Americans' Big Stake in a Powerful Navy

Even the most convinced pacifist must have moments, these days, in which he feels like thanking his God for the United States Navy.

We seem to have passed entirely out of the era in which international law or international treaties meant anything in particular. What makes the present so dark and the future so discouraging is the fact that the world has reverted to the rule of brute force.

A nation's only safeguard lies in its own strength; and it is extremely comforting to see that America's strength is fully implemented—sinead and made ready in a way no one can mistake.

We have been one of the world's luckiest nations for a century and a half—lucky because of our isolation, because of our infinite supply of natural resources, because destiny fixed things so that we could work out our own salvation in our own way.

But lucky nations are on the spot nowadays. The nations which have not been lucky have set out to take the things which have been denied them. In Ethiopia, in Spain and in China we have had ample opportunity to see just how determined and ruthless this desire to get a better share of the good things of this earth can make a people.

It used to be supposed that simply to possess strong armaments put a nation on its muscle. Build a great fleet or a great army and you will sooner or later go looking for a chance to use it—so ran the argument. But our own recent experience disproves that. We have one of the two mightiest navies on earth—yet we have resolutely kept our skirts clear of all entanglement in the Mediterranean, and have followed, in China, precisely the course we would have followed if our fleet were small and weak.

And as we do this we have the comfort of knowing that the war cannot be brought to our own shores. What happened to Nanking and Madrid won't happen to San Francisco or New York. Not until our navy is destroyed—and there exists today no power that could destroy it—can that be inflicted on us.

Our old pre-war outlook, which held that strong armaments were somehow incompatible with peace-loving democracy, has had to change. Democracy today is on trial as never before. It has to be strong enough to defend itself against powers which would destroy it.

Until this turbulent and uncertain era passes, it is hard to see how we can do anything else than keep our fleet as strong as the strongest and as ready as the readiest.

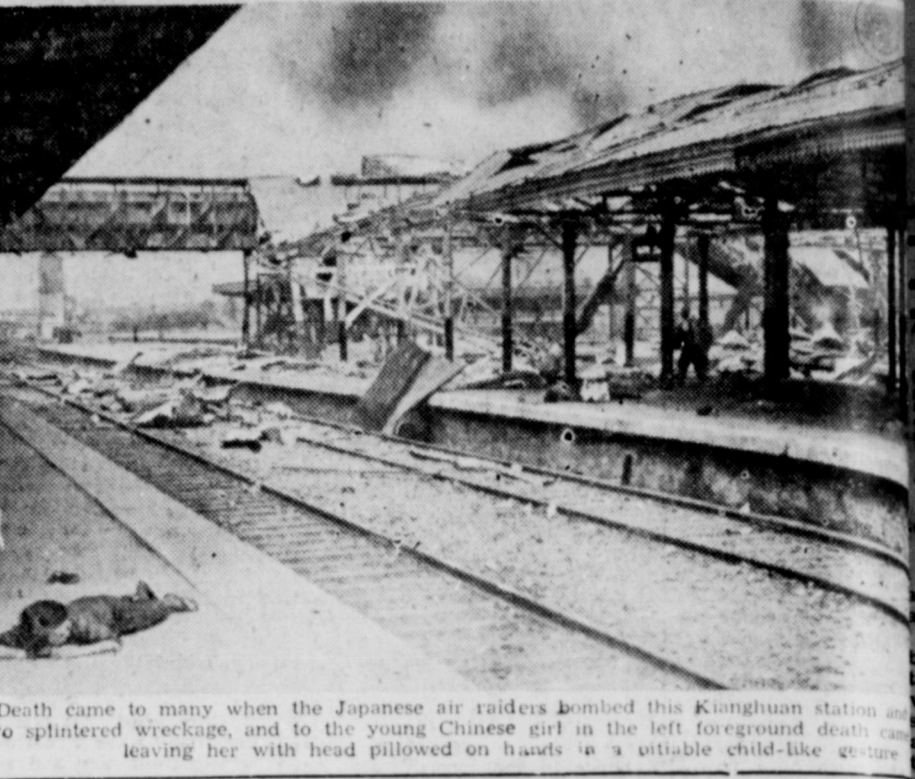
Three Students Take Dormitory to School

WASHINGTON. — Far-sighted Republican politicians, who couldn't keep their minds off 1940 even if they tried, cast frequent sidelong glances at Thomas E. Dewey of New York.

Dewey is famous in the east as the special prosecutor who has broken up vice and other rackets in New York City. He is now running for district attorney of New York on the same ticket with Mayor F. H. LaGuardia. A spectacular reform district attorney in the metropolis would be an obvious good Republican bet for the governorship, timber being as scarce as it is, and nearly any Republican governor of New York would be a strong candidate for presidential nomination.

All this would require some fast going, however, and Mr. Dewey is a long shot in an obstacle race. Tammany still has many jobs and privileges and the nightmare of Mr. Dewey making hay for himself by busting up Tammany rackets in district after district is calculated to bring all the bickering groups in that once powerful machine together in an effort to mother him.

Dewey runs only in the Tammany stronghold of Manhattan and not in the adjacent boroughs. Thus he is considered to have a poorer chance than LaGuardia. Furthermore, the Republican figure, Postmaster General Jimmy Farley has his mind set on running for governor next year and can be depended upon to do all he can to keep Tammany from being dis-

SISTER MARY'S KITCHEN

CHAFING dish parties are not confined to college dormitories. Even mothers can give them on cold nights after a few rubbers of bridge. They are an education for any appetite.

Shrimp de Luxe
(4 to 6 servings)
One-quarter cup butter, 1-4 cup flour, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 1-16 teaspoon pepper, 1-8 teaspoon paprika, 1-2 cups clear chicken broth, 3-4 tablespoon anchovy paste, 4 cups cooked or canned shrimp, 2 egg yolks, 1-2 cup cream, 3-4 tablespoon lemon juice.

Heat butter, work in flour to smooth paste, add salt and pepper and paprika. Then slowly stir in chicken broth. Cook until smooth, then add anchovy paste and shrimp. Beat cream and egg yolks together and add. Heat thoroughly but do not boil. Stir in lemon juice. Stir and serve on small spears of hot unbuttered toast.

Ham a la Rancho
(4 to 6 servings)
One large slice boiled or baked ham, 1-2 teaspoon French mustard, 1 teaspoon vinegar, salt and pepper, powdered sugar, 4 tablespoons sherry.

Cut ham into individual servings season with salt, pepper and French mustard. Place in chafing dish over flame. Add vinegar. Heat ham quickly, then turn. Dust lightly with powdered sugar, add sherry, bring to boil and serve immediately.

Of course, we never grow too modern to relish an old-fashioned Welsh rarebit. George Rector supplies this recipe.

Welsh Rarebit with Ale
(4 to 6 servings)
One tablespoon butter, 1 pound soft American cheese, 1-3 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon dry mustard, a few grains cayenne pepper, 1-2 cup ale, 1 egg.

Put butter in chafing dish. When melted, add cheese broken into pieces, and ale. Combine egg, salt, mustard and cayenne and beat thoroughly. When cheese is melted, add this egg mixture and cook until it thickens. Serve on strips of toast or on crackers.
