





1 teaspoon salt
2 teaspoons cinnamon
1 teaspoons cinnamon

1/4 teaspoon mace or nutmeg teaspoon allspice

1½ cups canned pumpkin puree 3 egg yolks, beaten 3 egg whites

1/3 cup granulated sugar 2/4 cup chopped pecans 1/2 teaspoon ginger Split doughnuts into 2 equal circles. Place 6 doughnut halves, cut surface up, in bottom of a shallow oblong pan (10 x 6 x 2). Soak gelatin in cold water 5 minutes. Combine and mix brown sugar, molasses, salt, spices, pumpkin, and egg yolks together in the top of a double boiler. Place over hot water and cook until mixture thickens, stirring often. Cool mixture until it starts to set. Beat egg whites until they form soft peaks. Add sugar one tablespoonful at a time beating mixture until stiff and glossy. Whip partially congealed pumpkin mixture until fluffy; fold meringue mixture and nuts into pumpkin. Pour into oblong dish atop doughnut halves. Top with remaining doughnut halves placed cut side down. Chill until mixture has set. Serves 6.
