"Tensions can kill," Billy Don Turner, 15-year-old Eastland High School Student, said in his sermon at First Methodist Church Sunday evening. Turner, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. J. Turner, preached the second sermon of his career Sunday and the first one in which he presided over the entire worship service from beginning to end, while his proud pastor peacefully parked himself in a pew with his family.

Miss Marsha Smith, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Smith, Miss Patricia Ann Liles, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Aattie Liles, and Mr. Alva Lotspeich, dean of the musical department of Ranger Junior College, played pre-worship service religious music on violin, piano and cello respectively.

In his sermon Turner said mankind today was too busy fretting with minor things of life with a hustle and bustle that brings on inner tensions that cause nervousness, heartache and unhappiness.

He went on to say that too many of America's business men were worrying themselves into graves and they were so busy they didn't see how they've had time to go to their own funerals.

Turner humorously told of his school-teaching uncle's once telling him he was so busy worrying that if something were to happen to him now he wouldn't be able to get around to worrying about

The Monday meeting was a make-up meeting. Commissioners were to have met Thursday, but the meeting was re-set for last night.

Commissioners also voted to open the City swimming pool June 1. There's nothing unusual about that, but the commission went on to vote that the day be designated "Splash Day" and everyone be admitted to the pool free.

Mosquitos also came up for their share in the discussion. City Manager Jimmy Young explained that it costs the City \$400 to spray the city "and when the rains come it goes down the creek and doesn't do any good." He assured the Commission that he would get City workers on the job as soon as "we have a couple of pretty days, maybe even in the morning if it's pretty."

Lowering Lake Eastland three feet at the spillway as a flood precaution was discussed and Mayor Horton agreed to check to see if such a move was possible under Water Board rules if it was the proper thing to do.

Commissioner Cyrus Frost called for the City to improve Eastland Air Port, and Mayor Horton named Frost and himself to a two man committee to seek ways and means of doing so.

Commissioners agreed with the City Manager that streets damaged by recent rains needed to be fixed before more road work was begun, but they urged him to try to get at the new work at the earliest possible time. Young said five blocks of paving has already been paid for by citizens.

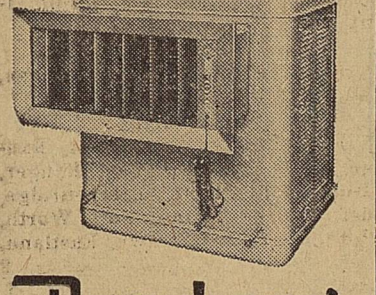

This tiny rectangle of sticky paper probably costs less than anything you buy, and it's probably your best bargain. I call it a true miracle. By purchasing a stamp, not only do you get an elegant steel-engraved print by a noted artist, but you also get the power to send a message to any one of 165 million people who live in this country. "You don't reach just a group of people or a general location; you get right to the one specific individual quickly and surely. It duplicates a job that might cost you hundreds of dollars and days of your time. The little stamp takes on the job without batting a perforation; it does it for a few cents and hardly ever misses. How's that for a guided missile?"

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
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
