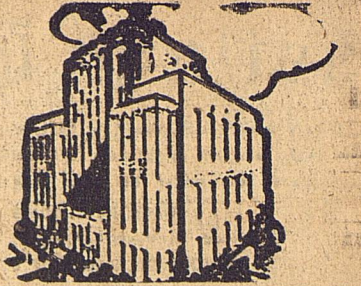

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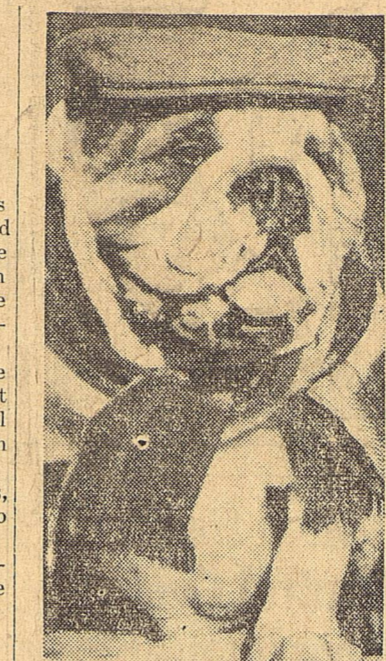

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Skeleton Found Near Cisco Is Unidentified

Investigation Underway By Area Officers

The Eastland County Sheriff's office this morning was planning a full fledged investigation of a skeleton of a man found late Monday on the I. J. Pence farm about

Chief Deputy Sheriff Johnny Boyd today at noon disclosed that an investigation of a skeleton found near Cisco last night indicates that the dead man was approximately five feet eight inches tall, weighed between 135 and 140 pounds and had reddish-grey hair.

Parts of a newspaper dated Sept. 18, 1955 (believed to be a Fort Worth paper) were found on the body along with two pocket knives, two pairs of small scissors, a pair of tweezers, two spoons, and a few pennies. The man was dressed in rib overalls and khaki shirt. The skeleton had no teeth, leading officers to believe that the man was elderly. The body was taken to Wiley Funeral Home in Cisco.

Officers investigated the incident last night and returned to the scene this morning. Pence reported to officers that he found the skeleton in a pasture, about 30 yards from a county road and hidden by weeds, while he was out in the pasture with his dog. Actually it was his dog who discovered the skeleton.

Chief Deputy Sheriff Johnny Boyd said there was no immediate evidence as to who the man might have been. Apparently he had been dressed in work clothes at the time of his death, however.

According to officers, no identification of a wound was found on the body. They said the man had possibly been dead six or eight months. When found the skeleton was lying on its right side under a big tree as though the man had been resting. The remains were left where found overnight so that a physician could view the skeleton this morning.

Eastland GI's Getting Special Atomic Training

FORT LEWIS, Wash., Feb. 25—PFC Kenneth Lee, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. H. Lee, Route 2, Eastland, is training for artillery battalion tests that will involve the firing of simulated atomic shells.

The shells, with dummy warheads replacing the nuclear explosive, will be fired from the Army's new 8-inch howitzers. These guns and the "honest John" rocket are the big punch of a "pentomic" division arsenal which provides far greater firepower than before.

PFC Lee is serving as a wireman in Btry C of the 4th Division Artillery's 1st FA Bn (Rkt/How) 20th Arty. Army Training Tests of the division's artillery battalions are scheduled here in April.

The 4th Infantry Division, famed for its fighting record in World Wars I and II, was reorganized as a pentomic unit early last year. Under the pentomic concept, streamlined units have the rapid mobility and tremendous firepower to meet demands of Atomic and Missile Age warfare.

Along with its new mission and weapons, the 4th is perhaps the Army's only division to sport a new nickname. The division song is sung to the tune of "The Saints are Marching In" and out of that the nickname "Saints" gained quick popularity among the troops.

Prize Money For County Livestock Show Is Listed at More Than \$1000

More than \$1,000 in cash prizes will be awarded to the owners of the winning animals at the annual Eastland County Livestock show at the Eastland airport March 23 and 24, Bob Pressley of Cisco, president of the County Livestock Raisers Association, has announced.

Only the FFA and the 4-H Club boys and girls from over the county exhibiting animals will receive cash premiums as the adults exhibit for ribbons only. Pressley expressed thanks to the business and professional people, civic groups and others from all over the county who took ads in the show catalogue.

