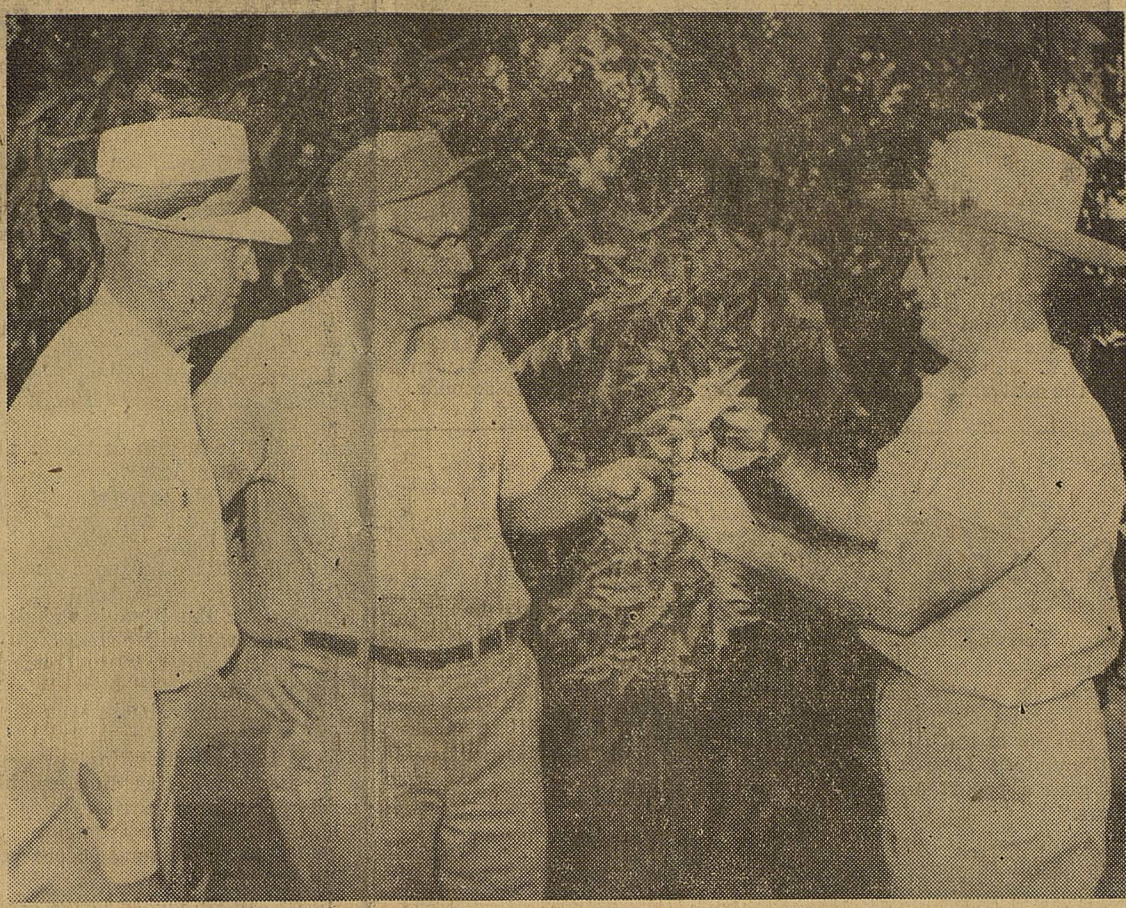

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**Molasses Cake Takes Pudding Form**



The person who likes gingerbread will be an enthusiastic sponsor of Colonial Molasses Pudding. The dessert, while having the same wonderful flavor mingling of unsulphured molasses and spices, is velvety of texture and feathery light. Served warm with a topping of cream cheese and lemon sauce, this pudding takes dessert honors. This dessert can be made a day or two ahead of use and be reheated to serve warm.

