#### WEST MAIN STREET STORE CHANGES OWNER

Moldave & Wolf Are Purchasers and Lease It For One of the Clarence Saunders Chain Stores.  
The real estate and brick store building at 308 West Main Street occupied for the last several years by the Knight Printing Company, has been bought by Moldave & Wolf from Ed Parsons et al. The consideration has not yet been stated. Mr. Wolf said this morning that the deal had been negotiated and as soon as they obtained possession, which would be within a short time, the building would be renovated, perhaps a few minor changes made, and it would then be occupied by one of the Clarence Saunders "Sole-Owner-of-My-Own-Name" stores. Mr. Wolf also stated that the adjoining building, formerly occupied by the Blue Ribbon Bakery, had not yet been rented, but that the building beyond that, formerly occupied by the J. H. Harrison grocery, has been leased to the Murray Drug Store. This building adjoins the postoffice. These two buildings were bought by Moldave & Wolf several months ago. It is not yet announced where the Knight Printing Company will move its shop.

#### FINE PRODUCER BROUGHT IN AT GORDON POOL

Belva Oil Company Gets Well Flowing 285 Barrels Oil Daily, and 2,000,000 Feet Gas.

A splendid well was drilled in last night in the Gordon pool northwest of Eastland, by the Belva Oil company of Eastland. The No. 4 on the Good and Beggs lease is flowing 285 barrels of oil and is making 2,000,000 feet of gas from the Bond sand. This lease has proved one of the finest developed in the pool that was discovered almost two years ago. The No. 1 of the Belva came in for 750 barrels and is still making 150 barrels a day after having been in for 18 months. This producer is probably the finest in the pool on the basis of long-time, sustained output. The No. 2 came in for 200 barrels and is holding up well. Both these wells are producing from the Bond. The No. 3—which went on down to the Ranger sand—was the biggest of all on flush production—800 barrels a day.

#### EARTHQUAKE IS VIOLENT BUT DOES NO HARM

Occurs In Gulf Off Vera Cruz, So Only Its Distant Tremors Are Felt On Shore.

NEW YORK, Oct. 9.—A severe earthquake which was felt in 9 states of Mexico and which probably would have proved disastrous had it centered on land, was recorded here last night. The center of the quake was placed by the Rev. John Tyan, of Fordham University here, as in the Gulf off Vera Cruz. The distance was estimated at 1924 miles from New York. So intense were the tremors that they were recorded as far away as central Europe. United Press advices from Mexico City said the quake shook down several walls there, but only one person was reported injured.

#### News Writer Is Told By French Officials To Leave

PARIS, France, Oct. 9.—Harold Horan, Paris correspondent of the Universal News Service, faced today the necessity of leaving France as an undesirable alien by Thursday, after complaint by the government that he published a secret document from the archives of the ministry of foreign affairs. Horan was summoned to police headquarters and questioned at length regarding the means by which he obtained a letter Foreign Minister Briand had sent to American ambassador in Paris containing instructions about interpretation of the secret French-British naval pact, which aroused resentment in the United States. Horan complained today that he was detained for three hours at headquarters and that permission was refused for him to summon a lawyer or communicate with the American embassy. Presented with the choice of signing a paper by which he agreed to leave France by Thursday afternoon or face prosecution on the charge of publishing a secret document, Horan said he signed the paper.

#### TEXAS COTTON CROP 58 PER CENT NORMAL

Total Yield of 5,050,000 Bales Of 500 Pounds Off 17,631,000 Acres Estimate This Year.

AUSTIN, Oct. 9.—A cotton crop of 5,050,000 gross weight bales of 500 pounds each is indicated by the Oct. 1 condition in Texas, which is 58 per cent of normal, H. H. Schultz, statistician of the United States department of agriculture in Austin, announced here today. This represents an average yield of 137 pounds of lint upon the 17,631,000 acres remaining for harvest. "In the south-east and south-east districts, which represent 25 per cent of the production of the state this year, three-fourths of the crop had been ginned prior to Oct. 1. Central Texas, which will produce hardly more than these three districts combined, has ginned somewhat more than one-half.

