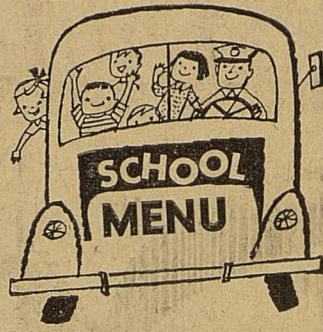

Citizens Buy \$59,772 Savings Bonds In August

A total of \$59,772 Series E and H United States Savings Bonds were purchased by the residents of this county during August. These figures were released recently by Guy Parker, Chairman of the Eastland County Savings Bonds Committee. Sales in this county during the first eight months of this year totaled \$323,539 which is 54.9 per cent of the yearly goal of \$589,300.

Sales in Texas during the first eight months of 1957 totaled

\$112,863,400, or 58.4 per cent of the 1957 goal of \$193,100,000. August sales in Texas were \$13,118,000.

"During the months of September and October, many schools throughout Texas are again installing the Savings Stamp program for their students. The School Stamp Program affords our young citizens an opportunity to learn the habit of thrift. In addition, they will develop a better understanding of our government and will learn to realize their responsibilities as citizens of this great land," Chairman Parker said.
