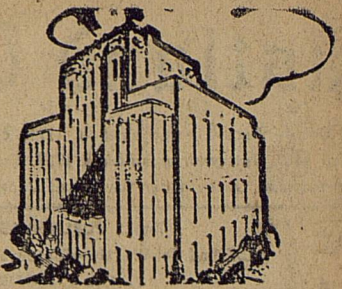

## Old County History Is Packed With Information

(Editor's Note: This is the first in a series of articles taken from the book, "History of Eastland County Texas," which was written by Mrs. George Langston. The book was published in 1904. The Telegram is grateful to H. J. Tanner, chamber of commerce manager, for the use of the book, which was taken from his files on the history of the county.)

In 1858, before a white man had ventured to expose himself and family to the dangers of what was then an Indian infested frontier, Eastland County was created by an act of the Seventh Legislature of Texas. By the same act Callahan, Stephens, Concho, Wichita, Coleman, Dawson, Shackelford, McMullin, Frio, Zavalla, Edwards, Haskell, Knox, Hardeman, Dimmit, Baylor, Runnels, Jones, Wilbarger, La Salle, Dubal, and Encinal Counties came into existence. The bill was approved Feb. 1, 1858.

Eastland County is ideally located, containing within its limits the divide between the Leon River and Palo Pinto Creek, and the eastern extremity of the backbone of the Colorado and Brazos Rivers.

The depression between these two divides is cut into by Colony Creek, a tributary of the Leon River.

The northern slope of the eastern divide is drained by the two forks of Palo Pinto Creek, while the rest of the County is watered by the Leon, which rises just beyond the County's western limit, and makes its exit about three miles southwest of Desdemona.

The eastern divide is characterized by high hills of numerous shapes, which lie, in the main, east and west. It is gashed with ragged ravines, and abounds in deep canyons, in confused and tilted rocks, producing a varied and picturesque scenery.

This broken ridge of high land bends northward above the first impressions of Colony Creek, and dips again southward around Cisco, the tongues of the Brazos licking into the northern slope of the backbone, playing hide and seek with the foragers of the Leon and Colorado on the south. As the great skeleton begins to spread its web, it leaves large canyons and gulches.

Trees of many kinds grow in great profusion—cedar and live-oak on the hills; post oak and black-jack on the sandy uplands; pecan and walnut, elm and hackberry, cottonwood and willow, along the streams, and in the glades mesquite abounds, and in many sandy locations the shiner.

When the County was created its soil lay bare, void of fence or shack in its rugged nakedness. Under its huge boulders the wild cat found a safe home; its numerous caves afforded the wolves a hiding place; the bear, the panther, and the cougar roamed wild and free over its mountains, while the Indian, in his savage wildness, did not need to seek even the protection of a friendly canyon, so free was Eastland County from the tread of the White man.

The First Settlers The creation of these new counties a stir throughout the contiguous frontier, and several settlements were made even in the first year.

The first man who came to the County was a Mexican, Frank Sanchez. He had worked for Thomas Donahoe, of Parker County, but came here with his own stock and located between the Jim Neal Creek and its junction with the Leon.

In 1855 or '56 John Flannagan emigrated from Kentucky to Texas, and settled on Kickapoo Creek, in Parker County. When the new counties were laid off

the impulse to "grow up with the country" again possessed him, and, moving into Eastland with his family, he built a home on Colony Creek, about 11 miles from the center of the county. One can but wonder if he looked down the years, and passing the choice location of the Palo Pinto Creek section, sought the center of the county for financial reasons. Mr. Flannagan has a wife and four children, Golston, Wesley, Julia Ann and "Bud."

It is curious that a man, forgetting things he once loved, and moved by the spirit of unrest, will sever ties of long standing and expose himself and his family to untold dangers. This strange influence burned in the heart of W. H. Mansker as he sowed and reaped on his farm in Arkansas, and was fanned to flames by news of the Texas lands. With his family he pushed across the unsettled wastes of Eastern and Middle Texas, and stopped awhile in Parker County. Later he built a home there, and the lake still bears his name.

The next to cross the boundary Georgia J. M. Ellison from some where in Texas; Dr. Richardson from Arkansas, with their families, and the Gilberts, four or five young men from Alabama. All these took up or brought surveys around Mansker Lake; Ellison to the south, at Ellison's Spring where he still lives; the Gilberts, Jim, and Tom, at Jewell, and Sting and Sam, brothers and cousins to the other Gilberts, three and one-half miles below Jewell, on Sanbiano Creek. This ranch is now known as the Morgan place.

Following these was C. C. Blair, who came from Georgia to Alabama stopped awhile in Collin and Parker Counties, and finally settled six or seven miles northeast of Mansker Lake. A little later this settlement became known as Blair's Fort.

W. C. McGough came from Georgia and camped at Blair's Fort. His first son, born at the Fort Aug. 17, 1861, was the first white child born in the county.

