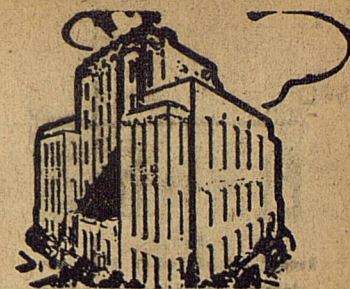

Cameron was tumbled from the undefeated class last week in the Pioneer circuit losing to Tyler 16-7. Tarleton State bowed to Kilgore last week 14-0, while Arlington State smothered Wharton 41-7. San Angelo defeated Victoria 12-0.

This week's schedule in the Pioneer loop sends Tarleton to Texarkana Thursday night. On Friday night it is Cameron vs. New Mexico Military at Lawton, Okla.

Saturday it will be Arlington vs. Navarro at Corsicana, Ranger at Cisco and San Angelo vs. Wharton at San Angelo.

Kennedy said that this city is being considered for the important YMCA meeting.

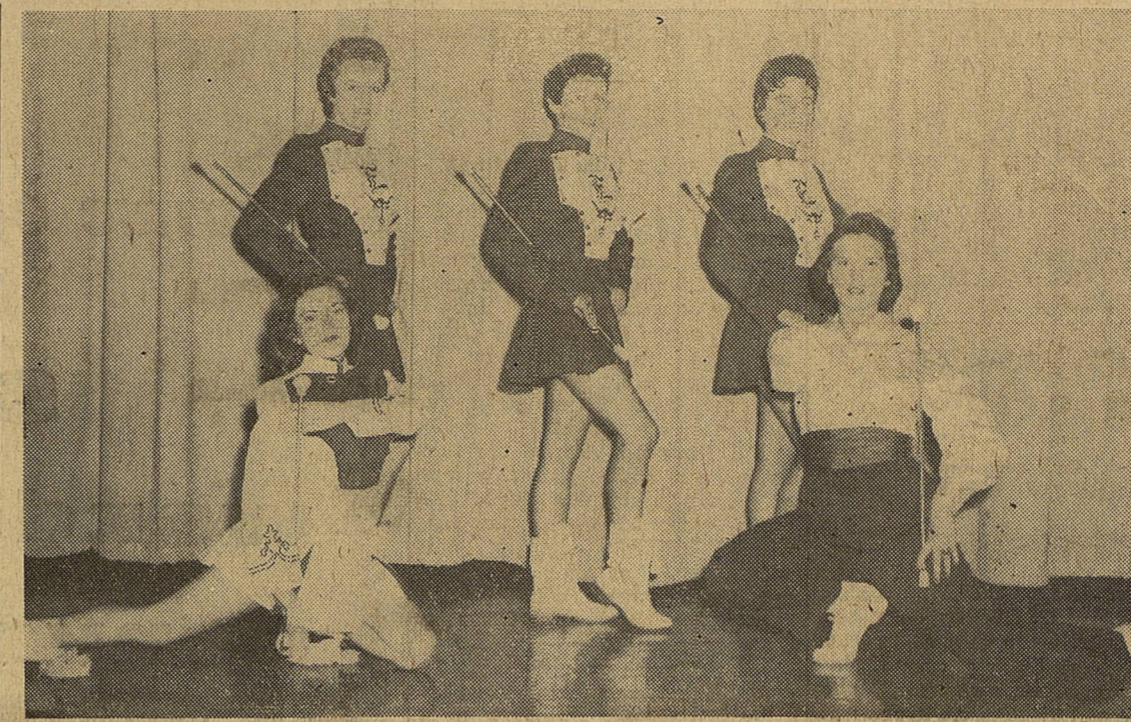
He also told members of the two organizations of the forthcoming Officers' Training Conference to be held some Sunday in the near future in Sweetwater.

More Early Settlers Draw Writer's Praise

(Editor's Note: This is the 24th in a series of articles taken from the book, "History of Eastland County, Texas," written by Mrs. George Langston in 1904.)

