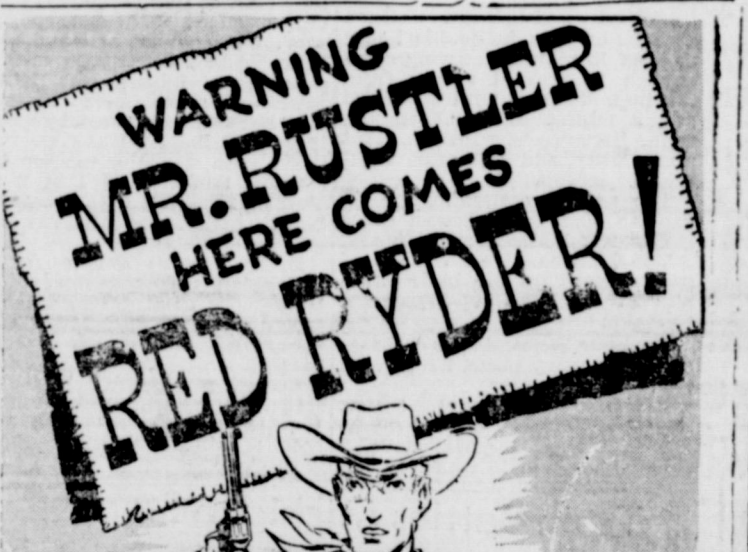

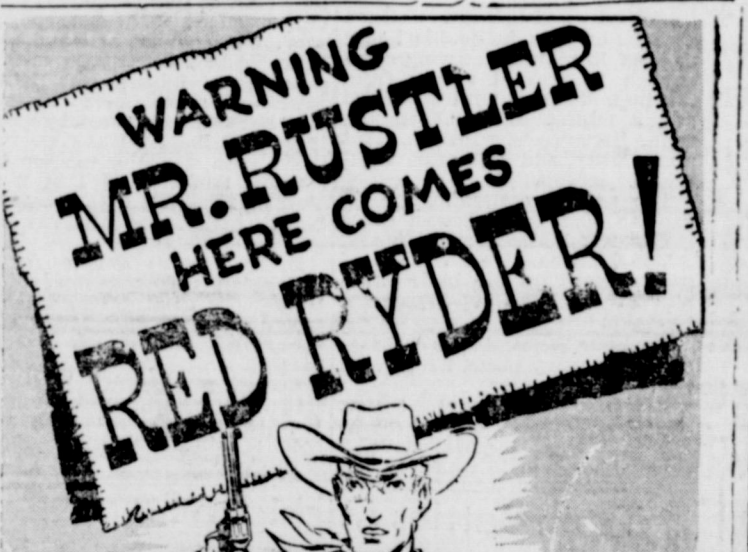

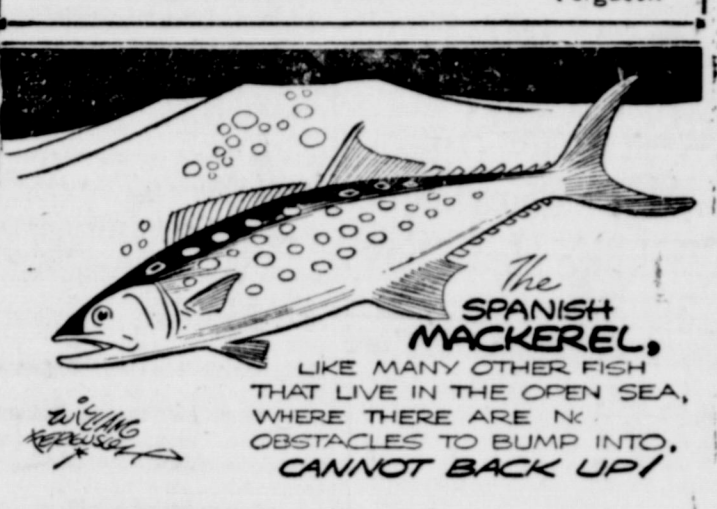

AUSTIN, Texas—Sen. Clint C. Small of Amarillo thinks a State budget prepared by a Governor in his first term would be much less valuable than one prepared by a Governor after serving a term. The first would be theoretical, the next one practical.

Small said the best budget officer would be a former member of the House appropriations committee or the Senate finance committee. He doesn't expect either to become Governor. In fact, he doesn't consider any legislator has much chance to become Governor. He had some practical experience along that line as a candidate.

Lieut. Gov. Coke R. Stevenson of Junction sat poker-faced while Small explained his views to the Senate. Stevenson is looked upon by many as a likely candidate for Governor when he completes his present term as "assistant-governor."

