1. Pay less than 25 cents an hour or its equivalent to workers in interstate industry.

2. Pay less than time and a half in cash for all work in any week in excess of 44 hours.

3. Employ children in oppressive labor or employ a child under 14 in any capacity in interstate industry.

## **Discovery** of America as International Villain

The recent Czech crisis would not have been complete until British newspapers found some way to blame the whole business on Uncle Sam. That moment has finally arrived, and so the whole thing is now official.

According to the magazine Newsweek, an astonishing amount of anti-American sentiment is finding expression in England these days, and it is being argued in London that the Czechs would not have been sold down the river if America had only done its part.

That amazing argument, it seems, goes like this: The British were slow in backing up France because the British were reluctant to commit themselves without assurance of American support. Such assurance not being forthcoming, the British government hedged and hedged until Czechoslovakia was signed, sealed, and delivered to the mercies of Hitler. Further, it is added, "Czechoslovakia was Woodrow Wilson's invention anyway," and hence the United states should have borne the chief responsibility.

Now it may well be that America should have been more active in European affairs in recent years. But it hardly becomes Britons to say so.


If your memory runs back to the early 1930's you may recall that the first serious blow at the Kellogg treaty, the leaguecovenant, and the rest of the world's peace machinery was struck by Japan, in Manchuria. At that time it was an American secretary of state, Henry L. Stimson, who took the lead in trying to rally the democracies to stop the steal. Mr. Stimson boldly took his country out on a limb in his effort to stop the Japanese, trusting that the Britishwhose interests in the Orient were far greater than America's-would back him up as they had promised.

If Stimson's effort had succeeded, the history of the last half-dozen years would probably have been profoundly different. But the effort failed-because, when the pinch came, the British were looking the other way with V. Galloway include the followgreat steadfastness.

Luncheon sets or dresser scarfs with at least one inch hems make more expensive looking articles. Articles that are too decorative detract rather than add to the appearance. Blind-stitched hems with a small amount of single or double hem-stitching in the corners of luncheon sets or dresser scarfs make them very attractive with only a small amount of time spent n making them.
