Cisco Jobs to Be Available For Operators

Eastland telephone operators will be given an opportunity to work at Cisco when this city's telephone exchange is switched over to dial, W. H. McAnnally, district manager of Southwestern Bell Telephone Co., said Monday in a talk before the Eastland Rotary Club.

"We have room for these girls in Cisco," he said, adding that "they can still live here."

McAnnally also revealed that Cisco long distance operators will probably take over part of Eastland's long distance calls late in March. And he also announced

another step-back in Eastland's planned swing-over to dial. Originally slated for October of this year the conversion was moved back to Jan. 1959. McAnnally said Monday the tentative date is now July, 1959. He urged a reporter present to remember he used the word "tentative," adding the date could be moved up or back.

The district manager, who was introduced by Taylor Smith, told Rotarians that Eastland's first telephone exchange was built in 1907 by G. W. Bishop. Bell Telephone Co. purchased the exchange in 1919 from Frank Crawford and Co. At that time there were 257 phones in use here. Ten years later that number had jumped to more than 1000. Then it dropped to 607 in 1940, but rose again to 1463 in 1950 and then to 1846 in 1957.

McAnnally said the reason for Eastland's delay in getting dial is that other towns which have shown sudden growth needed new equipment immediately. Present equipment is sufficient to handle service here, he stated. Plans call for building a new building here to install the dial equipment in.

In five years, the speaker said, Eastlanders will probably be dialing their own long distance numbers.

Roy Leslie Branter Jr. of Pearlman was rushed to Ranger General Hospital following the mishap, and attendants said he suffered chest injuries and numerous cuts and bruises. He was released Monday morning.

Damages High After Wreck Of Truck On 80

An estimated \$15,000 damage resulted from a truck crash on U. S. Highway 80 Sunday morning and the driver of the truck was hospitalized.

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"This is in reply to your telephone complaint of 9 January 1958 relative to an excessive aircraft noise incident in the vicinity of your home at approximately 10:15 AM.

"The purpose of this letter is to appraise you of the results of our investigation. First, let me state that there are no aircraft based at Dyess Air Force Base capable of exceeding the sound barrier and producing a noise commonly known as a "sonic boom". Your description of the noise indicates that this was the case, therefore a Dyess aircraft could not have been involved.

"Upon receiving your call, a review of inbound and outbound transient aircraft traffic to Dyess Air Force Base was instituted. This investigation did not reveal any aircraft traffic of the type capable of a "sonic boom", arriving or departing Dyess during the period in question.

"The United States Air Force is extremely interested in eliminating disturbances that cause adverse public relations. Reports such as your receive great attention and strenuous efforts are made to determine whether or not such an incident could be caused by an Air Force aircraft. To help in investigations of these incidents, a need exists for all of the information that a witness can provide; time and place, description of aircraft, direction of flight and accurate description of the noise.

"We are certain from the description you gave of this incident that none of our aircraft were involved. However, this base does not have knowledge of all the aircraft that are flying in our vicinity. The agency in primary control of military air traffic in this area is Carswell Flight Service. Because of this fact they are in a better position to answer your query, and can be contacted at Fort Worth, Texas, telephone Pershing 77251 or Pershing 77252.

"We regret that we are unable to assist in determining further the source of disturbance."

Lake Leon Road Is Back Before Court

Extra State Money Sought By Backers

Representatives for the Ranger and Eastland chambers of commerce Monday got their first help out of the county commissioners' court in their efforts to complete the road around the lake.

The delegation, headed by Virgil Seaberry Jr., asked only that the court ask the State Highway Commission if any extra funds would be available in 1958 to construct some four miles of highway which would complete the route and give Staff community citizens an above-floodstage road.

The court agreed to write such a letter asking if an appropriation "over and above the 1958 program" would be available. They also included in the letter a statement which asked that any such grant not interfere with present or future farm-market road appropriations for this county.

The delegation has previously appeared before the State Commission and gained "favorable response." It is not known if extra money will be available but one

delegate summed up the chambers' feelings, saying, "It certainly will not hurt to ask."

The court unanimously passed the resolution to send such a letter, after assurances that it would not mean that they were giving any priority to the road.

Commissioners also paid monthly bills and voted to proceed in a condemnation procedure against a property holder along the new routing of F-M Road 2214.

Virtually every Southern Baptist church in Texas will be represented at the three-day meeting. Purpose of the conference is to inspire both church members and pastors toward greater efforts in soul winning. Sessions are being held in the Dallas Memorial Coliseum and the First Baptist Church of Dallas.