| 2 1/4 cups sifted all-purpose flour | 1/2 cup finely chopped nuts     |
| 3/4 cup sugar                       | 1 cup unsulphured molasses      |
| 3/4 teaspoon nutmeg                 | 1 cup cold water                |
| 1 1/2 teaspoons cinnamon            | 1 teaspoon soda                 |
| 1/2 teaspoon salt                   | 2 3-ounce packages cream cheese |
| 1/2 cup shortening                  | 2 tablespoons milk              |

Sift together flour, sugar, nutmeg, cinnamon and salt. Add shortening, cut with two knives or pastry blender, to resemble coarse crumbs. Stir in nuts. Combine unsulphured molasses, water and soda. Alternate crumbs and liquid in a greased 8 x 8 x 2-inch square pan, beginning and ending with crumbs. Stir gently only 2 or 3 times with a fork. Bake in a moderate oven, (350° F.) 1 hour. When ready to serve, blend together cream cheese and milk. Cut cake into squares; place spoonful cream cheese on top of each square. Top each serving with \*Lemon Sauce.

Mix together cornstarch, sugar and salt in saucepan. Gradually stir in boiling water. Cook, stirring constantly, until mixture boils and is thickened and clear. Remove from heat; stir in remaining ingredients. Serve warm.

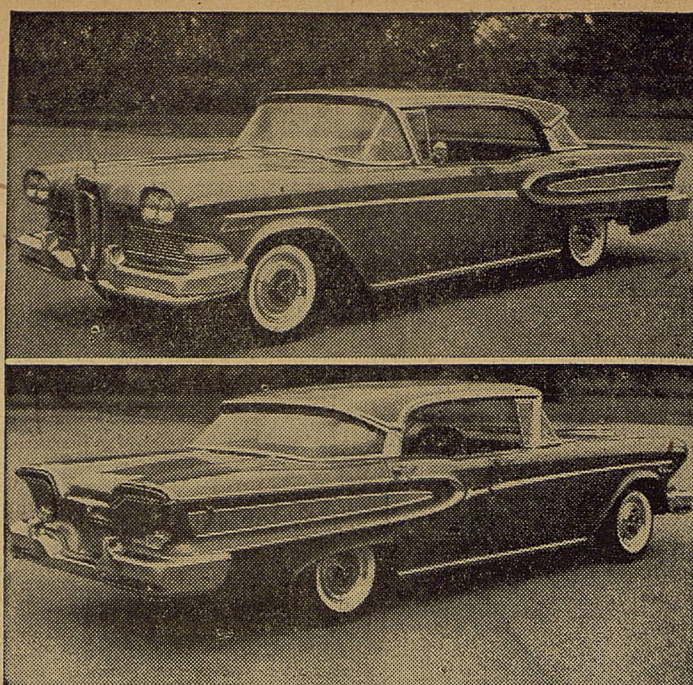

## Compare Baby's Growth Against Self, Not Others

Your baby's weight and body length were among the first facts recorded when he was born, but most parents, during the following months, compare him against his friends and playmates.

It's well to remember, however, that, while your baby's growth will proceed along a general pattern similar to other infants' he will have individual differences in this just as in any other phase of development, says an article in the September issue of Better Homes & Gardens magazine.

All through his "growing" years, your child's height and weight should be measured only against his own record.

Chart your baby's height and weight each month, and consult his doctor if it appears he is not developing normally.

