# FOUR HUNDRED DEAD REPORTED IN FLORIDA

Some Sections Yet To Be Heard From. Deaths In Guaduloupe, Haiti, Placed At 660.

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla., Sept. 19.—Homer Dickson, field captain of the Red Cross, filed a report with authorities today which indicated that the death toll in Florida from the hurricane already stood at 400 with some sections of the State still isolated.

"Two nurses and myself sent two truckloads of bodies to the aviation field here," Dickson said. "There were a hundred or more bodies in the vicinity of Bell Glade. according to the crews of two boats that were sent to Tory and Cramer islands to aid in the re-

Dickson's report was the first official estimate that has been official estimate that has been made of the number of dead. Here-tofore only fragmentary reports have been received. Earlier today the Red Cross compiled a casualty death from six towns which said that 62 were known to have been killed and 545 injured.




