



# **Rains Spare Texas Worst** Year for Birds

AUSTIN (Spl.) - The Direct-or of Wildlife Restoration for the Game and Fish Commission said field reports indicate the recent general rains spared Texas its worst spring for game bird nesting in modern times.

He added that cover, food and water, which were at a low ebb already are rally g, presaging 'fairly favorable nesting conditions.

He said reports from the major big game range in the Hill Country indicate deer are greatly benefitted by recent rains. Those on over-populated ranges were facing starvation for want of green food. The Director said some areas still are dry, but explained that most of the state "got some showers.'

He said the critical period "lies just ahead" for nesting of such popular game birds as wild turkey and quail. Mourning doves have been reported nesting for some time in most state areas. The Director said "the spring

will be a crucial one for our quail, which suffered so greatly from the drought the last few years." He said the quail, also stricken with the periodic cycle slump, appear to exist in sufficient seed stock to
