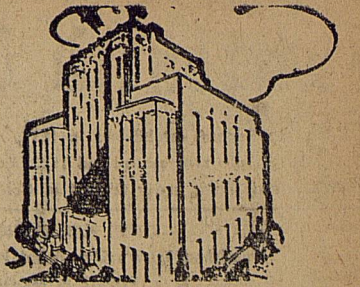

Moore ... ABOUT EASTLAND

Eastland County will be 100 years old in 1958.

In 1858 the county was first created. It was not organized until 1873, however. The county was originally a part of three other counties, Bosque, Travis and Coryell. It was named for W. M. Eastland, Texas patriot who took part in the Battle of Mier.

We were asking Herb Tanner, manager of the Chamber of Commerce, if any special activities had been planned, and Herb told us that the 1873 date was generally recognized as the year Eastland County was formed. So we supposed the county will have to wait a few more years for a centennial celebration.

Ray Harbin and Jim Hallmark were showing off a fine nine pound yellow cat they caught Monday morning at Lake Leon. The fish was caught on a trot-line. The two were using shrimp and minnows to bait the line, and said they believed the cat took a minnow. Lake Leon continues to clear up and good catches will start becoming commonplace again soon.

Mrs. J. L. Black of Carbon recently decided to spend a few days with her daughter and son-in-law in Ranger. So when Mr. and Mrs. Rayneal Baze and son David, 22 months old, came to visit her she went back home with them. On the way back to Ranger Mrs. Black was holding David and she said, "David, are you glad Ma Black is going home with you?" He smiled and nodded his head yes and said, "Wash dishes for Ma."

Another "cute saying" was entered in our contest by Mrs. A. L. Gallagher, 1310 South Seaman, Eastland.

"One night while eating supper Joe's foot went to sleep," she wrote. "Nothing disturbs either of the twins more, Joe jerked his foot and very seriously said, 'Foot, you stay up until I finish supper.'"

We knew that sooner or later it had to happen. Judge Jim Boggus, law west of the Leon River, received a "Bull Throwing Certificate" in the mail the other day. The certificate, done up in official looking fashion, read, "Awarded to Judge Jim Boggus for telling the worst, the longest and the least interesting true stories about what he has done, will do, can do better, faster, easier, than anyone, anywhere, anytime and considered an authority on any subject that has happened, will happen or should happen is hereby entitled to full membership in the Bull Throwing's Association."

The certificate was issued by Otta Johnson, Church of Christ minister.

George Dolan, columnist for the Fort Worth Star-Telegram, gave the community of Necessity a nice write up the other day. Writing in his column, "This Is West Texas," Nolan had this to say:

"Necessity used to be a thriving agricultural community. It was noted, between 1910 and 1916, for its baseball teams. Those clubs, which drew as much support then as Breckenridge High's football team does now, regularly polished off teams from Cisco, Eastland, Rising Star, Throckmorton and other larger towns.

"Old timers still talk about it. And some of them still regard Stephens County Clerk B. R. Grant, a pitcher for the Necessity nine, as sort of a celebrity. "During the oil boom, Necessity's population was swollen to several thousand."

Wm. Blackmon To Visit Seattle For Annual Fair

SEATTLE, Wash. — William Blackmon, machinist's mate third class, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Blackmon of 310 S. Lamar, Eastland, aboard the destroyer USS Ozbourn, will visit Seattle, Wash., Aug. 7-12, during the annual Sea Fair.

Twenty-two U. S. Navy ships will visit the Northwestern port for the event and will take part in a Sea Parade in Elliott Bay. All ships will be open to the public during their stay.

The Sea Fair is a 10-day pageant of spectator and participation entertainment designed to point out the Puget Sound area as one of the boating capitals of the world.

Maritime features will include a sailboat regatta, salmon fishing derbies, crew and outboard races, water-ski shows, a decorated yacht parade and the U. S. championship race for unlimited hydroplane speedboats on Lake Washington.

Mr. Bobo was married to Debra Madewell in Ranger in 1914. She died March 25, 1950.

