Paul Brashear Is Opposed to New Session

State Rep. Paul Brashear told Eastland Rotarians Monday that he could see no need for a special session of the Legislature which Gov. Price Daniel has indicated he will call in October.

Rep. Brashear said that there would be little need for him to return to Austin since he already has voted no to all three bills which the Governor says Legislators need to pass. The Cisco lawmaker declared that he believed lobby laws now in existence to be strong enough. He said lobbyists are not as bad as some people believe, pointing out that they merely try to sell their side of the story to the lawmakers. "You get to hear both sides of the question that way," he explained, "and then try to go down the middle."

Besides the lobby law, Gov. Daniel has requested water legislation and passage of a bill to form a State Crime Commission to hold open sessions to investigate crime. Brashear said the bill was known as the Gestapo bill in Austin, and emphasized that he opposed it.

No Tax Bill

Brashear said it was a major accomplishment when the Legislature was able to not pass any additional tax bills this year. But he added, "There's no financial Santa Claus at the North Pole or in the District of Columbia." He reminded Rotarians that they are now working one-third of the day for the government.

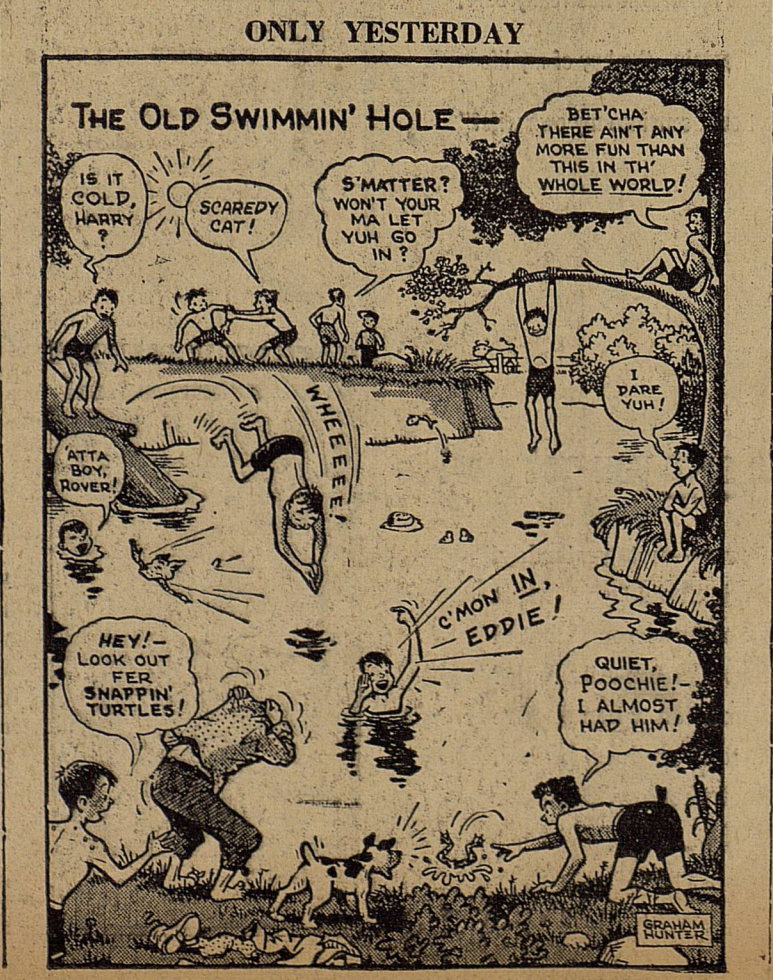
The sophomore representative pointed out that he voted against the 10 percent increase on automobile licenses, and that he voted for Senate Bill 225 which allows breweries to operate in territories which have been wet but later voted dry.

"I have been told that I voted to allow a brewery to operate in Eastland County," Brashear stated, "but that isn't so. There are only six breweries in Texas today and they are the only ones effected by the bill." He termed his vote a good chamber of commerce move.

Brashear said he worked hard to get a pay increase for state employees and said he voted for the teachers pay raise. "If the teachers raise would have meant an increase in taxes I would have been forced to vote against it, however," The Ciscoan also told his listeners that he voted against the bill which raised the pay of district judges from \$9000 to \$12,000 a year, and the pay of Civil Appeals court judges from \$12,000 to \$16,000 annually. "I favored a smaller raise," he explained.

Asked if he thought his bill which would have added two additional counties to the 91st District Court did not get enough support in the Senate, he answered in the affirmative, although saying, "This is no reflection on our sen-

Special Appropriation Asked by Commissioners

"Floods, Lake Leon and rising costs" were reasons given by two commissioners Monday for asking for emergency appropriations from the county road and bridge fund to their precincts.

Precinct 1 Commissioner J. B. (Tip) Arther and Precinct 2 Commissioner B. M. (Froggie) Bennett made the request. At their suggestion the Court did not make a decision Monday, but delayed their final say until the next meeting of the Commission so that all would have time to study the request.

