When these same boys get out into the business world they can't afford to be losers. They have to win a living for themselves. And just as you can win a football game without having a coach who curses and whips his boys, you can win a living for your family without cheating and stealing. It isn't easy, however. You have to be willing to work, to stay in shape for your job... and usually it takes a good leader.

H. C. Adams, a longtime employee of the Texas and Pacific Railway Co., retired this month and plans to continue to make his home in Olden.

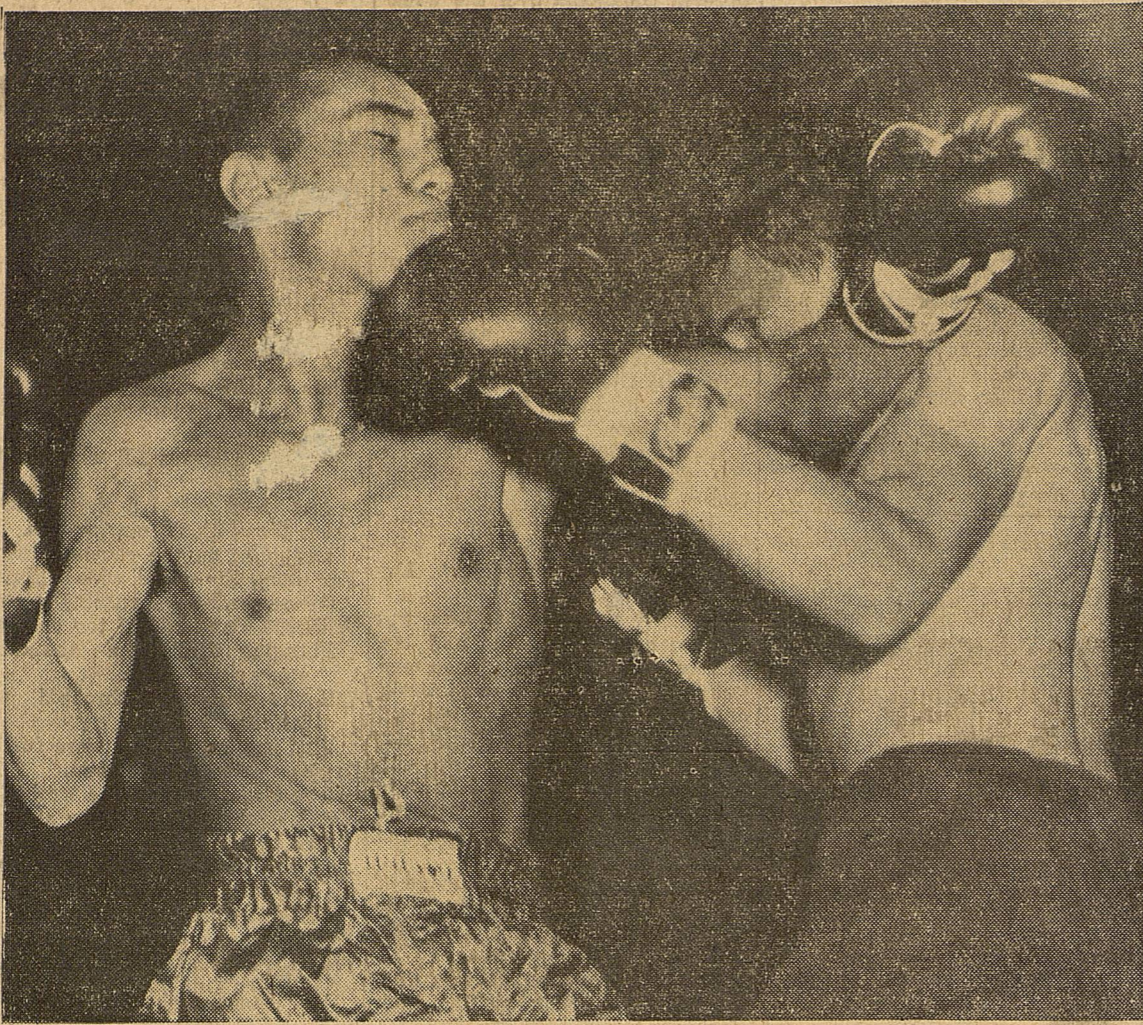

Jiminez, Robinson Win Golden Gloves Awards

Eastland boxers walked off with three championships in Abilene's Golden Gloves last night, making a clean slate in one of the best team performances in the tourney.

Don Slattton won the open heavyweight title and the right to enter the state meet in Fort Worth. Jimmy Jiminez scored his second knockout to win the lightweight division, and Jerry Robinson got the decision in the featherweight championship finals. The three Eastland lads were this city's only entries in the meet.

Jiminez turned in the best performance in the regional tourney. He won both of his fights by knockouts. Jimmy finished off Weldon Mercer of Ballinger in 58 seconds of the second round to win his novice championship.

