O'DANIEL LEADER IN GOVERNOR'S RACE All But Two County Races Appear Settled

LEGISLATIVE, CLERK POSTS ARE UNCERTAIN

Crosley, Williams, Branton, Woods and Davenport Have Early Majorities

Only two county offices appear likely to have a runoff to determine winners of the democratic nomination, on the basis of figures compiled after midnight Sunday morning in the democratic primary of Saturday, when 22 boxes of the 27 in the county had reported, with six being incomplete.

A runoff appeared likely in the race for florial representative, where Omar Burkett was leading Wayne Sellers 2030 to 1682, with Ross trailing far behind with only 929 votes, while Curry had accounted for 622. Returns from Callahan county, however, may change these results.

The other race in which a runoff loomed was in the contest for district clerk, with John White leading with 2,252 votes to 1,697 for Claude (Curley) Maynard, and Euel Bond trailing with 1,348.

Loss Woods, candidate for reelection as sheriff, had polled the largest vote of anyone in the county with 4,121 tabulated for him, as compared with 1,622 for Virge Foster.

Lewis Crossley had a big lead over Cecil Lotief in the race for representative from the 106th district, Crossley having 3,337 to 2,161 for Lotief.

T. C. Williams of Cisco was holding a good lead over Clarence Eldridge in the race for county superintendent, with 2,923 votes to Eldridge's 2,482.

Garland Branton, the armless candidate from Rising Star, had a good majority, over both his opponents, the count being Branton 2,946, Dick Weekes 937 and Mrs. Frances (Holbrook) Cooper 1,669.

Henry V. Davenport, commissioner from Precinct No. 1, held a majority over both his opponents, with one Eastland box incomplete and Olden unreported, his vote was 1,315, compared with 799 for Aaron Stiles and 385 for Doug Barton.

Judge O. C. Funderburk, Congressman Clyde L. Garrett, County Judge W. S. Adamson, County Clerk R. V. Galloway and District Attorney Earl Conner, Jr., were proposed.

An Army Private Shoots Sweetheart And Then Himself

TUCKER, Ga., July 23.—Richard Denham, army private, shot and killed his 16-year-old sweetheart, Sarah George, then attempted to commit suicide, police reported today.

Officers said the girl and the soldier had entered a suicide pact because Sarah's parents tried to keep the couple apart.

Denham shot the girl, then turned a shotgun on himself, firing one shot just below the heart. His condition was critical.

MILLION VOTES ARE EXPECTED IN ELECTION

Almost a million Texans went to the polls Saturday ignoring rain in many places to climax one of the bitterest campaigns in history.

Early tabulations came from Houston and Beaumont, where W. Lee O'Daniel of Fort Worth and William McCraw of Dallas were neck-and-neck in the governor's race with Ernest Thompson a strong third. Tom Hunter of Wichita Falls and D. B. Renfro, Beaumont mayor, were fourth and fifth in Renfro's home territory.

The rains were expected to reduce the rural vote, but city voters turned out in record numbers.

Other early trends showed that Coke Stevenson of Junction was leading G. H. Nelson of Lubbock for Lieutenant Governor; Walter Woodul of Houston, Gerald Mann of Dallas and Ralph Yarborough of Austin bunched together in the Attorney General's race; C. V. Terrell of Decatur and John Wood of San Antonio leading the vote for railroad commissioner; S. R. LeMay of Athens and W. E. James of Fort Worth close behind L. A. Woods in the race for school superintendent and Bascom Giles of Fort Worth leading W. H. McDonald of Eastland and Morris Browning of Dallas for land commissioner.

All state races seemed headed for a run-off however. Congressman Fritz Lanham of Fort Worth apparently was destined to win his race for reelection over five opponents without a runoff.

Rains extended from West Central Texas to East Texas and from North Texas to the Rio Grande. Roads were impassable around San Angelo, Menard and San Saba.

HOOPER WILL SPEAK IN SEVERAL CITIES

BOHEMIAN GROVE, Calif., July 23.—Former President Herbert Hoover said today he would make three or four Republican campaign addresses this fall to challenge President Roosevelt's recent statements and proposals.

U. S. CHECKS ON PLANS OF FOUR POWERS

The United States and Soviet ambassadors called today at the French foreign office in Paris and asked for details of the proposed four-power discussions among Great Britain, France, Germany, and Italy, over Czechoslovakia.

They were told France has not been informed of such a project and would reject it if made.

