

Unprecedented Rains Fall In This Area

Rain Here At All-Time High

Creek which flows through the area has set a new all-time record in Eastland County. This is the most rain recorded in Eastland in May since 1911, the year records were started.

In 1920 the oldtime record of 9.40 inches was recorded. Rainfall today totaled more than 11 inches. The following was written Friday before the recent rainfall and shows the fallacy of writing a rain story these days before your deadline.

A wind-blown rain drenched Eastland County Thursday, pushing the total rainfall in Eastland during May to near an all-time record.

An official reading of 1.00 inches was recorded here, but unofficial reading ranged as high as 2.50 inches. Around the county the rainfall was even heavier. Apparently the heaviest rain was at Rising Star where an official 3.60 inches was recorded. The rainfall there caused a flash flood which was said to be the worst in the last 34 years. The high water came from two branches of Copperas

At one time water was two feet deep in the Weldon Roach Ford Motor Co. building. The Texas Utilities Co. building, the post office and the Joyce Dry Goods Store also stood about 18 inches in water.

Ranger reported an unofficial four inches. Highway 80, between Eastland and Ranger, was inundated at one point during the height of the storm. Cisco reported just .30, but Carbon and Gorman both had some two inches.

The rainfall here brought the official reading for the month to 9.16 inches, and the total for the year to 19.49 inches. That is the third most moisture ever recorded here in May since records have been kept. And if an additional .25 of an inch falls during the last week of May an all-time record will be set. In 1920 9.40 inches fell and 9.35 inches was recorded in 1922.

Eastland is now 8.21 inches above normal for this time of year. Only 6.34 inches must fall in the remaining months to make this the first normal rainfall year since 1949.

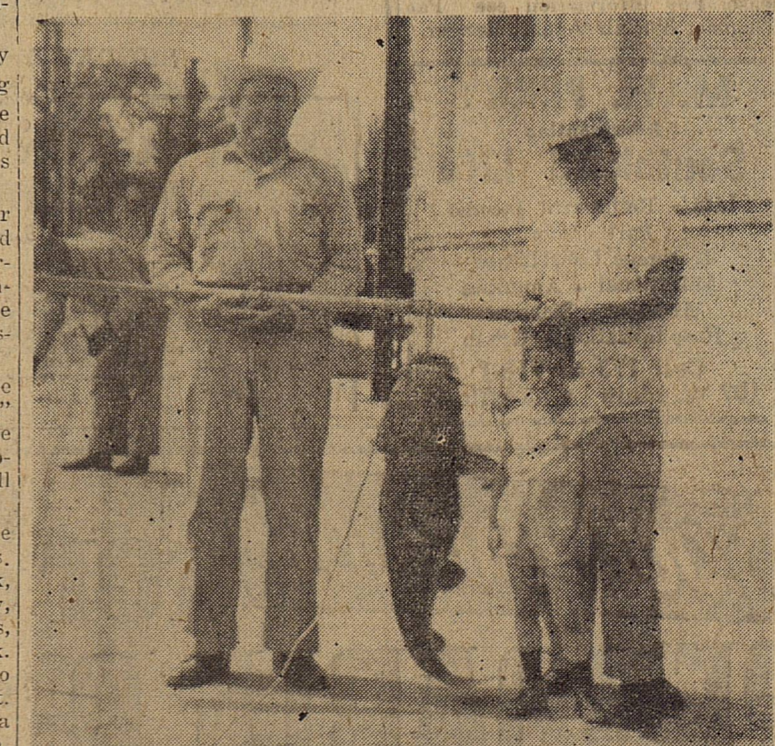
\$160 Month for Korean Vets Attending RJC

Crawford Accepts 15 Year Pen Sentence

George Crawford, well-known Eastland Negro, was given a 15 year sentence in the state pen Thursday for the "murder with malice" of his wife last September. Crawford, father of six young children, didn't change the expression on his face as 91st District Court Judge Turner Collier read the jury's verdict which was handed him by Harry Gurney, jury foreman. His attorneys, Earl Conner, Jr. and Allen Danney, immediately requested that judgment be passed and Judge Collier announced he would enter judgment as called for by the all-male jury. This was indicated that there would be no appeal.

Committeemen of Three Scouting Units To Meet

All committeemen of Eastland's three Scout units have been asked to meet with Steve Potts, local advancement chairman, Tuesday in the American Legion Hall.

The committeemen recently selected a group of Eastland men to serve on Scout Merit Badge work. The program is to cover the duties and responsibilities of a merit badge counselor.

It has been pointed out that a scoutmaster cannot pass all Scout work in the 110 phases of merit badge activities. Men have been selected who are experts in their field to help and coach the boys in the various badge work. All fathers of boys were also urged to attend the meeting, which will begin at 7:30 p.m.

