

## Mavs Clawed 20-6 By DeLeon Bearkats

### Biggest Loss May Be Mav Injuries

A hard-hitting, hard charging DeLeon Bearkat team upset the favored Eastland Mavericks, 20-6, Friday night, leaving Coach Carl Shelton's charges badly crippled. The Kats showed surprising power as they bounced back from a one-sided defeat at the hands of Albany last week.

The Bearkats marched for a touchdown the first time they got the ball to set the pattern, then threw up the best defense the Mavs have met all year to keep Eastland from scoring until the last seconds of the final quarter.

The Mavs were without the services of three of their ace men. Co-Captain Ronald Robertson, a halfback, and Tackle Charles Martin didn't even suit up for the game. And Coach Shelton didn't use Halfback Bill Norwood, the Mav's second biggest ground gainer, because of a back injury.


"We couldn't risk getting him seriously injured," he said after the game. Martin was ill and Robertson's knee injury kept him out of the game.

Worse than the loss as far as Eastland was concerned was the large number of injuries. Larry Alldredge, a hard-hitting Mav guard, remained in Eastland Memorial Hospital this morning. Alldredge's injuries were not yet determined. The 152-pound lad passed out twice after getting hit hard and was under observation at the hospital.

Mike Manning suffered a twisted knee. Coach Shelton Saturday morning said the injury would keep Manning out of workouts until week. Full extent of the injury still wasn't known. Billy Don Turner, who was hit in the stomach and brought out of the game late in the final quarter, apparently will be okay, Shelton said.

Eastland couldn't seem to come up with the right series of offensive plays in the game and the Mav defense was loose as a goose. The Kats completed only three passes, but only because their passer couldn't hit receivers, who had the Mav secondary all to themselves time after time.

It took DeLeon just 10 plays to score after the opening kickoff. The Kats marched from their own 24 to the Mav five where David Whitehurst, a lad who the Mavericks just couldn't handle, pranced over practically untouched. Longest gain in the series was a 35-yard pass from Quarterback C. M. Caraway to Halfback Bruce McGinnis. Caraway kicked the extra point from six yards out, after a first down on the 23. Pullman went to the 16 and Hollis raced to the five. Pullman went over there but a penalty drove the Mavs

## USDA FIGURES TOO HIGH Turkey Growers Fight Estimates

Members of the Central Texas Turkey Growers Association, meeting Thursday night at the Chamber of Commerce in Ranger, have joined hands with the Texas Turkey Federation and other groups representing turkey growers throughout the state, in seeking a reduction in the United States Department of Agriculture crop estimate for 1957 which has literally knocked the bottom out from under turkey prices.

The Crop Rotating Board of the USDA has placed the 1957 Texas turkey production at 4,724,000 birds, which is one of record-breaking proportions, the growers say.

Half Million Birds Too Many

The Texas Turkey Federation, which is state wide and which operates in every turkey-growing community in the state, has taken an almost farm-by-farm turkey census of its own which has revealed a crop of only 4,204,000 birds, well below the crop of last year, and more than a half-million birds less than the USDA figure.

W. D. Blachly, a representative of the USDA, who made the record-breaking estimate, said he based his figures on reports from hatcheries which showed that 5,303,000 poulters were started in Texas this year. He estimated the mortality rate at about 14 per cent in arriving at his figure.

The Texas Turkey Federation contacted five major feed mills in their survey and found that one of these mills estimated the mortality rate to be at least 32 per cent in the area which it served. Two other feed mills estimated the loss at 20 per cent in their areas, and the fourth and fifth mills estimated the loss from 17 to 20 per cent.

Eastland County Loss 18%

Hardy Tidwell of Desdemona, president of the Central Texas Turkey Association, reported losses in the Eastland County area to be about 18 per cent. Losses up to 25 per cent have been reported for the Coleman-San Angelo area.

