EL PASO, Tex .- Making a 40cre lake and building two hills on sandy desert covered with brush and greasewood is the job of W. H. Orme-Johnson, engineer for Ascarate Park, a civic playground project on the outskirts of El

More than a million cubic yards of earth will be moved in building the lake, covering an area large enough to swallow the city's busiless district if it could be transferred to the park site. Giant scoops biting seven cubic yards of sand at each swipe and towed by

70-horsepower tractors are being used to scrape out the lake bed. It will be dug to a depth of three feet. The dirt scooped up will be piled around the edge in a dyke. Ultimately the lake will be seven feet deep.





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

Combatant countries do not consume as much cotton in wartime as in peace, Mc-Donald finds from the records. During the World War, cotton sold at an average of a little more than 11 cents prior to United States participation. Then it jumped to the high twenties. But the increase did not come from consumption and demand but from scarcity of farm labor when negroes were taken from the field and put in labor battalions and other units.

Wool foodstuffs, livestock, animal and vegetable oils will get the chief price benefit from war, Mo Donald believes.