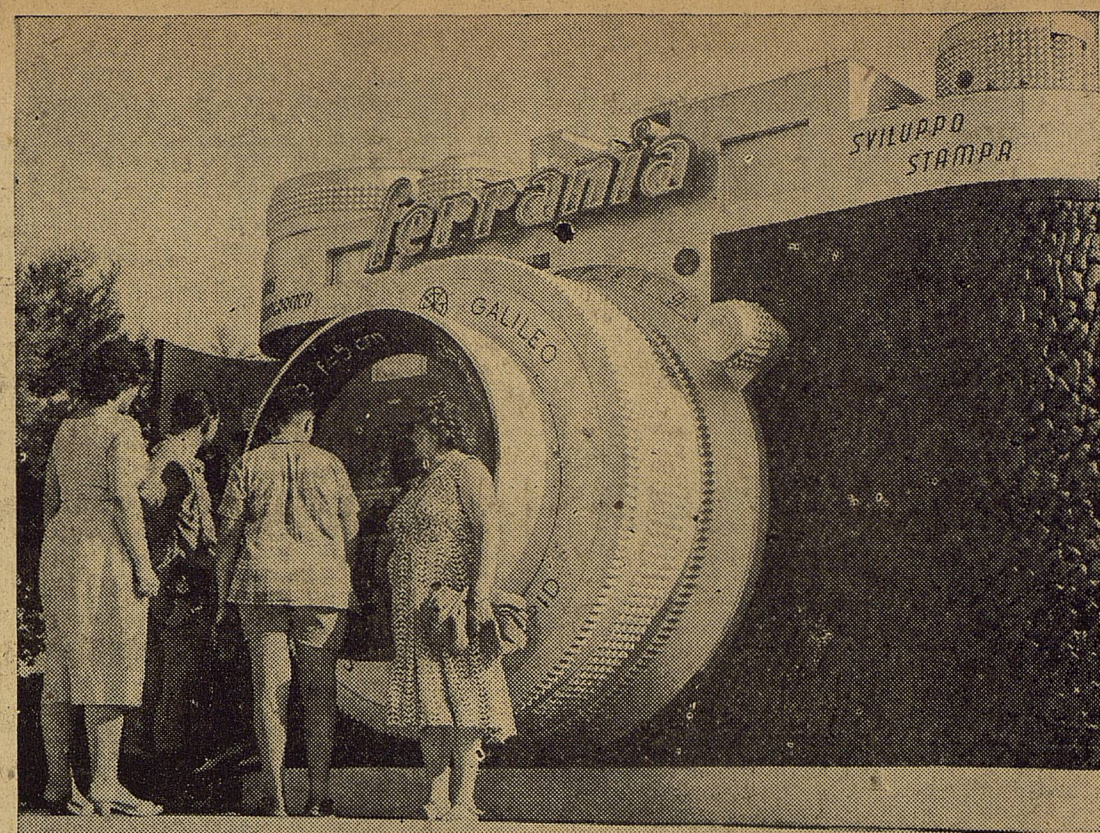
Rate of growth is very rapid in early infancy, especially weight increase. Most babies double their birth weight by the fourth or fifth month. Generally, they have tripled it by the end of the first year.

The majority of the healthy, full-term babies weigh between six and nine pounds at birth. Their body length is from 19 to 22 inches. There is about a 50 percent increase in height in the first year, according to the article.

Growth may slow down during the hot, summer months, and speed up in the fall. Rate of weight gain is less rapid between four and eight months of age, and slows still more between eight and 12 months. Appetite, too, will slacken as the need for food is less than in the early months.

The height of parents and ancestors mainly will determine the baby's height, rather than the food he eats. However, good nutrition is necessary if he is to achieve what is called his "optimum" (best) growth.

A newborn baby's proportions are quite different from an adult's. His head, which is one-fourth of his body length, looks too large. His shoulders seem narrow and his torso tapers to even narrower hips, though his abdomen protrudes. His legs are shorter

than his arms.

His head will be about four inches bigger around by the end of his first year. And his shoulders will be broader. But the most noticeable growth will be in the lower part of his body, his trunk, and legs.

There is an inexact rule that says a two-year-old has reached half his adult height. This isn't quite so, the magazine says. Research has shown that at two years of age girls, on the average, have reached 52 percent of their adult height and boys have reached only 48.5 percent. There is, of course, a chance for these predictions to be in error because so much can happen between this age and adulthood to change the course of growth.

