

And, it not only adds some of its own desirable flavor to the conserve, but brings out the flavor of the more expensive strawberries and allows that flavor to predominate. In the recipe given below, oranges are used, too, as well as nuts to make the recipe more interesting. Cut oranges in slices not more than 1/8 inch thick, and cut strawberries crosswise in slices not more than 1/4 inch thick.

STRAWBERRY, ORANGE AND RHUBARB CONSERVE (Nine half-pint jars)

Two tablespoons dried currants, 2 oranges, 2 cups water, 4 cups (134 lbs.) prepared strawberries 2 cups (1/2 lb.) prepared rhubarb, 8 cups (3½ lbs.) sugar, ½ tea-spoor salt, ¾ cup coarsely chopped nuts (optional).
