Besides Eastland County Agent J. M. Cooper and assistant Curtis L. Boase, other agents who will have delegations at the two day affair will be Ralph Lindsey, Palo Pinto County; J. D. Gressett, Stephens County; W. C. Vines, Shackelford County; and Bill Lemberg and Glen Green of Callahan County.

Camp activities will be recreational, although competitive, in nature. Ribbons will be awarded to the winners in the tug of war, swimming, base ball, washer and horseshoe pitching and in the track events.

Boys are expected to bring most of their food, such as beans, bacon, potatoes and onions from home. The \$1.50 camp fee will pay for the first meal of sandwiches,

Eastland County Commissioners have assured the Cisco Chamber of Commerce that the county will cooperate with the State in providing right-of-way to complete a rebuilding program for Highway 880 from the county line to Cisco. A delegation composed of W. B. Wright, Paul Brashear, Haywood Cabaness and Roger Parker accepted the Cisco Chamber's request to the County that the State Highway Dept. has said the county must cooperate.

Commissioners agreed to check with the district highway engineer for information about the project. The State has already told the Cisco group that Cisco dam is too narrow and will not be included in the new project, and suggested that the highway be routed off Cisco's main street.

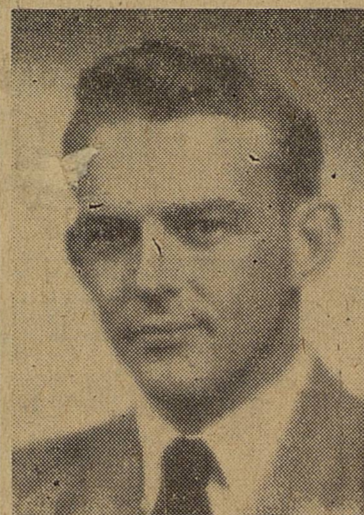

Husbands Points Out 'Selling Job' Chamber Breakfast Again Well Attended

"A good industrial program is nothing more than good selling and if you make enough calls you are going to make some sales," Fred Husbands, executive vice president of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce told a packed room of Eastland C-C breakfast goers this morning in the White Elephant restaurant.

Husbands, who knows of what he talks, having served for years as a successful city chamber of commerce manager, warned that the salesmen must know their product, however. He declared that a good industrial program is a "long range job."

Husbands praised the "fine turnout" of breakfast goers at the third quarterly membership meeting. He said the large number in attendance proved Eastland

citizens were progressive. He predicted that in the next few years Texas will enjoy an "amazing industrial growth," and then said, "And I know Eastland is going to get its share of it."

The WTCC leader pointed out that Texas enjoys favorable labor laws, taxes and has an abundance of natural resources plus a huge market of its own.

"This year, we at the West Texas Chamber of Commerce will begin our real industrial selling job," he informed his listeners. He said in recent years the WTCC has been making a study to fully know its market.

Husbands told Eastland C-C members at the breakfast that the best place to look for new industries is here in Texas. He said that there are plenty of prospects in Texas' major cities. "If a firm has a sales headquarters in Dallas it's a good bet that someday they will expand their operations to include manufacturing," he intimated.

"Imagination is the most important thing," he asserted. Then he pointed out that 85 percent of all industries are locally developed and that 80 percent of all industries are small.

Husbands warned that a city is lucky if it lands one factory out of 100 calls, and said that reason an industrial program caused "more bitterness and frustration" in a city than any other program he knows.

The speaker was introduced by Bernard Hanna, president of the local C-C. Hanna first asked Virgil Seaberry Jr. to report briefly on work done locally. Seaberry told of work being done by Eastland and Ranger chambers to get a paved road over Lake Leon dam.

He termed it the most used county road in Eastland County and said breakfast goers and others should inform their commissioner that they want it paved. Seaberry said a delegation from the two cities will meet Aug. 29 in Austin with the State Highway Commission to ask that the work be put on the county farm to market road program.

He also announced that the C-C has been advised that FM Road 2214 (the Staff road) will be completely paved giving us a clean shot to Stephenville. He said he could foresee that the road would someday become a state highway.

