PARTITION PCLAND WAS PRE-WAR PLAN

BERLIN, Sept. 22.—German and Soviet high commands today divided Poland about equally, by announcing a line of demarcation between their armies, which, the Nazi official news agency said, had been agreed upon before war

started in Eastern Europe. The news agency said that the 700-mile line of demarcation plitting Poland's 150,000 square miles about in half "was already agreed upon before the war's be



What Is the World to Be Like After the War?

Is it silly to begin to wonder, even now, what the world is to be like after the European War? The fighting has scarcely commenced, and, except in Poland, there really hasn't been any on a large scale. And yet, even at this stage of the game, it may b wise to begin fixing our eyes on the world that is to be afterward. This war, like all wars, must end some time. The world will go on. What will have been accomplished!

It depends, of course, on who wins, if anybody can be said to win a modern war. It is more than possibe that nobody will win in the sense of the elimination of the whole races and peoples. All the root-problems of Europe will remain to be solved.

Up to now, neither side has published official summaries of "war aims" in the sense of a program it hopes to accomplish after the war. The British White Paper and its German counterpart are simpy the usual efforts to say, in involved diplomatic language, "He started it!" and

Theifs and might-have-beens are all past now. It has started, and the world is where it is. The British-French position is simply that a world is intolerable in which there is no international law and only naked force and the threat of it govern the relations between nations. The Germans' position is that they were unjustly oppressed after the World War, denied their natural position in the world, and that they are going to achieve it by whatever force is necessary. Behind these high-sounding statements lies the simple fact that the Germans and the French-British alliance are rivals for the control of Europe, and that neither will be satisfied until the other is eliminated.

Does either side extend even a valid promise that after peace comes it will help to construct a peaceful Europe run on a sane system, in which justice will be available to every country without fighting for it? Not that we have

It is probaby too early for that. Yet it is a thing not to be forgotten. The men who settle this war must do better than Versailles. There is something to the German contention that after Versailles they could get no justice from tention that after versalites they tion. Neither is there anything in German policy during the past 10 years which promises Europe and the world any- over Offhand Remark thing better than a continual international dog-fight.

It is certainly clear that Europe must be reorganized after this war.

Is it to be done by a victorious Germany to suit itself? Or by a victorious British-French coalition to suit themselves? An example of the second alternative has been seen since 1919, and it hasn't worked very well. An example of the first could scarcely fail to be even worse.

If the people of Europe, let alone peoples across the seas, are to be expected to support a long war, they must be offered something better-something very much better. So far no such hope has been offered by either side.



Building Style Is Seen Cradled In St. Louis Structures

ST. LOUIS, Mo .- The best exnples of "cast iron" architecture, rerupher of modern sky-scraper struction , are found in St. ouis according to Dr. Sigfried Geidion, professor of the history of architecture at the University f Zurich.

Dr. Giedion said the cast iron fronts and large windows were tpyically American and their successful use paved the way for building present day skyscrapers. He said that St. Louis had the most extensive examples of the 1850-80 construction period. He urged preservation of representative buildings as part of the Jefferson Memorial.

The professor, who had previusly used pictures of the buildigs in a lecture course at Harard University, said that conseration of the bdildings would be a istorical asset.