Picking is further advanced in the northeast than in the north district and in the west it is well started. The Oct. 1 reported condition of 64.4 per cent of normal indicates a United States crop of 13,993,000 bales. Upon the 44,916,000 for harvest, an average yield of 149 1-10 pounds of lint cotton per acre is indicated, which compares 154 5-10 in 1927 and a 10-year average of 156 3-10 pounds.

#### Sports Writer In Breckenridge Praises Mavericks

Tribute is paid to the Eastland team by Wes o'Hedges, sports writer in the Breckenridge American: "To the victors go the spoils, but to some losers goes some praise. Now the Mavericks suffered one of the greatest defeats they ever had administered to them here this past week-end, but they bore it proudly. In the first place, the Mavericks were doped to lose. They have a very young and light team. Captain King is about the only two year man they have. Their reserve strength was scarce. When a man was hurt Friday, he almost had to bare one, if there was no one to take his place. "No team ever put up a better brand of real fight than they did—from the first whistle until the last, they were fighting, although crippled, everyone. Captain King fought like a veteran warrior—155 pounder, Daniels at his side was noticeable. Then there was little Smith, 130 pound quarterback, who played so hard and took so many bumps that he could hardly walk off the field. They were at least not quitters. "Eastland will remember this defeat, and we will get hooked good and hard some day."

#### BULLDOGS TO PLAY SATURDAY IN EASTLAND

Mavericks Expect A Hard Game. Brownwood To Play In Cisco.

Two conference games will hold the center of the stage this week. In the meantime, fans are hoping that the July brand of weather that has nipped the State up to the present time will give way, before Friday, to the kind of climate that usually is in evidence in the middle of October. A cool, crisp day adds vastly to the speed of the game and to the comfort of the spectators. Ranger will invade Eastland in a conference struggle and Brownwood will go to Cisco for an official game. On the face of past performances, impartial critics might choose the Bulldogs as victors in the first game and the Lobos as a cinch to win in the other combat. But football is not always decided that way. One team—that is, naturally strong—may play sluggishly, carelessly, while the weaker eleven may start with fire and rush and put over a touchdown or two before the opposition realizes what has hit them. For instance, if Ranger plays against Eastland as the Bulldogs did last Thursday against Winters, the Mavericks may prove a surprise. Winters is a Class B school, has only three letter men and was greatly outweighted by Ranger. Yet at the end of the third quarter the Bulldogs were barely ahead, 6 to 0. Eastland was defeated by the Breckenridge team last week. But the Buckaroos have the heaviest line in the district and have ample reserves. Furthermore, Breckenridge had "pointed" for that game and was all set to play its best. For three seasons, the Buckaroos had opened the season against Eastland—and the Mavericks had been a hurdle they could never jump. They were keyed up to beat Eastland this time and they did. But because the Mavericks lost last week does not mean that they may not start on a winning streak. Defects in their play will be ironed out by Coach Gibson during the intervening week and Ranger will face a much-improved team. For one thing, Ranger is going to receive a thorough test on ability of the Maroon and White to defend against passes, for Connie Smith, tiny Maverick quarterback, is one of the best passers in the district and the Mavericks have ends and backfield men who can catch 'em. Brownwood Lions are full of pep after their 25 to 0 victory over Brady, Cisco, on the other hand, will doubtless let down after the Lobo win over the powerful El Paso club last week. Consequently, the Brownwood-Cisco affair may prove to be a pretty good game.

#### RAIDERS SEEK GAMBLERS AND BOOTLEGGERS

Federal Officers and Texas Rangers Trying To Protect Legionnaires Meeting In San Antonio.

SAN ANTONIO, Oct. 9.—Federal agents and Texas Rangers took steps today to curb gambling and the flow of liquor here during the American Legion convention. The city had been wide open to legionnaires until four Rangers threw a scare into gambling when they raided the St. Anthony hotel and closed the gambling rooms which had been doing a flourishing business since the convention opened. All gambling paraphernalia was seized. The raid came, however, just a few minutes after professional gamblers had ceased and departed. Local police had been giving the doughboys freedom of the city. Police sought professional gamblers upon the complaint of Earnest Walsh of New York City a delegate to the convention, who said he was cheated out of \$600 in a hotel dice game. Federal agents arrested 17 men and seized a hundred barrels of liquor in raids in an effort to curb the large flow coming into the city. Among those arrested was Alfred Street, son of the late chief of detectives, Sam Street, and until a week ago a motorcycle policeman. He was charged with violating the federal prohibition laws. #### DOUBLE DEATH AT BEAUMONT IS UNEXPLAINED

Aged Man Kills Middle-Aged Priest, Then Shoots and Kills Himself.