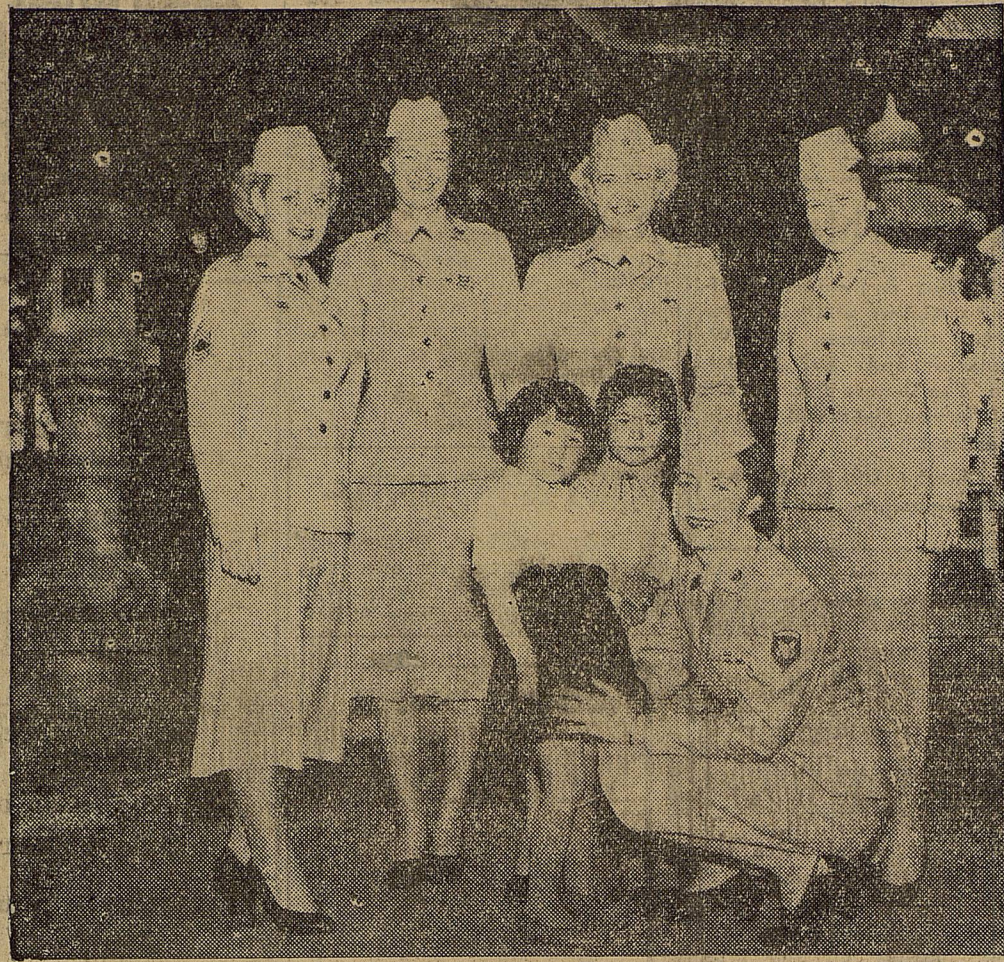

County Draws Three Good Oil Producers

Three new producers and three new tries topped oil news in Eastland County in the last few days.

The three newly completed wells, all in the Jo Kiel (Caddo) Field, had daily potentials of 218, 231 and 135 barrels daily.

No. 2 F. E. Clark, six miles southwest of Cisco in Section 82, Block 3 H&TC Survey, had a daily potential of 218 barrels of 44 gravity oil, flowing through a 20-64-inch choke with 650 pounds on casing and 140 on tubing. Flow was from 160 perforations at 2,8-2060 feet. Total depth was 3,730 feet with casing set on bottom. Pay was tested with 1,000 gallons of acid. Gas-oil ratio was 950-1.

