

Paul Brashear Not In Favor of **Special Session**

State Representative Paul Brashear believes that the October 14th Special session of the Texas Legislature will be a needless, waste of approximately \$500,000 in taxpayer's money. His attitude toward the session just called by Governor Price Daniel was expressed in a statement released

for publication today.
"It has been my understanding that special legislative sessions should be ordered to deal with emergencies," Brashear said. "The governor has called this session to (1) provide for registration and regulation of lobbyists, (2) require registration of persons who represent others before state agencies, (3) recommend to the next session ways and means for improving law enforcement, and
