NO WILL? WHO INHERITS PROPERTY?

What will happen if you should die without executing a legal and proper will? Who will inherit your property? Your husband, wife, mother, father, children, yours wife's relatives? The best way you can say who will have it is to provide a will which will protect your rightful benefic-

ty in accordance with your wishes. When a deceased has no will, or dies "intestate" as the law calls it, the property of that person is distributed according to a detail-

cerning the distribution of the property of a person who dies without a will are rather complicated, and all of the possibilities cannot be covered by a general statement.

There are different rules for real estate and for personal propas farmers and ranchmen during erty, for community property and for seperate property, for homesstead property, and for all of the Agricultural Experiment Station many possible combinations of surviving relatives. Each situation must be carefully studied to determine the correct distribution of

the property.