Ranger Junior College Ready For 32nd Year

Ranger Junior College will open its doors for the thirty-second year of service on September 9, 1957, it was announced today by Dr. Price R. Ashton, president.

Prospects now point to the largest enrollment in the history of the institution, Ashton said.

In keeping with the educational trend throughout the state, requirements are being stiffened. Courses in English, American history, government, foreign language, science, and mathematics are now required courses for all students who seek an associate of arts degree.

Dr. Ashton begins his fifth year as president of Ranger Junior College. Valuation of the college plant has increased from \$410,000 to \$712,000 making it now in the neighborhood of a million dollar investment in Ranger. The income of Ranger Junior College four years ago was \$93,000 per year. Today it is \$228,460 per year and promises to continue to increase.

Enrollment for the 1956-57 term of 630 students will likely show a large increase. New dormitories for both men and women and the new cafeteria will provide the added facilities necessary to care for the influx in enrollment.

The Administration Building is at the present time undergoing a complete renovation and redecoration.

\$400 Million to Be West Texas Share Of Federal Roads

West Texas' share of the proposed federal highway program will total almost 400 million dollars, an article in the July issue of West Texas Today states.

The magazine, in an article reflecting on the effect of the new highway system on West Texas and its economy, quotes State highway engineer D. C. Greer as saying that "1,359 miles, 47 percent of the proposed Interstate System for Texas will be in West Texas."

The magazine, monthly publication of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, states that Greer estimates West Texas' share to be about \$377,964,000 or 25 percent of the total allotment for the State's interstate highways. Texas will receive about \$1.6 billion during the next 13 to 15 years from the Federal government for the program.

The article also explains the current highway program of the Texas Highway Department.

"Our highway program, including Interstate, for the present fiscal year calls for 5,068 miles of construction throughout the state

at a cost of \$381,000,000. Of this programmed construction, 43 percent, 2,229 miles, is in the West Texas area," Greer says in the article. He adds that the total cost for this West Texas construction will be about \$128 million.

The article also quotes Greer concerning future multilane or expressway construction for West Texas which is now on the Highway Department's program books. In addition to similar construction now underway, Greer states that 181 miles of multilane construction in West Texas is planned.

A complete list of all multilane construction programmed for West Texas — that part of the state served by the WTCC and west of a line running generally from Gainesville through Arlington, Waco, Johnson City, and Kerrville to Del Rio — is carried in the article.

Ike Stumped At What Civil Rights Bill Really Had In It

It becomes increasingly apparent in the skirmishing phase of the projected battle of Civil Rights that President Eisenhower has been rather surprised at what his boys wrote into the bill, and that he will be happy to sign most anything that Administration backers can get through the Senate that can still be called "Civil Rights."

When some of the boys got around to telling Ike what was really in the bill, he began a toe dance that has been going on ever since as he has tried to reconcile his former remarks with what he now knows is the true nature of the Bill.

Georgia's Senator Richard B. Russell, leader of the Southern opposition, described the matter as "a force bill of the rawest kind", and there was some doubt that a filibuster could be avoided, even if the Administration were to throw out completely the vicious Section III of the bill. This is the section that makes the Attorney General a virtual dictator and authorizes the President to employ Federal troops in enforcing Federal Court orders—and is, to Southerners, an infuriating reminder of the abuses of "Carpetbagger" days.

Northerners, on the other hand, are obtuse enough to regard this high-handed Administration bid for police power at the community level as designed merely to enforce school integration. Under this bill, Federal powers will be equally represented, NORTH and SOUTH.

The best proof, perhaps, is President Eisenhower's statement that he could not imagine himself using such powers. WELL, WHY IN THE NAME OF THUNDER IS HE ASKING FOR THEM, THEN?

Skylights... Excellent Idea In New Housing

Today's improved skylights have opened new planning and living possibilities never enjoyed before in homes.

Skylights pour daylight into shut-in rooms, into dark pockets of space that have little or no outside exposure. But they make all sorts of other things possible, says an article in the August issue of Better Homes & Gardens magazine.

