

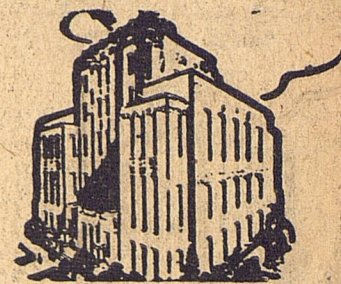

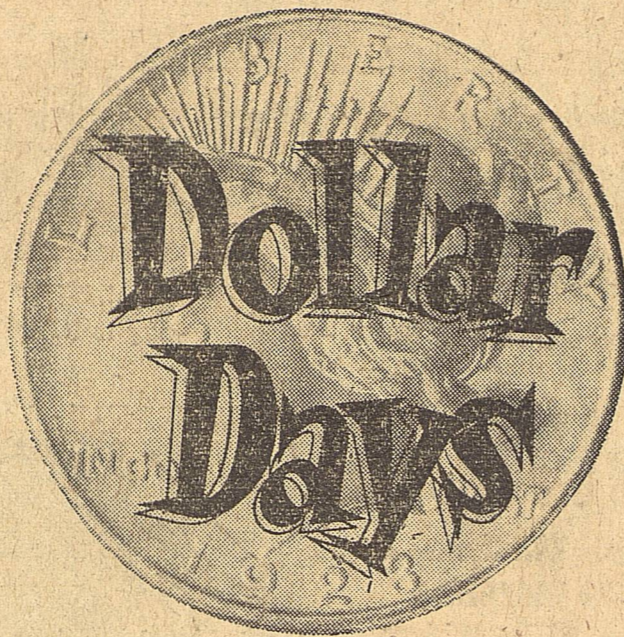
## Fire Damages Church of God State Building

Fire of unknown origin destroyed two rooms in the Church of God encampment building west of Eastland off Highway 80 Tuesday night, and smoke damaged almost all of the building.

The building, which was originally built to house Warner Memorial Hospital, is a two-story red brick structure. Fire Chief Jack Johnson said a woman who lives near the building and two young men turned in fire alarms at practically the same time. The alarm was sounded at 11:47 p.m. and firemen didn't leave the scene un-

til Wednesday morning at 4:30. Ranger and Cisco firemen came to the aid of local fire fighters, who were faced with fighting the blaze without anyway to tie onto water lines. Chief Johnson credited firemen of the two cities with "saving the day." He said he doubted that local firemen could have kept the fire in check without their aid. Cisco and Ranger both rushed tank trucks to Eastland.

The Church of God annually holds an encampment at the building, but there was no one in the building at the time the fire broke out.

### Rev. Kimbler Is Named Executive Board Member

Rev. Harvey Kimbler, pastor of the First Baptist Church in Eastland, was elected Tuesday to the executive board of the Baptist General Convention of Texas.

The 191-member board consisting of pastors, laymen and women throughout the state met in Dallas for its quarterly meeting. Purpose of the meeting is to conduct the denomination's business between annual sessions.

The denomination's most influential organization, the executive board, is authorized to conduct business when the annual convention is not in session.

At Tuesday's board meeting, three Texas Baptist schools were granted permission to conduct fund drives totaling \$1,175,000.

Drives approved were Howard Payne College, \$750,000; University of Corpus Christi, \$250,000; and Deatur Baptist College, \$175,000.

Hardin-Simmons University was granted a \$100,000 contribution toward its current building program. The board also voted to underwrite another \$100,000 in endowment for the University of Corpus Christi.

In other action, the board granted permission for the Valley Baptist Hospital in Harlingen to build a unit to house a cobalt machine.

Approved a request from Mexican Baptist Orphan's Home for permission to build two new \$35,000 cottages.

Heard a six year progress report from the BGCT church loan association. The agency, said executive secretary, Dr. A. B. White, has loaned more than \$11,754,800 to Baptist churches since it was founded.

Granted Baylor Hospital in Dallas permission to borrow \$1,500,000 to expand their facilities from 26,000 hospitalizations a year to 52,000.

### Three Contested School Races Are Noted In County

There will be at least three contested school board races this year.

Twenty candidates have filed in seven separate races, records kept in County School Supt. H. R. (Pop) Garrett's office reveal.

Four candidates seek three seats in the Olden trustee race. Candidates there are L. J. Williamson, C. B. O'Brien, O. H. Dick and Z. W. Cook.

At Carbon there are four candidates for two vacancies. Candidates are T. R. Bryant, L. A. (Jeff) Irbbin, A. E. Guy and J. E. Jackson.

At Desdemona Bill Greenhaw and L. P. Hammonds seek the only two seats at Desdemona.

At Gorman the only two candidates are J. O. Thompson and J. Floyd Gilbert.

Seeking the two seats at Scranton are John H. Shrader Jr. and Howard Ingram.

At Rising Star candidates are Robert Butler, Jim Ray Cox, Cecil Carter and Wesley (Pete) Sparks. There are two vacancies there.

Running for Place 1 on the Eastland County Board of Trustees is L. C. Inzer. Candidate for the Precinct 2-seat is W. G. Kirk.

School districts with less than 500 students are required to have candidates for trustees file with the county school superintendent. Eastland, Ranger and Cisco trustee candidates file with business managers of the separate districts. In Eastland candidates are W. E. Hallenbeck and J. T. Gregory.

Today is the deadline for filing in the school races, but some candidates may get their names on the ballot. They could do this if they file for the office by mail before the deadline.

### Officers Seeking Identity of Body Found Near Cisco

Officers of the Eastland County Sheriff's Department this morning were still working on thin clues seeking to identify the body of a man found earlier this week near Cisco.

Dr. Charles H. Ballew, Cisco health officer, has ruled that the man died of natural causes. The body was decomposed and was brought to the Wylie Funeral Home in Cisco from the I. J. Pence farm nine miles northwest of Cisco Wednesday. The body will be kept at the funeral home while officers seek to have it identified.

Chief Deputy Sheriff Johnny Boyd said last Wednesday that Sheriff's officers are definitely still seeking to identify the body. He hinted that several clues are being run down.

## Here's Way to Drive Your Teacher Crazy!

With a wary eye on her teachers, Martha prefaced the article with this statement: "This was written entirely in fun and has a civil purpose behind it. She also confided to us that it wouldn't work.")

By MARTHA CONNELL When a person wants informa-

tion on a certain subject, he usually refers to a dictionary. Because of the lack of information on this specific subject, I have conducted a research on "How to Drive Your Teacher Crazy!" I have, after 12 years, summed the results into the following manuscript.

The first method to be tried is one of antagonizing the teacher.
