Right off the bat, we ought to explain that there isn't any such word.

But if a word were to be made up to describe the fellow who worships success, any kind of success, attained by any means at all, that might be it.

Right now we are in danger of developing too many people of this type. We've all heard the kind of person who looks at Europe with popeyed wonder, and mutters to himself, "Gosh! You've really got to hand it to that fellow Hitler, don't you? He sure has put it over! He must have something!"

It is certainly true that the military accomplishments of Hitler's Germany, strictly as military accomplishments, are magnificent. He has developed a German army which no one has yet been able to resist.

Question: How worthy an object is that? How has that served the world and its people.

Question again: How was it done? At what cost, and by what means?

The answer is simple: By channeling an unheard-of percentage of the productive ability of the German people into building a military machine. By making every man a soldier and training him for periods of time and with a thoroughness which other nations were unwilling to adopt.

Only one punch stands between me and the champion ship, says Max Baer. He's right. And Joe Louis has got it.



Blanton Speaks To Eastland Voters Thursday

Thomas L. Blanton, for many years congressman from this district and who was defeated four years ago by Clyde L. Garrett, present incumbent, brought his candidacy for re-election to the voters of Eastland and Eastland county in an address from the south steps of the Eastland county courthouse Thursday night.

Gathered early on the courthouse lawn was a crowd that by the time the speaking began, had increased to such extent that it covered the entire south lawn and the broad street on the south side. Automobiles, in which people sat, were also parked on other adjoining streets about as far as one could easily hear the speaker, who used the usual loud speaking system.

The audience paid marked attention throughout the one and one-half hour address and frequently applauded the speaker.

Judge Blanton opened his address by stating that he was not after votes of Sam Russell, Otis Miller of Anson or Joe Shepherd

of Ranger, all candidates for the position he is seeking, but that he was after votes that Clyde Garrett took from him when he defeated him four years ago.

Briefly reviewing his services as district judge for a number of years of this district, Judge Blanton said that many of the best friends he had resided in Eastland county, and told his hearers that if any of them were not acquainted with his record he would be pleased to have them inquire of any citizen of the county that was here in those days.


Early in his address Judge Blanton went into Garrett's record in congress, stating that Garrett had clearly demonstrated that he was unqualified and offered as proof of this the statement that during the four years he has been in Washington, Garrett has never made a speech on the floor of the house. He also stated that the fact that Garrett, after four years, was on only one committee, that of Postoffices and Post Roads, showed that other members of congress did not rate him very highly and therefore placed him on one of the most, if not the most, unimportant committee in the house.

"If a member of congress is going to be of any service to his constituents, he must be able to make the necessary fights for them on the floor of the house and in the committee rooms," the speaker declared.

He then reviewed much of his long career as a member of the house and the things he accomplished for the people of his district. "I made my first speech as a new member of congress the first month I served," Judge Blanton said.

Calling the attention of his audience to the fact that Garrett voted against the Hatch clean politics bill, recently passed by Con-

gress, Judge Blanton asked, "Why did Clyde oppose this bill? Is he opposed to clean politics?"

"This is the most crucial period our country has ever experienced and now, of all times, you should have some one to represent you in congress that knows how from experience to take care of your best interest. If you believe I know how and believe I will look after your best interest, I want your support," the speaker said.

In reviewing his legislative record Judge Blanton reminded the women of his audience that at one time in the history of this state there were three classes of persons who could not vote and that these were convicts, lunatics and women, and that he made the fight in congress that by a margin of only one vote, got that body to pass a law taking the women of Texas out of the class with convicts and lunatics. "If you appreciate this let me have your vote in the coming primary," he urged.

Blanton told the farmers in his audience that he was opposed to many of the policies of Farm Administrator Wallace and that if he returned to congress he would put forth every effort to liberate the farmers so that they could run their own business without dictation from Washington.

"Until the manufacturers and others of that class are freed from





OLD AGE PENSIONS

7. I am in favor of a safe and sane old age pension policy. However, I am not in favor of building up in the minds of our people a false hope of securing any more than a just, equitable and adequate old age pension. I will at all times work untiringly for paying to them regularly and promptly an adequate old age pension. When the rest of our people are preparing to shoulder additional heavy tax burdens to make our army, navy and air force strong enough to guarantee our national safety, I know that our old people would not ask more than an adequate old age pension.

8. I am opposed to our country sending men to fight Europe's wars, but I favor sending England and her allies every material aid possible in the greatest amounts and at the earliest moment possible so long as it is consistent with the usages of international law.

However, I am not in favor of sacrificing our national honor in order to avoid war. Both my Grandfathers and my father ahead of me fought to preserve this nation of ours. I served in the World War, and I am not too old, but what I could go again if my country called me. I believe we can stay out of war, and I am in favor of such a policy, provided we can do so without losing our self respect and our national honor.

I am in favor of building up on this western hemisphere a sisterhood of nations that can make the rights of democracy inviolate in the face of old-world dictatorships.

9. It is my firm conviction that this country needs more than anything else is a good case of religion and a job to work at. If I am elected to congress, I shall seek to foster the kind of government that makes honest men and women of our people—not the kind of government that teaches its citizenship to seek to get something for nothing.