BEAUMONT, Oct. 9.—Still groping for a motive to the slaying here Monday, of Father Anthony de Simone, Roman Catholic priest, and John Rose, curio shop proprietor, police today held one theory which linked the name Benito Mussolini, Italy's strong man, with the double tragedy. There seems to be no doubt that Rose, 70, killed the priest, who was 54, and then took his own life. This theory seemed sealed early today with identification of the pistol found near Rose's body as having been in his possession for some time. The pistol was lying near the outstretched hand in the library of the priest's home where the bodies of the two men were found after two shots had been fired. The Jefferson county grand jury is delving into the case.

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#### Poison Liquor Gets Many Victims In New York City

NEW YORK, Oct. 9.—The body of an unidentified man found sprawled in an east side doorway at dawn today, brought to 33 the number of persons who have died from poison liquor since Saturday night. Out of the mile and a half strip in the heart of New York's waterfront, has come a flood of undiluted wood alcohol, which has made the last three days rival New Year's eve in liquor fatalities.

#### AUSTIN CHIEF OF POLICE IS SHOT TO DEATH

Alleged Crazy Negro In the State Capital Kills Two Women and Two Men, Then Is Killed.

AUSTIN, Oct. 9.—Chief of Police J. N. Littlepage was fatally wounded this morning when he attempted to arrest a supposedly demented negro, who had shot two negro women in South Austin. Littlepage was shot down with buck shot from a double barrel shotgun. Littlepage died in the emergency hospital shortly after noon from the negro's bullets. Besides Littlepage, the negro shot and killed Joe Blum, a white man, and two negro women. After shooting Littlepage, the negro pursued by a posse of officers, was shot and killed. Police said the negro's name was Alexander. Identity of the two negro women killed by Alexander has not yet been fully established.

#### NEW METHOD OF PRESERVING FRUIT DEVISED

Keeps It In Virtually Same Ripe Condition As When It Is Picked.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa.—A new method of preserving fruit, through which it is believed possible to keep it for long periods in practically the same ripe condition as when it is picked, has been demonstrated here. The process makes use of nitrogen, and was developed by Thomas F. MacGregor, who has been experimenting with the method in company with Robert J. Reagan. The process was demonstrated before members of the Franklin Institute here, and fruit packed in the new way has been set aside to be opened for inspection next month. In the demonstration fresh peaches were placed in wax paper which was inserted in large tin cylinders. Pumps extracted all the air from the containers and then nitrogen was forced through a small hole in the can. The containers were filled with nitrogen, and then sealed. Farmers who witnessed the demonstration anticipate a time when "seasonal" fruits will be available in their natural state all the year. This, they said, would aid greatly in solving the marketing problem which results from heavy supplies at certain periods and a lack of supply at others.

#### SOUTH POLE EXPEDITION READY TO GO

Start Will Be Made Wednesday From Los Angeles Harbor, Where Ship Arrived Today.

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 9.—The whaler E. A. Larsen arrived at Los Angeles harbor today, and by noon tomorrow it will be under way for the south pole with the expedition of Commander Richard Byrd. Byrd was reported completely recovered from his recent illness and the entire Antarctic caravan in condition to proceed as soon as supplies were loaded on the Larsen. The supplies include four airplanes, each equipped with aerial matting. Three other vessels, the Elanor Bolling, which was named after Byrd's mother, the City of New York, and the Ross, will converge at New Zealand to escort the Larsen and offer whatever assistance possible to aid in the attempt to conquer the antarctic. The vessels will serve as "mother ships," assisting the expedition in breaking through the ice floes when they reach the frozen bay of Whales. During the course of the expedition thousands of miles of unknown territory will be explored.