Robinson turned back Lowell Taggart of Abilene in the finals last night. He had earned his spot there by decisioning Richard Herrera of Sweetwater Saturday night.

Slattton, considered one of the top heavyweights in the state, got his title the easy way. He didn't have to lift a glove and his competition failed to show up after a lot of big talk.

Ninety Percent Of County Taxes Paid By Jan. 31

Just over 90 percent of Eastland County taxes were paid by the Jan. 31 deadline, J. C. Allison, tax assessor-collector, revealed Tuesday. Allison pointed out that during the month of February 1 1/2 percent additional interest must be paid on 1957 taxes. That interest climbs to 3 percent in March, 4 1/2 percent in April, 6 percent in May, 7 1/2 percent in June and taxes become delinquent July 1.

The collector pointed out that collections totaled 71.4 percent in October alone. The main reason for that a three percent discount was effective that month.

Actual Work On Lone Cedar Club Underway

'Neutral Soap Box' Being Constructed

Dr. James Whittington, president of the Lone Cedar Country Club land company, Monday called the new country club the "neutral soap box" which Eastland County citizens can stand on. His remarks came at a Rotary Club meeting in Eastland just after he announced that work on the clubhouse got underway Monday morning.

Dr. Whittington has long been an exponent of cooperation among all Eastland County citizens. He said that the new country club, which has a membership composed of citizens of all towns in the county, will bring the county's leaders together and give them the opportunity to work together. "Learn to play together and you can learn to work together," the Eastland specialist has long maintained.

"We are at a stage now where we are all climbing on horses and riding in different directions," he said. He urged a planned program by all, instead of a number of different groups working in different ways for the same end.

Dr. Whittington said he believes that in 10 or 15 years—when the price of land in Dallas and Fort Worth get so high that it will not be practical to buy it—that Eastland County will attract many new industries. He warned, however, "that we cannot wait."

The Eastland County native faced a tough question square in the eye and didn't pull his punches. He pointed out that in 1919 this county had a population of 59,000 people and "we were heading to be another Tulsa." By 1949, he reminded his listeners, the county's population had dropped to 27,000, and today, he maintained, it has a population of only 20,500.

"This is an economic trend which we must change," he declared, then added that "we have tried everything we have thought of without success."

Dr. Whittington dared his listeners to be different. He said he be-

NATIONAL BOY SCOUT WEEK TO BE OBSERVED FEBRUARY

Local Boy Scouts will join the national Boy Scouts of America in observance of its 48th anniversary during Boy Scout Week set for February 7-13.

The scouts will launch a year-long national safety good turn during the week. The safety good turn, undertaken at the suggestion of President Dwight D. Eisenhower, will find 4,700,000 boys and leaders engaged in promoting traffic safety, outdoor safety, and home safety.

In the White House message, the President told the scouts:

"In our land each individual is of inestimable worth, yet in no other land do accidents cause a more terrible loss of human life and limb. This fact cannot be passively accepted. We must seek new ways to save the basic resources of our nation: its people.

"Encouraged by the splendid results of your conservation good turn four years ago, I now urge you to adopt safety as your service project in 1958. Through the concentrated action of your members, and in cooperation with other organizations, you can alert the public to the urgent need for reducing the tragic toll of accidents.

"This is an opportunity for service to your country in the highest tradition of the Boy Scouts of America."

The Scouts' national safety good turn is being coordinated nationally and locally with other safety programs and campaigns. National safety organizations have advised and assisted Scout leaders in developing plans and projects.

During March, April, and May, the projects will involve traffic safety. Outdoor safety projects will keep Scouts busy in June, July, and August. Home safety will be featured in September, October, and November.

Next October, the Boy Scouts will distribute to approximately 35,000,000 homes a civil defense booklet on family preparedness for emergencies.

The nation is accustomed to the great achievements of the Boy Scouts. Their outstanding work in the 1952 and 1956 get-out-the-vote campaigns, their conservation good turn in 1954, their collection of nearly two million items of clothing, foodstuffs, and supplies for the needy in 1934, and other activities in behalf of their fellow

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

Nurse Training Offered By VA
Increased opportunities for advanced education and training now are offered nurses by Veterans Administration, the agency reported today.
VA said the opportunities include leave and financial assistance to selected nurses for attending universities, in addition to in-service training for management and supervisory positions, hospital training in nursing specialties, orientation programs for all nurses entering VA, and opportunity to attend nursing institutes and workshops throughout the nation.
The comprehensive educational program conducted at all VA medical stations during fiscal 1957 to provide for training and advancement of VA nurses on an individual basis is being expanded in fiscal 1958, VA said.
VA nurses selected for university training may be provided tuition and salary, or salary only, or leave without pay, depending on the university program undertaken. During the fiscal year ending in June 1957, a total of 109 VA nurses attended universities under these arrangements.
