

To Launch Clean-Up Campaign on Saturday

CIVIC LEAGUE TO LEAD CITY IN BIG DRIVE

Planned As Eastland's Most Extensive In Over Ten Years

What is planned as Eastland's most extensive clean-up, paint-up and fix-up campaign will be launched Saturday under the auspices of the Civic League and Garden Club and will be continued until Sunday, April 9.

Mrs. James Horton, president of the Civic League and Garden Club, which has been sponsoring the annual campaign for over 10 years, has been assured of the cooperation of individuals, the city and many organizations.

Campaign officials stressed that this is "not just another special week but a real campaign," in

which cooperation of all is earnestly solicited.

The city of Eastland is cooperating wholeheartedly, according to Mrs. Horton. Mayor C. W. Hoffmann and commissioners have arranged to send water users reminders of the campaign and to solicit their cooperation when water bills are mailed.

Housewives also were reminded that they should gather all their trash during the campaign and put it near the curb from where it will be removed by city employees.

City trucks will be used exclusively during the clean-up, paint-up and fix-up campaign. The league has had 1,000 circulars printed to further advertise the event.

Five men have been employed by the city to clean up its lots. Those participating in the campaign urged citizens to only use local labor and local material so that the campaign will have far reaching effects beneficial to all.

The highway department in recent weeks has announced that it would raise unsightly buildings located on land adjacent to highways.

The campaign is being carried

to every organization in Eastland. West Ward school children are making posters advertising the cleaning up, fixing up and painting up.

Posters are to be placed in the Safe Haven Community Recreation Center operated by the W. P. A. in the Eastland National Bank. Children in the W. P. A. nursery schools are to be reminded of the campaign so that they may take the message home to their parents.

Citizens have also been reminded of a ruling of the city that forbids dumping of empty tin cans on vacant lots. Owners of stock have been reminded to keep their premises clean and sanitary.

Housewives have also been reminded that many need new trash cans. Some are too light and are often knocked over, making an unsanitary condition.

Mrs. W. A. Martin is general chairman of the committee and has as her co-workers, Mrs. T. E. Richardson, Mrs. Milton Lawrence and Mrs. Horton.

On Easter Sunday, April 9, the league has asked all citizens to have a flower in their windows and that businessmen have a flower in their store windows to make the city more attractive on the final day of the campaign.

(6) Porch floors, steps and railings—Repaint or revarnish.

(7) Balconies—Repaint.

(8) Screens—Repaint.

(9) Flashing around chimneys, scuttles, skylights, cellar doors.

(10) Storm doors and storm windows—Repaint.

(11) Outbuildings, garage, etc.—Repaint.

(12) Fences and gates—Repaint.

(13) Garden furniture, trellises, lattice work, bird houses, window boxes, flower pots, lawn mowers, wheel barrows, etc.—Repaint.

(14) Children's swings, wagons, scooters, etc.—Repaint or revarnish.

(15) Automobile—Refinish.

(16) Boats—Repaint and revarnish.

(17) Camps—Redecorate camp buildings.

INSIDE THE HOUSE

(1) Interior of the house—repaint, revarnish and redecorate completely.

(2) Walls, which are soiled, stained, cracked, flaked or faded—Repaint, recalcimine.

(3) Ceilings, which are soiled, stained, cracked, flaked or faded—Repaint, recalcimine.

(4) Floors of rooms and entrance halls which are scratched, marred or dulled by time and wear—Repaint or revarnish.

(5) Woodwork, inside doors, sills, stairs and railings—Repaint or revarnish.

(6) Linoleum—Revarnish to prolong its brightness and wear.

(7) Chairs, tables, bookshelves and all other worn, scratched or marred furniture—Repaint or revarnish or relaqueur to renew or change the color.

(8) Kitchen—Repaint, revarnish or relaqueur.

(9) Basement—Repaint walls and ceilings in light colors to improve lighting. Waterproof cement and masonry with waterproof coatings.

(10) Nursery—Repaint, revarnish or relaqueur as may be necessary and to make the room more attractive for the children.

(11) Toys, hobby horses, etc.—Repaint, revarnish or relaqueur.

