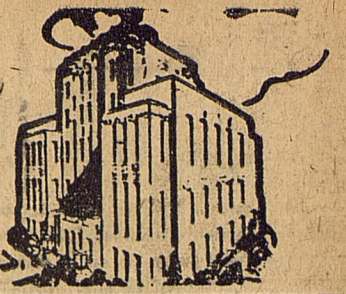

Well, now that we have all paid our poll tax, let's talk about another stage of being a good citizen. How many of you folks actually know what a precinct convention is? Not many of you we will wager.

Precinct conventions in Texas are most important. We would say your vote at your precinct convention is a lot more important than it is at a primary election. That's because so few persons turn out for the conventions.

Precinct conventions are held on the day of the primary election. That will be July 26 (probably at 2 p.m.). If you vote at a certain precinct, you have the right to attend that precinct's convention.

Here in Eastland precinct conventions are held in the courthouse and at city hall. You know which of these is your precinct. Elsewhere around the county the conventions are usually held near the voting precinct.

What goes on at one of the conventions? First off the conventions are called to order by the precinct Democratic chairman, or in his absence, by any qualified voter. The convention then elects its own permanent officers—a chairman and a secretary. It then selects its delegates to the County Democratic Convention and transacts such other business as it may desire, including resolutions on party policy or platform, preference for party nominees, etc.

That may not sound important to you, but in the long run the outcome of the precinct conventions decide what factor will run the Democratic Party in Texas. One more tip: If you class yourself as a Conservative, Loyalist, Moderate or any other title, you had better do some pre-convention work if you expect to accomplish anything. For the fight is usually won before the convention.

What should you do? Decide who you want for a chairman and secretary and what, if any, resolutions you want pushed through. The rest isn't so easy. You get enough voters who agree with you to vote the same way you do.

Some folks here in Eastland have attended conventions and come away complaining about unfair tactics. The same is true around the state. That's why we hear so much talk about ethics this year.

We have attended most of these conventions, and we haven't noticed anything unfair about them. We have just noticed that one group, and one group alone, has organized. That's what it takes. If you're not willing to work for your cause, then it couldn't be much of a cause. That's why we are always pleased with the outcome of these conventions. The winner is always the hardest worker!

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Mavericks Lose By Two Points To Greyhounds

A scare that should last them for the rest of the season was thrown into the district leading Throckmorton Greyhounds here Friday night, but the Hounds managed to scrap out a 52-50 victory over a keyed-up Eastland Mavericks five. Throck's girls won by practically the same route, edging the fighting savettes, 37-34.

The Mavs played one of their better games of the year, and could have easily have come out on top. With 26 seconds left in the game, the score was knotted 48-48. In those last hectic seconds

Throckmorton got four more points and the Mavericks got two. The score was tied 12-12 at the end of the first quarter, but Throckmorton led 28-25 going into the third stanza. The Hounds held their edge in the third quarter with the score 40-37. A standing room only crowd—the largest of the year at Maverick gymnasium—saw the game. Their enthusiasm likely had a lot to do with the Mavs' good showing.

Clint Humphrey had a great night, getting 19 points to take scoring honors for the game. Larry Hollis and Phillip Lewis each got 11, Otis Green had six and Johnny McMahan, who fouled out in the third period, had three.

Jerry Grable was high for the winners with 16 points. James Baker had 13, Chigger Hibbets got 12, Ben Kimmel nine and Billy Bishop just two.

Evans High Pointer Brenda Evans, who came into her own Tuesday when the Mavericks beat Wylie, had another fine night for the locals. She got 17 points for the night. Yvonne Green added 15 to that and Peggy Humphreys pitched in two. Kay Ingram was high for the winners with 16 points.

The girls game was just as exciting as the boys tilt, and the crowd was gasping for breath when the two close ones were over.

Elsewhere in District 10-A, Wylie downed Albany, 53-46 to make the district race a two-way affair. Only Clyde has a chance to upset Throckmorton now, and the only way that could happen would be for Albany and Wylie both to stop the Hounds.

Major Wilson E. Speir, Commander of Region No. 4 of the Department of Public Safety, announced today that Texas motorists will be lined up for blocks before Motor Vehicles Inspection Stations as the April 15 deadline nears for obtaining safety inspection stickers for cars and trucks.

Only 125,000 vehicles have received their safety inspection stickers, out of the one-half million registered vehicles in Department of Public Safety's Region No. 4," said Captain R. M. Hammett, Commander of Motor Vehicle Inspection Service. "About ten weeks remain in which to obtain 1958 inspections and there are 375,000 vehicles still to be inspected in the 49 counties of Region 4."