#### Cardinals Leading Yanks At Start of Seventh Inning

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 9.—The Cardinals appeared to have a fair chance of winning the fourth game of the world series at 5:10 o'clock today, when the score stood 2 to 1 in favor of the St. Louis Nationals in the first half of the seventh inning. The Cardinals made the first run today. In the first half of the third inning Babe Ruth knocked a home run and the Yanks, having evened the score, felt safer, but soon afterwards the Cardinals scored again. Both teams were playing hard and fast throughout the game.

#### Radical Textile Committee Would Continue Strike

NEW BEDFORD, Mass., Oct. 9.—Thirteen arrests were made here today when 35 policemen descended upon the headquarters of the so-called radical textile committee. It was this committee which opposed the ending of the New Bedford textile strike last Saturday and subsequently threatened to meet the police "blow for blow."

#### Navy Dirigible Heads Northward

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NEW YORK OBJECTS.

The largest city in the United States strongly resents being held up to the rest of the nation as America's most wicked and lawless city. The World says:

"Mayor Walker has an indisputable right to resent the statement of Mrs. Mabel Willebrandt, assistant attorney general of the United States, that New York city is the 'worst' of the 'wicked' sections' that oppose prohibition, and that it is ruled by Tammany, 'an organization that for underworld connections and political efficiency is matched no place else in America.' Such remarks may be hailed with applause in Oklahoma. But they are demagogic, grossly unjust, demonstrably untrue. They were made in an attempt to excuse the singling out of New York city as the scene of a sensational intensive enforcement drive in the course of which Mrs. Willebrandt's policy was disapproved by the able United States attorney of the district.

"We submit that there are three great American cities, republican in political faith, concerning which such remarks would be more appropriate. Naturally, Philadelphia would be on the list. There the grand jury has just reported a 'direct connection between certain members of the police force and a well-organized group of persistent offenders' and upon its advice Mayor Mackey has suspended from his duties Charles C. Beckman, until now captain of detectives.

"The presence in any community of 'desperate men, defiant even of the fundamental rules under which our citizens live,' as the Philadelphia grand jury puts it, is roughly indicated by the homicide rate per 100,000 of the population. The same figures are in these days a pretty accurate index of the activity of illicit dealers in liquor, since so large a percentage of homicides is attributable to gang warfare over bootlegging territory and privileges. The homicide rate in New York city in 1926, reported by Dr. Frederick L. Hoffman, consulting statistician of the Prudential Insurance company, was 5.7. The homicide rate in Philadelphia in the same year was 8.6. Both rates are much too high, but the advantage in the matter of 'desperate men' does not seem to lie with Philadelphia.

"Chicago is a republican city. Its murder rate in 1926 was 16.7, three times as great as in New York city; and that rate apparently has not declined in recent months. Practically all the murders most characteristic of Chicago—the planned and deliberate slayings of gangsters by rival gangsters—are attributed to bootleg rivalries.

"Detroit is a republican city. Its territory across a narrow strait to the west of the city is the wettest territory in the United States. Its mayor refuses to direct its police force to neglect other duties to specialize in liquor law enforcement. The 1926 homicide rate in Detroit was 25.3, more than four times that of New York city. And again, as in Chicago and Philadelphia, the bootleg gangs were responsible for a liberal share in piling up such a shocking rate.

"For Mrs. Willebrandt's information—if she is really ignorant of facts so easily obtainable—we would emphasize that in no respect need New York city shrink from comparison with the towns we have named. Under a board of estimate only half of whose members are Tammany men it has what is in effect commission government, much improved of late and far superior to that of either Philadelphia or Chicago. It has one of the lowest death rates among the great cities of the world, a tribute not more to its

health department than to the steady habits and normal right living of its excellent and intelligent people. Its citizens are public-spirited and generous; its museums, parks, libraries, universities are famous.

"In every respect New York is a good city and a good city to live in—in every respect but one, as orators of the Willebrandt school view it. It is a democratic city. That makes it a 'wicked' city.' That entitles it to intensive liquor raids engineered from Washington while wester towns of republican leanings go scathless."