(12) Radiators—Paint properly to increase efficiency.

(13) Metal work—Andirons, brackets, fire screen, light switches, etc.—Refinish.

'A Nice War Would Be Good for Business'

Somehow you never actually find the fellow who says, and sticks by it, that "a nice little war would be good for business."

Such sentiments seem to be in the back of some people's minds. You hear such sentiments implied, but you never pin the remark down to any single responsible person who is willing to stick to it.

Just how good for business another war would be is indicated by the tax proposal just launched in the Senate, the most sweeping tax measure ever to gain majority approval in that body. Fifty senators are reported to have signed their approval, though it is likely that many of them never read it.

The bill would provide "steeply graduated income and other taxes," amounting to 98.9 per cent. Up to \$4000, the taxes would be held down to 4.5 per cent, but for \$10,000 incomes, taxes would reach 26.4 per cent, and for \$20,000 incomes taxes would be up to 51.2 per cent. And if any person's or any corporation's war profits rose to \$10,000,000 in a year, the government would get \$9,890,210, or 98.9 per cent of it.

Nobody can object to the principle that at a time when many men are made to give their lives, other men should be made to give their money, any or all of it.

But such a proposal runs into interesting complications. It leaves out of account state and local taxes. For instance, one calculation is that a \$500,000 income in New York would not only be taken by the government, but the man who received it would owe \$24,130 in addition. A New Yorker with \$100,000 income would have \$2030 left after paying federal and state taxes, and one who made \$1,000,000 would owe state and federal governments \$61,130 more than his entire taxable income. He might even have to dig down into the barrel for a couple of gilt-edged bonds.

What corporations would do to build up reserves against future emergencies under such a regime is not stated.

It is unlikely that such a bill will pass, despite its enthusiastic reception. But it is well that it has been introduced.

It will show to any lackwit who has any lingering idea of profiting out of a "nice little war," that the pickings are going to be mighty slim the next time, if there are any pickings at all.

Probably the only pickings during and after any other war in which the United States engages will be at the bones of free and democratic institutions.

A purse on the sidewalk will be welcome this April 1—even though there is a string attached. And the foolers had better be sure their jerk is lightning-like.

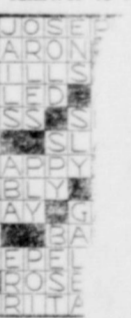

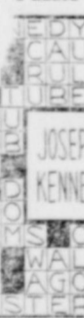

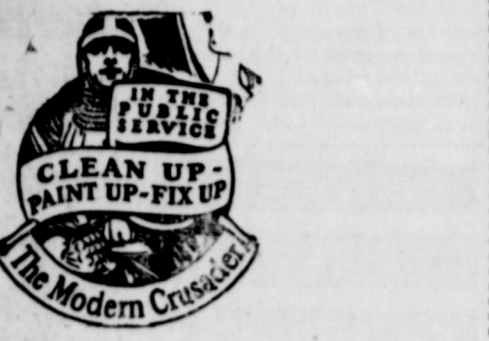
causing the increase by telling of the big increases they have made in crop yields because of fertilizers. In extreme cases where soils are badly worn, the addition of commercial fertilizers has doubled yields of peanuts and caused a good crop of feed where formerly it was impossible to grow feed. Fertilizers used in Eastland County vary in analysis from low analysis fertilizers such as 4-8-4 to high analysis fertilizers like 11-48-0. A few farmers are buying ingredients and mixing their own fertilizers. Far too few farmers are making use of the free, natural fertilizers found on their farms, the barnyard manure. As long as prices received for peanuts, peanut hay, and other products produced on the farm are reasonable, any kind of fertilizer that can be bought will prove profitable. However, according to Dr. G. S. Fraps, state chemist, the cheapest sources of nitrogen and phosphorus for several years have been found in 11-48-0 fertilizer. The two essential food elements needed by Eastland County soils are nitrogen and phosphorus. Whether or not potash is needed by these soils has not been definitely proved. Agricultural chemists now know that at least 58 elements are taken from the soil by plants. Some of these are zinc, boron, copper, and iron. It is not known whether any of these other than nitrogen and phosphorus are needed by Eastland County soils. M. K. Thornton, agricultural chemist of the A. & M. College Extension Service points out that the use of farm manures and wood ashes tends to conserve these minor elements in the soil, hence farm manures and wastes should be utilized to as great an extent as possible. To receive greatest benefits from manure, it should be treated with about 75 pounds of superphosphate per ton of manure in order to help balance the nutrients better. Eastland County soils are decidedly deficient in humus and if this is applied in the form of manure or by turning under green manure crops better yields can be had. The humus improves the condition of the soil by holding moisture and preventing the soil from packing. It also helps prevent plant food from washing from the soil. Great headway has been made by Eastland County farmers during the last three years in growing of cowpeas and other legumes to be turned under as humus. Placing fertilizer in a band at the side of the row about two inches from the seed and a little below the level of the seed avoids early injury to the seed and assures the greatest benefits to the crop. Hundreds of tests by Federal, state, and commercial agencies support that conclusion. They also prove that a part of the three hundred million dollars which farmers spend annually for fertilizer is wasted because the fertilizer commonly is not put where it will do the most good. It was learned that fertilizers placed too close to the seed in such a way that the seedlings come in contact with a concentration of the fertilizer usually delays germination, retards growth of the young plant, or causes loss of a large percentage of the plants. Farmers who plan to use commercial fertilizers can well make a good investment by spending part of the money available on an up-to-date fertilizer distributor. Finish Tank On Kleiner Ranch