Some 80 to 90 boys are now actively engaged in Scout work here.

Some 20 onlookers, who had sat through the 4 1/2 hours the jury had deliberated, also took the verdict without noticeable comment. Judge Collier first started reading the jury's verdict out loud, saying, "We the jury find the defendant, George Crawford, guilty of murder with malice," then quit and called an attorney from both sides. Then he returned the verdict to the jury and asked that it be completed. The jury foreman finished filling in the form, passed it around for all jurors to see and then returned it to the judge.

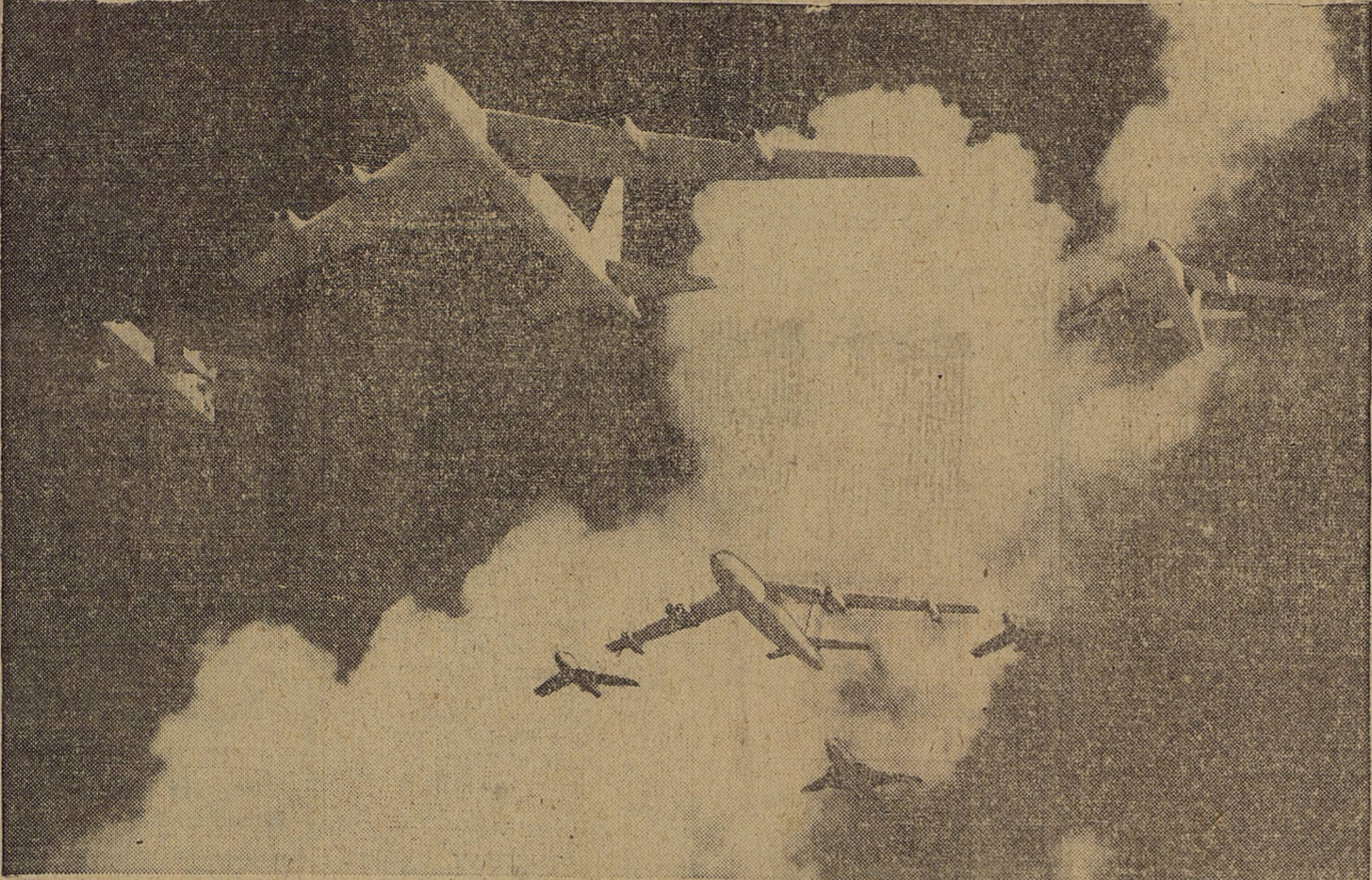
Crawford was found guilty of shooting his wife a number of times as she sat at a table with three friends in the home of Armstead West. This was the second time the case had been tried. A hung jury, which couldn't narrow a wide gap in their decision resulted in the first trial.