Great Britain's long range program for stalling off the next war appeared to have made noteworthy gains. Actually a week of international activity highlighted by the visit of the British sovereigns to France, produced slight concrete evidence toward solving Europe's quarrels.

But in a preliminary manner the British leadership toward peace gained strength, particularly in improving the prospects for German cooperation.

Meanwhile a new border incident between Soviet Russia and Manchukuo was reported in dispatches from Siberia. The dispatches said six Manchukuan soldiers landed on a Soviet island and fired at a Soviet boat. All six were captured and two were wounded.

Reports were circulated at Hong Kong that Japanese submarines in South China had left for the north because of the new incidents with Russia on the Siberian frontier.

Russia protested to Poland against "intolerable" police repression of Russian embassy officials at Warsaw.

China: The American gunboat Monocacy jammed with navy men and civilians, escaped Japanese aerial bombs in the Yangtze river and Chinese defenders of Hankow continued to fight off the Japanese offensive.

Spain: The loyalists announced tonight the government has approved the plan of the non-intervention committee to remove foreign volunteers from both loyalist and nationalist armies. The insurgent offensive against Valencia was reported ready for a big push after being blocked for four days.

Rich Well Makes 288 Barrels In 24-Hour Testing
CISCO, July 23.—G. Willard Rich No. 1 M. and J. W. Andrews, section 39, block 7, T&P Ry. survey, has been given an official test. The test, according to information received here was 288 barrels for 24 hours. This well, located six miles due east of Moran across the Stephens county line, was drilled in about four weeks ago. It has been tied in with storage tanks and will run around 100 barrels allowable.

Producing from the Lake sand, this well has created considerable interest in this territory. This is the first producer from this horizon in the Moran section, and will in all probability lead to much drilling during the next few months.

Mr. Rich and associates have staked a second location west of the discovery well which will be spudded in in the near future, according to information received here. There has been considerable leasing in that territory, with land not under lease west of the Andrews being taken.

The Rich is one of the finest producers found here in some time. Being found just below the Caddo line, it hasn't been given much chance in this area. Most of the deeper wells stopped in the Caddo. The Rich is only a foot in the pay, with very little gas. Should there have been an appreciable amount of gas in the sand, the well would have flowed at a much greater daily rate. The well flows regularly by heads through tubing, and will more than flow the allowable.

Three Lives Lost In Houston Wrecks
HOUSTON, Texas, July 23.—Three lives were claimed today by auto accidents in and near Houston. Four others were hurt, three critically.

FORT WORTH, July 23.—E. E. Smith of Colorado was elected president, today, of the Texas Rural Letter Carriers' association. Abilene was chosen as the 1939 convention city.

FLOODS RAGE NEAR BRADY, AND SAN SABA

SAN SABA, July 23.—Stages of the river in San Saba Valley's worst flood in history became stationary at mid-afternoon today and an emergency relief committee reported that the city was "out of danger" for 24 hours.

While light rains continued it was believed the crest of San Saba and Brady creeks would begin to recede shortly. Unless they fall enough, however, to allow for new floods from 13-inch rains along the Concho and San Saba, it was feared new disaster might result.

Two persons were known to be dead and at least 14 others were believed to have been swept away by the floods.

Pilots of two national guard planes, dispatched from Houston to survey the flood area, reported that floodwaters did not reach the business district of San Saba. Many houses along the river were inundated but their occupants reached higher ground.

The national guard pilots saw about 100 persons gathered in the public square without protection from the rain. About 2,500 had found refuge in business buildings and homes on higher ground.

Nine motorboats were being rushed from Austin. Red Cross representatives and state health department workers also were enroute.

Earlier the relief committee sent urgent appeals to the coast guard and U. S. Army for help. At that time it was feared the entire city might be inundated.

Food supplies in the town of 4,000 were running low and the city water works were submerged. George Steinman, Methodist pastor, said the situation was "extremely critical and much loss of life and property is feared."

Steinman said that hope was abandoned for 14 persons believed to be Mexicans, who were marooned on a barn that washed away. Two persons, a man and a woman about 60, were drowned Friday.

Two thirds of San Saba's population was driven from their homes and the water rose at a two foot an hour rate after 12 inches of rain in three days.

Three Teachers, Lost For a Week, Found by Officer

GRANTS, N. M., July 23.—Three women school teachers, missing for nearly a week on the northwestern New Mexico bad lands, were found today by searching parties attacked by mirrors the women flashed into the sun. They were suffering exhaustion and exposure.

