Sam E. Von Rosenberg of Austin, state manager of the American Dairy Association, will discuss the importance of milk consumption at a meeting of Eastland County dairymen at the courthouse in Eastland, tonight, according to Marshal Berry of Carbon, secretary of the county dairy organization.

## Eastland Church Leader Says Her Faith Persecuted

An Eastland church leader charged today that members of her faith have been subjected "to beatings and violence by police and prison guards" in the Dominican Republic.

Mrs. Zettye Parrack, presiding minister of the Eastland congregation of Jehovah's Witnesses, declared that 10 American missionaries were deported from the Dominican Republic Aug. 3. She said their fare was paid for by the Dominican government and that the missionaries were "escorted under arrest to the plane."

Action came on the heels of "a wave of persecution equaled only in Communist countries" climaxed by a total ban proscribing the work of Bible education conducted by the Witnesses in the Dominican Republic since 1945, she said.

An ultimate to the Christian missionaries to renounce all association with the organization and cease communication with their Brooklyn, N. Y., office or leave the country was made last month by Major General Arturo Espallat, minister of Security, whom the U. S. Government has sought to question in the disappearance of Dr. Jesus de Galindez. Some of the missionaries have been in the country for 11 years.

According to official news sources of the Dominican Republic, proscription of the Christian activity of Jehovah's Witnesses was legalized by President Hector Trujillo on July 25 and the law carries penalties of from one to three months imprisonment with fines of from \$30 to \$100. It was announced that over \$1 million had been appropriated by the Dominican government to enforce the ban.

Mrs. Parrack said a full-scale campaign to restrict the religious freedom of the Witnesses has been (Continued on Page 3)

## County Draws Four New Tests In Recent Days

Four new oil tests have been staked in Eastland County in the last few days.

No. 1 L. R. Pearson is being drilled by John R. Shaw Jr. as a regular field try four miles north of Eastland on an 80-acre lease.

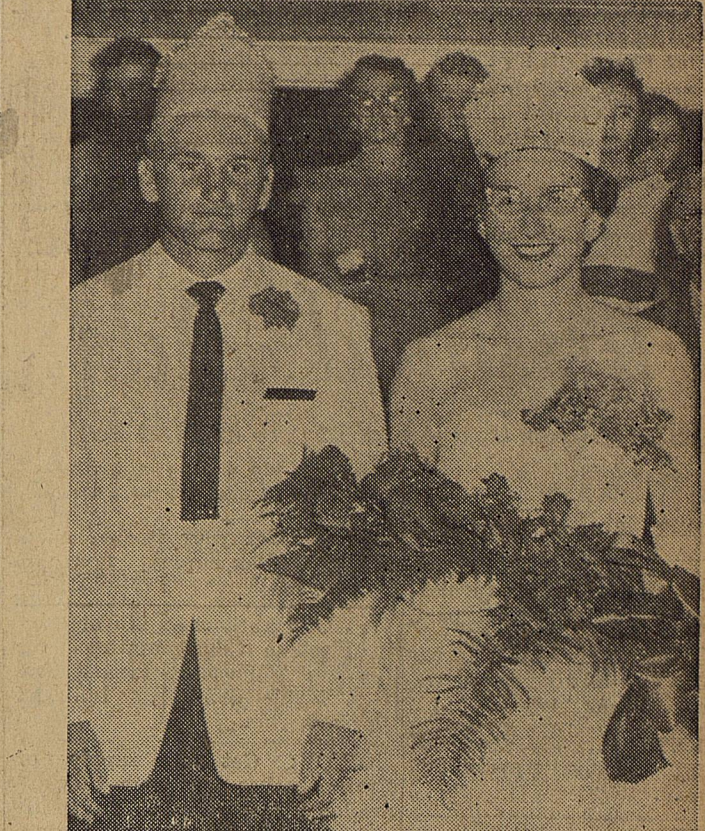
Location is 480 feet from the north line and 150 feet from the east line of Section 9, Block 4, H&TC Survey. Proposed depth is 2000 feet with rotary.

