



Moore .. ABOUT Eastland

July 4th has always been one of America's favorite holidays. And well it should be, for Independence Day means more to Americans than anything but God. Perhaps on this day, 181 years since we first gained our independence, it would be well for us to review our standing.

Today the United States is the strongest nation in the world. We are, of course, confronted by one of the strongest enemies we have ever faced, too, so our strength is most comforting. We have become a nation of people born in freedom, and thus our freedom doesn't seem quite as important to us as it must have to those citizens back in 1776. But let one of our freedoms be trapped on and we are still a fighting nation. Just as long as we remain a nation that will argue and disagree at almost every turn, yet fight for the rights of the fellow we disagree with to disagree, we will remain a free nation.

Better than anything we could write about Independence Day, is the writing of W. G. Vollmer, president of the Texas and Pacific Railway Co. With Vollmer's kind permission, we would like to reprint "Heritage of Freedom."

One hundred eighty-one years ago a new nation was born.

It was conceived by men of vision, faith and courage... men who were dedicated to the proposition that the Rights and Liberties of man were God-given, not state-granted.

These Rights and Liberties constitute the essence of the Declaration of Independence which we pause briefly to celebrate July 4.

In signing this historic document, our Founding Fathers could not have foreseen the long-range significance of their action.

They were not supermen possessed of superhuman qualities.

But they were dedicated men possessed of a deep conviction and an abiding faith in the justice of the principle... "that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among them are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness."

These heroic patriots could not have foreseen that the nation they were struggling to create out of thirteen sparsely settled agricultural Colonies eventually was destined to become a great and powerful united nation of 48 states.

Nor could they have foreseen that a great Civil War would rock the nation to its foundations and almost tear it asunder, while two World Wars would test its vitality and strength, its courage and faith.

Our Founding Fathers built well, for in the 181 years which have passed since the signing of the Declaration of Independence, our nation has flourished.

Peanut Growers Urge Election D. B. Warren


Several prominent peanut growers in Eastland County have joined together this week in urging the re-election of D. B. Warren as a director in the Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association.

Today is an official holiday in Eastland, and in almost every city, town and nook in the nation. It's July Fourth, Independence Day.

Senator Johnson Says New Hiway Benefits Many

"Future growth of Texas will be vitally affected by this (interstate system) vast highway construction program," Sen. Lyndon Johnson has declared.

The new Federal program, which includes turning Highway 80 in Eastland County into an eight-lane super-interstate Highway 2, is one of "the most progressive pieces of legislation enacted by Congress since I became a member of the House of Representatives 20 years ago," Johnson said.

The U. S. Senator stated, "Economic benefits of the program will spread out widely."

Johnson said that as of today 267 miles of superhighways are under construction or soon will be in Texas. Bids are now being asked for construction of 273 miles more. Work in Eastland County is not expected to start for several years, however, the main reason being that Highway 80 through the county is now one of the best sections in existence, anywhere on the road.



Special Session Need Isn't Seen

State Senator Floyd Bradshaw, in a talk here Tuesday, indicated that he could see little reason for a special session of the State Legislature in October. Gov. Price Daniels has indicated he will call legislators back for a 30 day session then.

Sen. Bradshaw, speaking before Eastland Lions, said he didn't think the Governor's reasons for suggesting a special session were good ones. Gov. Daniels wants the

Legislature to form a State Crime Commission to hold public hearings on crime in the state, according to Sen. Bradshaw. The Weatherford lawmaker, who represents this district, declared that he believed the present system of local grand juries meeting in private was a much better system.

Pointing to the Governor's demands for a lobby control bill, Sen. Bradshaw said the only way a lobby law would work would be to have honesty in the Legislature. "I believe a representative or senator is honest when he comes back home from Austin if he was honest when he went down there," the speaker emphasized. He said the present lobby bill is strong enough now, but that enforcement might not be.

Speaking softly but bluntly in his usual fashion, the ex-school-teacher predicted a new tax bill will have to be passed when the Legislature meets two years from now, "unless the demands of citizens lessens."

He pointed out that the \$399 teacher pay raise which passed this year cost \$50 million a year. (Bradshaw has generally supported almost all teacher pay raises and is considered the teachers' friend.) (Continued on Page Two)

Ten Persons Will Die In Texas In July 4 Traffic

Austin, (Sp)—Faced with the prediction that 10 persons will die in traffic accidents in Texas during the 24-hour period of July Fourth, Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, has called state police forces together for a coordinated effort to prevent death and injury on our highways during the forthcoming holiday.

Col. Garrison has ordered all facilities of the Motor Vehicle Inspection Division and the License and weight Division to bolster the force of the Texas Highway Patrol. Their mission will be that of patrolling our highways July 4 to remove dangerous drivers from the road before accidents occur.

"At least 120 more units from other divisions of the department will be in operation during the 24-hour holiday to add to the Patrol strength," he said. "Our divisions will patrol around the clock, and every effort will be made to reduce the death count from the 10 we anticipate."

The prediction of 10 deaths came from N. K. Woerner, chief of the department's Statistical Division, who said 12 persons were killed in traffic accidents during the holiday last year.

Col. Garrison said law enforcement officers throughout the state once again will be working overtime to carry their part of the traffic law enforcement load.

In addition to the operation to prevent traffic deaths and injuries the Texas Department of Public Safety will be keeping its eye on all other forms of violence.

The department's OPERATION DEATHWATCH will be in effect for the 24-hour period at 12:01 a.m. July 4. In the operation all forms of death and violence will be reported to the department here.