He explained that this was the only source of revenue for the show. He further thanked the various committee in the various towns who solicited and collected for the ads.

C. M. McCain of Eastland, general superintendent of the show, has announced that all animals not showing sufficient quality or finish to merit exhibition will be turned back and not allowed to show by the sifting committee. This is in line with the policy established last year to keep poor quality and underfat animals off of the show ground.

A showmanship award of \$10 will be awarded to the boy or girl who does the best job of showing his or her animal.

Cotton Insect Control Guide Now Available

COLLEGE STATION — No cotton farmer has to be told about the reduction in profits that insects can cause. But luckily, cotton insects can be controlled economically by the use of the proper poisons at the right time.

Controlling damaging infestations of boll weevils, bollworms and other insects on cotton growing on fertile soils returns substantial profits even when a large number of applications is necessary for maximum yields. On upland soils where insect infestations do not last long, fewer applications may be needed.

Giving information and recommendations for the control of the various cotton insects is the theme of two leaflets recently released by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service — L-218, "Texas Guide for Controlling Cotton Insects," and L-219, "Ways to Fight the Pink Bollworm in Texas."

L-218 deals with the more harmful insects. It contains a chart giving the recommended controls and also general information including points on the safe handling of insecticides.

L-219 deals with the pink bollworm specifically. It tells about the habits and damage of the insect and gives special attention on the ways to fight it.

March 1 to 8 has been officially designated as 4-H Club week in the county by a special proclamation issued by County Judge John Hart recently. Different clubs over the county are expected to put up some posters in the schools and communities to commemorate the event. A special radio broadcast is being planned for the week.

Due to the weather only about two dozen members attended the meeting Saturday morning in the courthouse of the County 4-H Club Council. We saw two mothers

there, Mrs. Frank Ziehr, Cisco with her children Roland and Kathleen as well as Mrs. Dewey Hames of Ranger with her son Gary. Incidentally a Ranger Jr. High club girl is chairman of the group, Sandra Alsop.

A Pleasant Hill boy, Park Plambeck, Jr. is a member of the Cisco Jr. High club. Park has a purebred Duroc boar and sow. Incidentally, club boys who wish to buy for one of the 9 registered Duroc pigs to be distributed in May under the Sears pig program are reminded that the winners are chosen from among those who turn in essays.

Prepackaged Foods Offer Advantages

COLLEGE STATION — Prepackaging of food is often thought of as an extra service to the consumer. And it is frequently used as an explanation for the rising costs involved in marketing farm products.

Both these ideas are sound, says B. G. Hancock, extension horticulturist, but overlooked is the fact that packaging may also be of great advantage to the producer and seller of farm goods. He cites prepackaged carrots as an example. As recently as 1951, only about 1 percent of the fresh carrots was sold prepackaged. More than 85 percent are now sold this way. This change is due in part to advantages to the grower, shipper, retailer and consumer, says Hancock.

Prepackaged carrots are topped by the grower as they are harvested. There are no tops to pay freight on and no need for ice to keep the useless tops cool. Retailers report handling costs reduced from 14 cents per sales dollar and waste and spoilage losses cut from 8 to less than 1 percent. Space required for handling carrots is cut and the film bags reduce spoilage and extend shelf life, making possible a continuous supply of fresh carrots. Housewives, too, prefer the fresher, crisper and cleaner carrots.

Dallas Building To Have Chapel On Top Floor

A sanctuary high above the city for individual prayer and meditation will be included in the public service facilities of the new Southland Center main tower, now under construction in Dallas.

"The Chapel in the Sky," as it will be called, will be approximately 500 feet above the ground on the 39th floor of the 42-story skyscraper, tallest building west of the Mississippi River.

"To the best of our information, this place of worship is the highest located within a building in America," said Ben H. Carpenter, executive vice president of Southland Life Insurance Company. The company owns Southland Center which also includes the new 28-story Sheraton - Dallas luxury hotel.

Dan C. Williams, Southland Life's president and well known Southwestern religious leader, conceived the idea for a place of prayer in the building plans.

"The Chapel will, of course, be entirely non-denominational and will be available for anyone seeking a moment of peace in a busy day," said Mr. Williams. The Chapel, complete with altar, will have stained leaded glass windows, a vaulted, timbered ceiling, and will be large enough to accommodate 35 persons. It is planned for use principally by individuals rather than groups or meetings.