V&J Production Co. of Coleman has staked the No. 1 S. T. White as a wildcat try 990 feet from the north line and 330 feet from the east line of the southwest fourth of Section 23, Block 2, ETRR Survey, five miles northeast of Pioneer in the southwest part of the county. The try, scheduled to go 3200 feet with rotary to the Ellen sand, is 2 1-2 miles east of the old Pioneer field.

Another wildcat try, the No. 2 P. C. Frazier, has been spotted by N. T. Smith of Cisco. Location is 2300 feet from the south line and 1330 feet from the east line of Section 10, Block 1, H&TC Survey, six miles northwest of Gorman on a 160-acre lease. It is a re-entry into a failure for the purpose of testing the Strawn Sand Zone at 1900 feet and is one fourth of a mile southeast of a 3475 feet failure.

McElroy Ranch Co. of Midland has staked the No. 2 F. D. Wright 1380 feet from the north line and 1263 feet from the west line of Section 2, Block 3, H&TC Survey, three miles southwest of Eastland on a 237 acre lease. The Marble Falls test is slated to go 3049 feet.

## Eastland County Vet Land Tract Now On Market

Fifty one tracts of land will be offered in a Sept. 27 sale by the Veterans' Land Program, including tracts in Eastland, Brown, Comanche and Earth counties, Land Commissioner Earl Rudder announced this week.

Texas veterans who desire information about the sale of forfeited land can contact Commissioner Rudder at the Land Office in Austin by mail or phone.

A high bond market was still making it impossible last week to sell any part of the \$100,000,000 Veterans' Land Program bond issue approved by voters last November.

The net effect is that the only way most veterans can participate in the program now is to purchase forfeited land. The next sale of forfeited land is September 27.

"Until we can sell our bonds our regular program has money to buy only about 200 tracts of land a year," Land Commissioner Earl Rudder, who is also chairman of the Veterans' Land Board, says.

There are about 21,000 Texas veterans on the V.L.P. waiting list.

The board cannot by the Constitution pay more than three percent interest on money obtained through the sale of bonds. Average interest rate on government bonds during the week ending August 10 was 3.54 per cent.

"While we're trying to get our bonds sold, we suggest that veterans avail themselves of the possibility of buying forfeited tracts," Commissioner Rudder says.

## County History Tells Of Pairs' Race With Indians

(Editors Note: This is the sixth in a series of articles taken from the book, "A History of Eastland County, Texas" written by Mrs. George Langston in 1904.)

In Steve Brandon's home everything was going wrong. His wife had been ill for two days. The four or five grown boys could turn "flapjacks" and make "corn dodgers," but their big hands were clumsy when they tried to "pat up" Ma's pillow, or give her a dose of medicine.

"I'm going for Mrs. Kohen," Mr. Brandon announced after dinner. "She's over at Clayton." Keep a sharp lookout for the redskins, boys.

"You do the same, Steve," he called out to his wife, as he hucked on his six-shooter and left the house.

The sun shone from a clear sky on that memorable afternoon, Dec. 15, 1860. Brandon was a brave man, but his heart was heavy with forebodings as he started on that fateful journey of five or six miles. As he went deeper into the wood, however, thinking of his sick wife and his own imminent danger (as it was the light of the moon) he realized, perhaps unconsciously, that nature is capable of restoring one's peace of mind and calming one's fears.

Mrs. Kohen readily consented to go, and for lack of any better

way Mr. Brandon took her up behind him on his trusty black steed and started off in a smart pace for home.

When they had covered but half the distance they were most abruptly apprised of immediate danger. The air was cut by the whiz of an arrow, which lodged in a tree directly in front of them. The noble animal knew as well as the riders that an Indian was behind them, and plunged wildly down the homeward path in a race for life.

