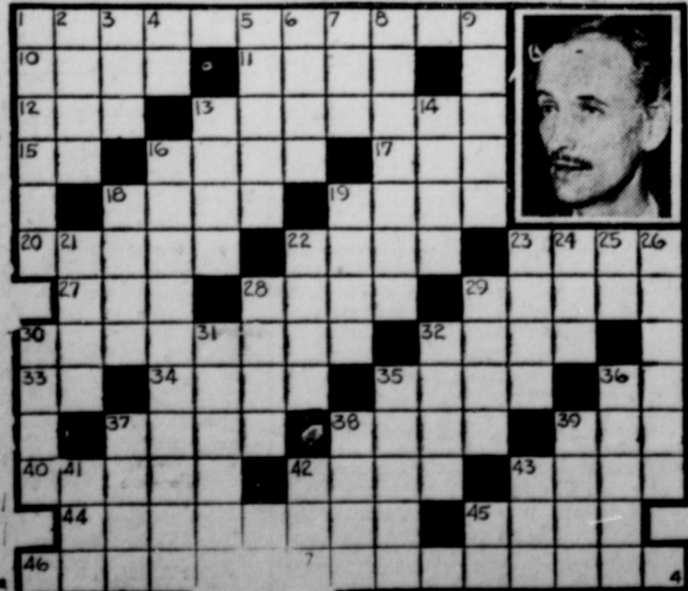

Water and Gas For Corpus Christi Is Assured by Bonds

CORPUS CHRISTI, Texas.—Corpus Christi's industrial interests received a guarantee for an adequate water and gas supply last week with the passage by a four-to-one vote of \$750,000 in bond issues to rehabilitate the city's water and gas systems. The bond issues were for the building of a new water line from the Nueces River at Calallen to Corpus Christi and for general rehabilitation and extension of the city's water and gas systems. Bonds for the water project total \$650,000, and those for the gas improvement program total \$100,000.

is expected to get under way in time to have it ready for use early next summer. The line will supplement a 20-inch main to Calallen now in use. The improved water and gas facilities, instituted to meet Corpus Christi's rapid industrial development program, will be a boon to new industries contemplating entering the local trade area.

Among the major industries which have announced plans for entering Corpus Christi are the Columbian Carbon Co., which will build a \$100,000 quick-freezing plant for frosting and preserving foods. The General American Tank Storage Terminal company is constructing a \$50,000 refinery and contemplates construction of a plant to build and repair tank cars and a pre-cooling plant for perishable foodstuffs. The Southern Alkali Corporation will soon add units for the manufacture of salt and chlorine.

8,000 Yearling Bass Put In White Rock Lake Near Dallas

DALLAS, Tex.—Eight thousand "yearling" bass have slithered down the bank into the waters of White Rock Lake, east of Dallas as part of the program to keep the lake in good condition for fishermen.

Marcus Evans, lake superintendent, said the fish were from 6 to 11 inches in length and by next May, when the 1938 fishing season opens, should all be the legal size—11 inches in length.

Approximately 250,000 fish are being taken from the city hatchery and dumped into White Rock and 100,000 into Bachman's Lake, including bass, crappie and catfish.

Dazzling Star Is Brighter than Sun

LICK OBSERVATORY, MOUNT HAMILTON, Cal.—Astronomers have discovered a super-nova, or "exploding star," which may mean the creation of a new planetary system.

Dr. F. Zwicky of the California Institute of Technology first photographed the celestial phenomena on Aug. 28 of this year. Since then the awe-inspiring manifestation has been the subject of repeated observations at the Lick Observatory.

The super-nova has received the designation "N.G.C. 4182," which places it outside the stellar system in which the earth has its place.

The super-nova at its maximum apparent brightness was only about one-sixth of that of the faintest star visible to the eye. It had an estimated brilliance of 250,000,000 times that of the sun, but its radiance was decreased because of its great distance from the earth, estimated at 3,000,000 light years.

It is difficult to conceive of the brightness of this new star. A super-nova was found in the center of the Andromeda Nebula in 1885. That particular super-nova was estimated to be 20,000 times brighter than the sun. Placed in our own stellar system, the 1885 star from a distance of nine light years, would appear 100 times brighter than a full moon.