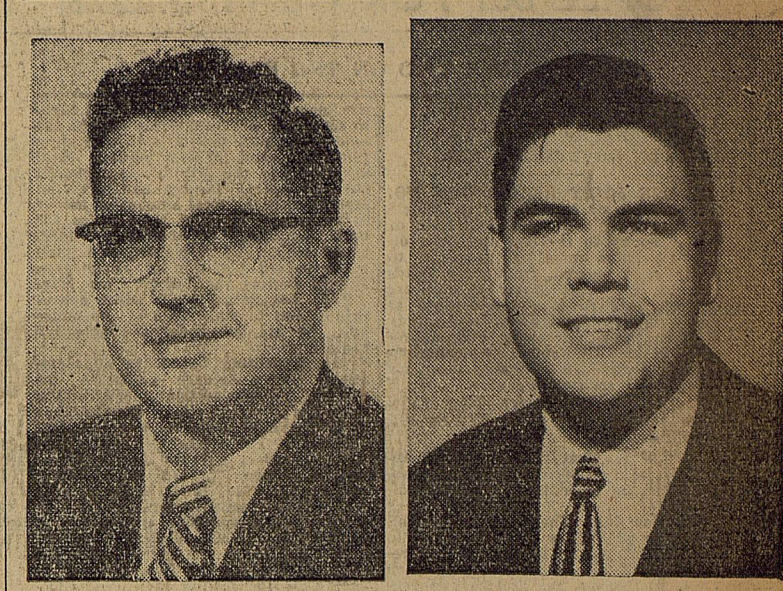
No. 2-B H. J. Hamilton, Section 91, Block 3, H&TC Survey, was finished for a daily potential of 231 barrels of 44 gravity oil, flowing through a 24-64-inch choke with 96 perforations at 2,830-54 feet. Casing pressure was 600 pounds, with 120 on tubing. Total depth was 2,893 feet, with casing set at 2,880. Gas-oil ratio was 850-1. Pay was treated with 1,000 gallons of acid.

No. 3-B Hamilton, also in Section 91, had a daily potential of 135 barrels of 44 gravity oil, flowing through a 16-64-inch choke with 800 pounds of casing pressure and 210 on tubing. Flow was from 36 perforations at 2,828-40 feet. Casing was set at 2,900 feet, total depth. Gas-oil ratio was 1100-1. Pay was treated with 1,000 gallons of acid.

George S. Anderson of Dallas has staked the No. 1 A. J. Johnson in the Banklin Owen field four miles northwest of Eastland on a 60 acre lease. Location is 330 feet from the north and west lines of Section 43, Block 4, H&TC Survey. Proposed depth is 3600 feet with rotary.

No. 4 R. E. Lunning has been spotted by Magnolia Petroleum Co. in the Keil Caddo field 5 1-2 miles southwest of Cisco on an 80 acre lease. Proposed depth is 3000 feet with rotary. Location is 330 feet from the north and west lines of the north half of the northeast fourth of Section 92, Block 3, H&TC Survey.

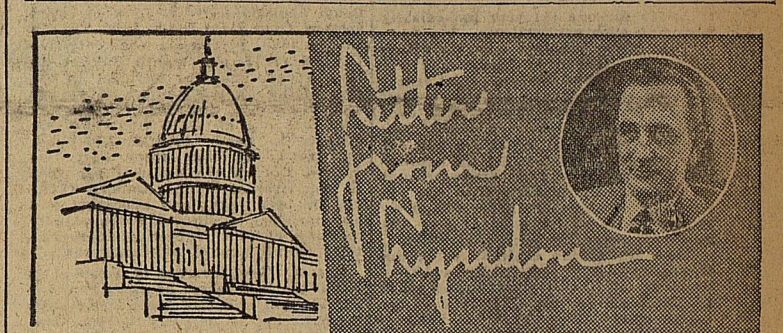

"JURIES ... HAVE BEEN THE FIRMEST BULWARKS OF ENGLISH LIBERTY." — THOMAS JEFFERSON July 31, 1957

Dear Friend: The words above were written in 1789 by a great man—Thomas Jefferson. He was looking back on centuries of British history to find advice to guide the United States. Out of that history, he came to the conclusion that "the opinion of 12 honest jurymen gives still a better hope of right" than any other method of determining the truth in a criminal case.

It is time to think about Thomas Jefferson. Clever lawyers have finally devised an adroit method to by-pass the jury system. They are attempting to write this method into the law under the name of "civil rights."

In its present form, the "civil rights" bill would: Enable a Federal District Attorney to go into Federal court when he BELIEVES someone is to be deprived of a voting right.

Enable the Federal judge to issue an injunction against the acts which the Attorney General SUSPECTS may happen.

Enable the Federal judge to decide WITHOUT A JURY when the injunction has been violated.

Enable the Federal judge under CRIMINAL contempt proceedings WITHOUT A JURY to assess fixed jail sentences and fines.

