Contestants Begin Applying For Annual Musical Club Meet

The Texas Federation of Music Clubs will conduct the annual musical solo contest at the State Convention of TFMC to be held in Waco, April 17-20.

Awards of \$10 each will be given to the State winner in piano, violin, woman's voice, man's voice contest, with the winner to go to the Lone Star District of Texas and Oklahoma elimination contest and from there to the National Federation of Music Clubs biennial convention at San Francisco in 1941.

The winner of the national contest will receive rewards of \$1,000 each and the best instrumentalist will appear with the Philadelphia Symphony Orchestra in Carnegie Hall and also with the Philadelphia Symphony Orchestra.

Elimination contest for the TFMC will be held in each of the seven districts in the State before March 15. Contestants must make application to Dr. Lena Milam of Beaumont, chairman of the Texas Federation of Music Clubs, and will be required to perform one American composition of their own choosing and the required number.

The required numbers include: Brahms "Rhapsody in G Minor," opus 79, piano; Vieuxtemps' Concert No. 5 in A minor, violin; Scarlatti's "Le Voltige," soprano; Mendelssohn's "O. Rest in the Lord" from Eliza, contralto;

MIKADO FOUND ONE OF BEST OF PICTURES