Bennett pointed out that the precincts still get the same amount of money—\$30,000 annually—that they did 20 years ago. He reminded other members of the Court that costs have sky rocketed since that time. "I am hard pressed to get along because of damage caused by the recent flood and by Lake Leon," the Gorman commissioner declared. "My people tell me they want roads they can drive on instead of trying to build up a million dollars in the road and bridge fund."

At present there is something like \$173,000 in the road and bridge fund, according to Arther, who said he had repairs he needed to make but couldn't unless he got an additional allotment. Bennett and Arther asked County Auditor Harl O'Brien if a transfer

could be made without hurting the road and bridge fund, and O'Brien said the fund is in "sound position" and a transfer could be made.

Commissioner Ed McCannies of Cisco said he didn't need any more money, but could see the need of the other two commissioners. Commissioner Bob Carter of Rising Star voiced no opposition, although he did not offer any oral support. Apparently, however, he would vote for such a transfer.

Preparations On For Port Isabel Fish Tournament

A. H. "Cowboy" Huebinger, president of the 19th annual Texas International Fishing Tournament, announced that at least three and possibly four boats would be in the Gulf of Mexico each weekend between now and the start of the fishing contest. These boats will travel offshore looking for sailfish, marlin, and tuna. These weekly expeditions will report on fishing conditions and catches each week and correlate this information with catches made off Corpus Christi during the Port Aransas Fishing Tournament July 16, 17 and 18.

Several other boats will fish closer to shore exclusively for tarpon at the mouth of the Rio Grande River which has produced some near record tarpon in years past. With the heavy rains, many tarpon fishermen will be fishing in this area in preference to Brazos Santiago Pass.

To date tournament officials have had only one offshore report of a three day expedition in the deep water.

Three weeks ago, Dr. J. A. Hockaday and Captain Bob Luce fished for tuna at the thousand fathom mark due east of Port Isabel. The fishermen left at midnight and arrived at the thousand fathom curve at noon the following day. Heavy tackle used for tuna was hit several times and stripped completely by large fish. Hockaday reports that these were either large tuna or sharks and never surfaced after striking and tearing up the baits and tackle. Heavy seas forced the group to return to shore ahead of schedule.

Tournament officials expect a record number of boats at this year's contest and reservations have been received from contestants in Houston, Corpus Christi, San Antonio, and Port Aransas. The tournament begins officially at 7:00 a.m. on August 1, and closes with the Port Isabel Volunteer Firemen fish fry and awarding of prizes on Sunday, August 4.

State Hearing On Lake Road Is Asked

Representatives of Cities Ask Request

Eastland County Commissioners Monday unanimously voted to request a hearing with the State Highway Commission so that "a group of interested citizens" could appear before the Commission and ask that the road across Lake Leon Dam be added to the Eastland County Farm to Market pro-

gram. Commissioners took the step at the request of representatives of the Eastland and Ranger chambers of commerce. They emphasized to the representatives that they would not recommend the project be listed as the most needed in the county, however.

At first the Commission was reluctant to ask for the hearing, saying it would put them in an embarrassing position. Finally, however, they agreed to do so providing the request said that "a group of interested citizens" could appear before the State Commission.

Involved is some four miles of what is now a county road. Representatives of Eastland and Ranger termed the road as one of the most used in the county. Virgil Seaberry Jr. of Eastland, serving as spokesman for the group, said it was impossible to maintain the dirt road because of the heavy traffic. The new section asked for would give both Eastland and Ranger a paved road all around the lake.

Appearing before the Court were Seaberry, M. H. Perry, Charles Freyschlag and Grady Pipkin, all of Eastland, and Rip Galloway, C. B. Pruet, Louis Conn and T. C. Wylie of Ranger.

Commissioner E. M. Bennett of Gorman, in whose precinct the work would be done, told the group that he was highly in favor of the project. He said it would mean that he could turn over the road—which has been a headache to him in recent years—to the State for maintenance.

Commissioners said that at present the county is obligated to complete the Staff to Desdemona highway. They said engineering work on that project is due to begin in September and the work is to be done next year.

Eastland and Ranger representatives did not ask that the new project be listed first—only that it be put on the agenda.

Work is now underway on the road leading from Highway 80 near Ranger to the highway which leads from Eastland going to the lake. Both cities will therefore have paved roads to an equal distance from the lake.

Richard Bumpass Holding Student Revivals Now

Richard (Dick) Bumpass, 214 S. Oak, an Eastland student at Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary in Fort Worth, is one of 45 Texas Baptist students conducting youth-led revivals in churches throughout the state during the summer months.

Dr. W. F. Howard, director for the student department of the Baptist General Convention of Texas, said the young ministers will conduct more than 100 revivals during the summer.

More than 1,000 revivals have been conducted since the program was begun by the department in 1946, Dr. Howard said. More than 44,000 decisions for Christ have been recorded.