Family Menu

BY SISTER MARY BREAKFAST—Baked peas, cereals, cream, broiled tripe, creamed potatoes, crisp toast, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Baked oyster and potato sandwiches, cabbage and celery salad, brown bread and butter sandwiches, pompadour pudding, milk, tea.

DINNER—Baked pork tenderloin, twice baked sweet potatoes, fried apples, spinach and tomato salad, peach cobbler, milk, coffee. The fried apples are cooked in just enough butter to prevent burning and are not really "fried" at all. They can be cut in sectional slices or across the fruit, making rings when the cores are removed. Choose a tender skinned apple and do not pare. Season lightly with sugar and cook in a frying pan, closely covered over a moderate fire.

Baked Oyster and Potato Sandwiches

Two cups hot mashed potato, 2 tablespoons butter, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 1-4 teaspoon pepper, 1 egg, 2 tablespoons milk, oysters.

Add butter, salt and pepper and egg beaten with milk to hot mashed potato. Form into small flat cakes about 2 inches in diameter and one-half inch thick. Put oysters dry between cloths and put one on half of the potato cakes. Cover with remaining cakes and bake on a buttered pan in a hot oven until the potato browns. Serve at once.

Recognized by the National Automobile Chamber of Commerce and the Automotive Equipment Association, the Dallas clinic is the only one of its kind to be held this year in the South, although similar clinics will be held later at New York, Chicago and other large Northern and Eastern cities.

The Dallas State Fair clinic is being sponsored by three Dallas A. E. A. automotive equipment wholesalers, the Automotive Appliance Company, the Ferris-Simpson Company and The Schoelkopf Company. It includes the exhibits of twenty-five leading manufacturers of automotive maintenance tools and equipment. Presiding over each exhibit is a factory trained specialist sent to Dallas for the occasion to explain and demonstrate the uses to which the equipment may be put in the garage, repair shop or service station. These highly trained men are experts in modern methods of shop efficiency and service merchandising and are available to men engaged in the servicing of motor vehicles for consultation and advice. Individual problems in the profitable operation of a maintenance shop can be brought to these specialists with entire freedom.

With a widespread awakening to the fact that more life is being built into motor vehicles, but which can be profited from only through adequate preventive maintenance, the public at large, as well as the automotive men, is displaying a keen interest in the maintenance clinic. GOLF COURSE BUILT IN FRANCE AT HIGH ALTITUDE

By United Press. PARIS.—Europe's highest golf club has just been created at Font-Romeau, in the Haute-Pyrenees, and its managers are boasting that it is somewhat above 2,000 metres altitude. This does not compare quite with the famous club at Bogota, at 2,600 metre altitude, but the European physicians say the atmosphere at Font-Romeau will be found perfect by golfers.

Font-Romeau has been growing in prominence as an all-year-round inland resort. In the summer months there are a score of hot springs and mineral cures in the valleys below, while in the winter the opportunities for ice sports rival even those of Switzerland. From November 1 to March 1, there are not only permanent sledding and skiing, but for hockey players there are an abundance of large lakes near the mountain tops which are covered throughout the season with amazingly hard and clear ice.

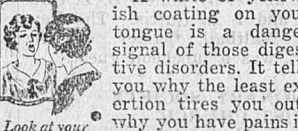

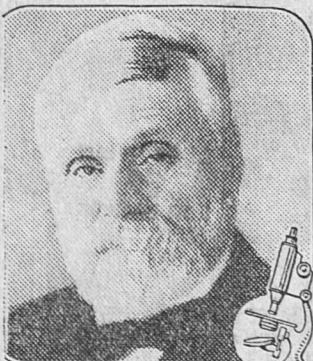

club, but New Yorkers have been taught to believe that McGraw is the Giant ball club.

