Maj. John L. Griffith, at his desk in Chicago, shakes his head and expresses grave doubts along the same lines. Various and sundry college presidents, A. A. U. officials, street cal conductors, and vacuum cleaner salesmen, all have made utterances to this same effect.

This, as a result of the International Olympic Committee switching the dates for the 1940 Tokio Olympiad from midsummer until September. (The excessive humidity in Tokio during July and August was given as the reason.)

And now as we give the matter a little thought it appears as though everyone says our collegiate athletic talent will be unable to take the boat ride but the collegians themselves . . .?

BECAUSE by far the greater portion of our Olympic athletes are recruited from the colleges, our athletic invasion of Tokio a cou-ple of summers hence won't get to that proverbian first base, say the gentlemen who pull the strings and manage our Olympic affairs.

Why, how can we get anywhere in Nippon, they ask. The boys have to be in school ... they won't be able to make up their work in have to be in school . . they won't be able to make up their work in time to graduate with their class . . . the schools won't give the boys a leave of absence, and allow them to start the first semester a month or five weeks late.

It is to laugh. Take any 100 college athletes-ask them, frankly, if they would mind graduating a half year later in order to sail to Japan as a member of the Olympic team.

Ask them if th of the school year in order to enjoy a trip the likes of which they might never again have the opportunity to take as long as they lived. Just off-hand, about 99 per cent of them, or thereabouts, wouldn't mind at all. . . .

IT would be only fair to say, however, that students in the professional schools, such as medicine, law or dentistry, might find it impossible to interrupt their scholastic work, but few others would balk. Naturally, a lot of the boys do take a wholehearted interest in

their classroom efforts, and they might regret it very much if their degree was held up a half year or so. But the results, we're thinking, would be amusing, and might bring a lot of red faces to the brass hats, if someone would conduct a poll

among our college athletes-As to whether they would or would not take that boat ride if they had the opportunity.