Today's boy babies are likely, when fully grown, to be two or more inches taller than their fathers and the girls that much taller than their mothers. Improv-

ed nutrition, vitamin supplements, and plenty of sun and fresh air are thought to be the reasons for increased height of young people in the United States during the past 40 years. These things, plus plenty of exercise, will mean sturdy, good health for your child

and the assurance of his attaining his "best" growth. This is a great deal more important than beating someone else's baby in the height-and-weight game, the magazine says.

times and lost 125 yards in penalties. Individually speaking, Saul Fullman continues to be the biggest ground gainer for Eastland. The big fullback has made 205 yards in 39 attempts for a 5.2 yard a try average. He picked up 116 yards in 17 attempts against Dublin Friday night for a game average of 6.7 yards a try.

Hollis still has the best average among the four May starting backs. The speedy halfback has carried the ball 18 times in two games, gaining 118 yards for a 6.5 yard a try average. Against

Dublin Larry got 57 yards in 10 attempts for a 5.7 yard average. Bill Norwood the other May halfback, is second in total yardage gained with 173 yards. Norwood carried the ball 18 times for a 4.9 yard average. For the season his 173 yards in 33 trips gives him a 5.2 yard average.

Quarterback Clint Humphreys has carried the ball 22 times and gained 42 yards for a two yard a try average. Humphreys got 24 yards in 12 carries against Dublin for a two yard average. His average would be much better if he hadn't been spilled for several passes when he chose to keep the ball rather than risk throwing it when no receivers were open.

The starters have to bow to reserve Quarterback Joe Martin when it really comes to a good average, however. Martin has just three attempts to his credit, but has gained 57 yards for a healthy 19 yard average. A 54 yard keeper play against Dublin helped his average considerably, to say the least.

Until the year 1870 he engaged in the cattle business and farming, when he was appointed District Surveyor of the Palo Pinto Land District, which included Eastland. In 1873, when

Eastland was organized, he was elected County Surveyor and held the office until 1878, when he declined to serve longer. Many old settlers testify that he helped them in locating good surveys without a thought or remuneration.

Mr. Davidson was member of the Methodist Church, South, and a Royal Arch Mason. His chief characteristics were his patience, integrity, purity of life and boundless hospitality. Hospitality on the frontier has always cast a sheen and glamour of dignified nobility, but few carried that virtue so far as "Uncle Peter."

For nearly 20 years on his ranch he kept "open house" for all who came or went—traveller, prospector, homeseeker, stranger, all were loyally entertained. He died at Strawn, 1897, and

was buried by the Eastland Masonic Lodge, of which he was a charter member.

**J.R. Higgins**

In the fall of 1872 Mr. Higgins settled on the farm where he now lives, six miles southeast of Eastland on the Leon River. One year later he married.

"In those days we lived in log cabins, usually with one door, no windows, roof weighted on, and puncheon floor. We went in ox wagons to Stephenville or Comanche to mill. Stephenville was my postoffice."

Mr. Higgins owns a fine farm with a good home and plenty of stock. His wife is a daughter of W. C. McGonch.

The Double Seven Club met in the home of Janie Arthur Monday. The club met to elect officers.

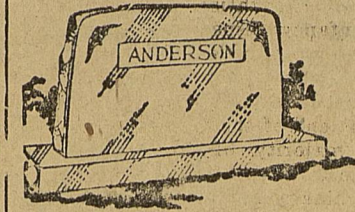

**ABOUT YOUR HEALTH**

AUSTIN—A wise man once said, "Who would not give a trifle to prevent what he would give a thousand worlds to cure."  
These words take on a great deal of meaning when viewed in the light of the many advances in

medicine and public health made in the last 50 years in the United States and throughout the world.

Medical research has brought about many outstanding drugs and spectacular operations which save individual lives and relieve suffering, but more outstanding and spectacular are the advances in preventive medicine that have been made which stop suffering before it starts—the proverbial "stitch in time."

Economically speaking, preventive medicine has saved the people of the United States countless dollars. One example is retrolental fibroplasia, an eye condition marked by the formation of fibrous tissue behind the crystalline lens. It is seen in many premat-

urely born babies and causes partial or total blindness.

For years the disease was thought to be the result of premature births. However, a study supported by both federal and private financing, established the cause of the trouble as due to the faulty administration of oxygen, (used extensively in incubators for premature infants.)