Small said a man who has served in the Legislature makes so many enemies in the course of his term that he is ruined as a candidate. "Whichever way he votes, he makes someone mad," Small said.

Stevenson won the race for lieutenant-governor after serving many terms in the House of Representatives. He was twice its speaker.

That is the advice of Sirdar Hardit Singh Malik, official trade commissioner in the United States for the Indian government. He is visiting in San Francisco for the primary purpose of developing imports of India and facilitating ex-

ports to that country.

Standing on the head for five or ten minutes daily is just one of the routine exercises of Yogi, which help to keep a man physically fit, Malik said.

"After a hard day at the office, especially if you have been doing a lot of mental work, go home and stand on your head for five or ten minutes. You'll find it more restful than four hours' sleep," he added.

To most Americans, of course, this would be the equivalent of telling them to go home and "stand on your head until your heart stops beating."

Malik is a Sikh. That, he said, means that he comes from a relatively small community of 5,000, 000 inhabitants in the Punjab of India.

Despite the obscurity of Punjab to most American readers, Malik is contributing in no small part to bringing it to the forefront in international affairs.

He is an Oxford graduate. During the World War he distinguished himself as an ace aviator in the British Royal Air Force. He was the first man of his country to receive an air pilot's license from the Royal Air Force.

Malik is the first representative of India ever to be stationed in the United States.

Good Old Days Of Grandfathers Time Not So Healthy

AUSTIN, Texas. — One often hears about the good old days when grandfather was a boy but according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, now are the good days for babies. A baby born today can expect to live until he is 62 years of age. This is almost twice the expectancy of babies born 100 years ago. There has been a gain of 14 years since 1900.

While still somewhat below the biblical promise of "three score and ten" Texans can look forward to reaching that goal within a few years.

The fact that a child born in 1938 who weathered the infantile storms of the first year could expect to live 62 years in contrast to the boy born in 1850, who could live only 38 years is a tribute to the American Medical Profession and the preventive technique of public health, Dr. Cox believes.

Vaccination is a preventive measure that saves thousands of lives annually. Prophylactic measures against typhoid, diphtheria and smallpox have greatly reduced the incidence of these diseases in Texas. Widespread sanitation

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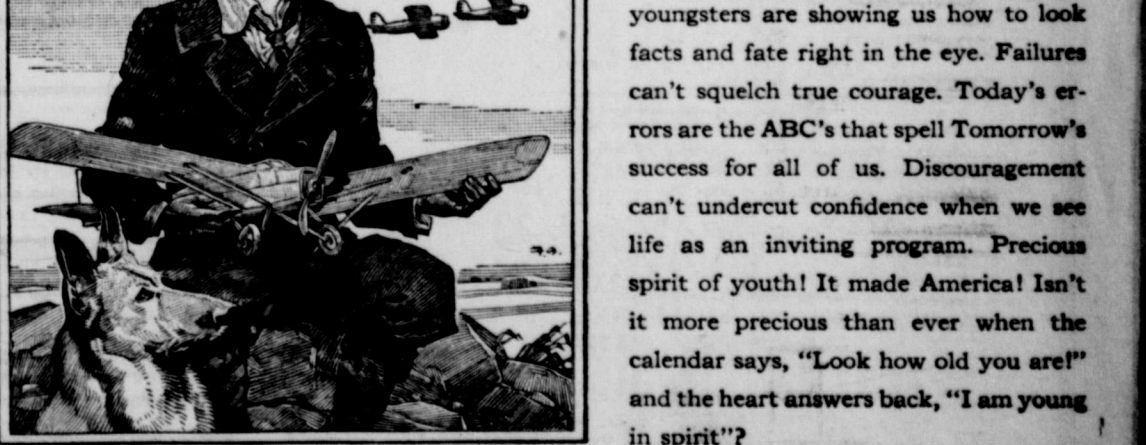

SISTER MARY'S KITCHEN

A PEASANT soup can fill the empty tummy with gratitude, and a sauce will often expand the virtues of a meager roast.

Their chapter on the Mother Sauce makes an excellent text. Let's study it in part, learning the variations possible, on an Espagnole Sauce.

One-half cup butter, 1-2 cups flour, 1 quart brown stock. Melt butter and let it sizzle slightly. Add sifted flour, and stir. Let simmer so slowly that mixture is not nicely browned in less than 20 to 25 minutes, stirring quite frequently to keep it cooking evenly.

