Farmers Can Still Sell Eggs To Customers Under New Law

Misunderstanding of Texas' new Egg Law was apparent this week in Eastland County following a meeting held in Eastland Tuesday at which egg producers and others who were interested from Eastland, Stephens, Callahar and Comanche counties attended.

Only about 40 or 50 persons attended the meeting, and most of the misunderstanding concerning the law came from producers who were not present for the meeting, one observer pointed out.

Prior to the passage of the new law both producers and retailers of eggs could do pretty well what they wanted to do.

in the union to pass such a law.

As best this reporter could understand under the new law an egg producer can sell all his eggs without any kind of license so long as he does not claim a grade.

Asked if the farmer would not suffer a reduced price by selling his eggs ungraded to a retail outlet, County Agent J.M. Cooper said they probably would if their eggs would grade Class A.

The law, according to State Department of Agriculture, will protect the consumer by placing a guarantee on graded eggs.

tion and answers for producers and retailers:

Producers Q.—Under what conditions will I as a producer have to have a license?

A.—If you claim a grade. Q.—If I need a license, where do I apply?

A.—Texas Department of Agriculture, Capitol Station, Austin. Q.—As a producer, do I have to sell my eggs on grade?

A.—No. Q.—As a producer selling directly to consumers, can I label my eggs fresh jumbo eggs, new laid, fresh hennery, or other words of such import, regardless of their grade?

A.—Yes, you are exempt from this provision of the law. Q.—Can I sell to retail stores?

cartoned eggs labeled fresh jumbo eggs or such other such label without regard to grade?

A.—Yes. However, the retailer is not exempt from this provision and would be in violation if he offered for sale eggs labeled fresh, jumbo, etc., below the grade of A.

Q.—As a producer, is it necessary for me to remove all inedible eggs when selling direct to consumers?

A.—No. If you are selling only the production of your own flock and not claiming a grade you are exempt from all provisions of this law.

Q.—Does the law require a producer to have an egg cooler and maintain a certain temperature and humidity?

A.—No. Q.—As an egg producer, in what way is it possible for me to violate the law in selling or handling my eggs?

A.—If you claim a grade and sell

she tends to think almost any change will be to the good. Thus she falls for any suggestion about her looks.

Just as sure there are seeds in little red apples the double-breasted suit is coming back. It will hide the pot-belly of most well-fed men much better than the single-breasted job and this is one reason for the popularity of the double-breasted in the days of old.

Take a look at a picture of Will Rogers; he always wore a double-breasted suit. In the thirties every well-dressed man who could afford two suits wore his double-breasted one on special occasions, such as going to church and acting as a pall bearer. If he had a single-breasted affair he saved it for taking the wife out in or to wear on those occasions when he didn't much care how he looked and when he wasn't trying to make an impression on anyone.

Sometimes one of these style houses will try to make unpleated pants a fad. They're wasting their time and ought to know better. A man who has a little sag in the waist line of the fallen chest variety doesn't like these no pleats pants. They're so uncomfortable that most men are miserably in them.

But if a fellow has a little sag in his chest from overtime at the dinner table he likes to relax in a pair of pants with good sized pleats. A good pair of pleated pants sure does make life a lot more enjoyable.

eggs without first obtaining a license; and if the grade claimed does not meet USDA standards.

Q.—In what way does the law place a limit on methods or places that a producer can sell eggs without a license?

A.—When a producer sells to persons other than consumers, he is dealing with parties who are regulated by the law; and even though the producer himself is exempt from certain provisions, the retailer, dealer, wholesaler and processor are not exempt from any provisions of the law.

Retailer

Q.—Do I need a license and if so where do I get it and what are the costs?

A.—Yes you need a license, but

if you meet the definition of a retailer as defined in Sec. 15, no fee is required. You can get the license from the Texas Department of Agriculture, Capitol Station, Austin.

Q.—When does the law take effect?

A. It was effective Oct. 20, 1957.

Q.—Will eggs be inspected for meeting the provisions of this act in my place of business?

A.—Yes.
Q.—Do I have to label or identify all eggs handled as to grade?

A.—Yes.
Q.—Do all eggs in my place of business have to be identified as to grade or not graded?

A.—Yes.

Q.—What records will I have to keep to comply with provisions of the egg law.

A.—None.