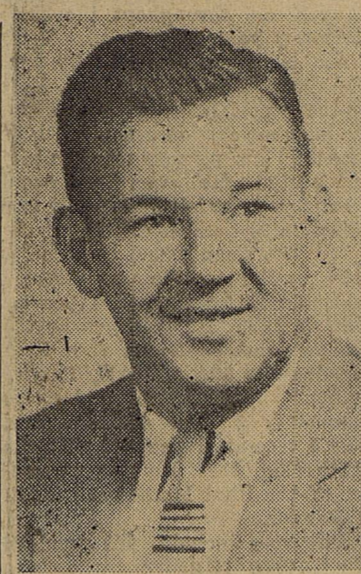
In the northeastern part of the County like settlements were made. Wm. Allen came from Palo Pinto County in 1858 and located a ranch on Rush Creek (which he still owns), some 12 or 15 miles east of the Flannagan Ranch. J. M. Stewart was his nearest neighbor, one-half mile away. Two or three other families settled in the same neighborhood.

In the same part of the county was the Edwards Ranch, and just across the line, from three to six miles was the Clayton Ranch, on Bear Creek. Bethel Strawn settled where the town which now bears his name is located three miles out of Eastland County.

In Palo Pinto County, at the foot of the hills, about five miles east of Strawn, Peter Davison lived. He moved into Eastland in 1865, and made his home five miles south of Allen's Ranch. All old settlers know the location of these two ranches.

On North Palo Pinto Creek, in Stephens County, 13 miles northwest of Flannagan's Bruce Ranch being the apex.

## Fifty Fort Worth Visitors Are Due

Some 50 Cub Scouts and their parents will arrive in Eastland Sunday at 12:10 aboard a Texas and Pacific passenger train.

The group has announced plans to accept an invitation of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce to ride the T&P special to Eastland from Fort Worth and then to catch an east bound train out 50 minutes later.

On hand to greet the Cubs, who will be making the train trip just to ride on a train, will be some Eastland members of the County Sheriff's Posse. They will be dressed in their riding uniforms and will be riding their horses to impress the young visitors.

Bernard Hanna, president of the Chamber of Commerce, will welcome the visitors and ice cream will be furnished by Foremost Dairies and lemonade by MacMoy's Clover Farm store. Each of the visitors will bring his own basket lunch.

Members of the Sheriff's Posse will meet the group at the train depot and lead them to the city park on the south side of town. "We would like to take them to the park on the hill," a spokesman said, "but there just won't be enough time."

The Cubs and their parents will then board the 1 o'clock T&P passenger train back for Fort Worth.

Mrs. R. V. Horn of Fort Worth, who planned the trip, said many of the youngsters had never had the opportunity to ride a train and this trip was planned to give them that chance.

H. J. Tanner, chamber of commerce manager, said. "We are delighted to have these Fort Worth visitors and want others to know they will always be welcomed."

## Diving Club Is Being Organized

Eastland has just about every kind of club, so Bill Walters decided one more wouldn't hurt. He's now in the progress of forming the Eastland Diving Club.

Joining Bill in his adventure already are Tom Grissen and Charles Coats. The three each now have in about five hours of underwater time.

Bill says the deepest they have been so far is 60 feet, but they have plans to go even deeper. With their present equipment they can go down as far as 3300 feet with complete safety. "It's just as safe as it is swimming on top of the water," he maintains, "even safer in fact."

Equipment used by the trio includes a face covering mask, breathing apparatus in the mouth, compressed clean air tanks and fins for the feet. They can go as fast as six miles an hour under water.

"We can stay under as long as an hour and ten minutes, and if we get tired in that time we just sit down and rest," the amateur diver pointed out.

He said that fish and other under-

water life didn't worry about them at all. "They just follow you around." The three have brought in a few fish and turtles to prove how easily they can be caught.

Most of the diving to date has been done at an old rock pit near Carbon. The men have also been down in Ringling Lake and Lake Leon. Walters said they plan to do a lot of exploring in Lake Leon when it gets completely cleared up.

What good can such a club do? Bill says besides having a lot of fun, members can help their fellow men and maybe even find something valuable. He explained that they plan to do a lot of salvage work, and said that they have been called on already to help find something which had been dropped in a lake by a fisherman or swimmer.

What happens if the diving equipment gets fouled up? "You get out of it and surface without harm if you are no deeper than forty feet," Walters explains. "I can get out of the equipment in three seconds flat."

Bill said that anyone interested in joining in and the others was welcomed. "Just tell them to look us up," he said.

## Building Industry Sees New "Boom"

# Lower Down Payment To Spark More Homes

With approximately a dozen homes now being built in Eastland and at least that many more recently completed, things looked bright for the future homeowner this week with the announcement of a new lower down payment on F.H.A. loans.

Building here is centered in the new Rivercrest Addition and the Hillcrest Addition with some limited building going on in other sections.

The building industry from the Atlantic to the Pacific has hailed the government's twin move to spur homebuilding among lower and middle income families as a shot in the arm that was needed to set off a new wave of construction of lower to moderate-priced

homes throughout the country, beginning at once, since the new regulations go into effect immediately.

The new move cut in half and less than half the down payment required on FHA and VA insured mortgages, and at the same time boosted the interest rate on loans from 5 to 5 1/4 per cent, a step that will loosen up more money and make more loans available.