A state trooper found the women, approximately three miles from their car, which they had left to visit a cave. He said they were hopelessly lost and so weakened that they could hardly move. Their feet were badly lacerated.

COUNTY MAY JOIN IN WTCC SOIL EVENT

A meeting has been called for Tuesday afternoon by the Eastland chamber of commerce and County Agent Elmo V. Cook for discussion of plans for the county to join in the West Texas chamber of commerce soil and water utilization contest of 1938, it was announced Saturday.

The meeting will begin at 3:30 and be in the county courtroom. The purpose of the contest, declared Agent Cook, is to encourage the conserving and rebuilding of Eastland county soil by terracing, contour farming, winter cover crops and soil building crops practices.

Prizes in the contest, according to WTCC notices, are \$500, \$300 and \$200 for first, second and third, respectively.

Cook was named by the Eastland chamber of commerce.

Carleton Is Named Again In Precinct One as Constable

Although returns from Olden had not been received, it appeared last night that H. M. Carleton was re-elected to the position of constable of precinct No. 1.

The Eastland man had polled 596 votes. Other candidates placed, according to the unofficial vote with Olden results lacking, as follows: W. A. (Buck) Hull, 91; Guy Robinson, 180; T. Z. Short 39, and Ben Pryor, 325.

AMARILLOAN IS SECOND IN BIG RACE

Count Based Upon Early Report From State

One of Texas' most colorful state campaigns came to a close Saturday evening as W. Lee O'Daniel, Fort Worth flour salesman and radio crooner, led the ticket with an unofficial count of 210,322 votes.

The report on the state races was from 198 counties, 11 of which were complete.

Other high men in the state governor's race placed as follows: Hunter, 44,439; Thompson, 39,068, and McCraw, 62,063. The unofficial reports confirmed information of late that McCraw, earlier in the race before O'Daniel announced, would be a winner, had lost ground fast.

Pierce Brooks, one-time candidate for governor and this time an aspirant for the lieutenant-governor's race, was leading in his race according to the unofficial returns with 105,165 votes.

Others in the race tallied the following number of votes: Smith, 25,745; Nelson, 71,260; Stevenson, 88,245, and Davison, 32,222.

Gerald Mann of Dallas, prominent Methodist and former football player at S. M. U. at Dallas, was the leader in the attorney general's race. Mann had polled a total of 114,790 votes to lead in his race. Others polled the following number: Calvert, 30,679; Woodul, 12,857; Goodrich, 15,869 and Yarborough, 77,825.

For the supreme court Davidson led the ticket with 113,312 votes accounted for. Critz, widely endorsed by West Texas lawyers, seconded with 112,389 votes. Smiley of Karnes county was third with 65,132 votes. It was apparent, in that complete returns had not been received, that the verdict might still be forthcoming.

Jurist Graves was ahead, with 106,399 votes, in the criminal appeals court, unexpired term, race. Others in the race stood Saturday night as Phippen, 82,958 and Stephens 96,006.

In a much contested race it appeared that C. V. Terrell of Wise county, would be re-elected to the railroad commission. The present chairman of the commission had polled 91,857 votes. In this territory was the amazement of citizens at learning that J. A. Jerry Sadler of deep East Texas followed Terrell with 82,431 ballots. John Wood of Timpsion, present member of the highway commission and Ferguson appointee, had 72,359 votes. R. A. Stuart of Fort Worth claimed 45,791 votes. Morris had 24,481 secured.

Seemingly assured for a second term was W. H. (Bill) McDonald of Eastland county for a second term as commissioner of the land office. The former Eastland county district clerk and attorney had polled 149,669 votes. Behind him were Mills, 45,907; Browning, 45,220, and Gilos, 32,673.

Charles Lockhart, the small state treasurer, was virtually returned to his office. He had polled 217,805 votes. Foster, in the same race, had 51,528 and Barnes 46,108 votes.

L. A. Woods, present school superintendent seeking reelection, had polled 169,072 votes. W. E. James of Travis county and S. R. LeMay of Athens had totals of 62,180 and 91,270 votes, respectively.

Majority of the Texans agreed that it was one of the most colorful campaigns in decades.