In other words, the Federal judge—in each individual case—makes the law, decides when it has been violated, tries the defendants and fixes the penalties. All of this takes place without a jury.

An amendment has been drawn by three Senators — O'Mahoney of Wyoming, Kefauver of Tennessee, Church of Idaho. All three are "liberals." All three believe in voting rights. BUT THEY ALSO BELIEVE A MAN SHOULD NOT BE BRANDED A CRIMINAL WITHOUT THE OPPORTUNITY TO STATE HIS CASE BEFORE A JURY.

That is the sole issue involved in the jury trial amendment. Nobody objects to the courts having full power to enforce legitimate decrees and orders. Nobody objects to adequate safeguards for the right to vote.

But many of us object to devious schemes to convict men and women under CRIMINAL contempt without trial by jury. That is why we support the O'Mahoney-Kefauver-Church amendment.

I hope you agree with me. I hope you will let me know whether you believe this is the proper course.

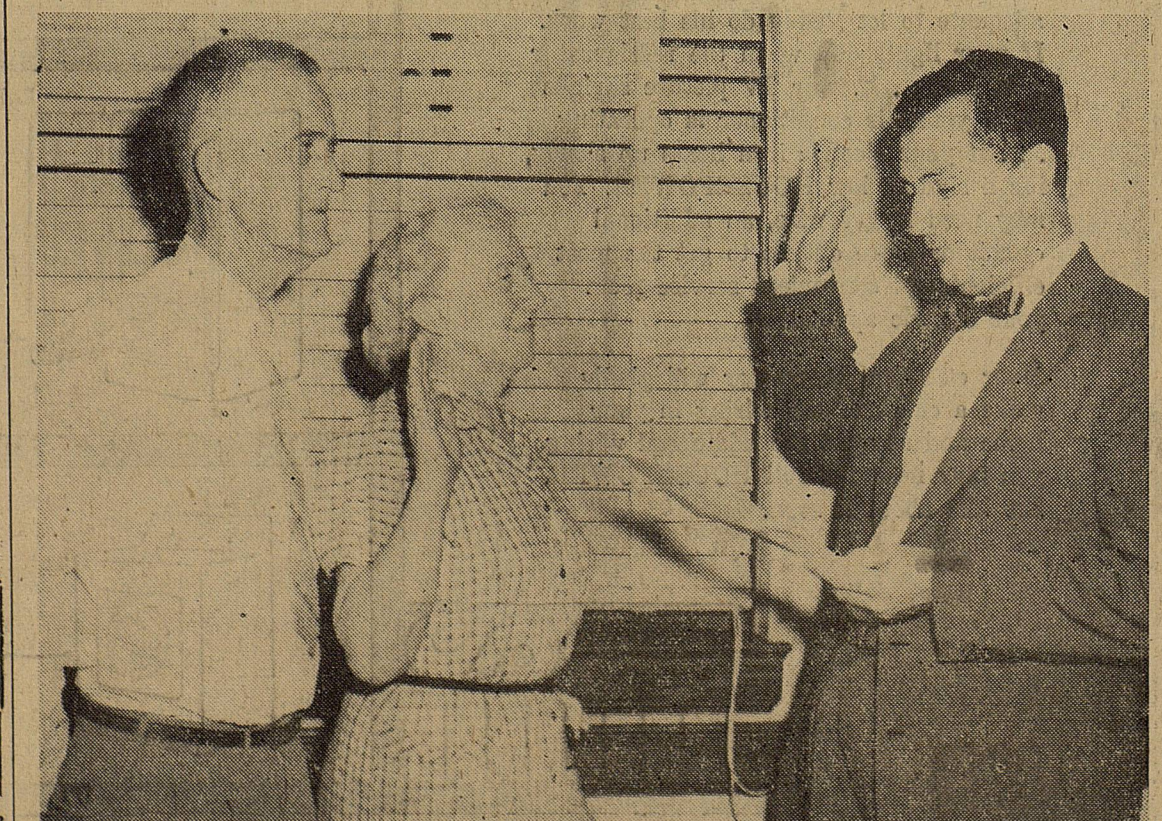

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1957.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 2 proposing an amendment to Article III, Section 51a of the Constitution of Texas, so as to increase the limit on the maximum monthly payment to needy aged persons from state funds and on the total yearly expenditure out of state funds for assistance to needy aged, needy blind, and needy children, and allocating and appropriating additional sums, supplementing current legislative appropriations, for payment of assistance grants.

