We were talking with W. H. McAnnally the other day about the telephone situation in his area. Mac, as you know, is district manager of Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. Anyone who thinks he has an easy job is crazy. In recent years we'd guess he has had about as much pressure as you can get. Mac didn't tell us this, but we know it's so. We personally have given him enough trouble to run an average man nuts. Lucky for us Bill can take it and come back for more. For instance, we've been trying to get the "Spirit of Communication" off the front cover of our phone directory for years now. Mac, of course, has to listen to our gripes and each time explain to us again that he isn't a magician. We still do not understand why Cisco can have a picture of their dam on the cover and we can't have one of the courthouse on ours. That, however, is not what we are writing about, and we apologize for bringing it up.

McAnnally has been in the middle of the fight over which one of Eastland County's three greedy cities would get the telephone toll exchange. No matter where his company decided to put the thing, Mac was gonna get it from two other sides. It went to Cisco, and that's that.

Now he has to worry about getting Eastland and Ranger switched over to dial. That's a big problem, believe us. Since we have in the sentence above set ourself up as some sort of expert on telephones, we perhaps should qualify the statement. You see, back when we were in college, we served as substitute custodian for Maw Bell during the summer months. We maintain that you cannot dust all of that equipment every day and not learn something.

Anyhow, we were talking to Bill and said, "Boy, switching over to dial must be a big problem." We were surprised to hear him say no. We questioned his answer and he replied that switching over wasn't hard at all. "It's just getting ready to that's all the work," he explained.

Mac tells us that each dial system is a custom made affair. Each unit is constructed to fit the particular patterns of a particular town. For instance, Eastland has a telephone building now that is in good shape. It will not be used for dial though. The reason for this is that the new dial equipment will not fit in the present building. A new building will have to be constructed just designed for the new equipment.

The actual switchover will be made at one time. Bell will set up a certain time for the switch-over, and up to that very moment operators will still serve you. Then all phones will be switched to dial. Actual work on the Eastland conversion has been underway for years. A step by step program has long been setup, and a lot has already been accomplished. For instance, local installers had to be taught new methods. That's why Bill Walters goes around mumbling to himself all the time. He has had to learn as much in a short time as is usually required to get a masters degree in math.

With just Eastland and Ranger left to switch over to dial, we reasoned that Mac's problems are almost over.

"Who are you kidding?" says he. "In this day and time you just do not ever catch up."

Then he pointed out that telephone engineers are always working on new ideas, which in the near future will be realities. For

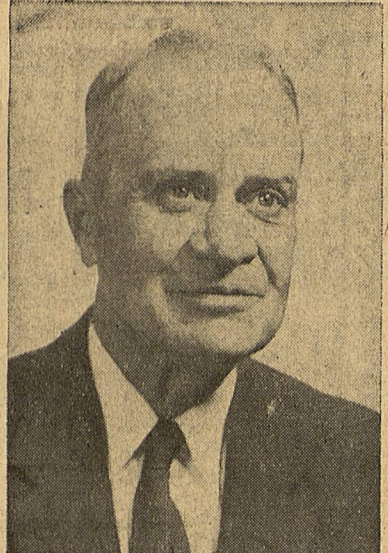

## Poll Tax Receipts Decrease In County

Poll tax receipts increased in Eastland County from last year, according to figures released today by J. C. Allison, county tax assessor-collector.

However, Allison pointed out, there was a considerable decrease in the number for 1956, the last big election year in the county.

Total poll taxes paid over the entire county were 4,038 compared with 3,122 for 1957 and 5,100 for 1956. Allison noted that 1957 was an off-election year with only a few scattered elections held in the county.