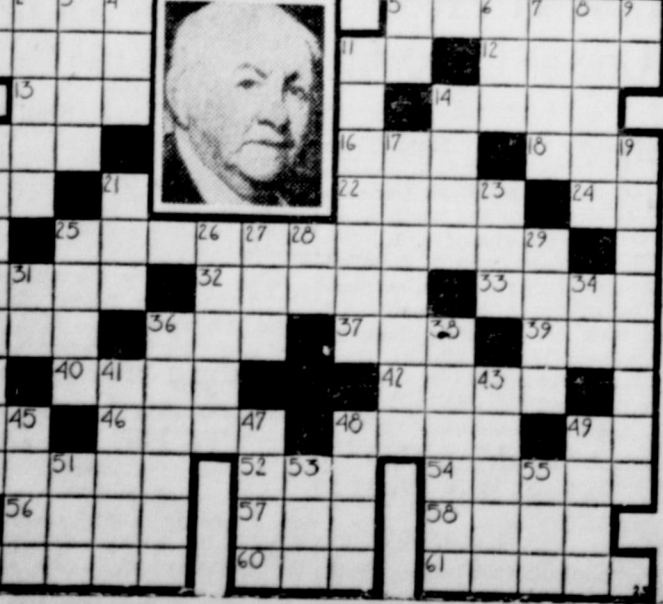

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SIX NEW LOCATIONS ANNOUNCED FOR AREA IN ACTIVE OIL WEEK

Six locations for this portion of West Central Texas contributed to making an active week for oil developments as reports were watched on interesting tests.

Eastland County In the Ellenburger area northwest of Cisco, Lone Star Gas company announced it would deepen its No. 1 Jesse Penn, section 468, SPBR survey, 400 feet from the south and east lines of the section.

The well is 700 feet north of the Lone Star No. 1 Cozart, producer from the lime, and 4,000 feet northwest of the Hickok Producing and Development company pool-opening Van Parmer well.

Christmas, Kirk and Haile No. 1 S. A. Eison, Ellenburger test projected to 3,400 feet four miles north of Gorman, 4,950 feet from the south line and 2,600 feet from the east line of the T. Tyler survey, No. 51, was shutdown at depth of 100 feet.

Five miles north of Rising Star, J. F. Baker No. N. T. Mulroy, section 1, William Ahrenbeck survey, was drilling below 2,700 feet and operator expected the lime at 2,950 feet.

Hayner, Reeves and Hose No. 1 P. C. Larkin, three and one-half miles northwest of Rising Star, section 40, block 2, ETRR survey, was to be plugged back to the upper Caddo at around 2,550 feet and receive acidization. In the lower Caddo around 3,100 feet only a flow of salt water was found.

N. D. Gallagher et al No. 1 Mrs. J. A. Hearn, section 1, block 2, H. & T. C. survey, five miles northeast of Carbon, was shutdown at 350 feet.

With a rainbow of oil reported, Jack M. Buckler planned to stimulate his No. 1 C. Jacobs, block 277, Kerry County school lands. Eighty quarts of "nitro" and 4,500 gallons of acid were to be used from 1,507 to 1,542 feet. Producing string was set at 1,507 feet.

Gilcrease Oil company reported location for No. 4 and 5 J. M. Perry, section 34, J. G. Rhea survey, one mile west of Thrifty. Both are projected for 1,250 feet. No. 4 will be 300 feet north of No. 3 and No. 5 will be 150 feet from the north line of the No. 2 well.

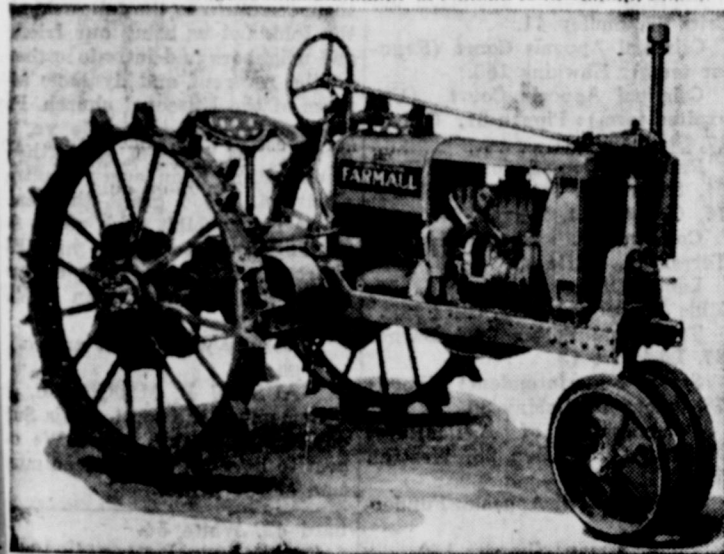
WHY MOTHERS GET GRAY

San Antonio Sees Premiere of Picture

SAN ANTONIO, July 23—Before a distinguished audience including Hollywood film stars and state and city officials, Paramount's "The Texan" had its world premiere at the 4,000-seat Majestic theatre here recently.

