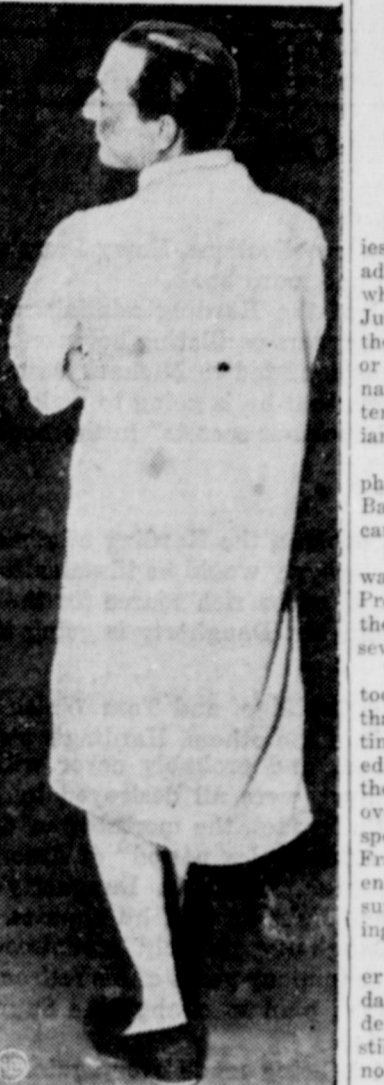

## Harry Can Write One —If He Will

At 79, full of years and recollections, Harry Daugherty says he is going to write one more book.

The attorney general of the Harding administration, now spending his declining years oscillating between Florida and Columbus, O., has confided to Michael Desmond, Columbus Citizen reporter, that he is going to make public a lot of "sacred but important secrets" in the book on which he is now working.

A completely candid book on the Harding administration by an insider like Daugherty would be illuminating to those who lived through it, and a rich source for the historian. Exactly how candid Mr. Daugherty is going to be remains to be seen.

Harding is gone, and Coolidge, and Tom Walsh and Jess Smith had nearly all of the others. Harding's papers have never been published, and probably never will be. There is a rumor that they were all destroyed by Mrs. Harding before her death. In fact, the mortality of documents concerned with the "normalcy period" of American history has been pretty high. Thus Mr. Daugherty can undoubtedly throw unique light on it if he chooses.

In the meantime, Daugherty publicly reminisced to Desmond for the first time in many years of his retirement. Asked to comment on the plan to change the Supreme Court, Daugherty replied:

"The Supreme Court is being made over again. Well, I made it over myself. Neither Mr. Harding nor Mr. Coolidge ever refused to send in the name of the man I recommended." Sanford, Sutherland, Taft, and Butler were specified.

The best thing about men like Harry Daugherty is that you know where they stand. "I was a standpatter," affirms Daugherty today. "A corporation lawyer. Still am. I never change."

So the public may await whatever sensational revelations Harry Daugherty may choose to make as a standpatter and a corporation lawyer who never changes. Private advice to the public: "Don't hold your breath."

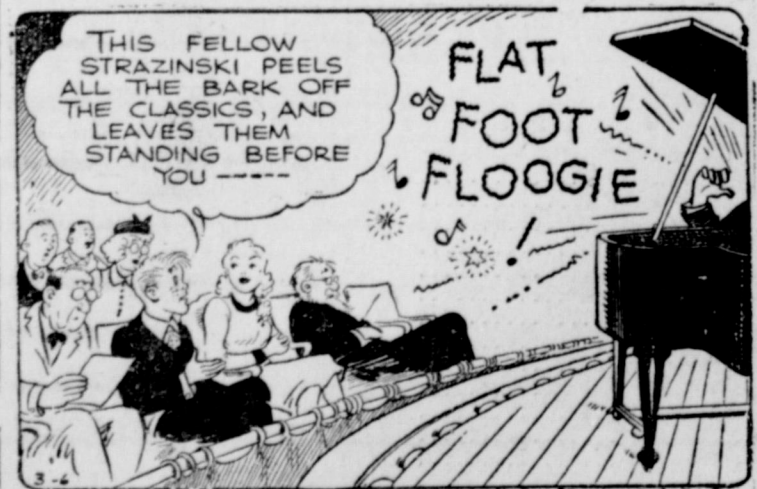

AUSTIN, Tex.—The poppies in your garden may be an aid in the treatment of sinus trouble, Junius Evans, University of Texas pharmacy student, thinks. Evans, who already has his bachelor of arts degree, has begun research on poppy-seed oil of the common garden poppy to see if such oil may be successfully iodized. An iodized poppy-seed oil, now imported from France, is used in treatment of sinus trouble. Placed in the sinus region, the oil gives up its iodine providing the therapeutic powers that Evans hopes to obtain.

