

## Tom Lovelace III Is Scout Swim Winner

Eastland Boy Scouts were well represented by Troop 6 and Post 48 in the council swim meet held in Gorman last Friday night. Troop 6, sponsored by the Rotary Club, was led to a second place ribbon award by high point swimmer Tom Lovelace III.

Scoutmasters for the troop are Jim Horn and Moreland Jackson.

# Small Forts Saved More Than One Early Pioneer

(Editor's Note: This is the fourth in a series of articles taken from the book, "A History of Eastland County, Texas," written by Mrs. George Langston and published in 1904.)

During the years 1857-1862 the Indians were unusually active along the frontier. When one remembers the topography of the counties forming the boundary line of civilization, the numerous streams which cut their way through mountains, leap into canyons, and tumble out pell mell into the valleys, where they wind in sinuous, undulating way it is to be wondered at that the red man of the forest yielded to the temptation of his environments and sought revenge for the appropriation of his domain to the uses of the white man.

Although the primal object of the Indians in making raids into the white settlements was to steal horses; yet, if there were the slightest pretext, they murdered with all the zest of their ancestral inheritance. During these perilous years the pioneer settlers were forced to come together for mutual protection.

In the southeastern part of Eastland County eight families were fortified at C. C. Blair's Ranch. The houses were built and the tents stretched around an open square, and these were enclosed by a close picket fence eight or 10 feet high. The families were gathered here, and it was also a frequent stopping place for the Rangers on their journeys hither and thither, large supplies of bread-stuff and ammunition were kept on hand. As the traveler went northward, however, he found Flannagan's Ranch practically un-

protected, guarded only by an elderly man, "Bad Reece," who kept about the house. In the Allen neighborhood were three fortified ranches—Allen's, Clayton's and Edwards'. Smaller ranchmen built their houses in groups of two, three or four. McCain in the edge of Stephens County and Uncle Peter Davidson at the foot of the mountains in Palo Pinto County, both had their ranches well fortified.

On Gonzales Creek, a little farther up the county in Stephens County, lived the pioneer settler, John Reynolds, whose sons, George, William D. and P. W., have large interests in Cisco.

It was in 1860, shortly before Blair's Ranch was fortified, that the Indians stole all the horses belonging to the Ranch. The men followed hard after them, and the women were left to guard camps. A daughter of the Fort writes: "We children were kept in a little two by four house, and the women sat under the wagons, expecting every minute to see the Indians come."

"By and by the Indians got so bad we all went to Stephenville and stayed six weeks. At that time there was one store, one drug store, and blacksmith shop in that town."

"On our way back to the old Fort we had a narrow escape from the Indians. We had just passed Mr. Ellison's, the only house between the two places, his dog began to bark, and as he stepped to the door, the Indians shot, one arrow striking in the foot."

## New Fishing Law Is Effective Sept. 1st

A new Sports Fishing License Law which increases fishing license fees becomes effective September 1, 1957. The additional revenue will enable the Game and Fish Commission to increase its work program by about 25 percent and will generally benefit Texans interested in better fishing.

The new law states, in effect, that it shall be unlawful for any person to fish in any waters of this state without first obtaining a fishing license, according to Ed Cooper, wildlife conservation specialist.

The exceptions to this law, says Cooper, are persons under 17 and over 65 years of age; any person, or member of such persons immediate family when fishing upon property he owns or upon which he resides; and persons fishing with trotline, throw line, or ordinary pole or line having no reel or other winding device when fishing in the county of his residence. No other fishing license shall be required.

The new law differs from the old one in ways besides fee charge, points out Cooper. Unlike the old law, the new one is not concerned with the type of bait to be used. Another difference is that the license fee is the same for Texans and out-of-state residents. The new law which requires salt water anglers to be licensed and charges a lower fee to non-residents, paves the way for a reciprocal licensing program with some of our neighboring state, concludes Cooper.

## Will Rush to Finish For Season Opener

The Eastland Quarterback Club has already broken the ground and construction is to begin soon on public rest rooms for Maverick Stadium bringing it closer to the top of the list as one of the finest small stadiums anywhere in West Texas.

The rest rooms will be located on the north end of the field near the entrance and construction will be rushed to completion so that the new facility will be ready for use by the time football season begins, we are told.

Quarterback Club President Wells Dalton, and Jimmy Young, chairman of the building com-

mittee, said today they needed the help of every club member who could possibly make it to come to the stadium each evening at 6 o'clock from now on to help pour concrete for the foundation and to rough in the plumbing. This must be done before the week-end, Dalton said, so the foundation will have time to set and so that work could then proceed Monday. A special plea is made for a 11 hands to show up at 6 o'clock this afternoon, Thursday.

