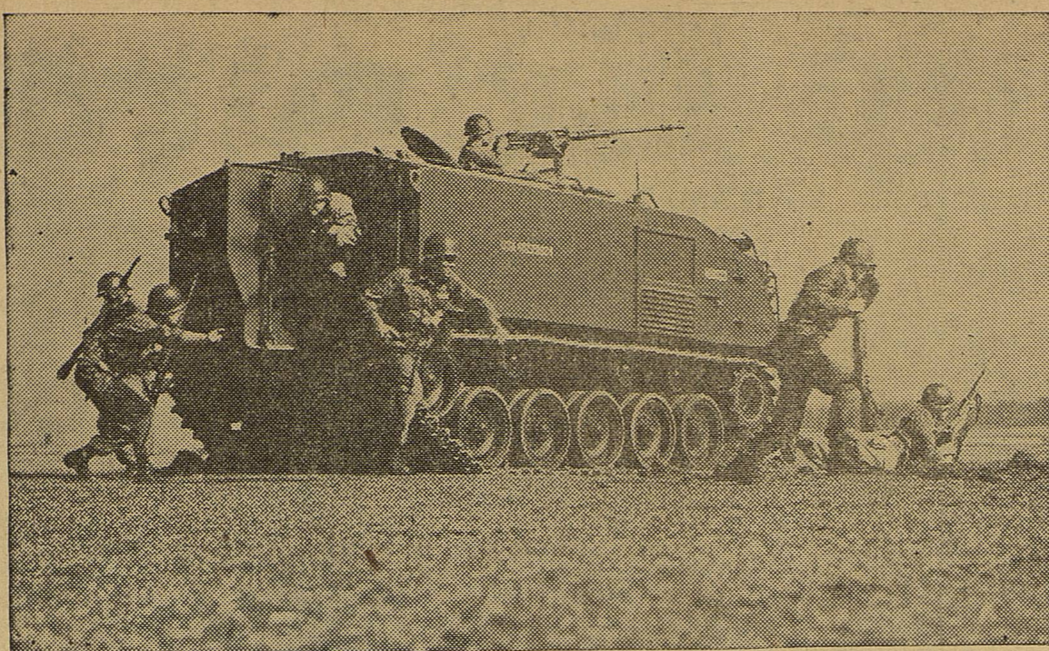

Home Economics Department Observes 25th Anniversary

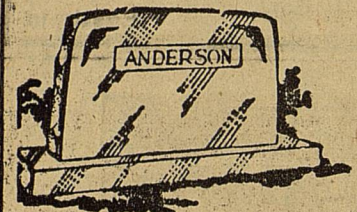
The Home Economics Department of the Lone Star Gas Company is observing its twenty-fifth anniversary. This was one of the first such departments to be established in a business firm in the Southwest. From a department started with one graduate home economist, the department has grown to a staff of some 30 graduate home economists stationed at strategic points throughout Lone Star territory.

From the beginning, it has been the objective of this department to serve homemakers by assisting them with the many questions and problems that arise in the important job of homemaking. The many homemaker friends gained, the hundreds of pleasant experiences and the daily requests for assistance indicate accomplishment towards this objective.

Since homemakers have contributed so greatly to growth and success of the department, they were called on to select the anniversary cake recipe to be used in connection with the celebration. A recipe contest was conducted and hundreds of recipes were entered. There were white cakes, spice cakes, fruit cakes, chocolate cakes, pound cakes, buttermilk cakes, milkless cakes, eggless cakes, every kind of cake.

Judges for the cake contest had a tremendous task and a difficult one. Recipes were read and re-read and cakes were baked, looked

at, cut, sampled and discussed. Finally, a winner was selected. This lucky person, who received a 1957 thermostatically controlled top-burner gas range of her choice, was Mrs. Charles Williams of Gatesville, Texas.

The winning recipe makes a delicious and beautiful cake. While it was chosen as an anniversary cake, it is one that would suit any occasion.

Blue Flame Anniversary Cake
Cream 3/4 cup butter or margarine and 2 cups sugar together until fluffy. Sift together 3 cups sifted cake flour, 3 teaspoons baking powder and 1/2 teaspoon salt. Combine 1/2 cup milk, 1/2 cup water and 1 teaspoon vanilla. Add the liquid mixture to the creamed mixture alternately with the sifted dry ingredients, beginning and ending with dry ingredients. Mix well after each addition. Beat 6 egg whites until stiff and fold into batter. Pour into three 9-inch pans lined with waxed paper. Bake in moderate gas oven (350 degrees F.) 25 minutes.

Remove from oven, let stand in pans 5 minutes, remove from pans and place on racks to thoroughly cool.

For the frosting, combine 3 cups sugar, 1 cup water and 1 teaspoon cream of tartar. Bring to boil over full gas flame and boil until sirup forms a firm ball in cold water (242 degrees F.) Pour hot sirup slowly over 3 stiffly beaten egg whites, beating constantly until mixture is of spreading consistency. Divide mixture in half. To one half add 1 cup chopped white raisins, 1 cup chopped blanched almonds and 3/4 cup shredded coconut. Spread between layers. Frost top and sides with remaining half. Sprinkle top with 1/4 cup shredded coconut.

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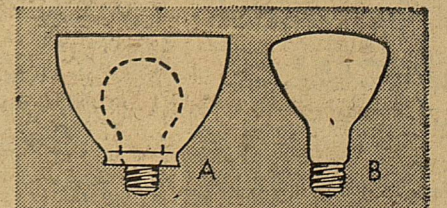


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Co-Ed Club Holds First Meeting
