## Red Front Drug One Of First In County

(Editor's Note: This is the 36th in a series of articles taken from the book, "History of Eastland County, Texas," written by Mrs. George Langston in 1904.)

**Red Front Drug Store**  
This popular drug store was established by Mr. Yarbrough soon after the sale of lots in 1881, and has only changed hands twice, Mr. St. John having bought it from the Hon. O. T. Maxwell.

The present proprietor came to Texas in 1877 and followed the profession of teaching until years ago, since which time he has been in the drug business. In 1902 he was elected Mayor of Cisco and has proven himself a most efficient officer. To his indefatigable efforts is due the formation of the County Club and other important measures. At present his energies are directed toward securing from the railway companies a more commodious Union Depot, with flattering prospects of ultimate success.

Mr. St. John is a prominent member of the Baptist Church, has a most excellent wife and seven children. **Dr. A. Owen**  
Born in Tennessee, Dr. Owen received his literary education at Athens College in that State. He came to Eastland County 20 years ago, and engaged in teaching. The next spring year he went back to his native state for helpmate and together they began to lay by the large property they enjoy to-day. The plan pursued was to put the salary received for teaching in land and cattle, and at that time

lots at City Hall. The dividing line between the two precincts is Daugherty Street. The polls open at 8 a.m. and close at 7 p.m.

Proposition No. 1 on the ballot will be an amendment to remove the present limit of five percent each on salaries of state workers (up to maximum of \$3600) which

they can put into the State retirement program. The State matches these funds. It would also change the method of calculating an employee's retirement benefits. The formula, experts say, will undoubtedly work out for higher benefits for all state employees.

Proposition No. 2 on the ballot concerns assistance to needy aged persons, needy blind persons and needy children under 16. It would change the State's contribution annually from the present \$42,000,000 to a maximum of \$47,000,000 annually.

Proposition No. 3 on the ballot if approved would create an agency to be known as The Texas Water Development Board. The Board would have authority to provide for, issue and sell \$100,000,000 general obligation bonds of the State of Texas. It further allows the Legislature by a two-thirds vote of the elected members of each House to authorize the Texas Water Development Board to issue additional bonds up to \$100,000,000.

These bonds cannot draw more than four percent interest per annum. The Amendment itself does not say they must be sold for par value, however; House Bill 161 does.

The funds made available from the sale of these general obligation bonds of the State could be used as loans to political subdivisions of Texas for water conservation and development. The Amendment doesn't say so but House Bill 161 does place a limit of money available to any one project of \$5,000,000 or one-third of the total cost of the project. If the amendment is passed, cities such as Eastland and Ranger, could gain loans to help build such lakes as Lake Leon, which the two cities constructed.

## Major Frank Hatten Wins Colonel's Wings In U. S. Air Force

Headquarters, United States Air Force, has announced that Frank Hatten, formerly of 809 Cherry Street, Ranger, Texas, has been promoted to Major. Major to Lieutenant Colonel.

Colonel Hatten is a squadron commander with the 463D Troop Carrier Wing, assigned to the 838th Air Division at Ardmore Air Force Base, Oklahoma. Flying Lockheed C-130 Hercules, the Air Force's first turbo-prop transport, Colonel Hatten's squadron was one of the first units in the Air Force to receive the revolutionary new aircraft that has brought a new era of global air mobility to Tactical Air Command and the U. S. Air Force.

The son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Ed Hatten, Lt. Col. Hatten is married to the former Fannie Adelle Swancy of Ranger. They have three children, Frances Ann, 20; Patricia Jane, 7; and Robert, age 5.

The Colonel attended high school in Eastland, Texas, and received his diploma in June of 1935. He later continued his education at the University of Texas, in Austin, where he received his BA with the class of 1950. At the time, he was on "Operation Bootstrap," a program set up by the Air Force which allows officers to complete their college education while members of the USAF.

A World War II veteran, Colonel Hatten flew 16 combat missions as a B-17 commander

with the 35th Bombardment Wing, stationed at Polebrook, England. Colonel Hatten was shot down while on his 17th bombing mission to Berlin. Captured by the German Army north of the Kiel Canal, Colonel Hatten was held as a prisoner of war from May 1944 to April 1945.

Five Oil Tries Are Staked In Eastland County  
Five new oil tries have been staked in Eastland County. The No. 1 Robert Fox is a regular field try staked by Robert Fox of Eastland. Location is 800 feet from the south line and 1400 feet from the west line of Lot 30, McLennan CSL Survey 2, eight miles southeast of Ranger on a 213-acre lease. Proposed depth is 1500 feet with cable tools.