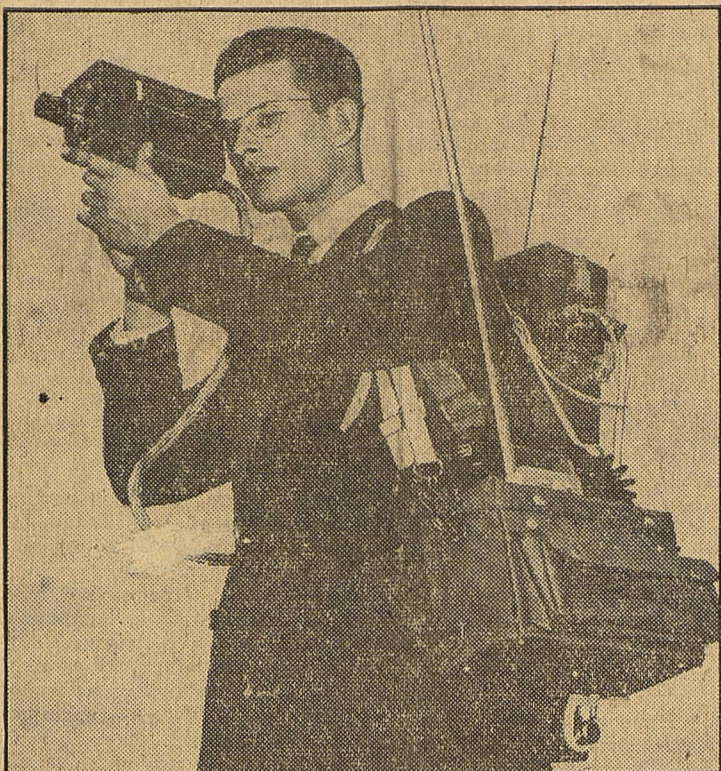

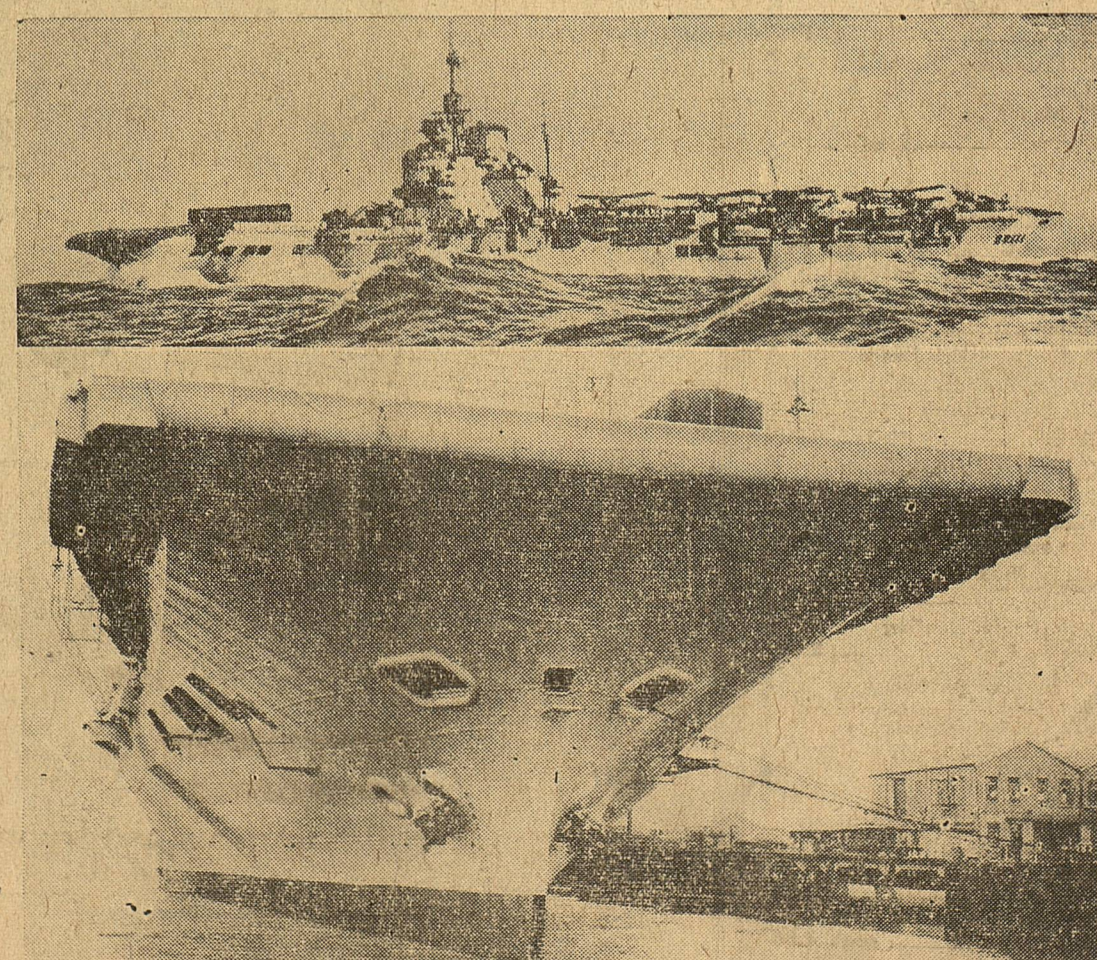
Activities among Cub Scouts, Explorers, and their leaders are at a new high this week as local Scouts join in the 48th anniversary of scouting.

