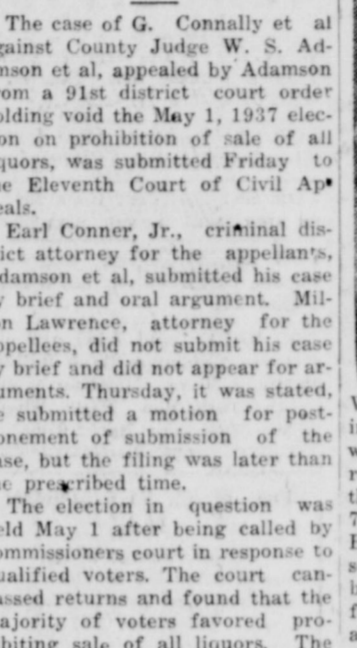

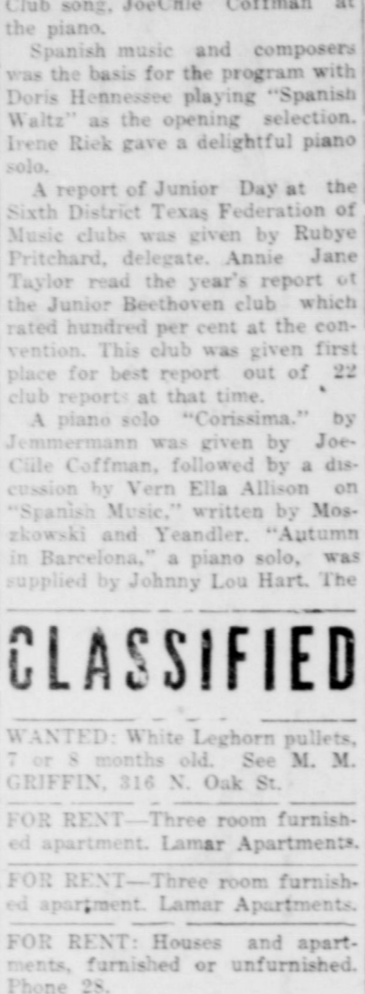

12. Should be a man able to win and hold the support of the great body of alumni and the support of the faculty.
13. Would be better that he know something of the problems of youth through having children of his own.
14. Should be a man of real character and high ideals who is committed to the principle that the university's mission is to equip men and women to live in society and to perform useful services as citizens.

NYA Training Is Enlarged In Scope

AUSTIN.—The training program for NYA youths assigned to work projects is being extended and enlarged in scope, J. C. Kellam, Texas youth director, told district representatives of the National Youth Administration here last week.
"We shall continue getting a dollar's worth of work for every dollar spent," he said. "But we will be in a better position to provide for instruction, and training, both on and off the job, for the young men and women assigned to our projects. NYA youths work only part time and most of them really want to devote their spare time to preparing themselves for a job in private employment."
Work projects approved by the NYA have been selected in part for the type and extent of training and work experience the project afforded to the youths. In addition, NYA youths have been encouraged to attend Emergency Education classes and evening schools, while youths from projects who desired to return to regular educational institutions have been eligible to receive regular student aid jobs.
Recently arrangements were completed in a number of towns for operation of training classes in homemaking for NYA girls through cooperation of the home-making division of the State Department of Education. Vocational training classes are also being planned in communities in which

Code of Valor Links Brave Fighting Men

Armies change from age to age and the generals are all different, but the men who get in there and do the fighting are pretty much the same, now and always.

Like the cavalymen in Tennyson's poem, their job is comparatively simple — to do and or die; and down through the centuries they had had an implicit and whole-hearted admiration for fellow members of their craft who dispels especial skill at the grim business.

So that little story about the Chinese "suicide squadron" at Shanghai, and the hit it made with the European soldiers who stood on the sidelines, is a revealing bit of history.

This suicide squadron consisted of a hundred or so Chinese soldiers who had taken cover in a ruinous warehouse along Soochow Creek to dispute the advance of the Japanese. They got in there and stayed for more than two days, subjected to heavy fire throughout, going woefully short on sleep and food, and facing nothing but certain death if they didn't retreat—which they grimly refused to do.

