Precinct conventions in Texas are most important. We would' say your vote at your precinct convention is a lot more important than it is at a primary election. turn out for the conventions.

Precinct conventions are held on the day of the primary election. That will be July 26 (probably at 2 p.m.). If you vote at a certain precinct, you have the right to attend that precinct's convention.

Here in Eastland precinct conventions are held in the courthouse and at city hall. You know which of these is your precinct. Elsewhere around the county the conventions are usually held near the voting precinct.