Roberson Garage Showing Farmall

New Farmall 14 tractor, carried by Roberson Garage, features are: an engine especially designed to perform efficiently on gasoline or distillate; a new type of replaceable oil-filter element which cuts operating costs by allowing the tractor to be run 120 hours between complete oil changes and which can be replaced at a cost of 45 cents; a breather on the valve housing which removes contaminating gases from both crankcase and valve housing and thereby assists in maintaining the quality of the crankcase oil; right and left-hand steering brake levers convenient to the hands of the operator whether sitting or standing; a new floating oil screen which assures a clean supply of oil to the oil pump and clean oil to the engine bearings; a higher seat which places the operator well out of the dust zone and gives him more room for his legs; the steering wheel is also higher and this enables the operator to stand when ever he desires to stretch his legs and add variety to his work. Like the other Farmalls, the Farmall 14 has the patented triple steering wheel control, by means of which the operator guides the tractor, automatically puts a brake on either driver to make a short pivot turn (7-foot radius for Farmall 14), and when using the shifting-gang cultivator automatically shifts the gangs for double-quick dodging action. The rear wheels on the Farmall 14 can be set in or out for 44 1-2 to 79-inch treads to adapt it to varying work conditions. Special axles can also

be supplied to permit setting wheels out to 93 inches.

The Farmall 14 may be equipped with all-steel wheels or at additional cost with pneumatic tires. Four different special transmission forward speeds on steel are 2 1-4, 3 and 3 3-4, and 2 1-4 miles an hour reverse; and on rubber 2 3-8, 3 1-8, and 4 forward, and 2 3-8 miles an hour reverse. With special transmissions on rubber the speed varies up to a high of 6 7-8 miles an hour.

The Farmall 14 will plow from 5 to 8 acres a day, disk 15 to 25 cultivate with two-row cultivator 20 to 30 acres a day, and with the corn picker gather and husk clean 8 to 10 acres a day. A variety of quick-attachable machines have been designed for use with the Farmall 14.

The pool is drained constantly and the water kept under strict tests and treatments, and comes up to the state sanitary department standard at all times. "Swim in Drinking Water" is the slogan for this excellent recreation center. The Eastland pool is the only pool in the state as far as known that is located on top of a mountain, which guarantees cool breezes at any hour. To make the entire scene more attractive and interesting the park surrounding the pool is full of shade trees, has tennis courts, roque courts and all kinds of swings and playgrounds for children. There are barbecue and cook pits and concrete tables and benches throughout the park for the convenience of those who like the great outdoors.

Back to the swimming pool there is a lifeguard on hand at all times in the main pool and the children's pool is looked after by Miss Betty Joe Brown whose vigil and knowing how to handle the kiddies is superior to the average. The pool is open each day at 6 a. m. and for the rest of the day and into the evening until 10:30.