SECTION 1. That Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:

Section 51a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations and restrictions herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may by the Legislature be deemed expedient for assistance to, and for the payment of assistance to:

(1) Needy aged persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any state-supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas for at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.

(2) Needy blind persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are over the age of twenty-one (21) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any state-supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas for at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.

(3) Needy children who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are under the age of sixteen (16) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid on account of any child over one (1) year old who has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding the application for such assistance, or on account of any child under the age of one (1) year whose mother has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.

The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Federal Government of the United States such financial aid for the assistance of the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children as such Government may offer

not inconsistent with restrictions herein set forth; provided however, that the amount of such assistance out of state funds to each person assisted shall never exceed the amount so expended out of federal funds; and provided further, that the total amount of money to be expended out of state funds for such assistance to the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children shall never exceed the sum of Forty-seven Million Dollars (\$47,000,000) per year.

"The Legislature shall enact appropriate laws to make lists of the recipients of aid hereunder available for inspection.

"Supplementing legislative appropriations for assistance payments authorized by this section, the following sums are allocated out of the Omnibus Tax Clearance Fund and are appropriated to the State Department of Public Welfare for the period beginning December 1, 1957 and ending August 31, 1959: Four Million, Nine Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$4,900,000) for Old Age Assistance, One Hundred, Seventy-Five Thousand Dollars (\$175,000) for Aid to the Blind, and Five Hundred, Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$525,000) for Aid to Dependent Children. Such allocations and appropriations shall be made available on the basis of equal monthly installments of the total amount of such allocations and appropriations for these purposes.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of Texas at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the 5th day of November, 1957, at which election there shall be printed on such ballot the following clauses:

"FOR THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT increasing the limit on the maximum monthly payment to needy aged persons from state funds from Twenty Dollars (\$20) per month to Twenty-five Dollars (\$25) per month subject to certain conditions for payment in excess of Twenty-one Dollars (\$21) per month and on the total yearly expenditure out of state funds for assistance to needy aged, needy blind, and needy children from Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) per year to Forty-seven Million Dollars (\$47,000,000) per year, and allocating and appropriating additional sums, supplementing current legislative appropriations, for payment of assistance grants."

"AGAINST THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT increasing the limit on the maximum monthly payment to needy aged persons from state funds from Twenty Dollars (\$20) per month to Twenty-five Dollars (\$25) per month subject to certain conditions for payment in excess of Twenty-one Dollars (\$21) per month and on the total yearly expenditure out of state funds for assistance to needy aged, needy blind, and needy children from Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) per year to Forty-seven Million Dollars (\$47,000,000) per year, and allocating and appropriating additional sums, supplementing current legislative appropriations, for payment of assistance grants."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

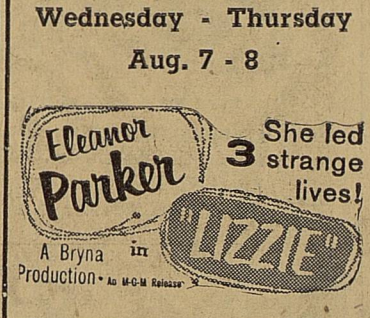

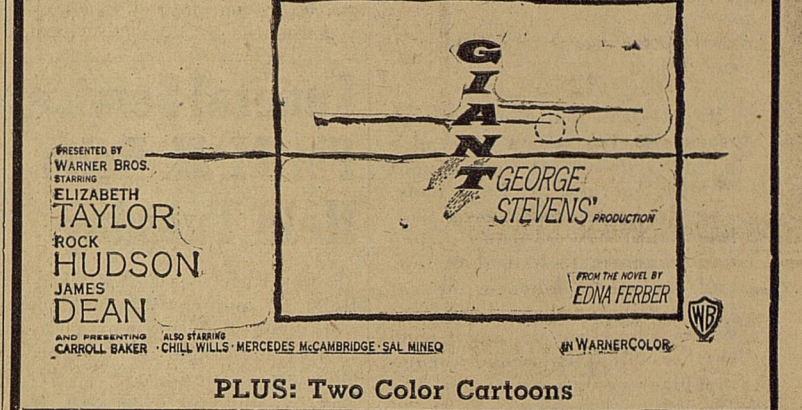

Oldsmobile to Celebrate Sixtieth Birthday; Looks Back Over Firsts

Oldsmobile, America's oldest automobile manufacturer, will celebrate its 60th birthday August 21.