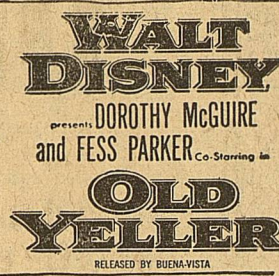

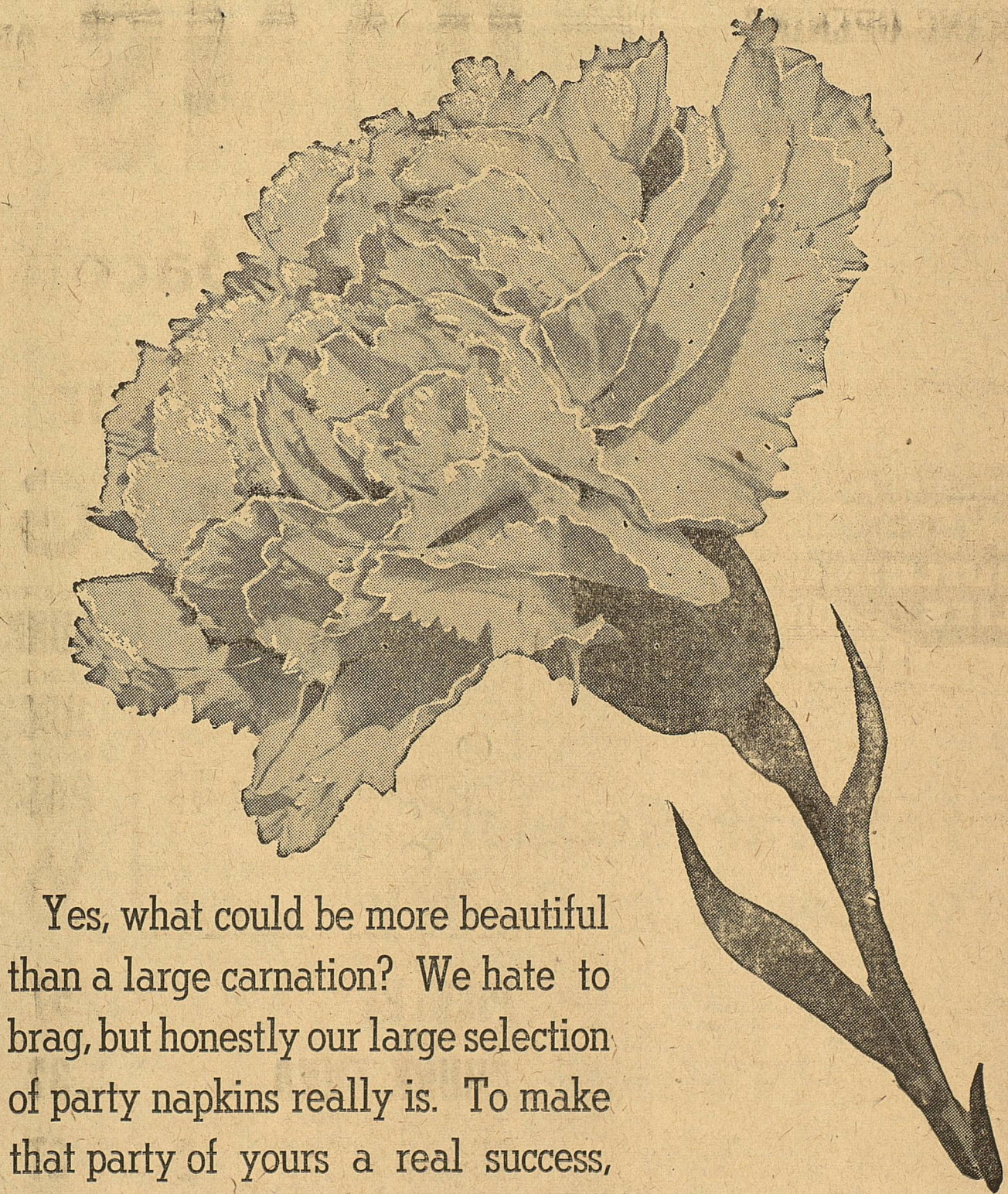

**Veterans Warned That Interest Earned on Insurance Is Taxable**

Although payments for Veterans Administration benefits are tax-free and need not be reported on 1957 Federal income tax returns, interest earned on GI life insurance dividends left on deposit with VA is not a "benefit" and is taxable.