I. J. Newlin of Cisco is drilling the No. 1 Albert A. Hansen as a regular field try four miles southwest of Nimrod. Location is 660 feet from the north and east lines of the Abraham Winfred 12 survey. Proposed depth is 3000 feet with rotary.

Eight miles north of Eastland on an 80-acre lease, John Halfhill of Abilene is drilling the No. 1 D. F. Williamson. Proposed depth is 2250 feet with rotary. Location is 2970 feet from the north line and 330 feet from the east line of Section 6, Block 4, H&TC survey.

A wildcat try is being drilled by J. E. Connally, et al, of Abilene 10 miles northwest of Rising/Star on a 160 1/2 acre lease. It is an east offset to a depleted 2776 feet producer, one-half mile northwest of a gas producer. Location is 330 feet from the south line and 1320 feet from the east line of Lot 10, Abraham Winfree Survey. Proposed depth is 2995 feet with rotary.

Paramount Oil, Inc. of Abilene has staked the No. 1 M. O. Proctor as a wildcat try. Location is 1690 feet from the north line and 230 feet from the west line of Section 41, Block 2, ETRR Survey, three miles northeast of Pioneer on a 142-acre lease. Proposed depth is 3400 feet with rotary.

Available for distribution at this time is flour, meal, cheese and milk. Place of distribution is the ground floor of the Masonic Building in Eastland, which is located across the street from the First Methodist Church.

Persons eligible to receive the surplus foods, but who cannot call for them in person, may send their cards by someone else, and this person can pick up the foods for them. Tuesday, all residents of Precinct 2 will pick up their foods. Wednesday is reserved for residents of Precinct 3, and Thursday for residents of Precinct 4.

## Five Day Drive to Raise \$6500 Begins

Eastland Tuesday morning will kick off the 1957 United Fund Drive. A breakfast will be held at 7 a.m. at the White Elephant restaurant, and then volunteer workers will go out to collect \$6500 for five participating agencies.

David Fry, this year's fund drive chairman, expressed confidence Saturday that the drive would again go over the top. He said the drive is well organized this year. "If everyone does his job we will complete the task in just a matter of days," he said. Fry has set Tuesday through Saturday as dates for the all out drive. This is the third year for United Fund here. In 1955 and 1956 the drive went over the top.

Agencies participating in the drive include the Boy Scouts, \$1800; the Red Cross, \$1750; the Y.M.C.A., \$1500; the Salvation Army, \$900; and the United Defense Fund, \$350.

John Goode, who spearheaded last year's successful campaign, will serve as breakfast chairman. Frank Sayre is chairman of the advance gifts campaign, James Smith is business chairman and Beta Sigma Phi sorority, with Mrs. A. G. Crosby in charge, will make the house to house canvass.

Smith has named five captains to aid the downtown campaign. They are Dr. Fehrmann Lund, Gene Rhodes, Everett Pionman, E. E. Layton and J. C. Poe. Each of the captains have named five workers. Advance work on separating cards has already been completed.

Fry pointed out that the five agencies which share in the United Fund would all have separate campaigns if it were not for the UF. He said money and time is saved by the one united effort. The Boy Scout drive alone took as many volunteer workers as does the UF.

All United Fund workers will carry identification and none will have to make many calls.

Charles Freyschlag, this year's United Fund president, put it this way: "We have five agencies which all do a good job. We in Eastland know the work of the Boy Scouts. We have three fine Scout troops here, a Den Pack and an Explorers group. In addition Eastland is fortunate to be headquarters for Troy Boone, scout executive.

"The Red Cross, of course, is just as familiar. Red Cross county headquarters is here. The Red Cross does so many different things, such as aiding our county servicemen, helping those in need and assisting when emergencies arise.

"The Y.M.C.A. is one of Eastland's proudest possessions. It's work with the teenage group has solved one of our city's basic problems.

"The Salvation Army also is another well known group. The Army maintains a county committee here. Hubert Westfall is presently chairman of the committee and he can tell you that the Army is always ready to lend a helping hand, just as they did during our recent flood.

"The United Defense Fund quota is small, but it is spent wisely to help entertain our servicemen."

Fry added, "Give generously, just this one time."