It was 60 years ago on that date that the board of directors authorized General Manager Ransom E. Olds to build a horseless carriage "in as nearly perfect a manner as possible."

Result of that directive was the first Oldsmobile, which later became the selling rage of the country in the early 1900's. The curved dash runabout of that era was the grandfather of the Oldsmobile of today.

The one-cylinder, open-air curved dash runabout jounced, bounced and often backfired but it ran, and that was enough to start putting America on wheels.

Later, hundreds of other automobile companies were organized, but the oldest automobile company still in operation is Oldsmobile.

In 1901 Oldsmobile established the first crude assembly line designed for volume production of automobiles. A total of 325 vehi-

cles were produced that year, but production jumped to 3,750 in 1902 and to 5,000 vehicles in 1903.

Continuing its pioneering role in the industry, Oldsmobile was the first to produce 2-cylinder and 4-cylinder cars; introduced nickel plating in 1907; Chromium plating in 1925, and the automatic choke in 1932.

In 1939 Oldsmobile became the first manufacturer to make fully automatic transmission, the Hydra-matic Drive, available on a volume basis.

Other "firsts" include the "Rocket" engine in 1948; Autronic-eye in 1952; two-tone body color styling in 1954, and, this year the three-carburetor J-2 "Rocket" engine.

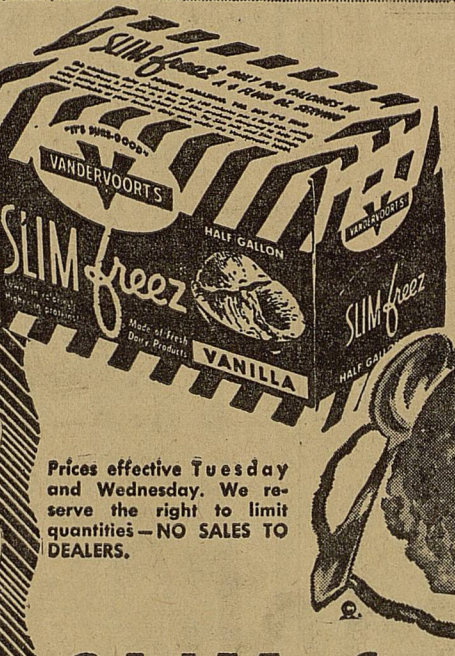

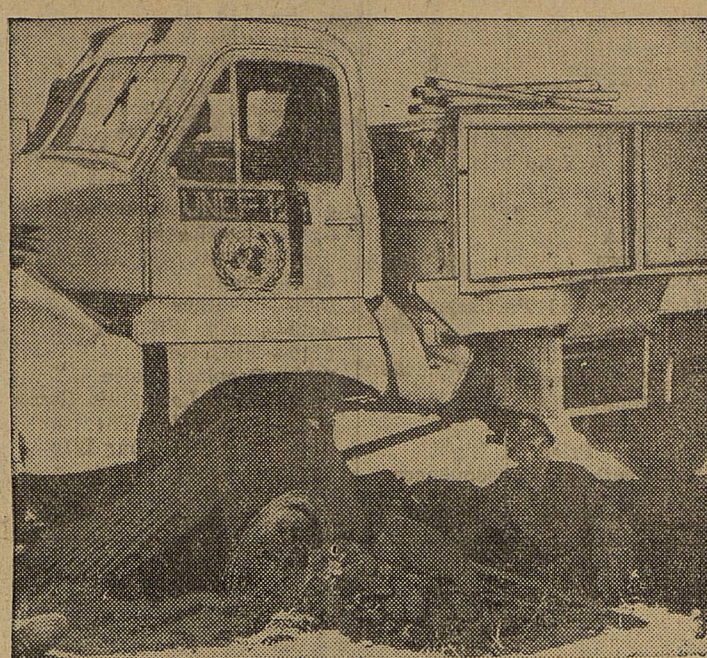
Women's Dep't of Waco Fair Offers \$2,000 Premiums

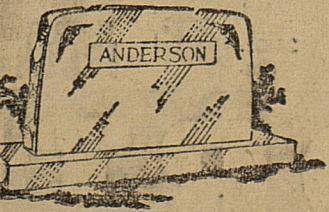
Other "name" stars will be presented in each of these big shows and there will be both matinee and night performances of each in the huge Heart O' Texas Coliseum.

