## School Budget For Year Is Approved at \$231,216

Eastland Independent School Board trustees this week approved a budget of \$231,216 for the 1957-58 school year. The budget is \$16,140 higher than last year's almost all of the increase coming in teacher pay increases which were legislated by the State.

The budget, presented by Supt. Wendell Siebert, lists estimated total revenue for the year at \$231,491, which would amount to an increase of \$22,711. Most of that increase in revenue will come from the state, but a small percentage of it will be realized from increased local property valuations.

A breakdown of estimated expenditures for the year shows that \$16,702 will be spent for salaries of administrative and secretarial staffs and for administrative supplies. Salaries of elementary principals is listed at \$16,373, secondary principals at \$5460, elementary teachers at \$70,630 and secondary teacher at \$44,805.

Band budget for the year is \$1500, \$715 has been budgeted for school library books, \$1870 will be spent of teaching aids and

The man who has often been called "Mr. Texas Farm Bureau" — J. Walter Hammond — will deliver the main address Friday night at the annual Eastland County Farm Bureau barbecue and county-wide picnic at Eastland City Park.

Hammond has served as president of the Texas Farm Bureau for more than 10 years. He has been prominent in both state and national agricultural work.

Farm Bureau members, and everyone else interested in FB work, will gather at the Eastland park at 7 p.m. to enjoy barbecue. Following the invocation and a barbecue, the program calls for special music by Al Anderson and his band of Cisco. Mitchell Campbell, Eastland County Farm Bureau president, will issue the call to order and then Christine and Carl Stroebel Jr. of Cisco will entertain the group with accordion and violin numbers. Mrs. Don Kincaid will lead singing and Hammond's speech will follow. The program will end after visiting notables are recognized.

Barbecue, beans, potato salad, pickles, onions, ice cream and Southwestern Spanish peanuts make up the menu for the affair. Tickets can be purchased from Farm Bureau members or at the park Friday night for \$1. Children under six will be admitted free and tickets for children under 12 will be just 35 cents.

Where will the money come from? The budget shows that \$5776 will come from the Federal lunch fund. The per capita apportionment from the State will be \$61,936 plus an additional \$3000 balance from last year. The State will provide \$77,163 for salary and operation expenses and \$2231 for the county supervisor. An additional \$5950 will come from the State for transportation and vocational education receipts will total \$850.

The county available fund will be \$439,921. Local tax revenue is estimated at \$49,921 (based on approximately 93 percent collections) and other local revenue is estimated at \$10.

Sinking fund receipts are estimated at \$25,175, making overall estimated funds total \$231,491.

Beginning the new school year there will be a balance of 355 in the transportation fund, \$3621 in the local maintenance fund and \$266 in the sinking fund. The budget report shows that \$26,000 in bonds was retired during the past year, reducing the indebtedness from \$218,000 to \$192,000. During the coming year an additional \$20,491 in bonds will be retired, reducing the indebtedness to \$171,509 at the end of the year.

# Hunt Ends In Tragedy

(Editor's Note: This is the seventh in a series of articles taken from the book, "A History of Eastland County, Texas," by Mrs. George Langston in 1904.

## A Turkey Hunt

That same night two men, Joe Smith and "Bad Reese", working on the Flannagan Ranch, about 12 miles southwest of Brandon Ranch, went out to hunt wild turkeys, thinking there was little danger, as no Indians had been seen for some time.

Suddenly, when they were down near the edge of the bank of Colony Creek, they heard a stealthy tramp on the dead leaves. "Sh! It's Indians, sure's you're

born said Smith, and catching the other man's hand, that they might stay together, they took two steps out from off the dead leaves on the soft grass bordering the stream, and cunningly striding up on the creek, artfully dodged the red skins.

When they reached the ranch, and next morning told the other men there, John Flannagan, his son, Golston (Gols), and Ralph Smith they were laughed at for their scare.

"I heard their steps. They were all about us. I believe they were in six feet of us. They'd 'skayed' us, you know, before we got to low down, and couldn't see us anymore. Oh, you can laugh, but it was Indians."