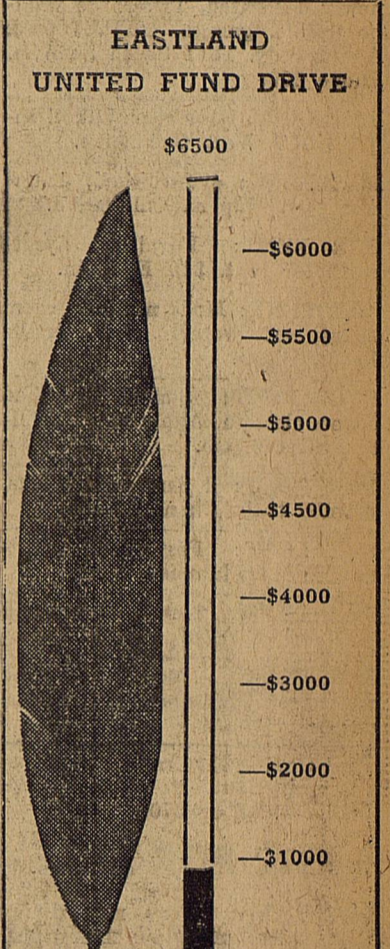

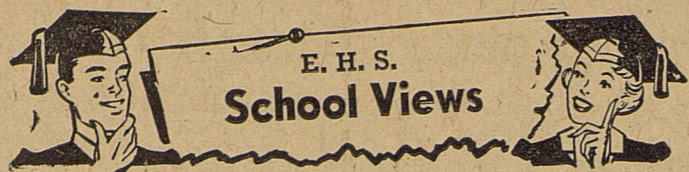

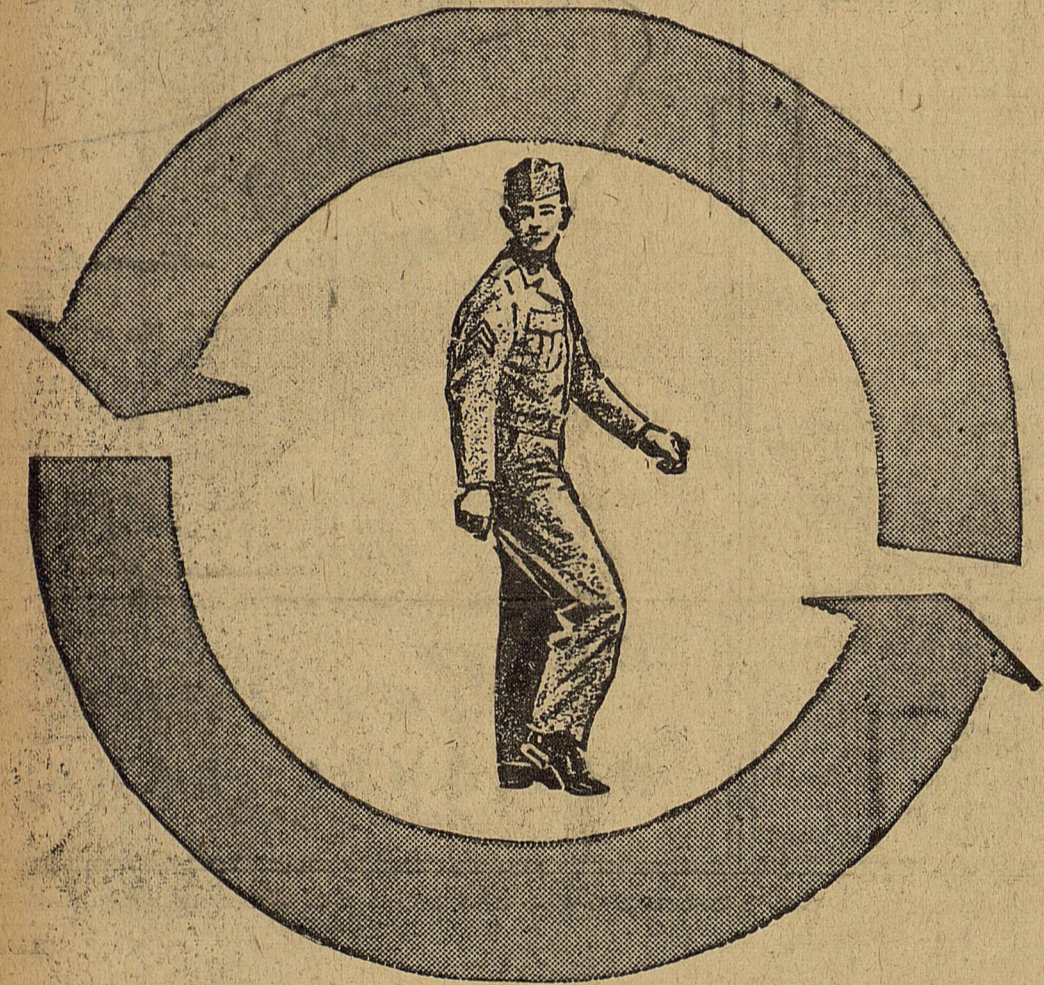