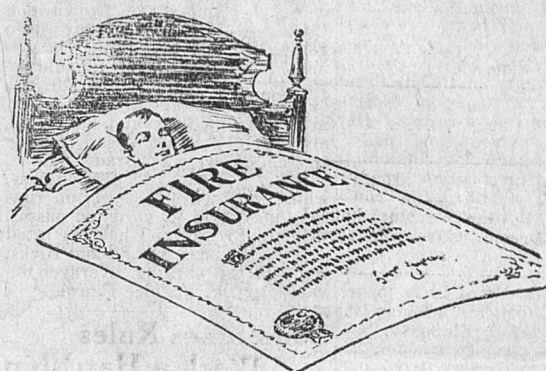

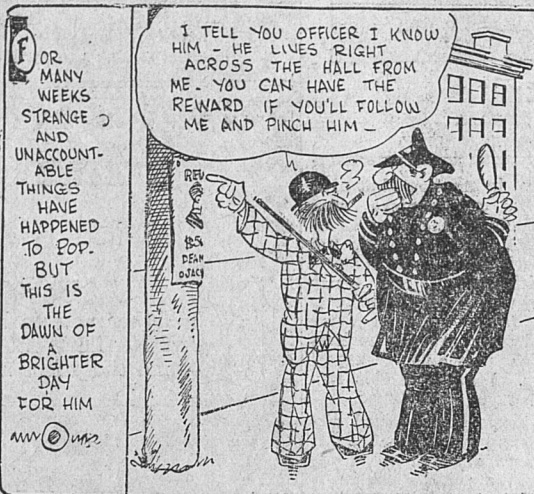

He got off a great punt for 65 yards out of bounds on the Navy's two-yard line. When Navy endeavored to kick, the punt was blocked and Davis-Elkins scored the safety. The week before defeating the Navy, Davis-Elkins trounced the strong West Virginia university eleven.

The Southwest is still thrilled at the thought of the great fight put up by S. M. U. Saturday against the famous Army team. The Mustangs, defeated by a single point, had half a dozen chances to win. They failed to kick a field goal. Hopper fell down after catching a pass with no one in front of him and the goal line. Another Mustang dropped a pass with a clear field. And as the game closed, after a series of brilliant passes, the exhausted Reed fell af-

ter catching one when if he could have kept to his feet he would have scored. Which may sound like ragged football—but it's not. It simply shows how hard-fought the game was and due allowance should be made for the strain that players are under in such an historic battle.

By proving themselves virtually the equals of the Army, S. M. U. demonstrated to the East that football in the Southwest must be accorded far greater recognition

than in the past. The aerial game of Morrison's men was a revelation to that section.

The long trip doubtless handicapped the Texans at least enough to account for a one-point margin. If that game had been played in Dallas Saturday—with a temperature of 90—the behemoths of the Army would have staggered and reeled and the Mustangs, accustomed to the climate, would have won by 30 points—just as they did over Missouri last year.

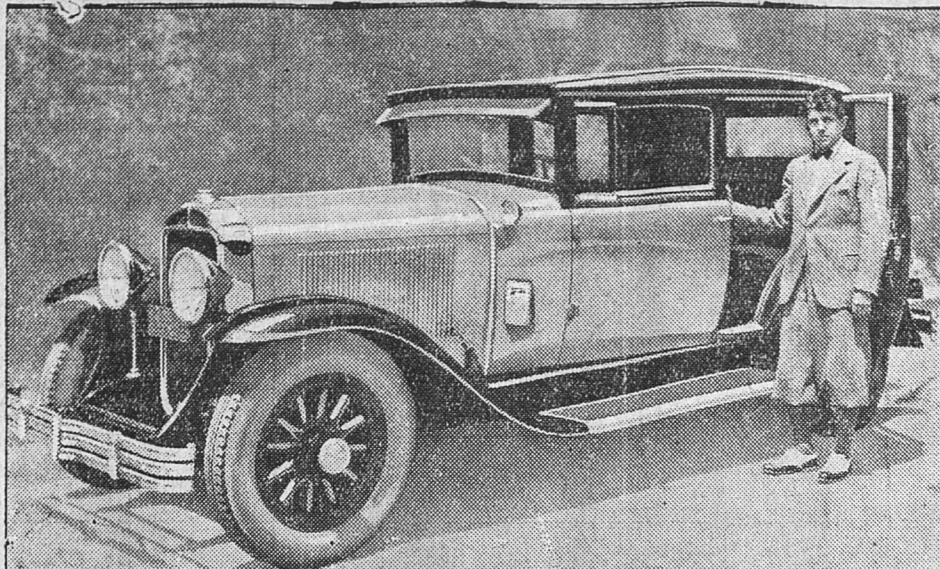
### OCEAN FLIGHTS EXPENSIVE FOR SHIPPING LINES

Searching and Extra Watch For Aviators Cost One Boat \$14,000 Daily.