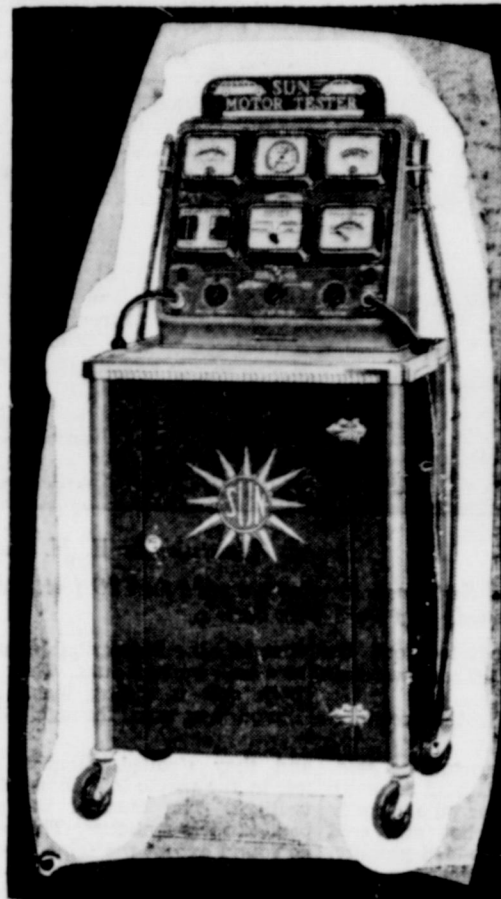

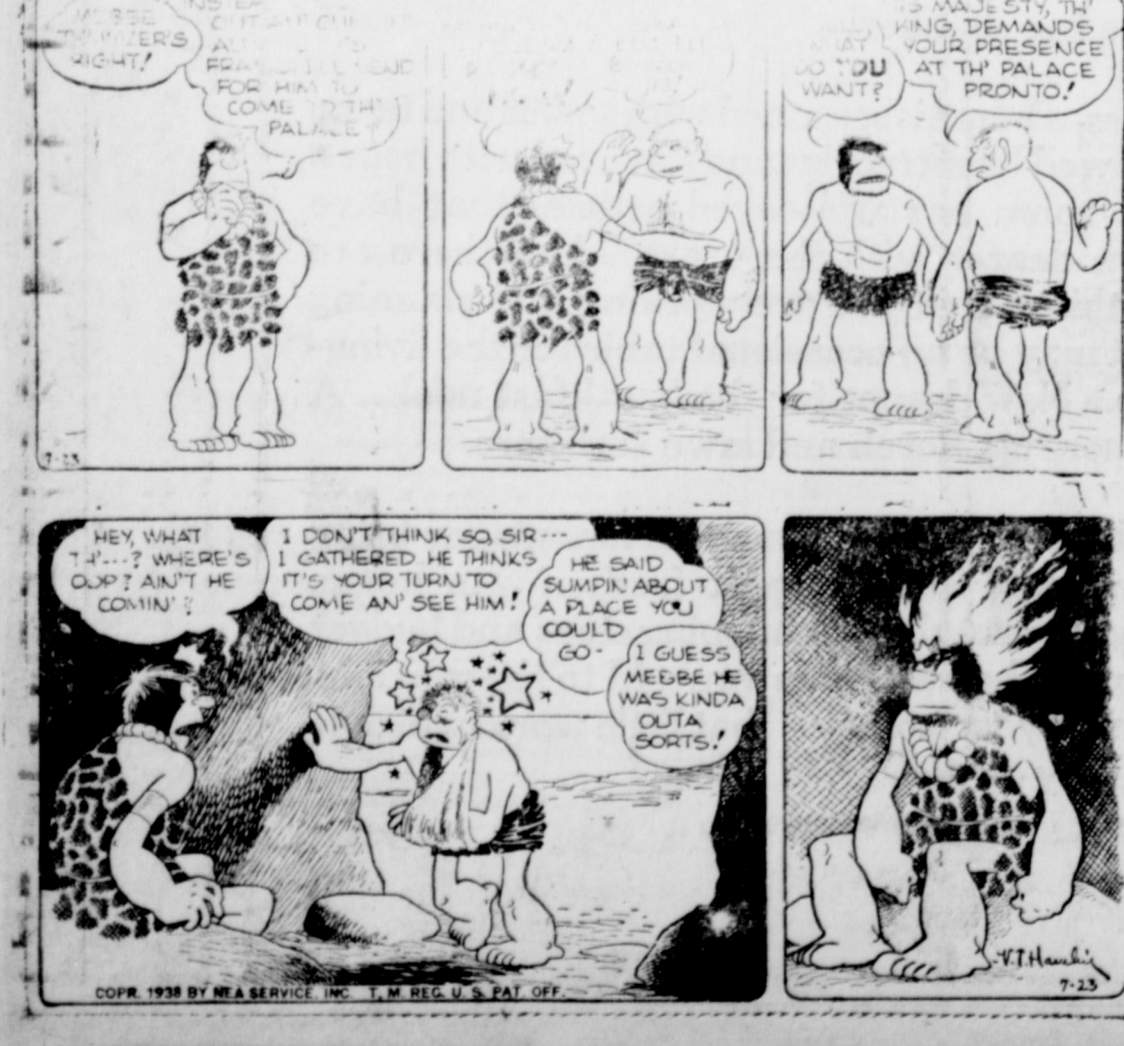