Across the creek, in the international defense sector, was a detachment of British regulars—Royal Welsh Fusiliers. And the stout fighting qualities shown by these Chinese soldiers somehow got under the hides of these Britishers. So after a while, when the Japanese attempted a coup to drive out the Chinese, the British Tommies came to the rescue—unofficially, unneutrally, but effectively.

The Japanese came up the stream in two naval launches mounting light guns. The banks of the river were lined with the innumerable little boats called sampans, which are part of every Chinese waterfront. And what did the Royal Welsh Fusiliers do but show the Chinese how to mass these sampans together across the stream, tying them together with cables, so as to block the path of the launches? That done, they led them to construct a similar barricade farther down the stream, so that the Japanese launches were neatly trapped.

Nor is that all. The brass hats felt the same sort of soldierly admiration for the dauntless Chinese. A British brigadier general and an American brigadier general joined in sending a telegram to Chiang Kaishek himself, begging him to order the heroic soldiers to withdraw and save their lives. It was none of their business, of course; apparently the whole business just naturally got to them.

For that is the way it is, with soldiers. Fighting men are a class apart. They live by their own rules and are bound by their own code. They may not often inquire what the fighting is all about, and they frequently grow infinitely weary of the fighting itself—but they never fail to give their admiration whole-heartedly to men of their own calling who show unmistakably that they have what it takes.

No war was ever as completely filmed as the one now being waged in Spain. It might have helped a lot, though, if the authorities could have drawn up a shorter scenario.

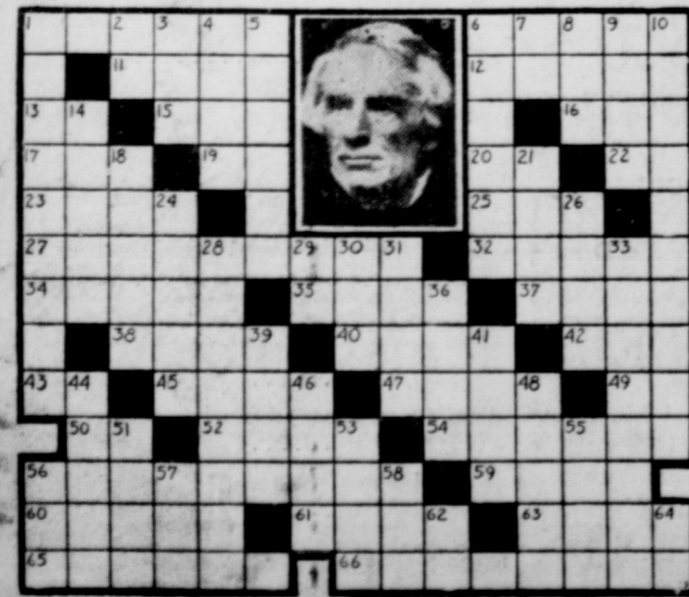

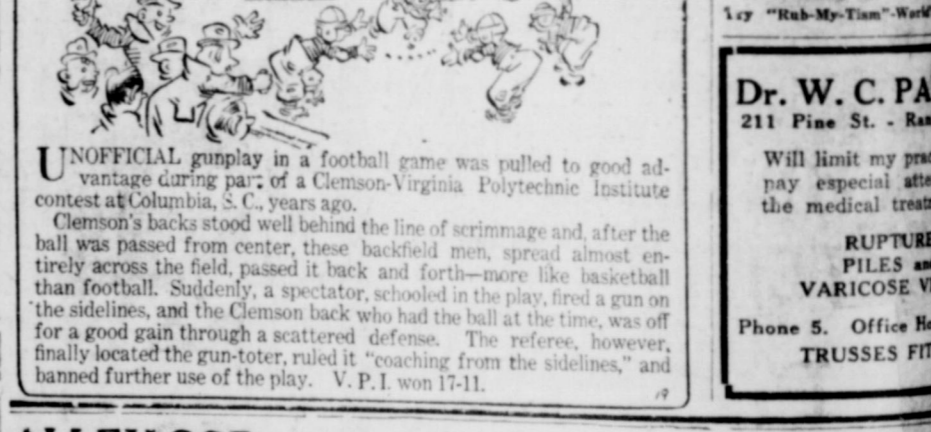

Safer Highways Is Now the Aim of Road Commissions

HOUSTON. — The old adage that an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure is being applied by the Texas Highway Department and the Federal Bureau of Public Roads to make highways safer for the traveling public, according to an article, "Toward Greater Safety," contributed by Charles E. Simons to the November issue of Texas Parade.