The hiss and sight of the arrow lodged in the tree instantly restored to Brandon's mind the gloom that had rested upon his soul as he entered the woods from home. Glancing backward, he was filled with unfeigned horror, for not one Indian, but 20, swung in to view, and came yelling like demons, the arrow's playing about their thick and fast.

Brandon, leaning forward, loosened the reign and urged his horse onward. The woman's grip about him tightened.

"My God! he thought, "She is shielding me!" And as his gloom had been lifted by the sweet breath of nature in these woods a couple of hours before, so now, the responsibility for the life of

this woman, on her errand of mercy for one he loved, thrilled him, angered him, lifted the burden from his soul, and in his restored manhood he thundered:

"Half! Wheel! The horse obeyed his master. The man fired thrice in quick succession at the bewildered Indians as they tumbled off their ponies into the grass.

"Go, General, go!" shouted Brandon, and again the mad dash forward for life!

The Indians instantly recovered their ponies. On they came: on, like a horde of devils, while their infernal yells and hissing arrows environed their victims as with a funeral pall. The white man urged his horse forward. Their air was thick with hideous sounds. He gasped for a good breath of God's air. The Indians gained on him! The gloom was again set upon his soul, when Mrs. Kohen cried out: "I am shot Steve!"

Again was he angered, angered at the fiends seeking life.

"Hold fast!" he cried, as he wheeled and fired. The Indians repeated their formed movement with greater agility, and the race was on again.

Not a moan escaped the lips of the women as she pleaded: "Steve, my back is full of arrows; I am killed already. Think of your sick wife and deep me and save yourself."

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### NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1957.  
HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 2 proposing an amendment to Article III, Section 51a of the Constitution of Texas, so as to increase the limit on the maximum monthly payment to needy aged persons from state funds and on the total yearly expenditure out of state funds for assistance to needy aged, needy blind, and needy children; and allocating and appropriating additional sums, supplementing current legislative appropriations, for payment of assistance grants.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:  
Section 1. That Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:

Section 51a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations and restrictions herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be provided by the Legislature, for the payment of assistance to: (1) Needy aged persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are over the age of sixty-five (65) years, provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any person who has actually resided in Texas for at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.

(2) Needy blind persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are over the age of twenty-one (21) years, provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any person who has actually resided in Texas for at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.

(3) Needy children who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are under the age of sixteen (16) years, provided that no such assistance shall be paid on account of any child over the age of one (1) year whose mother has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.

The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Federal Government of the United States such financial aid for the assistance of needy aged, needy blind, and needy children as such Government may offer

not inconsistent with restrictions herein set forth; provided however, that the amount of such assistance out of state funds to each person assisted shall never exceed the amount so expended out of Federal funds; and provided further, that the total amount of money to be expended out of state funds for such assistance to the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children shall never exceed the sum of Forty-seven Million Dollars (\$47,000,000) per year.

The Legislature shall enact appropriate laws to make lists of the recipients to aid hereunder available for inspection.

Supplementing legislative appropriations for assistance payments authorized by this section, the following sums are allocated out of the Omnibus Tax Clearance Fund and are appropriated to the State Department of Public Welfare for the period beginning December 1, 1957 and ending August 31, 1959: Four Million, Nine Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$4,900,000) for Old Age Assistance; One Hundred, Seventy-Five Thousand Dollars (\$175,000) for Aid to the Blind; and Five Hundred Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$525,000) for Aid to Dependent Children.

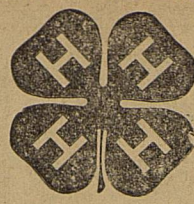
Such allocations and appropriations shall be made on the basis of equal monthly installments and other wise shall be subject to the provisions of currently existing laws making allocations and appropriations for these purposes.