Eastland has every right to be proud of Maverick Stadium with its recent improvements. The new score board which was added last year has contributed much to the value of the stadium and to the enjoyment of the games by the spectators. Also last season many hundreds of feet of new stadium pine boards were added to make the seating sections safer and more comfortable.

Progress on the stadium has been slow but sure, and there are several items that will perhaps come in for more attention in the future. The field house facilities could be improved, and so could the press box facilities.

The "Press Box" is incorrectly named, as it is not a "Box" for the "Press" at all. It could more correctly be called the nerve center of the entire proceedings during a football game.

Consider what's in it. First there are representatives of the press, of course—the home town newspaper and a representative of the newspaper of the visiting team. Between these two men there are at least two spotters. If the game being played is of area-wide interest, there are also representatives from the larger papers, with their spotters.

In the so-called press box also there is the home town radio station with at least two announcers and a technician with all their equipment. In 90 per cent of the cases there is also radio personnel and their equipment from the home town of the visiting team.

In addition to this there are the men who operate the public address system, the minimum being one announcer and at least one spotter, or assistant. During half-time the public address system is joined by the band directors from both bands, or other personnel, to explain what the bands are doing during their exercises on the field.

There are always football scouts who must be accommodated in the press box and these gentlemen proceed under the idea that they own the place and they take all the best seats and refuse to move. They are joined by members of the "press" who flock to the press box looking for a free seat and who have no intention of ever writing a line about the game for anybody. These press "spongers" are invariably joined by a half-dozen or more school teachers from both teams who have no more business in the press box than a Brahma bull in a baptistry.

So, in the case of Eastland, a press box that was designed to accommodate perhaps eight or 10 people is always bursting at the seams with 35 or 40 or 50. Eastland isn't the only town with such trouble—most all of them have it.

Ballinger, which is in District 7-AA, and which has a stadium about the size of Maverick Stadium, solved its problem by building another press box on the other side of the field. The new press box houses and accommodates the radio people, almost always the personnel from two radio stations, and the public address system. It

## Important Egg Law Effective Aug. 22nd.

The Texas Egg Law, which becomes effective August 22, provides that no person can buy or sell eggs within this state for subsequent resale without first obtaining a license from the Commissioner of Agriculture.

The exception to this, says F. Z. Beanblossom, extension poultry marketing specialist, are those who sell from their own flock and claim no grade; hatcheries which buy eggs for hatching; public eating places where all eggs purchased are served by the establishment; food manufacturers purchasing eggs to be used only in their products, agents employed and carried on the payroll on a salary basis by persons licensed under this act; and any retailer, as defined by law—that is, any person selling or offering for sale, eggs to consumers in this state.

In order to create a fund for the enforcement of the provisions of this act, each licensee shall pay a license fee. The annual fee for

dealers, wholesalers, and processors shall be determined according to average weekly volume of the month in which the licensee handled the most eggs in the preceding twelve months ending on May 31. The proceeds of such license fees shall be paid into the State Treasury by the Commissioner of Agriculture in a fund known as the Egg Law Enforcement Fund.

The deadline for obtaining licenses is October 20. Actual enforcement of the law will start February 17, 1958.

## A&P Spends \$5,000 to Cool Customers Off

The A & P Food Store in Eastland has just completed installation of a \$5,000 10-ton refrigerating unit for the purpose of keeping its customers cooler in the summertime.

Store manager Willis Moore said the new unit was tested for a few hours last Saturday, but was not put into full time operation until Monday morning of this week. He said at one time during the testing period it got so cold inside the store that the automatic heating system came on.

Moore said the temperature would be controlled to around 75 degrees which most people find to be more comfortable than 72 degrees.

 The town of Spanish Fort in Montague County was established on Village Creek, now silted up but then a pretty stream. Just across Red River was, of course, Indian Territory, which was infested by numerous outlaws, who frequently came to Spanish Fort. Three outlaws were lynched not far from the town but in Indian Territory.  
 Spanish Fort itself witnessed many exciting events. A woman whose husband had been killed moved from the farm into town. Three men were suspected of having killed the farmer. Perhaps the slayers thought that the widow might know too much. One night, her house was fired into; she ran out and was killed. The outrage led to the immediate forming of a posse and three men were tracked into a thicket. The thicket was surrounded, then two brave men—George Howard and Dave Price—crawled into the underbrush, got the drop on the trio and took them

prisoner. They were tried; two were hanged and the other received a long prison term.

