Wild game should be cooked according to the type of cut and age of the animal. Standard methds of cooking beef and lamb are uccessful for venison and ante-

For tender cuts, such as loin and shoulder, use dry heat. Season the meat with salt and pepper and place on a rack in an uncovered

as bacon may be added to venison i 360 degrees F. allowing 25 to 30 minutes per pound. If the meat is frozen, a longer time will be and dried. If the odor persists, needed for cooking.

heat the frying pan until it is sizzling hot. Brown both sides of the meat, turning only once. Season until air in the room is dry. when ready to turn. For thick steaks or chops, reduce heat after browning to finish cooking. Insert a rack under the meat to prevent over-cooking the meat next to the pan.

Steaks, chops or ground meat patties may be broiled on a hot, s very lean, brush with fat. When with a program. it is brown enough, season a n d turn. Reduce the heat and cook until done.

Less tender cuts, such as flank, round, rump, or shortribs, can be nade tasty by braising. The first step by this method is to brown the meat slowly on all sides in a heavy utensil. 



1/4 teaspoon salt 2 cups commercially prepared eggnog

1 can (29 ounces) fruit cockatail, thoroughly drained 1 baked 9-inch pie shell

Mix gelatine, sugar and salt. Gradually stir in eggnog. Warm over direct low heat until gelatine is dissolved. Chill until mixture mounds when dropped from spoon. Fold in whipped cream, flavorings, 1½ cups drained fruit cocktail. Chill again until mixture mounds. Heap into baked pie shell. Decorate with remaining fruit cocktail. Chill 2 to 4 hours. YIELD: 1 9-inch pie.