The second largest earthen tank to be built in Eastland county for livestock purposes has just been completed on the Charles J. Kleiner Ranch, 12 miles Northeast of Cisco near Lee Ray townsite by Joe Chastain, Abilene contractor, according to the County Agent. The tank was built with two track-type tractors, one using a hydraulic freso and the other a bulldozer. The dam contains 9,600 cubic yards of dirt and will

impound at least a surface acre of water with a maximum depth of 30 feet. Kleiner will use the tank to supply water for livestock on part of his 4,000 acre ranch. The largest earthen tank for similar purposes in Eastland county was built on the G. P. Mitcham ranch in 1938 with both teams and a tractor. It has a dam of 4,000 cubic yards of dirt and impounds about 7 surface acres of water with a maximum depth of 22 feet. Since the Triple A range program started in 1937 more than 200 stock tanks have been built in Eastland county with an average of 1,000 cubic yards of dirt in each dam. All of these tanks are fairly small but deep tanks that will still have available water after extremely long dry periods. Close observers have pointed out that a repetition of the 1934 drought would catch Eastland county livestock raisers in a much better condition to carry their cattle through the dry period.

Fire Chief Tells Importance Of City-Wide Cleanup Campaign

The importance of the Eastland Clean-Up Paint-Up Fix-Up campaign in preventing fires and providing greater safety has been emphasized by A. W. Hennessee, fire chief.

"No one can ever estimate the number of persons whose lives will be saved through a citywide clean-up campaign," said the chief.

"Typhoid fever today is almost wiped out because of medical research. Many other diseases have been conquered because of the discovery of an antitoxin.

"The antitoxins which will guarantee good living conditions conducive to public health and safety are bound up in the thorough rejuvenation of each city in the spring. The success of every worth while undertaking, every notable achievement in community welfare has been due to the proper co-ordination of citizens.

"Dangerous hazards may be found on almost every floor of the home. Your individual clean-up campaign for the family should start in the house and work outward.

"It is best to clean out and dispose of everything that does not have a definite value. All closets should be relieved of unnecessary combustible material.

"In the cleaning process, no gasoline should be used as it vaporizes quickly and this vapor mixed with air is highly explosive. All conditions which might produce spontaneous ignition should be checked.

"After thorough cleaning has been done, it is time to beautify the premises with a coat of paint whenever necessary. This maintains the value of the property at a much higher level and increased pride in ownership. Then clean up the yard and remove the possibility of grass or other rubbish fires endangering the neighborhood.

"If every citizen of Eastland works religiously in this campaign, the result will not only be assistance in a general civic campaign that is highly important but it may even mean that some man, woman or child is saved from disease or tragedy," Hennessee declared.