"The best method yet devised to prevent collisions between a motor vehicle and a locomotive at a railroad grade crossing is, first, to eliminate the grade crossing," says Mr. Simons. "And that, briefly, is what these two units of government are doing insofar as funds are available.

Figures compiled by a national safety organization disclose that approximately 2,000 or 2,500 persons lost their lives in collisions at grade crossings last year. A like or perhaps larger number will lose their lives under similar circumstances in 1937, due to increased motor travel and faster train schedules. This does not take into consideration the thousands that were permanently crippled or injured and the additional thousands that suffered only temporary hurts. The property damage, both real and human, caused in these scores of needless "accidents" will offset many times the cost of providing grade separations at the most dangerous crossings.

"During each of the next two years the federal government has made an extra allocation of \$24,825 to Texas to finance railroad grade separations and install warning and other preventive devices at railroad grade crossings having a bad accident record. The Texas Highway Department will furnish the plans, specifications, award the contracts and supervise their construction and installation. "The ordinary practice followed in eliminating grade separations is to construct either an overpass or an underpass. In the main, this procedure will be followed in

SISTER MARY'S KITCHEN

ON Thursday, the 25th of November, we'll take time out from fighting the High Cost of Living and have a feast of thanksgiving because prices aren't any higher. They might have been, you know. So as we plan our Thanksgiving dinner, let's sing a song of plenty.

I stopped in to ask Louis Cintrat, chef of a well known restaurant, what he had to say about cooking the turkey this year. "I'd select a 15-pound bird," he said, "and I'd roast it for 3 hours. During the first 2-1/2 hours I'd keep the pan covered, but during the last half hour, then the pan would be uncovered so the bird could turn a delicious, crispy brown."

Chef Cintrat's Turkey Stuffing
Two pounds bread, soaked in water for a few minutes and then squeezed fairly dry, 1 finely chopped onion, 1 pound pork sausage meat, pinch sage, pinch thyme, 1 teaspoon salt, pinch pepper, 1 tablespoon chopped parsley, 2 whole eggs, 1/2 cup cream.

Mix all ingredients together and stuff the noble bird lightly. Having settled the turkey problem, I visited the menu department of another restaurant where they pride themselves on the finest of American cooking. They gave me their secrets for three of their best Thanksgiving dishes. Here they are.

Sweet Potato Puff on Baked Apple
(6 servings)

Six firm baking apples, 1 quart mashed sweet potatoes, 3/4 cup hot milk, 2 tablespoons butter, 15

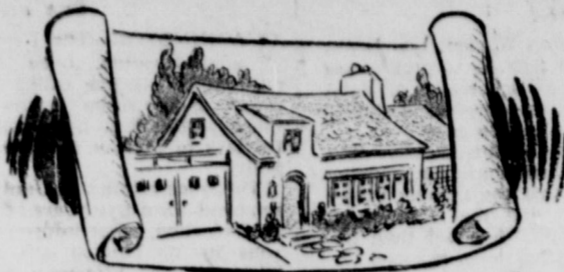
Cut apples in half crosswise, core and bake as for baked apples. To freshly cooked mashed sweet potatoes, add milk and butter. Season and beat vigorously until fluffy and not very dry. Put a rosette of mashed sweet potatoes on each apple half, using pastry bag or star tube. Be careful to leave 1-4 inch of apple showing around edge. Baste potato with juice from apples left in pan. To glaze them slightly replace pan of decorated apples in the oven under the broiler browning very slightly. Remove and decorate each rosette with 2 toasted almonds. When serving on dinner plate, decorate each with sprightly bit of parsley.