Our Texas law requires that motorists have the safety inspection stickers on all registered motor vehicles by midnight, April 15. In addition, all trailers registered in Texas which exceed 4000 pounds gross weight must have safety inspection stickers," Hammett pointed out that almost every town has a number of motor inspection stations and he added that motorists will be able to get quick service and avoid the last minute rush by having vehicles inspected early.

Captain Hammett pointed out that motorists are subject to a fine of one dollar to two hundred dollars, plus court costs, if they are apprehended without a valid safety inspection sticker.

Class Friday night when he didn't draw an opponent. Slatton proved one thing with his gloveless performance. He might not be one of the better heavyweights in the state, but he certainly has everyone convinced that he is.

Keys was supposed to be a rough man. He was Oklahoma heavyweight runner-up last year and Sweetwater Coach Al Poe has called him the best heavy in the state.

While Eastland and area fans didn't get to see Slatton put on the mitts Friday, they did get a brief glance at Jimmy Jiminez.

Jiminez scored one of three knockouts for the night, putting down Wayne Whitman of Abilene for the second round in only 57 seconds of the long round.

Fans attending the Gloves tournament tonight, (Saturday) will get to see another Eastland lad, Jerry Robinson, who is undefeated in six starts, in action. Robinson will go up against Richard Herrera of Sweetwater.

Disability Clause Listed for Vets

Veterans who qualify for both service-connected disability compensation and non-service-connected disability pension cannot receive both payments at the same time.

Mr. Scott B. Harrington, manager of the Veterans Administration regional office in Dallas, said these veterans may elect to receive the benefit which pays the higher amount.

The veteran may revoke the election later if his condition changes to such a degree that payment for the other benefit would be higher, he explained.

Mr. Harrington added that requests for election of the higher benefit must be made by the veteran, because VA cannot make such changes automatically under the law.

He said since non-service-connected pension is subject to income limitations and service-connected compensation is not, this may be a factor in a veteran's decision to change from one benefit to the other.

Lane Pledges Conscientious Service To All

Roy Lane, in announcing his candidacy for re-election as district clerk, said this week that he "sincerely appreciates the cooperation and courtesies shown me during the time I have held this office."

Lane said, "I promise to continue to render conscientious and faithful service if re-elected."

Lane is a long time county resident and has been active in all phases of community activities for years.

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McCain Will Head Stock Show Again

Members of the Eastland County Livestock Association elected Clint McCain general chairman of the County Livestock Show in a meeting held Friday night in the Texas Electric Service Co. conference room in Eastland.

McCain, who has served as general chairman of the highly successful show for a number of years, thus once again draws top responsibility.

Aiding McCain again this year will be two assistant chairmen.

Members of the Association voted several changes in this year's show, which will be held March 28 and 29.

Among the changes was one to divide the lamb division into three divisions, one for Southdown and Southdown crosses, one for medium wool and one for fine wool. There will be breed champions only.

The weight limit on hogs was cut from 300 to 275 pounds in another change.

They will be Keith McDonald and Johnny Aaron.

A number of other show officials were elected and will be named in the near future.

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Storage Stocks Will Dominate Turkey Prices

Turkey prices the first half of 1958 will be dominated by the large storage stocks now on hand, F. Z. Beamblossom, extension poultry marketing specialist, warned Eastland County growers recently.

Turkey cold storage holdings on Nov. 30, 1957, were 221,720,000 pounds compared to 194,000,000 pounds on the same date in 1956.

This is an increase of 14 percent and is 45 percent above the 1952-53 average holdings for the end of November, says Beamblossom.

According to latest reports, state and national turkey organizations are increasing their efforts in the promotion of turkey sales on a year-round basis, says the specialist. This special emphasis on year-round sales should help reduce the effect of these large stocks on the price that turkey producers might receive in 1958.

In 1957 considerable emphasis was given to the expected large crop, points out Beamblossom. As a result, many farmers' changed their production plans to the extent that turkey production was reduced somewhat, especially at the close of the hatching season.

Even though prices in 1957 were low, they might have been much lower had farmers not given consideration thought to the outlook.

Because of the low prices in 1957, profits were limited to the extent that growers will probably reduce production in 1958, although financing and feed suppliers may temper the decline.

After late summer of 1958, turkey prices will reflect next year's output. With a continued strong demand and if production is noticeably lower than in 1957, prices to producers should be higher than in 1957. It is for this reason that turkey producers should watch turkey testing and hatching reports the next few months, concludes Beamblossom.