The young ministers and music directors go out in teams of twos and fours to conduct the services. Most of them are in school preparing for full-time Christian service.

Revival campaigns started in June and will continue through mid-September. Latest reports received at the department in Dallas show 563 decisions recorded so far this year.

Before beginning their work this summer, team members met for a two-day clinic at the Mount Lebanon Baptist Encampment grounds near Cedar Hill.

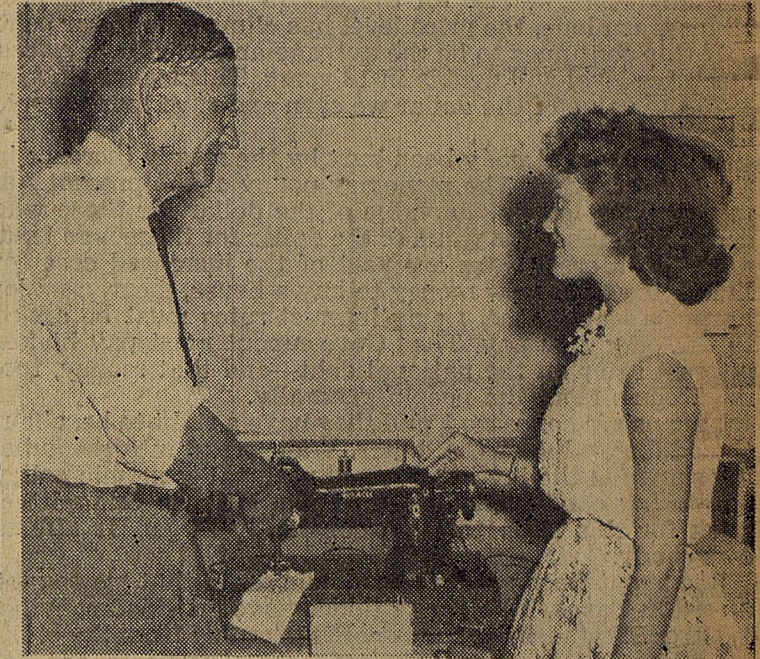

Muddy Water Still Hanging On At Lake Leon

Why the muddy water keeps hanging on at Lake Leon has everybody puzzled. It has now been five or six weeks since any water ran into the lake and ordinarily it should have been cleared long before now, but it's not.

Neither has there been any hard wind sufficient to keep the lake stirred up all this time. Lake Cisco is in the same shape, only muddier, it looks like.

It may be that the lake keeps turning itself over, due to the terrific heat during the day and the cooling off at night, but whatever it is has not been good on fishing and it has been bad on business.

The Telegram receives several calls each week from fishermen in Fort Worth inquiring about the water, and they won't come out here until it has cleared up.

Whenever fishing falls off at the lake, camp owners lose money to say the least of bait houses, sporting goods establishments, and other places that are patronized by out-of-town fishermen.

Only two more regular season games remain on tap and they will be played Thursday night. The Medics will play the Comets and the Lions take on the Bulldogs on Thursday action. Then Friday night the Lions and the Comets meet in the first game of a best two out of three play-off series for the city championship.

Managers of the four teams and other Little League officials are meeting tonight to select members of the all-star team. The teams will be announced in the near future.

WASHINGTON NEWS LETTER By Lyndon B. Johnson

An old story and a sad one was repeated once more last week. It was the announcement that, for the ninth month in a row, the cost of living had gone up again.

The general price level actually has been in a steady—and disturbing—rise for the last 18 months. In the past 12 months alone, the price level has climbed four per cent.

If this continues to be the average annual rise in prices, our price level will double in 18 years. This means that by 1975 the value of the dollar we earn and save today would be cut in half.

People have already been hurt by the steady increase in the cost of living. The monetary policy of the present Administration lowers the value of the dollar for those who spend and raises the value of the dollar for those who lend.

High interest rates are part of the increased cost of living. If you borrow money to buy a house, a car, a major household appliance, rising interest rates must be added to the price you pay. The Government must pay higher interest rates on the national debt—and that money, too, must come from the people generally.

Texans are concerned, and they have a right to be, about the sliding value of the dollar. Widespread interest is being shown in the investigation of national economic policy now being conducted by the Senate Finance Committee. Look for this issue to loom constantly larger. It affects everybody.

Recurrent floods are an economic drain that we cannot afford in Texas. This year's floods have provided convincing proof that, despite the benefits accruing from the highly successful operations of flood control projects, the extent of our controls has been limited.

One fundamental reason is that a basin-wide plan of improvement has not been completed on any Texas river.

A river basin is a natural unit. Water resource development within each basin must be unified, integrated and progressive. That is why I am asking insistently for surveys of all the Texas river basins. I am working every day to get congressional authority for the needed surveys and to spur the Corps of Engineers into effective action. I know of nothing more basically important to Texas.