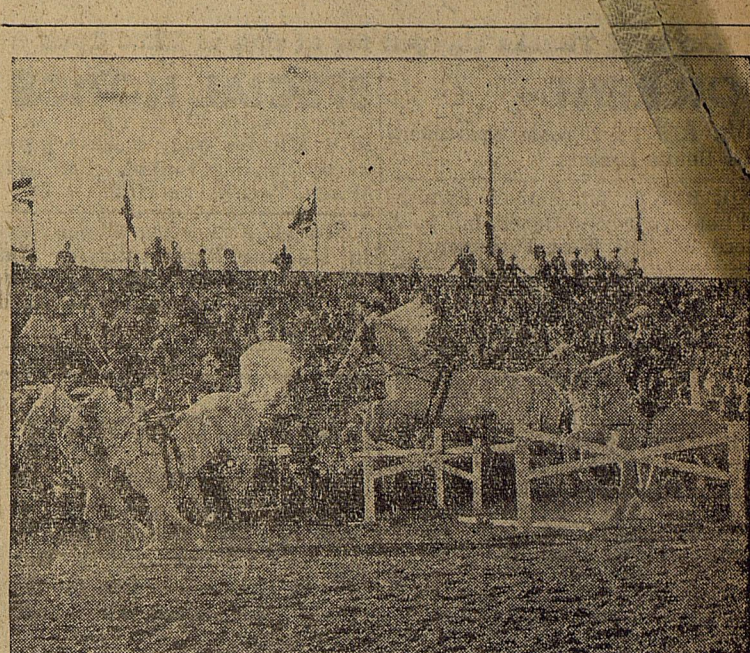
If the warning had only been heeded the two young men—Joe Smith and Gols Flannagan—would not have been started out alone that morning to Blair's Fort, and the lone grave under the tree still bears testimony to the grim truth that "it was sure Indians."

The following account of the attack of these same twenty Indians who had chased the self-reliant Brandon, who had all but captured Smith and Reese the same night, and now Smith ap-

their gruesome work, is told by Joe Smith, who lives at Victor, Erath County, seven miles from Desdemona.

**The Lost Arrow Head**  
"On the 16th day of December, 1860, Gols Flannagan and myself started in an ox wagon to Blair's Fort, 15 miles away, for some bread stuff. We had only gone a mile when we were waylaid by Indians, who opened fire on us at close range from a little ravine by the side of the road, which we were about to cross.

## Seven New Tests Spotted In County

## Rev. Baldwin to Conduct Revival at Olden Church

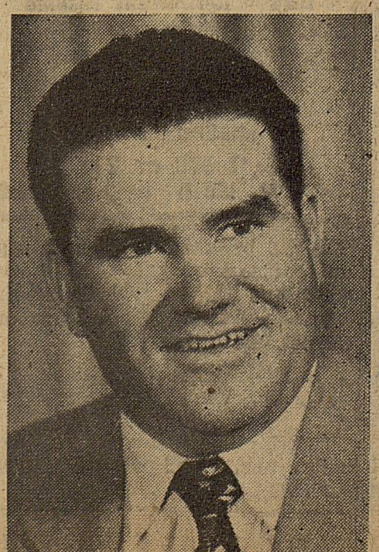

## I GIVE YOU TEXAS

My name has been signed to quite a few news stories in my time. But the biggest thrill was the first time that "By Boyce House" appeared in print.

An old hotel overlooking Court Square in Memphis was going to be torn down, in 1916, and the city editor assigned the staff's newest member, just graduated from high school, to do a feature story. The Gaston was established by a naturalized citizen who was born in France, made a fortune and gave much of it to the people of the city. A hospital and a park were among his gifts.

The hotel had much of the atmosphere of the Old World. Paintings, furniture, draperies

gave the lobby distinction. Many famous people — notably of the theatrical profession — had been guests during the hotel's long history.

I turned in an article about a column long and the first that I knew that the city editor had attached my name as author was when Al Wilson, assistant sports editor, said, "Congratulations on the by-line." (I had never even heard the term till then).

Court Square was, and is, inhabited by pigeons and squirrels, as well as by loafers and other visitors. The park is in the center of downtown Memphis. The pigeons and squirrels will flock around anyone who provides him-

self with a sack of peanuts.

