Noticed the signs on the back of some of those small foreign cars being sold by Tom's Sport Cars? It reads, "Help us stamp out Cadillac."



A battered DeLeon Bearkat team, left bloody by one 10-A team last week, takes on another Friday night. The Kats will entertain the Eastland Mavericks and both teams will be out to seek their second win in three starts. The Bearkats were behind before they heard the opening gun against Albany a week ago. With the clock showing the game just two minutes deep, Coach Al Langford's charges were behind, 14-0. They never could get back into that one and were humbled, 34-7. The week before, however, they had downed Gorman, a Class B power, 39-0.

Eastland, on the other hand, was getting into the win column this past week. The Mavs downed Dublin, 34-7. The previous week Eastland had fallen to Cisco, 21-18.

All eyes in District 10-A will be on the game. A loss by Eastland would tab Albany as the definite district favorite and more-or-less throw the race into a two-way battle between Albany and Wylie. An impressive win, however, would make the district battle look more like the three-way affair sportswriters are saying it will be.

When the kickoff gets play underway at 8 p.m. in DeLeon Friday night, the tale will be told. Eastland runs a straight T attack and keeps mainly to the ground. DeLeon, on the other hand, uses the split T, and Quarterback C. M. Caraway, who Eastland scouts describe as a "real tough" boy, likes to go to the airways. In fact, the only Kat score last week came on a 39 yard pass from Caraway to Joe Lee Brown. Halfback Bruce McGinnis is Caraway's favorite target.

Eastland will have a weight advantage in the line. The May forward wall will average 166 pounds a man, compared to 159 pounds a man for DeLeon. Eastland's starting offensive backfield will average 156 pounds a man and DeLeon's will measure out at 157 pounds a man. Overall, Eastland will average 162 pounds a player, compared to 158 for DeLeon.

The Bearkats aren't small, however. Smallest man on the starting team is 148 pound Bill Johnson, an end.

From scouting reports from last week's Albany-DeLeon game, it would appear that Left Halfback David Whiteheart could possibly be the man Eastland will have to stop. He runs hard and fast, reports indicate. Caraway, the Kat man-under, is a good runner.

## Paul Brashear Not In Favor of Special Session

State Representative Paul Brashear believes that the October 14th Special session of the Texas Legislature will be a needless waste of approximately \$500,000 in taxpayer's money. His attitude toward the session just called by Governor Price Daniel was expressed in a statement released for publication today.

"It has been my understanding that special legislative sessions should be ordered to deal with emergencies," Brashear said. "The governor has called this session to (1) provide for registration and regulation of lobbyists, (2) require registration of persons who represent others before state agencies, (3) recommend to the next session ways and means for improving law enforcement, and (4) create and finance a water planning agency for research and flood control."

Brashear, who represents Eastland, Shackelford and Callahan Counties in the Legislature, pointed out that article 180 and 182 of the state penal code, which has been a law since 1907 provides safeguards and penalties against lobbyists. There has been little effort to enforce this law which pro-

All the gilts will receive ribbons. The Sears Duroc boar will be at the show but will not compete for prize money or ribbons.

The boys that will show the Duroc gilts are Lynn Hagan, Cisco, David Stuart, Scranton, Dick Morrow and Terry Gey, Rising Star, Billy Johnson and Donald Sanders, Ranger, Billy Horn, Olden, and Larry Morrow, Gorman. The boar will be exhibited by Raymond Fox, Olden.

The first place gilt and boar will compete in the area show at Breckenridge Sept. 28. At that show the boys will be competing against other counties with their hogs.

Sponsors of these hogs is the Sears Roebuck Foundation. They originally furnished the money to buy eight gilt pigs and one boar pig that 4-H Boys of Eastland County received and since then one gilt pig from each litter has been returned to keep the program going. 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





# I GIVE YOU TEXAS

By BOYCE HOUSE

A rancher most of his life, Ira G. Yates decided it would be a fine thing to become a merchant, so he traded 216 cows for a store in the West Texas village of Rankin, in Upton County. But, after 18 months of keeping books and selling flour and kerosene, he had a hankering for life in the open again, so he swapped the store, in 1915, for a ranch "across the Pecos."

And that might be considered the starting-point in the chain of events that was to lead to the discovery of the Yates field, in some respects the most remarkable in history—a field that was to witness probably the most gigantic gusher ever drilled and brought under control in the world, a field moreover that was to contribute many millions of dollars to the public schools of Texas and that, before its course is run, will (ex-

parts predict) produce several hundred million dollars worth of oil.

When Yates acquired the ranch, a friend who had formerly been its owner, advised him, "Get rid of it at once," adding that he had lost money on the ranch himself. An acquaintance glibly, "Even the Buffalo knew better than to cross the Pecos." Another joined in, "Why, a crow wouldn't fly over that land," and a third said, "It ain't wuth the taxes."

But Yates ignored alike the well-meant counsel and the rough but friendly "joshing." A severe drought came and he found 1916 and the two years that followed "tough going." But he stuck it out and even improved the place. Then in 1923 the Reagan County field was discovered "and we all got the oil fever," Yates related afterward.

The Pecos, however, was regarded as the deadline for the production of oil. It is true that, some years before this, small production had been found by shallow wells near Toyah in Pecos County. And in January, 1921, Fort Stockton, the county seat, was thrilled by a well (some 60 miles from the Yates ranch) that, from the amazing depth of only 96 feet, flowed several thousand barrels in less than 24 hours—then stopped. Other wells around the "Mystery Well" proved dry holes. For all practical purposes, therefore, the Pecos River had come to be considered the deadline for oil.

Much of the romantic and the historical was associated with that stream—frontier memories of cavalry, of ox wagons and of Indian arrows whizzing a song of death. The very names of the crossings kept alive the thoughts of pioneer days.

Emigrant Crossing was used by westbound travelers and is said to have been on the route of wagons going to the California gold fields soon after '49. Horsehead Crossing was used by cattlemen and settlers. Pontoon Crossing apparently derived its name from military use; perhaps the soldiers used pontoons to get wagons across. S Crossing was said to have been named for a horse ranch nearby with the brand "SSS". Lancaster Crossing was near the fort of that name, a post in Indian

days. Old Spanish Crossing was below a dam that was built by Mexicans to provide water for irrigation to produce grain and vegetables for the troops at old Fort Stockton. A layer of brush was placed on the bottom of the stream and weighted down with rocks. Layer after layer was built and the chinks were soon filled with sand and silt. The dam was faced with rocks and it turned the water into the ditches.

Hickox Crossing was used by soldiers and emigrants. On the west side were two graves of Indian fighters—a Texas Ranger and an army officer.

vides, that in the event of conviction \$200 to \$2000 fine or six months to two years in the penitentiary. He added that the crime commission, lobby control bill, and water planning proposals were before the Legislature during the last session without results.

"None of these four subjects mentioned by the Governor in his call could possibly be construed as an emergency," Brashear stated. "As the elected representative of this district, I will attend the session and do my job, but it seems needless to waste half a million dollars without a good reason for it."

A copy of the special session call reached Brashear on Monday. It ordered the representative to be in Austin on Monday, October 14, at 10 a.m.

Brashear said he was pessimistic about anything being accomplished at the special session in view of the Legislature's handing of the subjects at the regular session and in view of the fact that a majority of house members said in a recent poll that they were opposed to the session.