Eastland County Cities Are Lucky New Highway Will Still Be Close

(An Editorial)
As the Telegram sees it, Eastland, Cisco and Ranger have little to complain about at the moment on the proposed re-routing of U. S. Highway 80.

The three cities will be well served by the highway, which will be a coast-to-coast limited access road. Indeed, the Telegram feels that it is fortunate that U. S. 80 and not U. S. 180, which runs almost parallel with our highway, was selected as the new superline. We doubt seriously that Highway 180 will get much through traffic once 80 becomes completed.

Take the case of Wood and Upshur counties. They are a couple of East Texas counties which are now on Highway 80. But they will not be on Interstate 2, as the new super highway will be known, according to present plans. Interstate 2 from Dallas to Shreveport, La. will cross Smith County at a point north of Tyler. It will miss both Wood and Upshur counties, now served by Highway 80. Those people have something to worry about. In other words, the new route doesn't have to follow the path of Highway 80.

He said he voted against the bill which raised the pay of district judges from \$9000 to \$12,000 annually and that of Court of Civil Appeals from \$12,000 to \$16,000 yearly.

Sen. Bradshaw expressed himself favoring a bill which would abolish the office of county school superintendent in counties where the office has "no duties" and keeping those that "are needed." He cited Stephens County as a county which didn't need the office.

The Senator also said he voted against an issue of \$200,000,000 in state bonds to help finance local construction of dams for water storage. He said he could not support the bill because they were general obligation bonds.

He pointed to the hardships the senators and legislators have in Austin in studying all bills. Some 5000 were passed in the last session alone, he told Lions. Norman Guess, program chairman, introduced the speaker.







Good Grasses Need Help To Stage Comeback

areas of the state have enjoyed good rains, but the resulting range vegetation may be undesirable

weeds rather than good grasses, which are making a slow comeback on most rangeland.

To help nature along and give the grasses a chance to re-establish themselves, make leaves, build a strong root system and make a seed crop, A. H. Walker, extension range specialist, suggests a program of resting or deferred grazing.

A grazing and management study conducted by the Sonora Experiment Station over a period of nine years, shows that pastures stocked 12 months and rested 4 months had more and better grass at the end of the nine years than those that were completely rested the entire period.

The Deferred Grazing Program Bill has been passed by Congress, but so far no funds have been approved to sustain the program. But regardless of whether or not this bill is activated, the specialist recommends the practice to those ranchmen suffering from poor pasture, for this is the cheapest means of range recovery.

So, Walker advises ranch men to make a close observation of pasture vegetation. Examine the top

growth. Take an even closer look at the future. Roots are the food and water suppliers.

Grass is your crop if you are in the livestock business, says the specialist, and the management you give it now will largely determine the kind of plants you have in the future.

Ask your local county agent for a publication on Deferred and Rotation Grazing.

BUILDING YOUR HOME

When you are ready to build, you will find that the law helps in many ways to make your home enjoyable and secure.

Have you decided on the type house you want and the amount you want to spend? If so, then let's go into details!

1. Your lot: Junior's school or your church may be nearby, but find out—

(a) Whether they are planning to run a highway through the area or nearby, or make any improvements for which you can be assessed.

(b) What "covenants" or restrictions run with the land? To protect residents, the plats or basic deeds of some neighborhoods call on you to build a certain size or type of house. Do you want to and can you afford to?

(c) Easements. Either you or your neighbors may need to run pipes, or string wires over each other's land or to share a driveway. Have the abstract checked carefully to disclose any easements.

2. Zoning Ordinances: For your protection the local government frequently zones some areas, for example, for single houses only, for multiple dwellings; for retail stores, for manufacturing, etc.

Unless the local governing body changes its zoning ordinance, no filling station, for instance, can go up next to you in a residential area. Neither could you turn your home into a store. In any case, you should find out what your neighborhood zoning rules are.

3. Building Codes: Be certain that the plans and construction will meet the requirements of the local building code as to size, location and structure. Municipal ordinances usually impose strict standards for the building, the plumbing and the electrical wiring.

Farmers May Ask For Refund on Gas Tax Paid to Gov't

Farmers are reminded by C. H. Bates, extension farm management specialist, that they may now apply for a refund on the 3-cent Federal tax on gasoline used for farming. The amount claimed must be based on the quantity of fuel used for farming purposes on individual farms and ranches during the period from July 1, 1956 to June 30, 1957.

Bates says that all claims must be submitted to the District Director, Internal Revenue Service, and claims for the past year must be in by September 30, 1957. Only one refund claim per farm operator will be permitted and each tax claimant is cautioned to make certain that his refund request includes all eligible fuel used.

Each farm or ranch operator who applied for tax refunds in 1956 will be mailed Form 2240 for filing the 1957 claim. An instruction sheet for preparing the application will also be provided, says Bates. For new fuel users or those who failed to file last year, copies of the filing form may be obtained from the office of the local county agent.

Too, Bates suggests that a copy of Publication 308, Farmers Gas Tax Refund, prepared by the Internal Revenue Service, be obtained from the county agent's office or from the nearest District Internal Revenue Service Office.

The specialist advises agricultural producers who use an appreciable amount of gasoline last year in their farming or ranching operations to check into their eligibility for a refund. The legislation which makes possible the refund was passed by Congress in the spring of 1956 and farmers unfamiliar with the procedure should contact their local county agent or Internal Revenue Service for details.