By United Press. LONDON.—Searching for lost trans-Atlantic flyers has become an important item in the expense of operating ocean liners. Even when a flight is successful, ships along the route taken by the aviators are obliged to provide an extra watch and to communicate the position of any plane sighted. This is cheerfully done, of course, and ships are diverted from their courses just as cheerfully when the word is received that a plane has been lost. But the expense to the shipping companies is far greater

than the layman would imagine. If a liner spends one day seeking a lost airplane, the shipping company must bear at least the following loss: One day's extra pay for the crew; one day's extra food for passengers; fuel for one extra day; one day lost in port before the return sailing. Then, too, passengers may miss connections in port or suffer business losses; the officers and crew are forced to work under nervous tension during the search and in attempting to regain lost time after the ship's course is resumed. Officials of shipping companies do not complain of this extra expense. Saving lives is part of the tradition of the sea. There is no thought of compensation. A remuneration for the captain or a donation for the crew of a liner may be made in all sincerity, but it is nothing compared with the expense of a rescue. Many ships which leave their courses too late to be of service are not even mentioned when the newspapers tell their thrilling story of what the aviators thought

The first ship on the scene will advise the others if their help is not needed. "Suppose that the Leviathan, with 1,000 passengers and 800 crew, loses a day in seeking or rescuing a trans-Atlantic plane. A conservative estimate, without counting a day lost in port before the return voyage, places the loss at \$14,000."

Each local chapter will have its own program. The club has 25 charter members and Talmadge Stovall is the president. Other officers are: A. W. Bishop, vice president; Charlie Black, secretary; Dick Murray, treasurer; Duane Bassett, reporter; Ben Whitehouse, advisor; and Walter Lowe, Bill Smoot and J. T. Belknap, executive committee. The club plans to have an exhibit at the poultry show that is to be held in Ranger during the first of December; send judging teams to A. & M. College and John Tarleton college; encourage the dairy industry by cow testing work free of charge; encourage terracing by putting on demonstrations and have teams to terrace farms in nearby communities; and hold an agricultural program in the school chapel. A Father and Son banquet is scheduled and an annual fishing trip is planned.

**Squirrels Doing Harm to Pecans** BALINGER, Oct. 6.—Farmers who own pecan orchards along the Colorado river in this county and the Concho river in Concho county, report that squirrels are destroying the pecan crop and in some localities it is estimated that 50 per cent of the nuts will be destroyed before they mature and are ready for harvesting. The pecan crop promises a good yield this year, the trees being heavily fruited, but the nuts are green and it will be 30 days or longer before they are ready for market. From July 1 to Oct. 1 is closed season on squirrels and it is against the law to kill during that time.

**Who Says It's a Free Country?** EL PASO, Oct. —Freshmen at the College of Mines are forbidden to wear their green caps across the border, according to a dictum handed down by sophomores recently. Wearing of the caps is compulsory on this side of the river. Other rules for freshmen require them to open the doors of upper classmen's cars when they arrive at school and to help the upperclassmen from their cars. Freshmen must change all upperclassmen's flat tires. They are forbidden to talk to girls on the campus, to wear plus fours or suspenders, to sit in cars parked on the campus, or to smoke around the college.

### Firecrackers on Christmas Baffles

DALLAS, Oct. 6.—Why do the North and South differ in their uses of firecrackers, the Northern states using them to celebrate the Fourth of July and the Southern states using them on Christmas? The United States Department of Commerce wants to know. Robert J. Smith, industrial and foreign trade secretary of the Dallas Chamber of Commerce, received a query from the department this week, which asks the question, adding "There must be some reason for this which dates back to the time when firecrackers were first introduced into this country."