Many years ago, when I lived in that city, a park policeman threw a club at a squirrel. I don't remember why he did it. Perhaps the creature was frightening a toddler. The squirrel received a broken leg. The officer had done an unthoughtful act and should have been punished; a few days without pay would have been adequate.

But organizations of well-meaning ladies got busy and, in the name of humaneness, demanded that the policeman be fired. That would teach him to be kind to animals. So he was discharged. The fact that he was out of work and had a wife and children dependent on his was of no concern to the good ladies.

### Children Over 18 Now Eligible For SS Checks

Some disabled children over age 18 received their first monthly social security checks in February, according to C. M. Vaden, Jr., field representative of the Abilene Social Security Office who was in Eastland Wednesday.

Recent legislation provided for these payments to start for the month of January, 1957, he said. A number of applications have already been filed, and more are being received.

Under the new provisions, children who are disabled may receive social security benefits after they reach age 18, if they were disabled before age 18, are unmarried and dependent upon a deceased insured parent. The term "parent" includes natural parent, and in many cases, step-parent or adopting parent, Vaden pointed out.

"It is not necessary that the child himself have any record of work under the social security law to be eligible for benefits as a disabled child. However, he must have a disability severe enough to prevent him from engaging in any substantial gainful activity. The disability must be medically determinable," he explained.

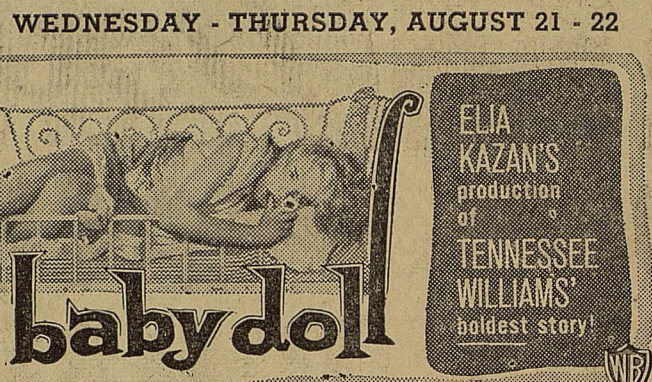
"Disabled children over 18 who believe they qualify or persons caring for them, should inquire regarding benefits by writing the Social Security Administration, P. O. Box 1641, Abilene," Vaden advised.

"Fifteen or 20 red skins facing a fellow on a turn in the road is enough to make the cold chills run down a man's back—Gols was only 19 and I was 20—but we didn't have time for more than that, for the bullets and arrows sang a funeral dirge about us."

"I'm shot!" I exclaimed, falling backward in the covered wagon and pulling a stinging arrow out of my knee. Gols turned and looked at me in a dazed manner, not seeming to understand. There was a red spot on his shirt front, and I knew he was hit, too.

"The young oxen, at sight of the Indians, wheeled around and ran as if wild, followed by the howling fiends. Presently the animals left the road and took to the open, making for a timbered spot. They ran some 200 yards, when the wheels hit a tree and they broke loose from the wagon.


"I was nimble as a cat in those days, and the Indians having fallen some little distance behind, I leaped from the wagon and ran off in the timber. There I looked and waited for Gols, thinking perhaps he was hiding in a little hollow below me. My knee got to hurting me so I decided to make my way to the ranch. Gols had not come in. 'Bad' Reese went at once to look for him, and found him dead and scalped. Reese and Ral Smith went out and brought him in on a horse. Early the next morning the men went to McCain's Ranch for help, and Mr. Highsaw and Lyman McCain came back with them and buried Gols, and we all moved up to their fortified ranch the next day. By April I was able to get around on crutches. From about the middle of January I was at my father's house in Parker County, and was disabled for six months.

"One day in 1889 something pricked me on the under side of my knee. On examination, I found a sharp black point sticking through the skin, and knew at once that 25 years ago I had been shot with a double-headed arrow, and had only pulled one head out. Three weeks later, on February 21, 1886, after having carried it in my knee for 25 years, two months and five days, the arrow head came out."