Homebuilding money has been hard to get for the past several weeks because the lending agencies have figured that such a move was in the offing and they have held off making loans until the new interest rates were effective.

While the slightly higher interest rate might be more attractive to lenders of money, it will make very little difference in the monthly payments of the man who builds a new home. Roughly the increase figures about 15c per month per \$1000 on a 25-year loan, and about 10c per month

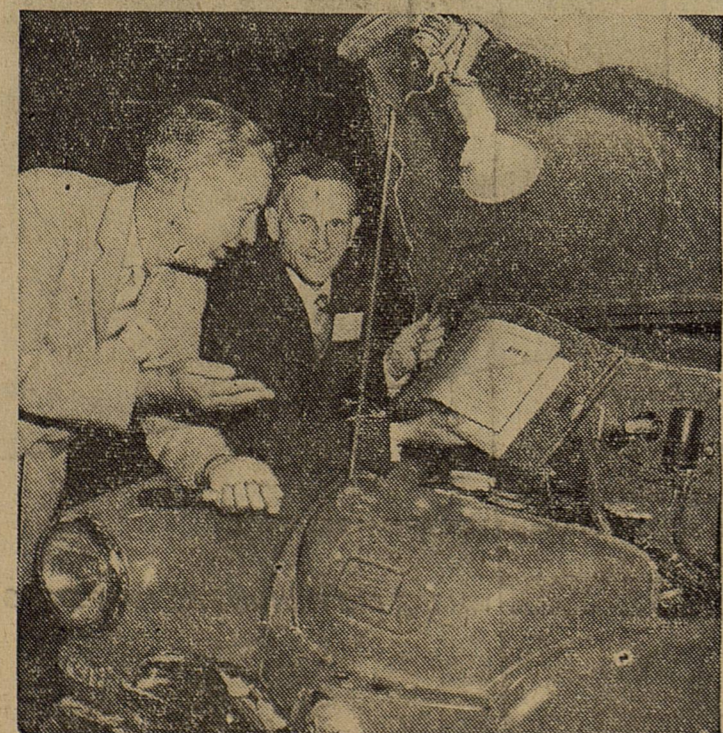
per \$1000 on a 30 year loan. Down payments have been whacked tremendously as shown by the following scale:

FHA VALUE	New Payment	Old Payment
\$ 6,000	\$ 180	\$ 300
8,000	240	300
10,000	300	700
12,000	600	1,200
15,000	1,050	1,950
20,000	2,400	3,200

Thus it can be seen that one of the so-called "lower priced" homes of around \$10,000, can be built with a down payment of only \$300, which is \$400 less than formerly, with other down payments dropping in proportion.

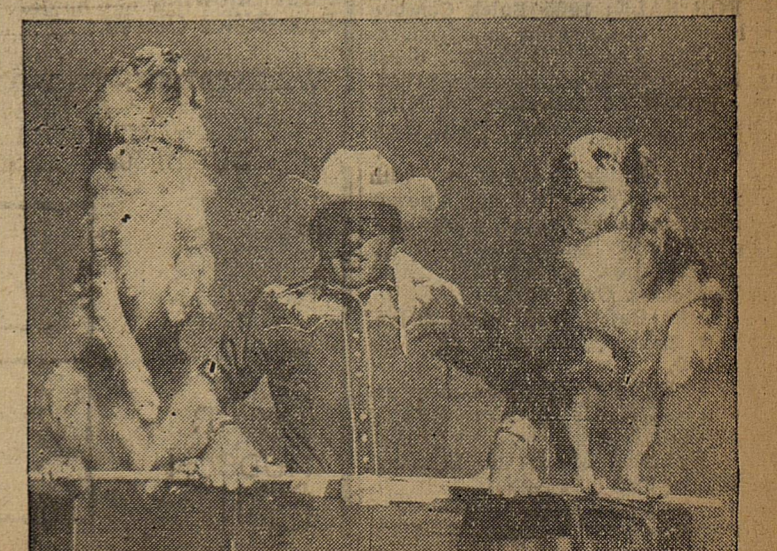

had done much for the civic, religious, cultural and commercial development of Ranger. Mr. Hagaman's father, the late M. H. Hagaman, was the first mayor of the City of Ranger and also served at one time as Representative from this District in the Legislature at Austin. His mother, who survives him, has also been prominent in club, civic and religious work in Ranger and throughout the state for many years.

Mr. Hagaman died at 1:30 p.m. Tuesday, August 6, in a Fort Worth hospital following surgery. He had been ill only a very short time and his passing was entirely unexpected. He was up and around Ranger all last week and in apparent perfect health.

Mr. Hagaman was born Jan. 9, 1896 in Ranger. He was married to Helen Howdeshell in Waco on Feb. 6, 1929. He belonged to the Ranger Masonic Lodge 738, Ranger Chapter 394 of RAM, Ranger Council 334 R & SM and Cisco Commandery No. 47. A World War I veteran, he served with the 315th Engineers. He was a member of the First Methodist Church of Ranger.

Survivors include his widow, Mrs. Leslie Hagaman, who is a prominent teacher in Ranger Public Schools; one son, John Leslie of Ranger; two daughters, Mrs. W. A.