### Alaska Guarding Her Grizzly Bears

JUNEAU, Alaska.—The huge grizzly and brown bears of Alaska are in no danger of early extinction, according to Franke Dufresne, chairman of the Alaska game commission.

More than 8,500,000 acres of land have been set aside as bear sanctuaries. Mount McKinley National Park and Katmai and Glacier Bay national monuments, where all wildlife is protected, provide the bears with most of their safe range.

The Alaska game laws prohibits bear hunting on some of the Aleutian islands. No hunting is permitted anywhere in Alaska throughout the summer season, June 20 to Sept. 1.

During about five months of the open hunting season the bears hibernate. Sale of bear hides is prohibited. Dufresne said this regulation is "perhaps the one outstanding factor which has permitted an increase in the large brown and grizzly bears."

The shaggy animals have also become respectable and valuable in the eyes of territorial residents, Dufresne said.

"At no time in the history of the territory has there been better feeling by the public toward these animals," he declared. "This is particularly true along the coastal area and other game fields, where non-resident photographers and hunters regularly spend large sums of money for guides, packers and transportation."

"The people of Alaska thoroughly appreciate this source of income and have no desire to jeopardize it by killing the bears."

"The bears are an outstanding wildlife resource. Their depredations are scarcely noticeable in the thinly populated territory and the public has come to regard them as money-makers."

Marshall, Tyler, Lufkin and Corsicana are prepared to send large delegations to this year's convention in Beaumont on April 23-25 to invite the chamber to those cities next year. Waco and Galveston are considering extending invitations, according to Hummer M. Harrison of Longview, vice president and general manager of the ETCC.

Marshall and Corsicana have not entertained the convention. Invitations must be submitted at the 1939 convention, and the host city will be selected at that time.

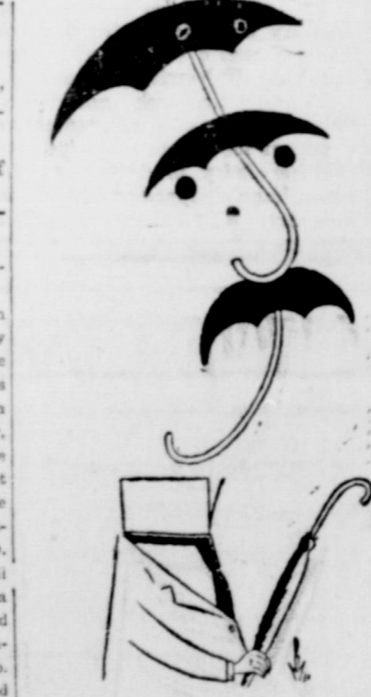

PITTSBURGH—The lot of present-day crippled children has improved much since the days when they were looked upon as physical misfits without a chance of succeeding in a world of keen competition.

This is shown in a booklet published by the Pittsburgh Industrial Home for Crippled Children.

It describes scientific treatment being used to make the lives of crippled children happier and tells of educational and recreational programs designed to make life worth while for these unfortunate.

Among other things, the 80-odd inmates of the home have a Boy Scout troop, a unit of the Girl Reserves, and a small orchestra. They play games; read, or are read to; do handicraft work and take part in sewing and cooking classes.

### Hydrophobia Cure Of Long Ago Is To Be Given Test

AUSTIN, Tex.—A forgotten hydrophobia cure of about 125 years ago, a tea made from skull-cap, a marsh-grown plant, may be on the verge of a comeback if by the research project of Dr. C. C. Albers, University of Texas pharmacy professor, is a success. Thumbing through journals and

newspapers of the late eighteenth century, Dr. Albers read glowing accounts of authentic tests of the curative powers of the skull-cap, scutellaria lateriflora. Suddenly, as far as publicity was concerned, the cure passed into oblivion.

Dr. Albers, in his University laboratory, has begun to make from the plant an extract which he will administer to rabbits and other test animals to ascertain the plant's possibilities for anti-rabies effects.