Mr. Scott B. Harrington, manager of the VA regional office in Dallas, said today the ruling on dividend interest was made last year by the Internal Revenue Service.

Still tax-free are proceeds of a GI life insurance policy, including the dividends themselves, he

said. Mr. Harrington added that other VA benefits which need not be reported on Federal income tax returns include:

Education and training allowances for veterans of the Korean conflict period who are in school or training establishments under the Korean GI Bill.

Subsistence allowances paid to World War II veterans training under the original World War II GI Bill.

Subsistence payments made to disabled World War II and Korean conflict veterans training under Public Law 16, the Vocational Rehabilitation Act.

pension payments received by veterans for service-connected and nonservice-connected disabilities.

Grants to seriously disabled veterans for homes designed for "wheelchair living."

Grants for motor vehicles to veterans who lost their sight or lost the use of their limbs.

World War I emergency officers' retirement pay.

VA death benefits to families of deceased veterans also are exempt from taxation. They include death compensation and pension, indemnity and all GI insurance payments.

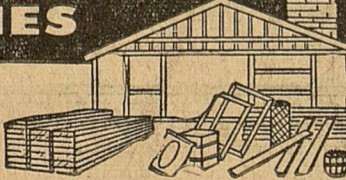

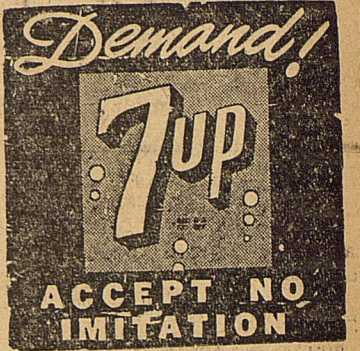

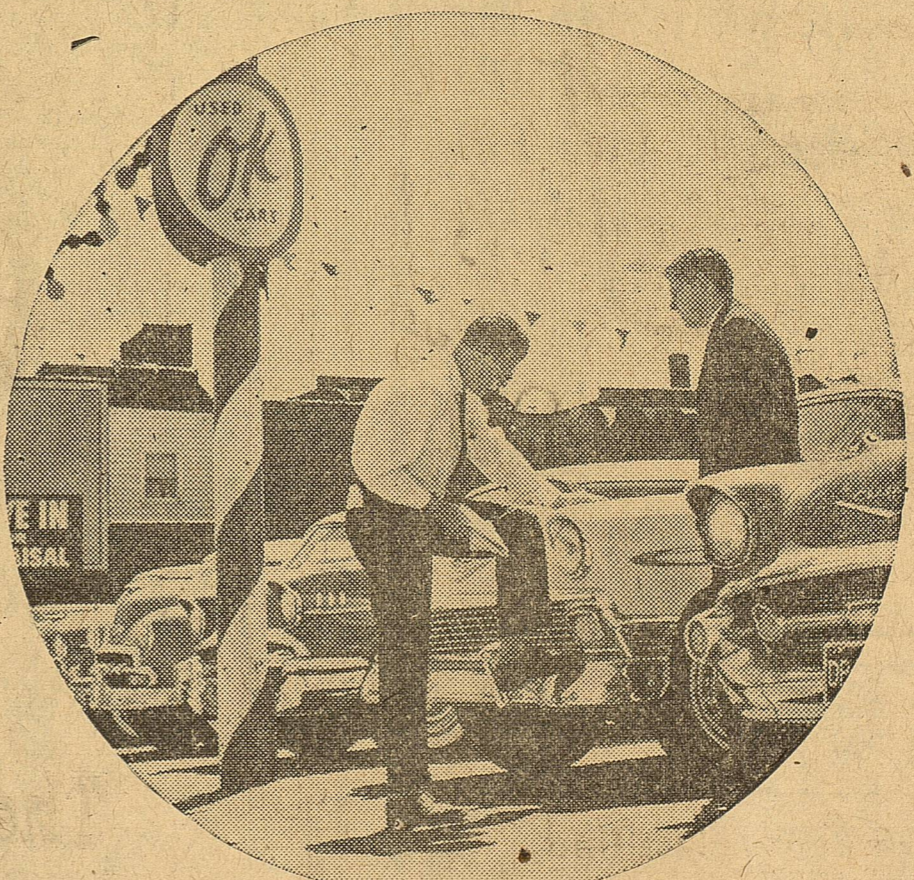