If it could be put in the place of the sun, it would give 100,000,000 times the light of that sphere and in a space of one month at maximum brightness, it would radiate as much light as our sun does in 10,000,000 years.

The super-nova now under observation has an estimated intrinsic brightness of 250,000,000 times that of the sun. The spectrum of the new super-nova can be photographed with a spectrograph. This is the first time that such a phenomena has been photographed.

The cause of the outburst of a nova is not known definitely, but one noted astronomer, Stromberg, suggests the possibility that it is the making of a new planetary system. No known super-nova has appeared in the earth's stellar system.

BRITAIN PENSIONS MILLION

LONDON.—Approximately one million people still are drawing war pensions in Great Britain, the annual report of the Ministry of Pensions reveals. The report estimates that \$5,960,000,000 has been spent on pensions since 1914, and that the remaining 1,000,000 pensioners still on the rolls are drawing \$20,000,000 a year.

Several different "levels" were uncovered, indicating that sites were inhabited by their people for many generations. The probably lived in their huts, generation or two unoccupied.

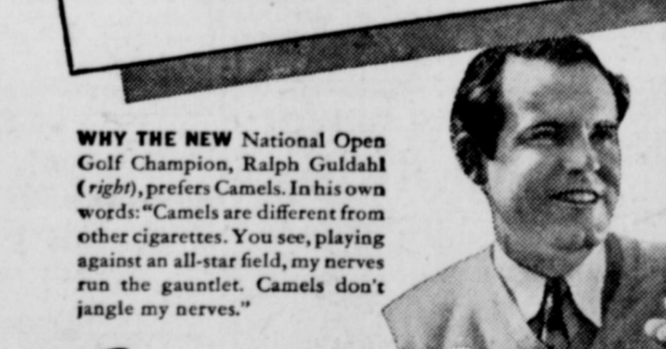

BREAKFAST: Grape and grapefruit juice, cornmeal waffles, maple syrup, coffee, milk.

LUNCHEON: Vegetable meat cakes, buttered rye bread, cabbage and apple salad, chocolate cake, tea, coffee.

DINNER: Apple juice, lardered beef liver, mashed potatoes, scalloped broccoli, stuffed celery, cherry gelatin, custard sauce, coffee, milk.

Vegetable Meat Cakes
(4 to 6 servings)

Three-quarter pound ground beef, 2 potatoes, 2 carrots, 1 tablespoon chopped parsley, 1 small onion, 1 teaspoon catsup, 1 teaspoon salt, 1-8 teaspoon pepper.

Chop carrots, potato and onion very fine--all raw. Combine with meat and parsley, add seasoning and catsup and mix thoroughly. Form into small cakes. Grease an iron frying pan and heat. Brown cakes in pan, turning frequently to prevent burning. Reduce heat, add about 1 tablespoon water to pan, cover and simmer cakes for 20 minutes. Youngsters will like this method of getting part of their daily requirement of vegetables.

Broiled mackerel for breakfast is an ancient and honorable American custom. Better try it some cold morning and you will understand why it belongs among the better things American. Use either fresh or salt mackerel. Salt mackerel should be soaked overnight in cold water to remove excess salt. To broil, first brush with melted butter, then sprinkle with salt and pepper. Salt mackerel will probably not require extra salt. Place skin side down on oven-proof platter under low oven flame and broil for from 12 to 15 minutes, basting with melted butter. This always calls for creamed potatoes and corn bread. Waffles, of course, but how about trying them made of cornmeal?

Cornmeal Waffles
(4 sets of waffles)

One cup sifted flour, 2 teaspoons baking powder, 1-2 cup yellow cornmeal, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 2 teaspoons sugar, 1 cup milk, 2 eggs, 1-3 cup melted butter.

Mix flour, baking powder, cornmeal, salt and sugar. Beat egg yolks into milk, and add melted butter. Stir this liquid mixture into dry ingredients. Mix just a little, only enough to blend. Beat egg whites stiff, then fold into mixture. To bake, place 1 teaspoon of batter in each waffle compartment which has been preheated to right degree of temperature. Cover and cook until brown on both sides. Serve with softened butter and maple syrup.