Scott and Brelsford

This firm is composed of Judge D. K. Scott, of Cisco, and H. P. Brelsford, of Eastland. The firm as at present constituted, was formed in 1892 and has been in existence without change since that date. They do a general State and Federal Court practice and maintain offices at Eastland and Cisco.

Mr. Scott has been several times County Special District Judge. Mr. Brelsford is the present Representative from the 85th District. He served as Special Justice of the Court of Civil Appeals at Fort Worth by appointment of Governor Culberson.

L. A. Hightower

Mr. Hightower established himself in his present real estate and abstract business, which is confined entirely to this county, 1895. He now has an abstract to every title in the county, which are in 24 bound volumes of abstract books and indexes.

Mr. Hightower, came to Texas from Arkansas in 1895.

In the early history of Cisco, Mr. Hightower kept books for Park & Paterson and for Blake & Son.

The Connors of Eastland County Samuel S. Connor, born June 10, 1821 and his wife Margaretta L. Connor, born Nov. 19, 1830, settled in Eastland in 1876. They were from Virginia and Kentucky families, and immigrated to Texas from their native State, Indiana, in the early fifties, and spent the greater part of their subsequent lives in Caldwell, Ellis and Eastland Counties. They moved from Ellis to Eastland County in Fall of 1876, and are now lying

peacefully side by side in the graveyard in city of Eastland—S. C. Connor having died on the 11th day of February, 1899, and M. L. Connor November 20, 1901. They were both strong characters and through the many years' residence in this county became widely known and universally esteemed,—conspicuous types of that sturdy Christian manhood and womanhood that have made our nation great.

As a result of their union, they reared the following children, most whom are now well known: Truman H., Maud, Ella, Jeannie, Claude L., and Earl.

The most distinguished member of this noble family is the oldest son Truman H. Connor. He graduated in the Law Department of Trinity University, Texas, in 1876 and was in the active practice of his profession from the spring of 1877 until July, 1887, when he was appointed Judge of the 42nd Judicial District, composed of Eastland and other counties, by Gov. L. S. Ross, and was thrice re-elected to the office. In 1898 Judge Connor was elected Chief Justice of the 2nd Supreme Judicial District of Texas, composed of 95 counties, including Eastland. Since the date of his present incumbency, he has lived in Fort Worth.

Maude, whose home was never in Eastland, was married to Col. John W. Coleman of Ellis County in 1871, and they now live in Coke County, Texas. Ella was married to Wm. S. Parson, of Ellis County, in 1872, and they lived in Eastland a number of years as many old settlers recall. They have one daughter living in the county—Mrs. Grace Dreinhof of Ranger.

CC Fire Theme Contest Is Set

Ed Freyschlag, chairman of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce Fire Prevention Week committee announced today that the C-C would sponsor theme writing contests in Eastland High School this year.

Freyschlag said all seniors, juniors, sophomores and freshmen can participate in the contest. Prizes of \$3, \$2 and \$1 will go to the three winners.

Other members of the committee besides Freyschlag are Earl Bender, Carl Johnson and Fire Chief Billy Jack Johnson. The contest will begin Sunday and continue through Oct. 13.

Traditionally, Fire Prevention week each year is the full calendar week including Oct. 9, anniversary of the great Chicago fire of 1871, Freyschlag pointed out.

It is observed at the same time in the United States and Canada by proclamation of the President of the United States and the governor—general of Canada.

Fire Prevention Week actually dates back to Fire Prevention Day which was inaugurated and first observed throughout the United States on Oct. 9, 1911. It began when the Fire Marshals' Association of North America suggested that the Fortieth Anniversary of the Chicago fire be set apart for bringing before the public the much-needed lesson of fire prevention. In August, 1916 the National Fire Protection Association Committee of Fire Prevention Day was formed.

Fire Chief Johnson pointed out that every day there are 1300 home fires... 31 deaths by fire... 150 store fires... 100 factory fires... 110 barn fires... 12 school fires... four hospital fires... and nine church fires

The combined U. S and Canadian fire loss total in 1956 was \$1,385,000,000 and there were approximately 2,000,000 fires.