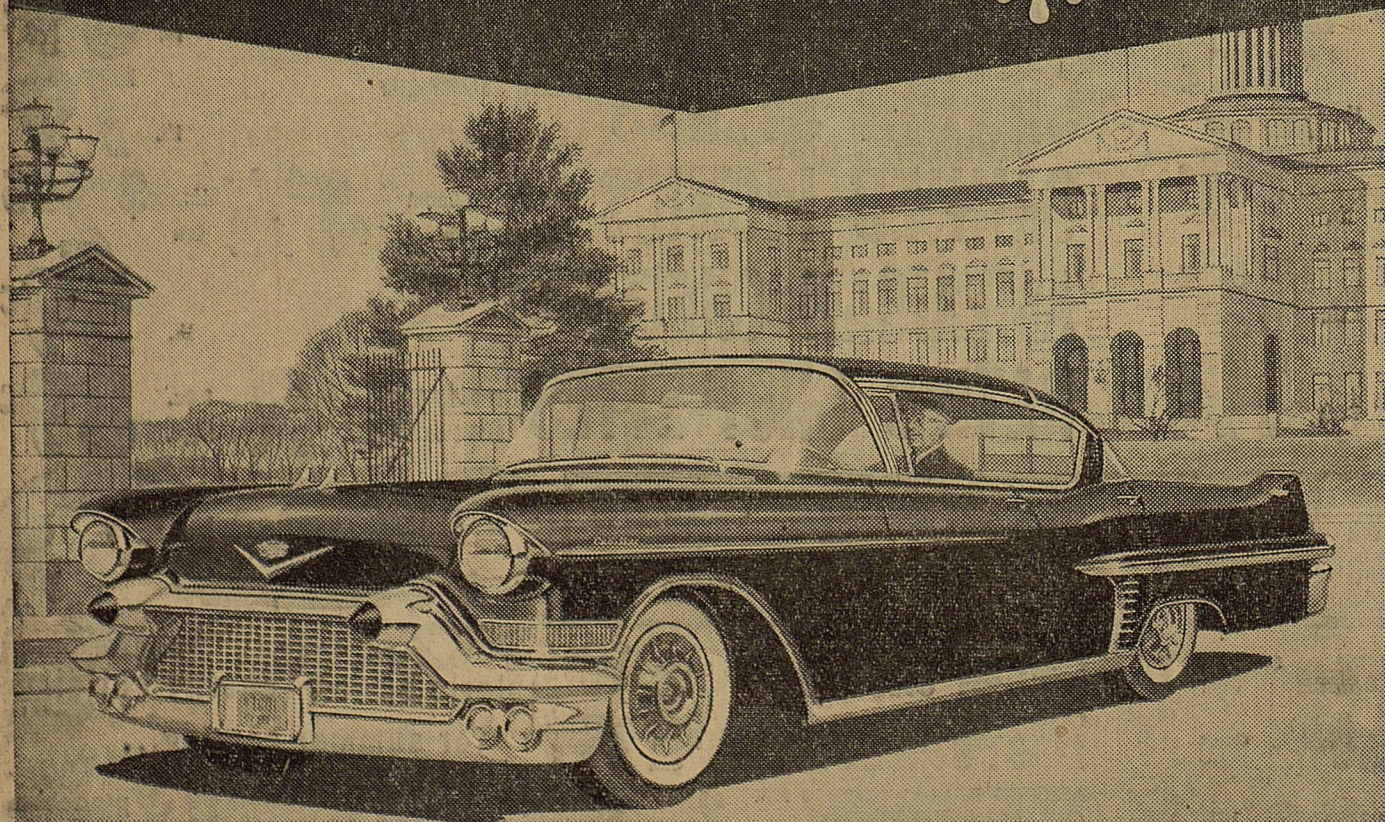
