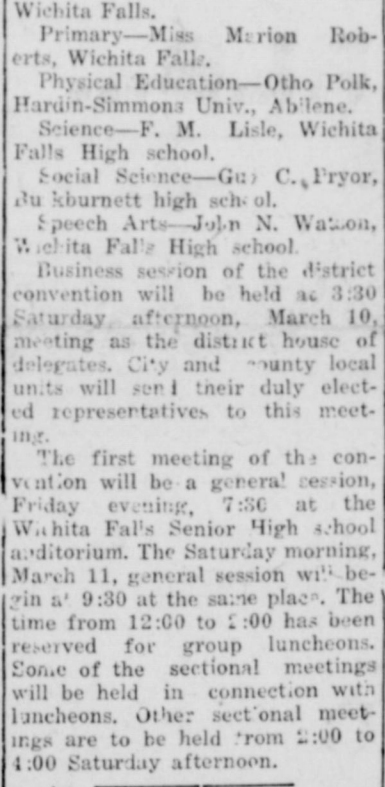

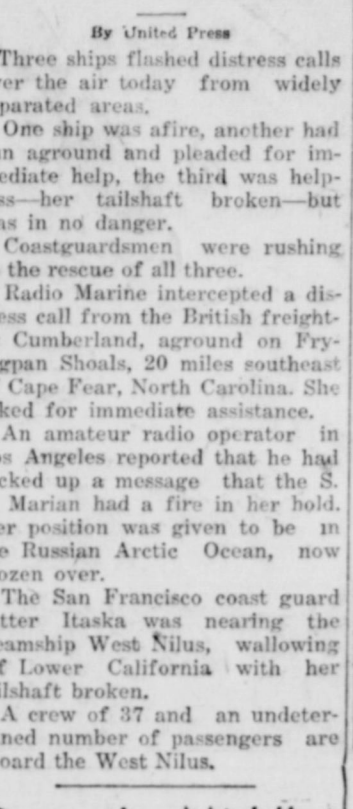

Will Courtesy Be Met With Courtesy?

The law has been upheld which is intended to protect foreign diplomats from harassing or threatening "demonstrations" in front of embassies. By refusing to review the sentences of four men convicted under the law, the Supreme Court apparently closed any further direct appeal.

Congress passed the law at the suggestion of the State Department after street "demonstrations" before the German and Italian embassies by people opposed to the policies of those governments.

"Congress shall make no law," says the Constitution, "... abridging ... the right of the people peaceably to assemble and to petition the government for a redress of grievances." The cardinal point of the first amendment must be carefully and vigilantly guarded. It is one of the very cornerstones of liberty.

The new law skates uncomfortably close to the edge of this guarantee. But as nothing is said about assembling and petitioning other governments for the redress of somebody else's grievances, one must presume that constitutional rights have not been infringed.

The law is based on courtesy. Ever since nations began to deal with one another, an ambassador has been granted special immunities and privileges. The most savage tribes often take pains to guard and protect one who comes on a mission from another. So it has been always the custom in civilized countries to consider the actual grounds of a foreign embassy as practically territory of that nation.

In return for this sort of consideration, nations have always expected foreign ministers and ambassadors to mind their own business with equal punctiliousness. Any dabbling in the internal affairs of the country to which they are credited has always in the past been considered the worst of bad manners and a poor repayment of the courtesies extended.

In passing the law as that under discussion, the United States has put something of a strain on the rights of her own citizens in order to guarantee to foreign representatives a courtesy by no means extended to ours in all other countries.

It has every right to expect courtesy and consideration in return. If any foreign representatives do not understand such language, and use their diplomatic status and privileges to mix into American domestic affairs, thus repaying courtesy with discourtesy and abuse, then the next work should not be courteous. It should be "Out!"

Township Treasurer Acts Like Robin Hood

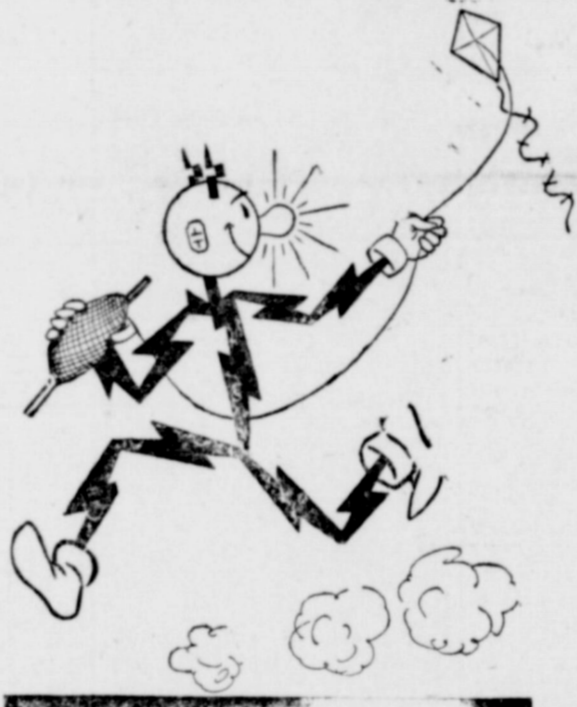

SUGGESTED RECIPES

Apple Butter Stacks
1 recipe All-Bran Pastry, 1 cup apple butter, 1 4-ounce package cream cheese, 1 teaspoon lemon juice.

EL PASO, Texas.—Transients who wander from one town to another and won't take a job if it's offered them are responsible for a great amount of crime, according to Sheriff Chris P. Fox of El Paso county.

Fox said he had received numerous letters from other peace officers, expressing the same belief and willingness to attend a conference to discuss the problem.

To investigate the transients in this section, Fox sent one of his deputies out to pose as a farmer and offer jobs as field laborers at good daily wages to a group of 60 transients waiting to board a freight train.

"The only response was inquiries about train schedules," Fox said. "That's an honest example of how anxious transients and hoboes are to get honest work."

"The transient problem is becoming more serious every day," he added. Fox wrote police chiefs and sheriffs in several southwestern states recently, asking them if they would attend a conference to seek a solution to the transient problem. He said that many officers had replied favorably to the suggestion.

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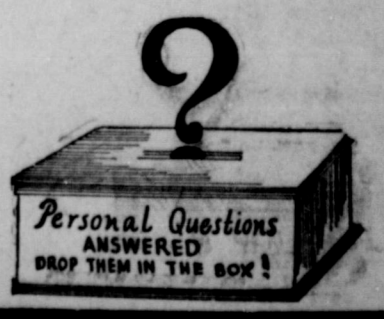