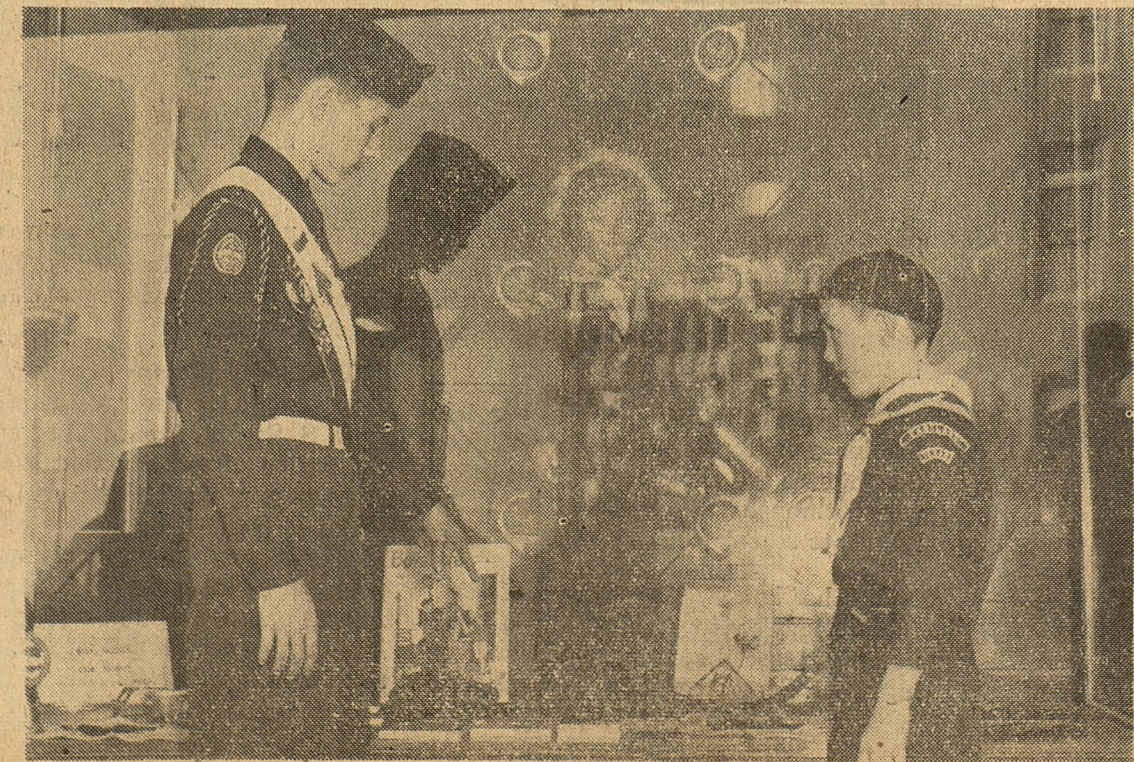

(Continued from Page One) prospector hoarding gold nuggets so we would have funds to go to each Saturday morning performance of the thriller.

I don't remember how often the Connellee was completely filled to standing room only. It may have been filled to capacity on several occasions but I do remember two times when they had to put seats in the aisles to take care of all the people. One occasion was the time the United States Marine Band came to town and played a concert on the stage. The other time was a ladies night at Harley Sadler's Show. The Sadler show was a popular tent show that played this part of West Texas almost every fall. It had played in Eastland almost every year since the show was organized as Harley Sadler and His Own Company and usually used its own tent and equipment. On this booking, however, they used the Connellee for a week. One night of the week was designated as "ladies night," when ladies were admitted free with a paid adult ticket.

They had to set chairs in the aisles that night too. Oddly enough we did have a Majestic Theatre in Eastland in the olden days. It was on the south side of the square at the location A & P store now occupies.

Pastor of the church is Rev. John House.

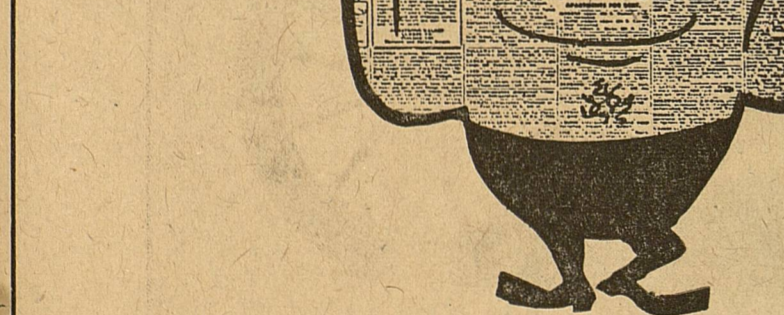
