## FINLAND SHE **WILL END PACT**

Soviet Premier Molotov informed the Finnish minister in Moscow today that the Soviet Union will denounce the Soviet-Finnish nonaggression pact.

Molotov said Russia denounced the pact because of Finland's anti-Soviet policy. Molotov rejected the Finnish explanation of the frontier incident in which four Russian troops were reported killed, and insisted Finnish troops be withdrawn from the border.

Russian army officers told their armed forces to "annihilate" any Finns firing across the frontier.

At Helsingfors, the Finnish peo ple remained calm, but at Moscov it was said the little nation's reply to Soviet demands was both bold and impertinent.

One obvious Soviet hope was that the Finns could be pursuaded to overthrow their cabinet and come to terms.



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#### Civilization May Sneak Through Again

During the course of the last war, writers and orators re-discovered a word that was not only filled with lurid implications but bounced pleasingly along the tongue. The word was "Armageddon," and it came to be an essential part of the vocabularies of alarmists and pessimists.

Never before 1914 had a war been staged on so widespread a scale. Conflicts before had always been conducted along conventional lines-between two nations or two factions within a nation over some such orthodox matter as boundaries, colonies, freedom of the seas or the prestige of a ruler. Never before had half the world gone to bat for democracy and the other half against it.

Here then was Armageddon. It was not only God's great battle of good against the forces of evil, but it was the war. that would eliminate either all future wars or civilization itself. Here was the master war of them all, with newfangled flying machines that could wipe out cities as men swat flies and guns that could fire shells into towns 60 miles away. Civilization could not possible survive that mighty onslaught.

For 21 years after the 1918 Armistice, Armageddon was forgetten by all but classical scholars. Civilization. through some inexplicable miracle, had not been wiped out. And wars had not been ended. The euphonistic word was U.S. To Hold First packed away in moth balls along with such curios as A. E. F. uniforms and bustles.

Then came 1939. Bustles came back and so did Armageddon. Here it was again—the great decisive battle of all time. This was the war that would grind the earth into a mass of lifeless pulp. 