This cost approximately \$50,000. Today there are about 5,000 blind children in the U. S. who are victims of retrolental fibroplasia. Each child will cost an estimated \$100,000 each for education, training and support from birth to death—a grand total of \$500 million.

Thus, the cost of care for 5,000 children will be, for our generation, 100,000 times the cost of the prevention for the future.

Advances in public health coupled with the discovery of wonder drugs raised the life expectancy for persons now born to over 70 years of age. In the 17 year period between 1937 and 1954, it increases 9.6 years.

This means that in 1955 alone, through this decline in the death rate, over \$770 million additional federal income taxes was received by the government, to say nothing of the earning and productivity resulting from an increased span of life.

There is no doubt about it, public health and research pays off!

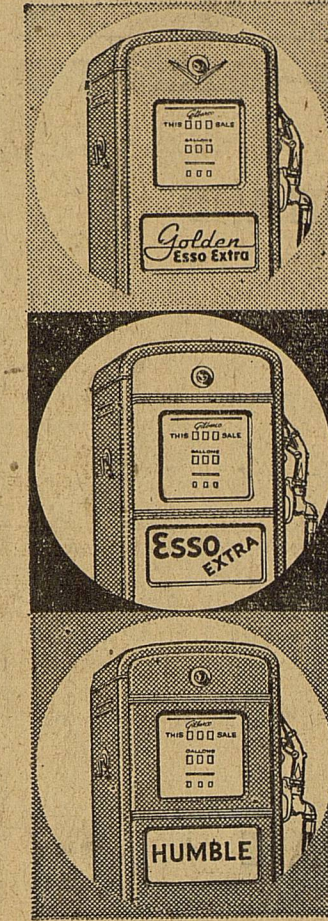

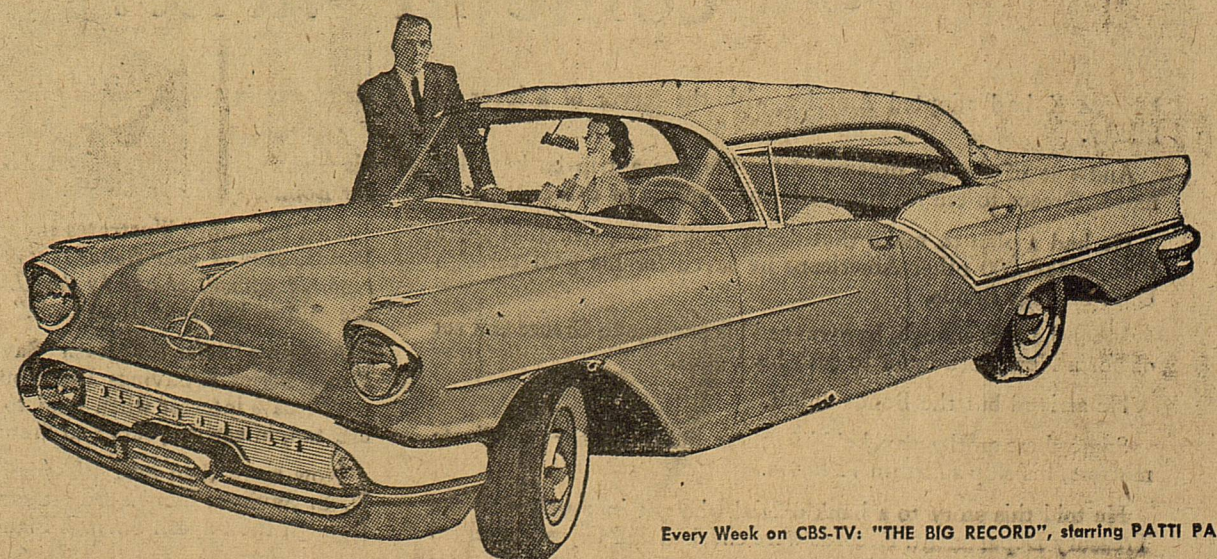
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