LOOSE SPENDING

10. I am opposed to the vicious doctrine now in vogue in our country that as long as the government is running a gravy train every town and community should sidetrack as many cars of gravy as it possibly can. This false theory of spending will bankrupt any nation. A nation is nothing more than an aggregation of individuals. An aggregation of individuals cannot violate the economic laws any more than a single individual can without paying the penalty.

I am in favor of the Federal government maintaining every service that is feasible and that pays real dividends, such as the CCC camps, soil and water conservation facilities, the farm program, yard sticks to measure public service utilities by, and all such dividend paying services. However, I am strictly opposed to pouring money into swimming pools, golf courses, and such like folderols. Not many people play golf as compared to the taxpayers soaked for such government luxuries, and a swimming pool is used about three months out of the year.

I am in favor of taking such funds, if they are to be spent anyhow, and putting them into the funds now being used to buy farms for jobless people—loans, if you please, that will be paid back.

AMERICAN LOYALTY

11. I have always held to the view that I owed my government my loyalty, my allegiance, and my best effort. I have never held to the view that my government owed me anything but police protection and the preservation of my rights and liberties.

I am opposed to asking too much of the government and giving too little in return.

I am opposed to the government doing what it should rightfully do, but I am unalterably and eternally opposed to the government poking its nose into the very life and everyday business of the people. This should be left to the local and state governments. Let the Federal government stay within its sphere and scope of authority.

Good statesmanship would demand that any spending we might be able to do over and beyond the new preparedness program should go for new military highways, improved air landing fields, interior waterways, flood control and similar lasting benefits.

FOREIGN POLICY

12. I favor a foreign policy in which the Congress, the President, the State Department and the People all have a part. In past years, the people have seldom, if ever, been taken into the confidence of Congress, the President, or the State Department when questions of foreign policy have been under consideration.

Consequently, there have been times in our national history when the people were not prepared to follow the Congress, the President and the State Department because of this lack of understanding of our foreign policy.

I favor an immediate and nationwide campaign to sell the American people on the idea of a Western Hemisphere politically and economically united for permanent peace and trade. Unless we do this AT ONCE it may be too late. Germany and Italy already have a dangerous foothold in South America because of their several million Nationals living there. We must, in deed and in truth become neighbors to our sister South American peoples. Americans should travel in South America and encourage South American travel in the United States. We must build highways across the Western Hemisphere to make travel and communication easy. We must become as it were one people politically and economically. Our oceans may protect us from European invasion and territorial aggression, but they cannot stop the economic invasion that is bound to come with peace in Europe. We must stop that by welding the Americas of the Western World into a political and economic unit that will withstand any assault from the dictator nations of Europe.

BRUCE CATTON IN WASHINGTON

ANTI-TRUST ACTION ROLLING DESPITE RUMORS
ARNOLD WOULD RELAX DURING DEFENSE DRIVE

WASHINGTON. — Despite a strong crop of rumors, there is as yet no sign the administration will relax the anti-trust laws to speed up production of goods for the defense program.

On the contrary, a federal grand jury in New York is just starting a broad investigation into the production of some items most vital to the army and navy program.

The rumors come mostly from a feeling that industries in the defense program may have formed combinations which might later be prosecuted under the anti-trust laws. The famous Madison oil case is cited: there the oil men claimed they were only doing what the government had urged them to do under NRA. It is beginning to be argued in some quarters that the anti-trust laws operate as a "business deterrent" to all defense production.

So far no administration pressure has been put on Attorney General Jackson or Assistant Attorney General Arnold, who heads the anti-trust division. Arnold some weeks ago defined the division's stand: national defense needs are paramount, and there'll be no anti-trust prosecution for any combination which either the War or Navy Department states in advance is necessary to meet those needs. To date, neither department has filed any such statement.

To which you might add that no group which is unable to get such a declaration from army or navy chiefs is likely to get any favors from the anti-trust division. Arnold is going right ahead; he won't pull his punches, and he won't resign. If the administration

decides to restore the NRA system officially, it will have to fire him ... and in an election year it isn't likely to do anything of the kind.

LOSES HELP
OF G-MEN

MEANWHILE, despite a shortage of funds, the anti-trust division is going ahead with plans for a broad investigation into food distribution costs. It has preliminary inquiries under way in New York, Chicago, and Philadelphia, and if Arnold can solve the problem of lack of personnel he hopes to put on a show as spectacular and far-reaching as his famous building costs investigation.

His chief handicap right now is the espionage and fifth column scare. He had been getting important help from agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation; lately, however, J. Edgar Hoover has had to call most of his G-men back and put them onto anti-spy work. Result is that the anti-trust division is woefully short-handed: its New York food costs study, for instance, is currently being carried on by two men.

"GERMAN DIET"
ON THE WAY?

ARNOLD maintains that unless food costs can be brought down the nation is likely to find itself on something resembling a "German diet" before long. He talks of "breaking the log jam between the farm and the table," and wants a grand jury study of all of the restraints between farmer and consumer.

The farmer's share of the consumer's dollar, he asserts, has dropped from 50 per cent to 30 per cent. Milk for which the farmer gets from 3 to 5 cents a quart, he says, may cost the consumer from 12 to 14 cents; the consumer's dollar's worth of potatoes may have brought the farmer only 30 cents, his dollar's worth of fruit may have netted the farmer a quarter, and the meat for which he pays 30 or 40 cents a pound may have meant but 5 or 6 cents a pound to the farmer.


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