Sauce Bordelaise (brown): Add 1 tablespoon minced shallot and 1 minced garlic clove that have been lightly fried in 1 tablespoon butter; add 1-2 cup claret (or unsweetened grape juice); boil until reduced to proper consistency. Season with salt and cayenne. Add 1-2 teaspoon minced parsley, 2 tablespoons lemon juice, and sliced beef marrow that has been blanched by pouring salted boiling water over it. Serve with steaks or mushrooms.

Caper Sauce: Add 1 or 2 tablespoons capers, 1-4 teaspoon black pepper, and the smallest grating of nutmeg.

Diable (Devil) Sauce: Add 1 tablespoon prepared mustard, 4 tablespoons meat gravy, 1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce, cayenne, and 1 teaspoon minced parsley.

Fermeiere (Farmwife) Sauce: Add 3 tablespoons minced ham, 1 tablespoon capers, and 2 teaspoons minced parsley. Serve with game.

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and extreme Western Texas were singled out today by Riley Wyatt of San Antonio, State Chairman for the observance of National Wildlife Week, March 19-25, as "one of the richest game producing sections of the United States, and one of the least publicized." "If we are going to 'sell' Texas to our neighboring States, we must not overlook Texas' \$94,000,000 wildlife crop (U. S. government figures), much of which is to be found in the western portion of the State. There the white-tailed deer and wild turkey abound, while in the trans-Pecos there are mule deer, scaled quail, and occasionally a black bear.

"But we as citizens are inclined to be somewhat smug about our vast wildlife resources," Wyatt charged. "Let us not forget that the mule deer is declining in numbers, that on the crags of the Guadalupe mountains the famed mountain sheep are nearing extermination. We must tackle the job of restoration, and the first step is to encourage public interest through such a medium as Wildlife Week."

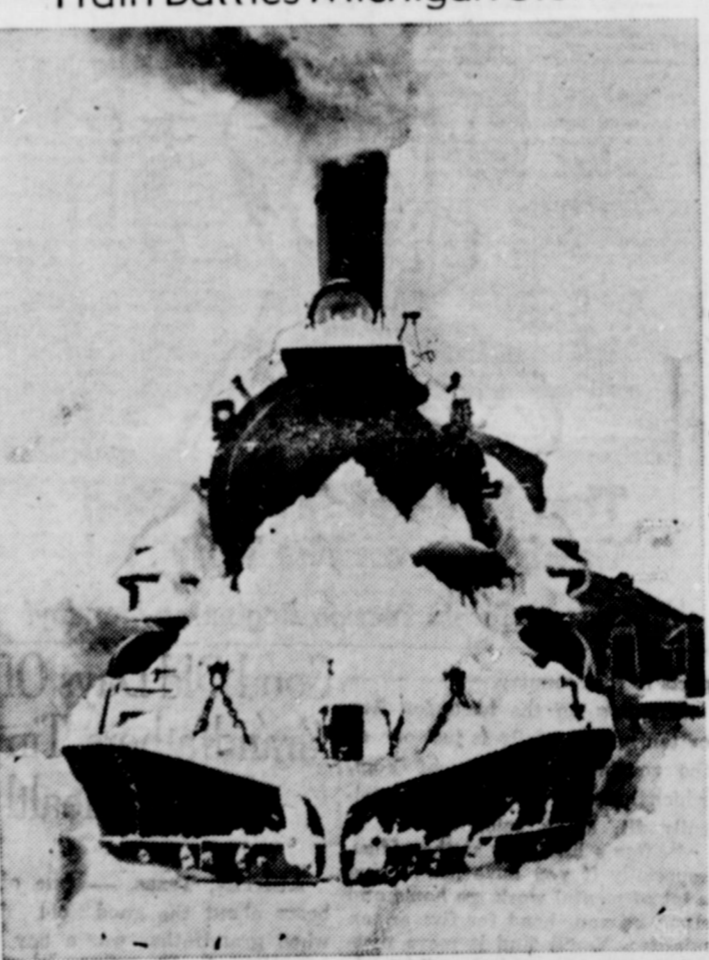

Wildlife Week programs will be handled by County Chairmen appointed by Wyatt. The County Committees will arrange for speakings, outdoor events, sale of wildlife poster stamps, and in other ways stimulate interest in wildlife. Wyatt announced appointment today of county chairmen in the West Central and extreme western counties of the State. Sale of poster stamps, painted by the famous artist "Ding" Darling, each picturing an animal, fish, bird, tree or plant, already has started, according to J. W. Chapman, manager of the Texas Wildlife Federation, which is handling detail work of the observance. The stamps will sell for \$1 per sheet of 80 stamps. County organizations selling the stamps may retain 20 cents of each dollar