A special feature of the conference, said Dr. C. Wade Freeman, Texas Baptist superintendent of evangelism, will be a series of laymen's clinics in soul winning.

Directed by L. H. Tapscott, Texas Baptist Brotherhood secretary, the clinics will include soul winning demonstrations, discussion periods and personal testimonies.

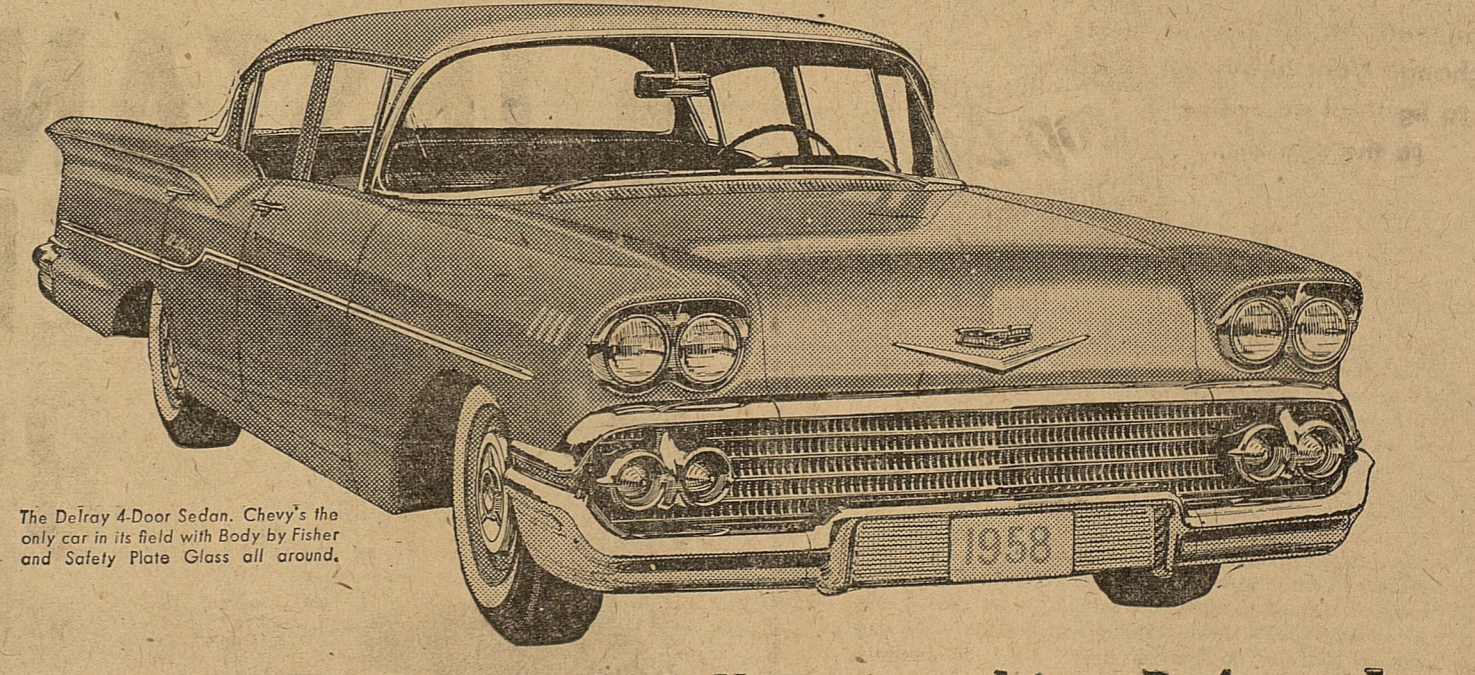

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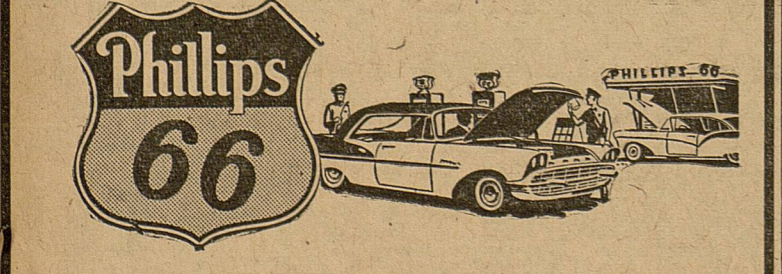