The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of Texas at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the 5th day of November, 1957, at which election there shall be printed on such ballot the following clauses:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment increasing the limit on the maximum monthly payment to needy aged persons from state funds from Twenty Dollars (\$20) per month to Twenty-five Dollars (\$25) per month subject to certain conditions for payment in excess of Twenty-five Dollars (\$25) per month and on the total yearly expenditure out of state funds for assistance to needy aged, needy blind, and needy children from Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) per year to Forty-seven Million Dollars (\$47,000,000) per year, and allocating and appropriating additional sums, supplementing current legislative appropriations, for payment of assistance grants."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment increasing the limit on the maximum monthly payment to needy aged persons from state funds from Twenty Dollars (\$20) per month to Twenty-five Dollars (\$25) per month subject to certain conditions for payment in excess of Twenty-five Dollars (\$25) per month and on the total yearly expenditure out of state funds for assistance to needy aged, needy blind, and needy children from Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) per year to Forty-seven Million Dollars (\$47,000,000) per year, and allocating and appropriating additional sums, supplementing current legislative appropriations, for payment of assistance grants."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election on this Amendment shall be published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

### Digest Tells of Great Blizzard Last Spring

How the prairie states endured the terrible blizzard of last March which took 36 lives and killed 60,000 livestock is recounted in an August Reader's Digest article, "The Blizzard that Tested the Great Plains," by Bill Hosokawa, a Denver newspaperman. "In assessing the effects of the blizzard," he writes, "one fact stands out: the people of the Great Plains proved once again, by heroism, stubborn courage and sacrifice, that the human spirit is equal to nature's fiercest challenges."

Never within the memory of men now living had a storm lashed Colorado, Kansas, Nebraska, Oklahoma and adjoining states so fiercely for so long. Rain changed

to snow, riding a whistling north wind which blew relentlessly for three days and two nights. Gusts reached hurricane speeds of 80 miles an hour.

A westbound Union Pacific train, City of St. Louis was trapped near Winona, Kansas. After 32 hours, the 210 passengers were rescued by school buses.

Jack Morgan, a 31-year-old contractor of Guyton, Okla., patrolled a highway with a bulldozer for 73 hours and rescued 87 persons. He spent five days in a hospital fighting off pneumonia.

Few of the 60,000 head of livestock that died froze. Snow and dust clogged their lungs, congealed in an airtight mask over their faces so that they suffocated.

In a two-day period radio station KGNK, Guyton's only means of communication, relayed nearly a thousand messages. Everywhere hearts and houses were opened to the victims of the blizzard. The Andy Browns, of near Jericho, Texas, sheltered 96 stranded travelers in their four bedroom house. The Arthur Mowinkels of Gretna, Neb., took care of more than a hundred.

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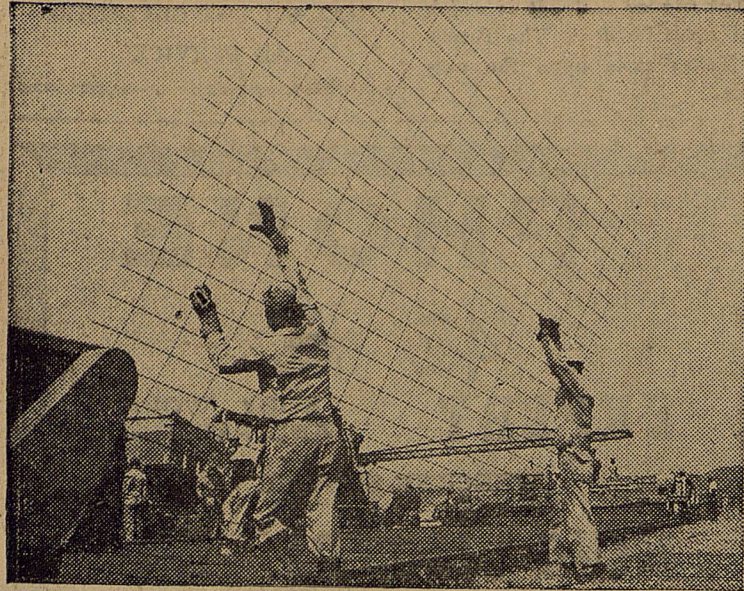