Seven-Jinx Waved In Eyes of Ranger Dogs

A determined Eastland Maverick football team Monday eyed past records and set a determined chin to see that the trend of the past continues. The Mavs got their workouts underway for the annual grudge game with Ranger's Bulldogs.

Eastland has won just eight games and tied one while Ranger has won 23 in the long rivalry between the two Eastland County schools. And the county seat eleven will be heavy underdogs this year.

But let's look closely at that record, which dates back to 1922. Remember while we go back into history that this is 1957. The last Maverick team to beat Ranger was the 1947 squad. That was a 6-0 victory. In 1937 the Mavs won 47-13, and in 1927 the score was 7-0, Eastland. If you payed close attention you noted that the Mavs won every game ever played when the last numeral in the year was seven. And on two of those occasions the Eastland score ended in seven. Seven is the magic number and this is 1957.

Of course Eastland would like nothing more. The only comparison between the two teams would make you doubt that Eastland has a chance. The Mavs lost to DeLeon, 6-20, while Ranger beat the same team, 33-0. That would make Ranger a 47-point favorite on paper, but again we call your attention to that magic number seven at the end of the point spread.

Physically the Mavs are coming along all the time. Charles Martin is back in the lineup, but Larry Alldredge, Mike Manning and Ronald Robertson will all miss the Ranger game.

Besides piling up a great 19-7 upset win over Cross Plains last week, Eastland did a lot to help their paper work. Season records show that Eastland has scored 68 points in four games, while allowing 55 for their opponents. The Mavs have made 67 first downs to just 41 for the opposition. In yards rushing Eastland is way ahead, 1096 yards to 679.

Cisco, Dublin, DeLeon and Cross Plains have netted 246 yards in the air to Eastland's 181. Clint Humphrey's has connected on nine of 26 passes for Eastland and the Mavs have allowed 12 completions of 36 tries. Eastland has intercepted five aerials and allowed three of their own to be intercepted.

Humphreys has punted 11 times for a 29 yard average for Eastland. Buton kicked the ball three

times Friday night and came out of the game with a 40 yard average, his longest kick going for 47 yards. But the Mavs haven't gained a thing on punts. For their four opponents have also punted 11 times and have an identical 29 yard average.

The Mavs have lost seven fumbles and recovered five of their opponents. Twenty-three times Eastland has been penalized for a total of 245 yards. Their opponents have broken the rules 34 times, however, for a loss of 270 yards.

A look at individual statistics make Coaches Carol Shelton and Jon Tate very happy.

Pullback Saul Pullman has his best night against Cross Plains. He lumbered for 104 yards in 15 carries for a 6.9 yard average. For the year he has toted the ball 70 times and picked up 390 yards

Atwell Still On Top Of District Scoring

Jerry Atwell, one of Albany's touchdown twins, became the first player to remain at the top of the District 10-A scoring parade for two consecutive weeks Friday as he blazed to higher glory in a 33-12 Albany triumph over Class AA Winters.

Atwell picked up 2 points against the Blizzards to push his season total scoring record to 55 points. Wylie's Joe Rex Schulle moved back into second place, coming up from third, with a 13 point output Friday night. Schulle now has 41 points to his credit. Against Aspermont this week he got all of Wylie's 13 points as the Bulldogs won a close one, 13-7.

Sliding to third in the scoring race was Throckmorton's Bob Neely, who didn't score despite the fact his Greyhounds won, 19-6. Harold Hicks of Clyde moved from sixth place to fourth with a 12 point outburst against Baird. His efforts were not enough, however, as his teammates fell, 22-13. Saul Pullman of Eastland and Chigger Hibbetts of Throckmorton are tied for fifth place honors, each with 24 points. Both got six points during the past week.

Atwell may have a hard time retaining his lead this week. Albany has an open date. Schulle would need 13 points to tie Jerry Atwell. District 10-A continues to have a most impressive record. Three of the district's five teams are undefeated.

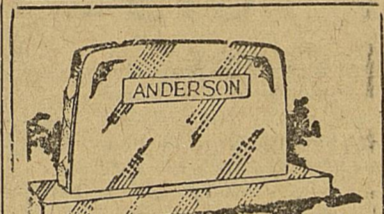