One of the busiest spots in Spanish Fort was the Cowboy Saloon. On Christmas Eve, about 1882, cowboys shot the front out of the saloon. Hundreds of shells were picked up next morning.  
 Almost in front of the Cowboy Saloon, a pitched battle took place. Six men (three on each side) met face to face and bullets began flying. When the shooting ended, one group had been wiped out. But life had its lighter side,

too. Broke and thirsty, one cowboy said to another, "Tell you what we'll do. I'll go in the saloon and, after while, you come in and I'll offer to bet the bartender you're wearing socks and, if he won't take me up, then I'll offer to bet that you're not wearing socks."  
 The other said, "You could lose."  
 "No," said his buddy, "take off your left sock right now. Then if he bets you're wearing socks, take off your left boot and you'll be barefooted. If he bets the other way, take off your right boot and there the sock will be."  
 And their little plan worked. A gambler in Spanish Fort was telling about a train being held up and he concluded, "It was a good thing I didn't have my six-shooter." Someone asked, "What would-a happened if you had had the railroad built into the country in 1887 and so the town dwindled until the once turbulent place has only a handful of inhabitants now."

gets all of the broadcasting off to itself, and gives the public address system plenty of room to accommodate the band directors, prayer leaders, speech-makers and others who take part in the program over the public address system.

Over in the old press box there are facilities for all the covering newspapers, and also the scouts from other schools. It is a fine arrangement and can be adopted by schools who do not want to hang one huge press box on one side of the stands, thus taking a chance of collapsing the whole thing.

We wish, though, they wouldn't call it a "Press Box" since the press takes up the smallest space in it.

them, but by the excited barking they knew the cougar was "treed," and followed on to the creek. Not until the "nasty varmint" fell, with a bullet through him, down among the tingling, quivering dogs, did this father and mother think of aught else.

"Lord a' mercy, Pap; the Indians!" screamed Mrs. Blair, and they ran, leaped and tore through the brush in their frantic efforts to reach their unprotected children. Mrs. Blair has always affirmed that the agonizing fright of those few minutes frosted her hair. "To think a pig could make me forget my children was what hurt," she said.

Daily contact inures one to dangers, yet quickens one's instinct to truthfulness. This is strikingly true of the frontiersman. At this Blair's Fort a man would pick up his gun and go out hunting alone, when it was well understood that when the light of the moon should come the Indians would be raiding the white settlements.

On a hazy October afternoon, when one of the men had just come in with a deer on his shoulder, Jim McGough went to the spring, 300 yards away, to water his horse. While there he was attacked by the Indians, and attempted to outrun them to the gates of the Fort. In this short, but impetuous race, the frightened animal pitched him into the brush. The Indians endeavoring to head him off, chased up the other side of the dense thicket, but seeing the gates closed, they disappeared, when Mr. McGough came running up to the Fort with his face covered with blood.


Cattle and hogs were the commercial possibilities of the County, on which the settlers relied for money.





## HOW BOYS GET SCOUTING

## Judging Schedule Over \$4 Million Heart O' Texas Fair Announced

Judging schedule of the livestock departments of the Heart O' Texas Fair in Waco, Sept. 28-Oct. 4, has been announced by General Superintendent Ralph Russell.

Actually, judging begins one day before the official opening as the first go-round for cutting horses will take place on Sept. 27, with the top 16 horses working their second go-round in the rodeo on Sept. 28, 29 and Oct. 1. Finals will be held during the Oct. 2 rodeo.

On Sept. 28, steers, lambs and pigs of the junior show will be judged.

Hereford breeding cattle, the open division of Ayrshires and both open and junior competition of the Guernseys will be judged Sept. 30.

Aberdeen - Angus breeding cattle and Jerseys (open and junior divisions) will go before the judge's eye, Oct. 1.

Shorthorn and Santa Gertrudis breeding cattle, Holsteins (open and Junior) and Quarter Horses will be judged Oct. 2.

Deadline for cattle, sheep and swine entries is Sept. 1; for cutting horses, Sept. 20 and for Quarter Horses, Oct. 2 (at 10 a. m.)

## In Back Wages Found Due

DALLAS—Back wages amounting to more than \$4 million were found due to workers in the five Southwestern states as a result of wage-hour investigations during the fiscal year ending June 30, it was reported here today.

Of this amount, \$2,031,538 already has been paid, according to

Regional Director William J. Rogers of the U. S. Department of Labor's Wage-Hour division here. Other cases are in litigation and some are held for "further handling."

Violations during the fiscal year just passed were found in 4,037 plants visited, he said. The payments were made to comply with the Fair Labor Standards Act (Federal Wage-Hour Law) which requires a minimum of \$1 an hour and at least time and a half for overtime after 40 hours a week for all non-exempt workers in interstate commerce or in the production of goods for interstate or foreign commerce.


In addition, there were 582 cases of violation of the child-labor provisions of the law, he said. A total of 2,958 employers paid the back wage bill of \$2,031,538 in the five-state Southwestern region consisting of Texas, Oklahoma, Louisiana, Arkansas, and New Mexico. The number of workers receiving such back wages was not announced.

Mr. Rogers emphasized that most of the violations were unintentional and arose from a misunderstanding or misapplication of the law's exemptions.


