

This was the attitude he had maintained throughout the trial and, as the grim words were uttered, not a muscle moved, not a touch of color came or went in that face which was as though carved of marble. The eyes were not lifted. The piercing scream and choking sob of his wife did not cause so much as the flutter of an eyelash

on his part.