It can be reached either by express elevator from the ground floor level or by escalator from the 41st floor which is the public observation area. Southland Center will begin operations in early 1959.

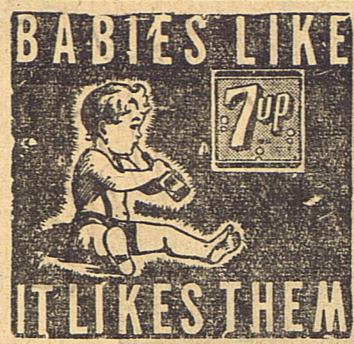

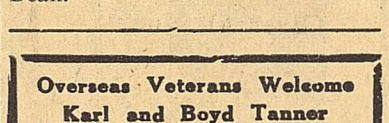

Summer Workshop Scheduled On SMU Campus July 14 - August 20

A summer workshop in family finance will be given at Southern Methodist University for the seventh consecutive year, according to Dr. Bob G. Woods, coordinator of the workshop. The course, limited to educators, will run from July 14 to August 20.

Through an arrangement with the National Committee for Education in Family Finance, as many as 30 qualified teachers and administrators may receive scholarships covering tuition. A descriptive brochure and application form may be obtained by writing Dr. Woods at the University, Dallas 5, Texas.

The Southern Methodist University workshop, one of 15 such summer courses offered by univer-

sities throughout the United States, will draw its students from Texas, Mississippi and Louisiana.

The workshop will cover such fields as personal income, budget, banking, consumer credit, renting and buying a home, life insurance and other insurance, social security, pensions, savings and investments, personal taxes, wills and estates. Students will do "laboratory" work to develop special materials or projects for their classrooms or school systems back home. Upon successful completion of the course, the teachers will receive credit toward a graduate degree.

These workshops are part of a long-range program aimed at giving young people in the nation's schools and colleges accurate and useful instruction in the management of personal and family finances. They are made possible by grants to the universities from the Institute of Life Insurance as a public service to American education. Workshop students teach such subjects as home economics, business education, mathematics, social studies, family living and guidance in junior and senior high schools, junior colleges, liberal arts colleges, and teacher training institutions.

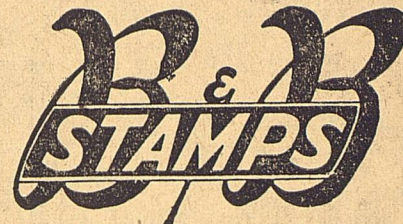

Once upon a time there was a farmer named Brown who raised corn. He had a neighbor named Smith who raised chickens, but no corn.

Now, Brown needed help on his farm, so he employed Smith one day each week, paying him \$5 a day in cash. Smith then bought five bushels of corn at \$1 a bushel from Brown for his egg-laying hens.

One day chicken-raiser Smith told corn-farmer Brown that the cost of everything was going up, so he'd have to get \$6 a day for his work. Replied Brown: "Everything I use is costing more, so I'll have to get \$6 for five bushels of corn."

After a while chicken-raiser Smith told farmer Brown that, with everything still going up, he'd have to get \$7.50 for a day's work. Whereupon corn-raiser Brown allowed as how everything he used was costing more, so he'd just have to get \$7.50 for five bushels of corn.

Both Brown and Smith were so pleased over the idea of \$7.50 for a day's work and \$7.50 for five bushels of corn that they both exclaimed: "Happy days are here again."

By and by, chicken-raiser Smith told corn-raiser Brown that everything had gone up still more, so he just couldn't hire out for less than \$10 a day. Brown said that seemed fair to him, but since everything he used was going up too, he'd have to get \$10 for five bushels of corn, which was agreeable with Smith.

Smith told his wife: "Ain't it wonderful... \$10 for a day's work."

That's the way inflation works. It gives us the pleasant but dangerous feeling that everything's wonderful, while it eats away at our pocketbook and savings, our insurance and pensions... and everything else of value.

The critical world situation may make it necessary for our government to increase annual defense spending by several billion dollars, which would add to the inflationary spiral.

But we can help check this inflation if, individually and collectively, we cease demanding federal aid, assistance and benefits for OUR special projects and programs. We can urge our government to economize, not to spend and spend and spend.