Now available are ready-made skylights, complete with frame, flashing, and fasteners. They are down in cost, more efficient, and easier to install. These new skylights are made of various materials—plastic, glass-fiber, and insulating glass. Most are shatter-

and weather-resistant, some open and close for ventilation. A new one type permits desirable winter sun to enter, but rejects the heat and glare of the summer sun.

With them you can plan on the cost-saving shape of a square house and still get daylight into every room, even rooms on inside walls. By reducing outside wall area, you'll reduce the length of a house. Thus, you get lower building costs.

You can take advantage of the savings in a "service-core" plan where the kitchen, bath, and laundry are centralized for the most efficient and economical layout of water connections, vents, and drains. Skylighted core rooms have mechanical ventilators that are more efficient than the usual small windows, the magazine says.

With this service-core plan it is possible to overcome the hide-bound planning restrictions of having every room on outside walls,

especially the bathroom and laundry; where outside exposure is not important, but privacy is. Exterior walls can be given over entirely to living, sleeping, and working space.

Skylighting makes rooms of wasted space, too. You can skylight a large inside closet or pantry for a half-bath when re-doing or adding to an old house. Or you may find space in some otherwise wasted nook that can be put to use.

Skylights can also substitute for costly attic dormers, according to the article.


New Colors Seen In Newest Home Furnishings

deep are the choice of one noted interior designer, Edward Wormley. He prefers a variety of shades from quiet light tones to vivid dark ones, all with a "stained glass" quality. These colors can be used in a family room with turquoise floor, plastic counter tops in violet, and chairs striped in two tones of blue, the magazine says. Or, do a bedroom with turquoise carpet, striped blue spread, accent pillows of violet, curtains of white or pale rose-violet, and doors of gray-brown walnut. With golden, glowing yellows, designer Everett Brown believes in keeping them simple. Since the

power and purity of the yellow-golds make them naturally dominant, it is best to let them hold sway, not confuse the effect with distracting contrasts. The article suggests using yellow on the floor and wall to unify a dining room or hall that is cut up by doorways, or to add sunshine to a dark room. If you adapt this to a small bedroom, use a small patterned wallpaper. The problem of using orange, according to expert Lawrence Peabody, is a particularly exciting one. Orange has the rare ability, so delightful to designers, both to stand out itself and bring out the best in the other colors. A room

sparkling with orange is bright even on the dulllest day. As for compatible colors, all the citrus shades and most flower colors are naturals with it. Remember that orange works best in simple surroundings, so perhaps the most flattering setting is a plain white background. This allows the orange tones to be big and bold, and makes the most of wood tones and shapely accessories. Orange would be a striking change for a living or dining room furnished with traditional dark mahogany, the magazine says.

Arrange alternate layers of apple sauce mixture, crumb mixture and coconut in greased 8" x 8" x 2" baking dish, ending with coconut layer. Bake in moderate oven, 350° F., 20 minutes. Serve hot or cold with cream. Yields 4-6 servings.

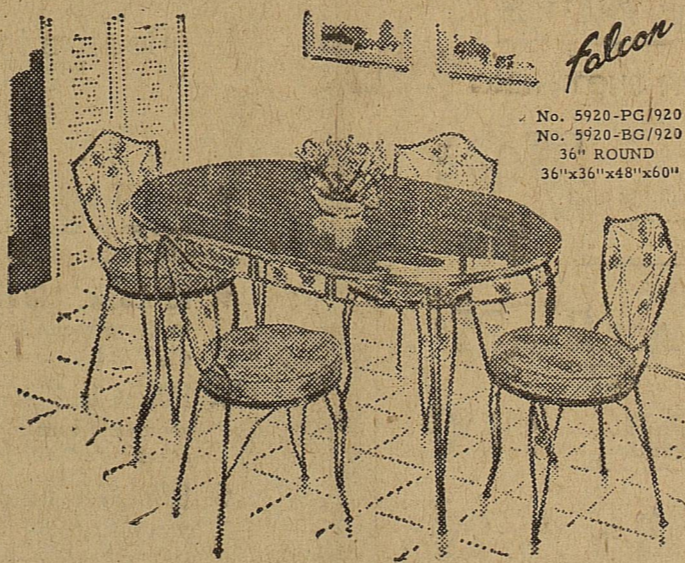