Ralph E. James of Austin made a careful inspection of the entire Hill Country regions and estimated losses up to 20 per cent with the same average holding true around the Marlin area. The San Saba area reports losses up to 17 per cent and H. H. Weatherby of Fort Worth states losses in the North east Texas area to be 15 per cent.

A City Is Born

A number of people availed themselves of the opportunity to get a free lot in the new town of Eastland. J. F. Davenport, now of Cisco, built a house on the northeast corner of the square, where Downtown's brick building stands, and merchandised. Isham Finch built a hotel on the southeast corner of the square. "It was beyond question the best public place of entertainment in the county at that time—there being no others."

Major J. H. Davenport, formerly state senator from Bell County, established a law office on the south side of the square and published the first newspaper in the county, "The Review." J. H. Callison, present District Judge, built a law office on the north side of the square in 1876, which is now the oldest house standing.

Other lawyers who established his office in Daugherty, Connelley & Ammerman's store. Mr. Corley exhibited the original "Uncle Tom's Cabin" at the Chicago World's Fair, and is author of a book entitled "The Lives of the Apostles."

## Seven From Eastland Attend Area Chamber of Commerce Oil Meeting

Seven persons representing the Eastland Chamber of Commerce attended an area Chamber of Commerce meeting in Breckenridge, last Tuesday. They included H. W. Porter, Neil Moore, Jack Chamberlain, Jr., Jack Chamberlain, Sr., Hugh Neel, C. A. McCowan & H. J. Tanner. The meeting was attended by Chamber of Commerce representatives from twenty-one other cities. The purpose was to discuss the present oil crisis in connection with oil imports. The first session of the meeting which began at 11 o'clock was devoted to what was happening to the independent oil producer covering every phase from the rig operator, service organizations, lease holders, and from a tax standpoint showing the reduction in revenue to operate our state and our school system.

ganized the first Baptist Church. In the summer of 1875, Daugherty, Connellee, and Ammerman made a proposition to the citizens to move the County Town from Merriman to Eastland. The election, held August 2, 1875, resulted as follows: Eastland, 67; Merriman, nine; McGough Springs, 44; Center of County, five, and scattering, two. The gentlemen making the proposition had agreed to erect a two-story stone building and donate the second floor to the County for a courtroom as long as desired, and entered into a bond for its faithful performance. This building is still standing on the northwest corner of the square.

The county assumed a new dignity. The court had a home and offices, and a number of lawyers located in the town: J. R. Fleming, later Judge of the District; J. M. Moore, son of Chief Justice Moore of the Supreme Court of Texas, and who was appointed Secretary of State under Governor Ross; Judge E. T. Hilliard; J. E. Thomas of Dallas, who served as County Attorney; T. H. Conner, now Chief Justice of the Court of Appeals of Fort Worth, Texas; G. W. Perryman; A. Lawrence, who held the office of County Attorney and Judge; R. B. Truly, at one time District Clerk; and B. F. Collins.

Daugherty, Connellee and Ammerman offered the Texas and Pacific Railway Company one-fourth of the lots in the town if the road were built through Eastland. In October, 1880, the first engine rolled into the county town, which remained the terminus for several months. J. B. Ammerman was made station agent.

Eastland was now the distributing point for all towns North, South, and West; and also the starting place for numerous stage and United States mail lines, during which time it was flourishing Western town. Mr. Berry of Stephenville did a banking business in Jake Alexander's store. (Next Chapter: "Fight For County Seat")

Actual surveys made by members of the Federation all over the State shows the birds ready for market to be far below the USDA estimate, but the harm has already been done on account of the USDA figures. Growers have been forced to sell their birds as quickly as they were ready due to the unfavorable feed-price ratio, and they were forced to sell before the birds reached a good saleable finish. They have taken a licking on prices as a result of the inaccurate USDA figures. Growers are seeking to get the crop estimate revised to what it actually is in order to salvage a little bit from the crop during the rest of the year if possible.