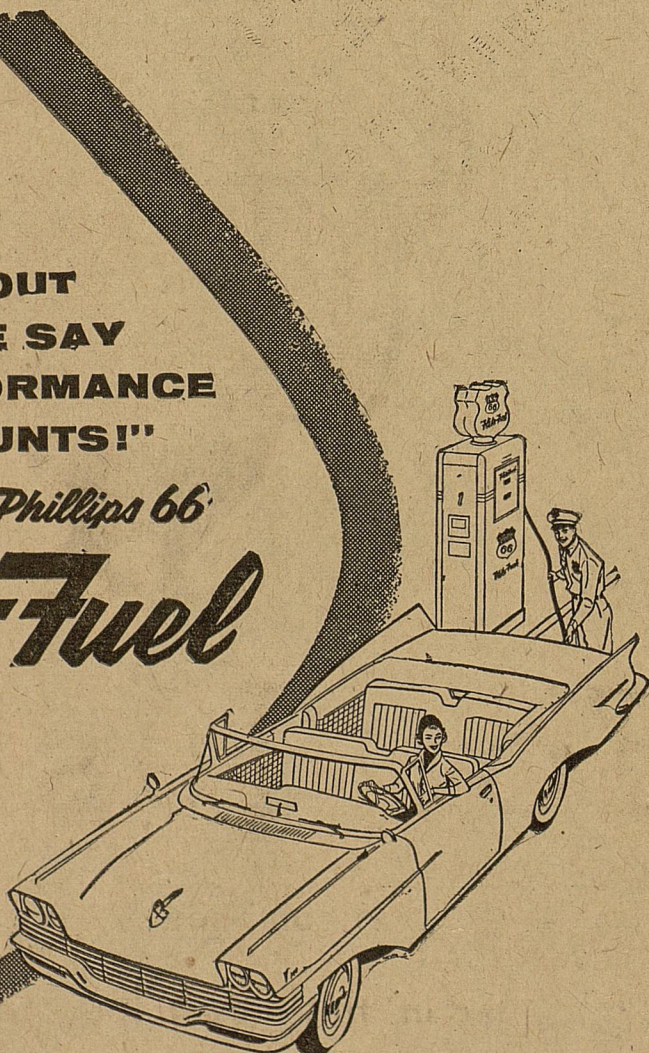

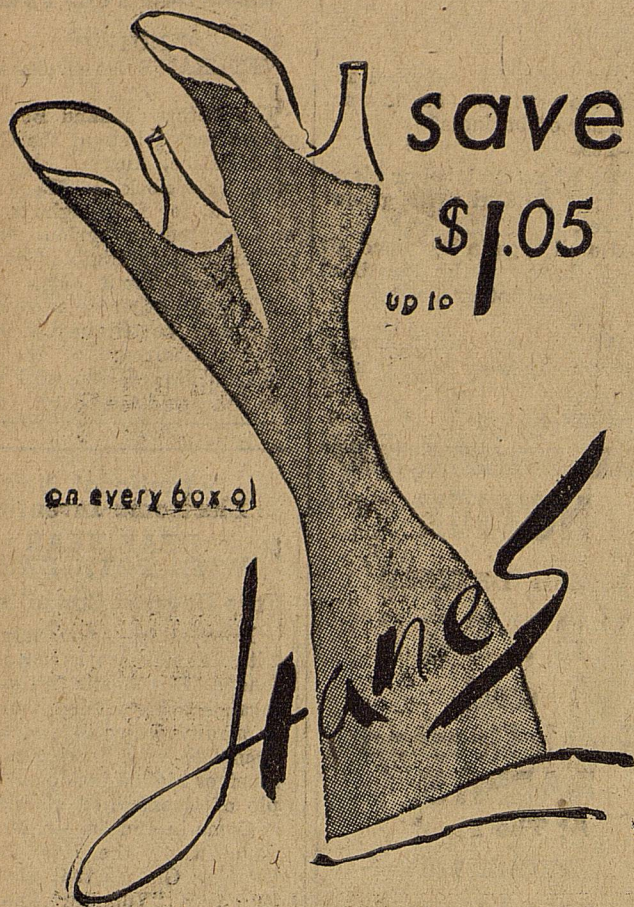

Program on 'Fabulous Feet' Is Presented for Club Wednesday

An array of beautiful shoes was the focal point of the Community Club House Wednesday when Civic League and Garden Club members met for an interesting and unusual program, "Fabulous Feet."

He suggested that a customer call for a favorite salesman who has given her a good fit in the past. The salesman will be flattered, he predicted, and will work even harder to find her another shoe with which she will be happy.

Bauer, representative of Customcraft Shoes, spoke briefly of current styles. He pointed out a number of 2-inch and 1-inch slender heel pumps in the same design as the 3-inch heel.

They were created, he said, to give the same dressy effect of the higher heel at a more comfortable height.

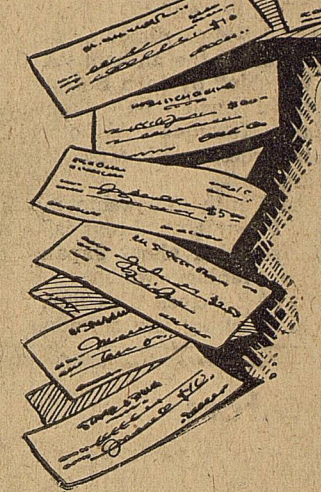
