



THE BARS at bottom in the graph above show the variation in heating weather for the last two years as revealed by Weather Bureau Reports.

The bars at top show the amount of gas an average home used each month. Gas for cooking, water heating and refrigeration is indicated in gray. Gas for house heating is indicated in black.
